Show News

The first Tennessee Walking Horse class in Eastern Canada was held at Sneak-A-Peak Stables, Castleton, Ont.this fall. The overall program was that of a fun show, with fifteen classes. Horses were called to a "middle gait", being a jog, trot, rack or run-walk. Classes enjoyed various English & Western tack. Entrants from as far away as Quebec City (450 miles) participated.

The winners of the Open Tenn. Walking Horse class were:

4th; Hae's Go Boy Cricket, Mr. Gray Knowles, Brantford, Ont.

5th; Allen, Mr. Peter Gibson, Stouffville, Ont.

From Darlene Moore, more information on the Manitoba All-Breed Show: "In 1971 I managed to obtain purebred Walking Horse classes at the annual Manitoba All-Breed Show held in August. It is always held at a main centre in Man., Neepawa, Virden or Portage la Prairie. It is an excellent show of halter classes for 17 breeds Saturday and performance classes on Sunday. I proudly announce that my stallion has won Champion of the Breed for the last 6 years, beaten only by his own mother the first year."

SHOW NEWS continued:

"This year the society consented to put in an Open Plantation Tenn. Walker class. There were entrants from the U.S.A. there and it was quite successful in that the public showed a lot of interest. This class was won by Ben Kuske, New Rockford, N.D. with the Moore family of Boissevain taking reserve honors.

So you people that like to show - remember the Manitoba Annual All Breed Show in August. Nine halter classes and one or more saddle classes for Walkers with four trophies and 40 ribbons up for grabs!!"

Several people have written about a possible "Walker Day" or show to acquaint people with these fine horses, not just as "high stepping show horses" as Hazel Paton says, but as a using horse. "Get people riding them at a show or at a special Walker Day so they can learn the feel of them."

I think this is a very good idea and happily, some folks around Edmonton are working on it. Jack Kerns and the Hermans at Willowbrae Stables found themselves too busy to get it organized this year but are tentatively considering something for next year. Mr. Kerns wrote, "I wonder if we could work up a set of classes for a show next year with some other breed association, for example, the Pintos. Maybe we could run a show of our own at Willowbrae."

What do you think? How many would be willing to support such a show and get out and exhibit? Let me know your ideas and I'll pass them on to Mr. Kerns.

In similar vein, Linda Block pointed out that Walkers should be included in the annual Alberta Horse Improvement Show at Spruce Meadows near Calgary. These classes are for Alberta born animals and are intended to encourage and advertise the breeding of superior purebred horses in the province.

Do you think there are enough Walkers to justify classes? Let's hear from interested Alberta breeders.

British Columbia

Walkers are moving briskly in B.C. too. Don & JoAnne McDonald of Pouce Coupe purchased two fillies from D.M. Stanley-Clarke - Sage King's Diamond 770704 & King's Falling Star 770703, plus the mare Little Toot Wilson 634236 while Lynda McNabb bought Marquita Belle, 640080.

Mrs. A.R. Patterson, Cawston, has been raising pony Walkers & really likes them. They're fast movers & don't consume near the feed the bigger horses need. She has both crosses: Tenn. stud on Welsh mares and Welsh stud on TWH mare, and prefers the latter due to better size & disposition.

W.G.A. Lambe, Vernon, owns the TWHorses Pride of Thompson 701301 Princess Beth 712976 and Anythingeldo 657890. He has sold his farm and the horses are currently in Washington with his partner. He plans to have both mares bred in '78 and is bringing all three back to B.C. in the spring.

From Earl Linsley of Ground Birch: "We live 28 miles west of Dawson Creek on the John Hart Highway and raise reg. polled Herefords and Tenn. Walking Horses.

We started our horse herd with a few grade Amer. Saddlebred mares & bred to our first Tenn. Walker, Little Wonder, bred by Mrs. Leta Tompkins, Notch Hill, BC. We now have 8 half blood T.W. mares to breed back to our new stallion that we bought last June from Evelyn Wocknitz of Tappen - Ebony Walking Eagle.

As we summer range the cows 30 miles one way from home we find the gaited horses almost a must as it takes so much less time on the trail and easier on the rider.

Our son also has one reg. T.W. mare, Jewel's Stardust C. We welcome any T.W. breeders or interested horse people travelling through to stop and see our stock."

Alberta News

Butch Friis reports that the dog trials at Hanna went very well and that there were some excellent horses there from the U.S. & Can.

Anne Wilson, Rolling Hills, used to own a Walking Horse gelding. Now that she's back in the country she's looking for a Walker again. She says that before receiving the newsletter she was beginning to think that she must be the only person in Alta. who even knew what a Tenn. Walker was!

Pam & Dave Gunderson, Water Valley, use their stallion, "He'za Walker", for rounding up cattle on $3\frac{1}{2}$ sections of land, so they could probably fill you in on the breed's ability as a ranch horse.
