


PASSING HANDS

COGITATIONS ON GAIT, GENETICS AND BIOMECHANICS

Most days I have a good chat with my good friend Victor Burton. Victor was raised in southern Saskatchewan back in the thirties when they still rode six miles through blizzard and flood to school and when the train got stuck in fifteen foot drifts in winter and waited there until spring when the snow melted enough so that it could be dug out. Each day brings a new tale of railroad or horse that makes one wish to have lived in a different time. Long before cell phones were thought of, Victor sent Morse code from the railway stations for a living, just like in the old west movies. He has a thousand horse stories from Kentucky Whips to Half Arabs and Standardbreds off the track. Victor is now eighty-nine years old but still rides and trains horses. For the past twenty years, he has been breeding and raising Tennessee Walking horses. Between Victor's twenty years and my fifty years with Walkers our conversation always turn to the easy gaited horse from Tennessee.

Our favorite topic is to discuss the latest edition of the *Walking Horse News* from cover to cover. It is somehow satisfying to flip through the pictures and analyze the gait and conformation of all the horses. We get particularly agitated though when we find a pacing horse being presented even on the front cover. A little side trip on a recent vacation has however given me cause to reflect on the matter, thus my cogitations.

A year ago, my wife Carol and I went to Brazil to visit my daughter, Maya. She married a young man from Brazil who was also doing a study abroad in the Netherlands. (Some of you may remember her showing in the leadline class at Westridge Stables south of Calgary back in about 1991.) Below she's atop Chim-Chim-Charoo and another daughter, Carley, is holding the certificate).



Now in Brazil they are mighty serious about their gaited horses. There are more than 200,000 registered

Mangalarga Marchador horses in Brazil. They have seventy-two branch organizations of their National Breed organization spread all over the country. Associação Brasileira dos Criadores do Cavalo Mangalarga Marchador (ABCCMM) boasts 7,000 members. On top of this they have nation-wide competitions, breeding selection programs, educational programs, and even their own television program. They even have a ranking system for their breeding stallions and feature a breeding individual on their TV channel.

I thought this to be a great opportunity to see how they went about things down there so asked my son-in-law to take us to a horse farm near São Paulo. We headed south-west through a maze of green wooded hills. The tree cover was mostly farmed groves of eucalyptus. They like those because they grow fast and are straight with few side branches. The natural forests had long ago been clear- cut I suppose to ship the hardwood to the stately halls of Europe. After winding through the hills and passing the little town of Aluminia, we left the pavement and travelled the red dirt back-road to the crest of a hill overlooking a couple of picturesque white buildings nestled in the vale. Horses on the hillside pasture let us know we were in the right place. Our little rental car could barely handle the deeply rutted grade approaching the haras (Portuguese for horse farm) below. As we approached the six-stall stable and the small bungalow with whitewashed walls, a red tile roof and blue trim around the windows, we were met by a friendly young lady who spoke good English. They had just purchased the place and were in the process of building up their pleasure riding stable. She introduced us to her father Raul, a professor with a doctorate in horsemanship specializing in the Mangalarga Marchador. He had had a stroke and was wheelchair bound but still conversed well enough with his little English and my little Portuguese. We hit it off instantly.

One of the reasons for our visit was to take a ride and experience the Marchador gait. Pedro and Lucas, a couple of his students brought our horses after we had visited for about an hour. I was hesitant to mount up as my 210 pounds was more than a bit over the recommended twenty percent rider to horse weight percentage. Now here is the interesting thing. My horse did a broken albeit smooth trot the whole time. After we got back Lucas got out his lap-top and explained that there are two types of gait in the Mangalarga Marchador breed: Marcha Picada -

a stepping pace with knee action) and Marcha Batida (a broken trot with knee action but without the suspension between the diagonals like a regular trot).

To test the trueness of the gait, they build sounding boards or ride on concrete so you can really hear the footfalls. I of course had to ask if they had any horses that were neither pacey nor trotty, that were just in-between. He said there was no such thing as marcha do centro. I of course had my Android along and showed him a video of my Blackie on Youtube doing what I thought a pretty square gait but he judged it was marcha picada.

Our hosts treated us like old friends. We sat around on the patio sharing their hospitality and enjoying the peaceful setting including the roosters in the yard, cilantro bushes up to our chests, all shaded by avocado trees. After sandwiches they shared brigadero (a Brazilian chocolate fudge desert) and little demi-cups of Brazilian coffee. Unfortunately, being Mormon, I had to refuse the coffee but heartily accepted the camaraderie.



Lastly, I had to take a photo of a spur they had hanging on the wall. What in the world would anyone want with an eight-inch shank and a four-inch diameter rowel? They could not tell me, but I will propose my theory later.

