

CRTWH TRAINING LEVELS - Background

Effective May 21, 2025

The CRTWH Training Levels were developed to provide owners of Canadian Registered TWH, the opportunity to measure skills and set targets for their relationship between rider and horses. The Levels include Basic Skills in Hand, Trail Riding, Horsemanship, Driving, Horse Camping, Liberty. Horse and riders are encouraged to participate in any activity desired.

In each activity entry begins at the lowest level which must be successfully challenged before the next level of the same activity is challenged. All activities are evaluated by people knowledgeable of and/or experienced with the particular activity and gaits of the TWH.

No matter the area entered, Basic Skills in Hand must be successfully challenged before any other activities can be challenged.

Currently Basic Skills in Hand is only 1 Level. Entry is limited to horses of at least 18 months of age.

Recently, the administrators of the Canadian Triple Challenge received a request to allow horses younger than 18 months to challenge Basic Skills In Hand. Recognizing the importance of skills for horses of any age, even those younger than 18 months, the following proposal was presented to the Board for discussion.

Skills currently included in Basic Skills in Hand

Catch the Horse – Stall – Paddock or Field

Halter the Horse

Tie the Horse – stands for 2 minutes – handler asks the horse to move in both directions

Groom the horse demonstrating you can – touch the head and body everywhere including ears, under tail and udder or sheath

Lift all feet while horse is either tied or free standing

Wash the face

Lead the horse with - Horse beside handler, Horse behind Handler. From the off side

Tasks while being led to simulate an obstacle course include in no order

Through an open gate, Through a closed gate – open and close

Up a slope, Down a slope

Through Mud, Around Mud

Around water, Through water

Around distractions - Around machinery or vehicles or bicycles (still not running)

Noise distractions of some type

Around a minimum of at least one other animal (horses, cattle, sheep, pigs, goats, cats, dogs, ducks, chickens etc)

Over and around a safe piece of plywood or tarp

Over poles or logs with uneven spacing

Move 6 steps to the left (light or no pressure)

Back a minimum of 6 steps

Doctoring

Hose legs, Show teeth

Dressing

Blanket (not necessarily a horse blanket)

Leg protection of some kind (polo wraps, shipping boots, splint boots, bell boots)

Fly mask or slinky

Trailer Loading - Going in, coming off

Basic Skills in Hand Effective May 1, 2025

Basic Skills in Hand has been altered to allow younger horses to participate in Training Levels. The basic skills have not been changed, but the difficulty of how that skill is performed has been altered to allow for 2 or 3 Levels of Basic Skills.

The proposed Basic Skills in Hand has been divided into 3 Levels determined by age.

Level 1 (Safety) Minimum Age 6 months

Level 2 (Growth) Minimum age 12 months

Level 3 (Graduate) Minimum Age 18 Months - combination of previous skills but with additional difficulty

Each Level will be evaluated using the same philosophy as the current Basic Skills but with tasks appropriate to the age of the of the entry.

Basic Skills demonstrates that the horse has been handled from both sides and is respectful of the handler and is respectful of the handler's space.

Any practice deemed unsafe or dangerous or abusive for either horse or handler/rider will result in disqualification.

A horse that does not respect the handler's space will be disqualified. In all tasks, perfection is not the goal.

Safety for both horse and handler, respect and willingness are what is being evaluated.

It is expected that some new circumstances may cause a horse to stop or refuse. It is not the stopping that matters, but how the situation is handled by horse or handler. It is to be expected that a horse will react to some stimuli, but the horse should also calm down and work through the situation.
