Marjorie Fabro on Training Walkers

"You asked me before how I train my Walkers. I take lots of time & put lots of miles on them. I start them out barefoot to get their natural gait - natural running walk, pace or trot - then put a pair of keg shoes & then toe weights, but I take their training slowly and put in lots of miles in open and rough country. Lots of hills are good, up and going down very slowly."

"I feel if you can train the Walking Horse naturally without heavy shoes you have a steady natural walk, whereas if you work with weighted shoes you have to use them all the time."

"Working cattle is also good for the training of the Walker. Ours do everything other breeds do but with more ease."

HI - BILL HOWES HERE!

I've been stumbling around lately trying to get things started. Firstly for a display stall at Red Deer and now the one at Lloydminster. The show at Red Deer has been cancelled due to a technicality that "No horse shall be allowed on the grounds which is not entered for the show." The display at Lloyd sounds identical except that due to assistance from the Horse Industries Branch there is to be no charge for the four day stall rental.

For those that haven't heard, the classes for Walking Horses at Lloydminster have been cancelled for this year due to what appeared to be a lack of interest last year. On talking to Peggy McAllister it was definitly emphasized that they are certainly ready and willing to help us in any way if we would just indicate that we are ready and willing to help ourselves as a group.

The display is to consist of one 10 by 10 steel pen with approximately 4 feet of area for written and printed display. They have no objection to the same horse there for four days but surely we can show people four different Walking Horses? I took the liberty of writing to Tennessee to ask for any information and pamphlets for a display. They were most cooperative and I received a huge supply of give away pamphlets of four types and car stickers pushing the Versatility Program.

I sent in the application to Lloyd and on it I requested two demonstration periods per day of 15 minutes each minimum to consist of a comentator giving some history of the Walking Horse and then with the aid of horse and rider demonstrate the different gaits and confirmation of the Tennessee Walking Horse. I suggested that if time allowed we would wish to enter a group of horses and riders into the ring for a couple of turns to indicate the versatility and sensibility of these fine animals.

The fact that no Walking Horse classes are on the program does not mean they cannot be in the show. Peggy McAllister has pointed out that they have left some classes quite open in HALTER and COSTUME and I think one Western class. Anyway she'll know more for sure on the 25 of May and we'll somehow get this information to you.

I am going to write to Tennessee and see if I can snaffle a film as there are facilities for films available at Lloyd. I will write a letter to the Horse Industries Branch to obtain information concerning setting up our own association. Upon talking to just a couple of people there seems to be some confusion as to whether we shold first join the TWHBEA. The initiation fee is \$25.00 plus yearly dues in advance of \$10.00. So it will cost \$35.00 to join. (I have about 15 membership forms that I will bring along.)

I personally don't see any point in trying to go it alone as we'll need all the help we can get. Foal registry is almost double for non-members. If we're going to form an association I think at that time we should take a vote as to how we intend to promote the Walking Horse. I sense that there is a majority for "bare-foot", "run walk", "comfort riding" at the least expense and consumption of time. This I think is the single most important factor as to whether we can come together as a group.

So the plans are to get everyone to Lloydminster for the four day display July 18 - 21 1979. We will probably have to board our horses in the trailers for that time unless some kind soul close to Lloyd has extra stall space. We need help:

- a display. someone with show experience preferably.

 There are to be no unprofessional looking signs. In other words no hand painted signs on cardboard.

 It will have to be someone close enough that I can get the pamphlets to. I have no show experience so would not be an asset in this department.
- 2) Someone to run film if I can get one from Tennessee.
- 3) Someone to write up commentary for history, flat walk, running walk and canter of T.W.H. suitable for demonstration in ring. Help is available at Lloyd for the commentary but I hope we can get people from

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our own group to commit themselves to this job. Again

4) Someone to help me arrange meetings every day at Lloyd preferably after demonstrations (if in morning or early afternoon). for discussion on association etc.

I'm asking Ed and Pat Hutchison, Andy McKinnon, Miles and Sandy Herman, Marjory Lacy.

Could North Peace people please get in contact with me so we can get some more ideas. I don't want anyone to think I'm wanting to run this show; I just want to give it a push to start it. I'm sure there are plenty of people who are full of ideas and ambition and are anxious to get the ball rolling. I have a few more ideas concerning the general format for the display and demonstration. Any ideas pro or con are definitly wanted provided they come in time so we can arrange everything to the closest possible satisfaction of everyone.

These are suggestions only. If you don't like them say so. 1) We arrange for a definite area in the grounds so we all park together. How about a circle or rectangle with all trailers backed onto an open area to be held for general meetings and discussions. A rectangle would be more practical than a circle, space wise.

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- 2) Bring a few picnic tables so we could all eat outside. Maybe if someone arranged it we might get a discount for ordering for everyone in advance to eat at specific times.
- could start from the beginning with the history of the breed, horses in ring on halter say. Follow through with a demo on gaits through the four sessions and then start over with some refinements of the previous demos and alot more detail. To me this might add more interest than one set demo and repeating it over the required number of times. What do you think? For something like this I think it would be wise to make a schedule and photo copies to be handed out at stall display. There seems to be plenty of info for commentary at demos in these pamphlets I have.

I could probably ramble on but I hope the rest of you will want to get your ideas in here. We have enough time if we get with it now don't you think? My phone # is 922-2932 Address RR#2 Ardrossan. Let's hear your opinion on it.

He was purchased from the Wilbrahams of Alameda, Sask. He is her second American Walking Pony. Her first, also a bay from the Wilbrahams' ranch, was lost due to an accident, but by then Teddy was sold enough on the Walking Ponies to go all the way back to Sask. for another.