Ever since the trip I have been stewing about gait. Is stepping pace so bad? I have ridden some reasonably smooth stepping-pacers. In Brazil, they have whole shows dedicated to Marcha Picada. They have over 100,000 horses registered and bred to steppace. Trail Rider Magazine claims that in 1994 a Marchador entered the Guinness Book of World Records with the longest endurance ride of 8,694 miles. Dr. Susan Garlinghouse's Tennessee Walking Horse, John Henry, has completed five Tevis Cup challenges. I contacted her to ask what gait he did over the ride and she replied, "John Henry does eight different gaits but usually defaults to the stepping-pace." I have read several authors who claim the stepping pace leads to unsoundness. Perhaps this opinion is unsound. Let us examine the genetics and biomechanics of gait.

I love reading about the old time walkers that helped develop our wonderful breed. As I was getting to the end I was pleasantly surprised to learn about the son of Black Dust MR who made it to Canada and who sired Bold Victory. Bold Victory is the sire to my gelding, Jack (Victory Walker). "

"Jack is out of Absaroka Snow White who my parents purchased in foal in 2003 from Laurindale Stables. At the time of purchase it was unclear if Snow was in foal but as the months passed it was no longer a question. Jack was born just after Easter 2004 during the tail end of a spring snow storm. He was the first foal my family ever had and he made things easy for us. He is my most trusted trail horse; I started to work cattle with him last fall and he is now teaching my husband about horses and how to ride."

"Jack will be 14 on April 14. While I never met Bold Victory, I can imagine what he looked like from the photos in the article. It's always a pleasure to learn more about the history and blood lines that make up a horse. I can appreciate Jack even more now. I've attached a photo of Jack, below. It is amazing to me how colour can shake out through the genetic tree. "

Ed. Note: Jack's dam was a white maximal sabino. Bold Victory was a heterozygous black. Their son inherited the hidden red colour his parents carried and turned out to be a flax sorrel with minimal sabino!

We are very sad to hear that 'Troop', the very first horse to be awarded the CRTWH TRIPLE CHALLENGE ULTIMATE CANADIAN HORSE died recently, only a short time after his 20th birthday.

CINNAMON'S SADDLE SAGA Part 5

On May 16, 2017, Dr. Sarah Matyjaszek and Dr. Laura Waitt Wolker at the Midwestern University Equine and Bovine Clinic in Glendale, Arizona, determined that Cinnamon's difficulties with cantering, inconsistency in middle gaits, stumbling, cinchiness, occasional bucking, and scrambling in the horse trailer were all caused by left lumbar epaxial muscle atrophy due to chronic improper saddle fit. I treated Cinnamon with two weeks of rest, banamine, the back massage I could give Cinnamon myself, and a new saddle. After Cinnamon's rest I started riding her bareback.

Cinnamon's neurologic score of zero along with clean lumbar spine x-rays were very good news because they indicated the saddle had not yet done irreversible damage. Cinnamon's lameness score of one was attributed to the back problem. It was a relief to find a single, curable, cause for all of Cinnamon's issues! Unfortunately, Cinnamon was in this predicament because none of the saddles I'd tried fit!

I asked the vets for recommendations about a suitable saddle for Cinnamon. Dr. Waitt is actively involved in the sport of Endurance so she asked the Facebook group she's a member of about saddle fitters. I also asked the vets what was wrong with the fit of the saddle I'd been using. Basically, the tree was too long.

Dr. Waitt explained that Cinnamon, like most TWH, has a short back. She also explained there are several ways of measuring back length that yield differing answers. For saddle fitting the critical measure of back length is from the back edge of the horse's scapula to the last rib when the horse is standing square. When Dr. Waitt placed her hands on these places it was easy to see just how short Cinnamon's back is. On May 18 Dr. Waitt emailed a list of four saddle makers that were recommended by

the Endurance Facebook group.

May 16, Cinnamon and I got home from Glendale in time for me to turn around and take my Mother down to Scottsdale May 17 to bring my Father home from the hospital. Consequently, it was several days before I realized my truck was losing a quart of oil every two days! It was 10 days before my favorite mechanic could fix it. That unexpected expense on top of the costs of the Glendale trip strained my finances before I had a chance to look at saddles.

When circumstances calmed down I reviewed all the tack catalogs I had and made a list of every saddle I knew did not fit Cinnamon. I went online to view websites for the recommended saddle makers and another saddle maker who specializes in gaited horse saddles that I'd heard about at a clinic. Reading the websites eliminated three of the saddlemakers because they used standard, mass produced saddle trees in sizes I already knew did not fit Cinnamon.

The gaited horse saddle maker listed only two tree sizes. A local friend had purchased two saddles from them so checking that option was as easy as riding Cinnamon over to my friend's house and trying her saddle. That saddle did not fit Cinnamon.

