Why do so many people, who get into the breed with so much enthusiasm, sell out and disappear' within a few short years? Perhaps it is common in all breeds to some extent, but it seems to happen over and over amongst Walking Horse owners. WHY? Do you have any ideas? I think it might be partly that Tennessee Walkers have a reputation for being easy to ride and easy to handle - and generally speaking they are just that. And so naturally they attract the novice horseman. After riding one, how can you resist! But they are still horses and it does take some basic knowledge to handle horses, feed and care for them. Also a certain amount of dedication to feed, water, clean out after and groom, day in and day out, whether you ride or not. And secondly, in spite of all that we wish were true about Walkers being naturally gaited from birth, they are still a little trickier to train than your average walk - trot horse. You have to know more about how the horse is actually moving, and you have to train it hold its gait. It's something like learning to drive a truck that has more gears! And when a person buys a horse for its smooth flowing gait and then finds that he isn't getting that glide ride, well - who can blame him for being discouraged? Here's what Elna Konkin, Edgewater, has to say:

"I'd like to give you my opinion on the one question you asked - why people who enthusiastically get into Walkers get out after 2 or 3 years. Maybe it is because somewhere along the line they had a chance to ride one and just being an individual who has enjoyed many an hour in the saddle just enjoying God's creation and the company of a horse and a dog and maybe running a few cattle (as I have) decide that owning one of 'those' would make things just that much more enjoyable. Right? Then - you find your horse is breaking gait - like I mean all sorts of strange things are going on down there from time to time and most of it is not that great to set, but, never having had a lesson (don't know if that would help) and having no previous knowledge of Walkers to draw on, you don't know what's going on or why. So, you ask someone who has Walkers and is showing and doing their own schooling and they are no help: (Whether they don't know or choose not to help you.) And so you soon lose that enthusiasm for Walkers, especially when you can go out and call that fat little grey, jump on and she'll go single-footing off down the road just as neat as you please. I'd love to be riding that Walker mare - she's a whole lot classier to look at, a couple of hands taller and, damn it, I bought and paid for her to ride her. Sure I think it would help if I took riding lessons from a pro but I don't want to ride around and around in a circle. There have been some clinics in Edmonton & Calgary that may well have been some help but I couldn't get to them. do have a book here - The Care & Training of the Tennessee Walking Horse by Joe Webb - very interesting reading but not much help. Anyhow now I think there have to be some secrets - from me at least - with regards to clues that will help keep these horses going in that beautiful natural gait (and I'm not sure what that gait is either, as it's not always the same to look at with the three we have on the place now). So I think confusion accounts at with the three we have on the place now). for the loss of enthusiasm, and as well the reluctance of an obviously knowledgeable person to share what they have learned because they don't want competition. I don't expect most people are like that but with the sparseness of Walkers in these parts you have to put on a lot of miles to find the right people. Any tips from readers would sure be appreciated as I don't give up easily!"

Thanks, Elna, for your frank comments. I'm sure nearly all of us have felt similarly frustrated at times. I have rationalized that if a Walker is good looking and has a nice disposition, you still have as much as you can expect from any other breed - and if it does an easy saddle gait without special training or shoeing, that's the icing on the cake. But that's not a solution to the problem. Is there one? What do you think?