I checked the local feed stores, a pawn shop, and a tack consignment shop. The consignment shop had a Sport Saddle treeless saddle I could borrow. June 10, Cinnamon and I tried the Sport Saddle on a trail ride. The treeless saddle was comfortable, except for the way the stirrups were attached. The girth arrangement was rather odd but it stayed in place better than I expected. Cinnamon seemed happier with the Sport Saddle than with any other saddle I'd put on her, but when I unsaddled after the ride I could see the treeless saddle was putting pressure on her withers. The Sport Saddle went back to the consignment shop.

On May 26, I emailed Alleghany Mountain Trail Saddles in South Wales, New York. This was the only saddle maker that offered custom tree fitting. They responded promptly, but all of their fit kits were out with customers so I had to wait. Shipping fit kits and saddles by ground from New York to Arizona takes a week. The AMTS fit kit was a set of 10 fiberglass forms. The instructions said to stand the horse up square, then photograph each form from 45 degree angle at both shoulders, and a straight side view, then walk the horse slowly forward while taking a short side view video of the form. I also added 45 degree angle rear views because Cinnamon's saddle fit issues were affecting her loins. Based on the photos and videos, AMTS offered one of their Western style demo saddles at a

discounted price. When the saddle arrived I tried it on Cinnamon for a short trail ride, in addition to photographing it on her. Cinnamon and I did not like the fit of the saddle. When AMTS saw the photos they emailed: "Send the saddle back. It does not fit your horse!" AMTS paid the return shipping and gave me a credit for the saddle.

Next AMTS sent an endurance saddle tree and several more fit forms for me to try on Cinnamon and photograph. Obtaining satisfactory photos and videos took several tries, but I could email AMTS a dropbox link to deliver the images. This continued all summer before AMTS was satisfied they knew how to fit an endurance style saddle tree for Cinnamon. Cinnamon's back is so short a Western saddle was not an option.

I ordered a new saddle for Cinnamon on Sept. 20, 2017, and shipped the saddle tree and fit forms back to AMTS. In mid November, 2017, Cinnamon's new, hand-made, custom-fitted, endurance saddle arrived. (*Below*) Cinnamon is still cinchy but out on the trail she's moving more freely and is more consistent in gait than before.

We're still working on physical straightening and strengthening for Cinnamon and I've started taking dressage lessons.

TEACHING THE GAITED HORSE TO CANTER

Part One: CONDITIONING FOR THE CANTER

Gaited horses have many different ways of moving. Some of them find it very easy to canter and for others it is a challenge. I have nine Tennessee Walking Horses in my pasture and when I call them up they come running in about nine different ways. Some trot up to the canter, some pace, and some just transition right into it. One of my little racking mares canters like a startled antelope. The other prefers a flying pace over any kind of canter. This is why the 'third gear' of gaited horses needs attention in different ways. However, the approach to the canter calls for one thing that is common to all of them; their need for pre-conditioning.

Most of us know that horses need to be in shape (as we humans also do) to perform athletically challenging tasks. Even carrying a rider over flat ground at a walk is an athletic task for a horse. Cantering with a rider is extremely taxing when collection and rate are called for.

Before you start, it is necessary to determine the physical condition of the horse. Are there issues with soundness such as arthritis or prior injuries? Does the horse have a poor body score? Are there issues with saddle fit or back soundness? In all honesty it would be unfair to inflict pain or even moderate discomfort while training for the canter. The sessions have to be comfortable and rewarding for both horse and rider.

So, assuming you have a fit and healthy horse that can already carry you comfortably, we will begin conditioning for the canter.

There is a simple exercise that can be done both in hand and in the saddle. I learned to do a *rock-back* at a clinic with Dianne Little. I had never consciously done this one before but it intrigued me and I find it beneficial. If the horse can do it on the ground, it can certainly learn to do it under saddle. This exercise teaches the horse to transfer its weight to the back end and stand like that for increasingly longer times, and eventually be cued to rock back while mounted, moving and ultimately achieving a nice canter departure. You can cue off the halter, and later, the bridle.

I believe that *backing* is the single most critical element in conditioning for the canter. The horse needs a strong back end in order to do canter departures correctly. The canter sequence starts from behind on one back foot, and the front end must be light enough to allow the horse to balance back on this single point.


Back your horse in hand whenever you are leading it. Do both the rock-back exercise and backing interchangeably using different cue-strengths for each so he learns the difference. You can ground-drive and long line for this also. Back up and down hills and in soft or even slightly deep footing. Back your horse under saddle. Teach him to back with very little 'ask' and back him up and down small hills and in soft footing. Teach him to hold a stop on a hill in both directions.

Driving is also an important tool for developing strength in the back end. Backing in long lines is great, but even better is training to pull. Horses develop great back end strength when pulling. Taking the time to safely train a horse to pull (even a hay bale on a rope) can be beneficial.

All of these exercises are helpful for conditioning horses for the canter. They will be using muscle groups that they aren't accustomed to; therefore it is important to develop them slowly.

In the next installment, I will offer some techniques for helping the horse to understand what you are asking when you want him to do a canter departure under saddle.


