TRAINING YOUR WALKER WITH DIANE MEIS SEPT

QUESTION: I recently bought a 4 year old mare. She was green broke. She does not do the 'rocking chair' canter. If I squeeze her easy, she does a rack; if I squeeze her hard, she does a fast canter. Is there anything I can do to develop a slower canter?

ANSWER: There is a way to develop a slower, 'rocking chair' canter.
First of all, there are a few things you need to keep in mind. A slow easy canter comes from a balanced horse. At 4 years of age, your mare may not yet be able to canter smoothly because she cannot balance herself and you well enough.

If the horse was cantered before you bought her, how was she allowed to canter? Maybe they asked her to go fast. If so, this is what she is used to and thinks she is being asked to do. You must let her know how you want

her to canter.

A nice canter also comes from a horse that is at ease with cantering With someone on its back. This comes from experience and having a capable rider.

Now we must find some ways to show her what you want of her. You mention that she moves into a rack if you squeeze her gently. You don't want to allow this to happen. Go ahead and squeeze her so she goes right in

to the canter when you're ready for it.

But, before you ask her for the canter, be sure she is relaxed and moving easily at the walk. Talk with her quietly, and as you squeeze her into the canter, ask for it verbally also. Say it as 'rocking chair' as you can. Then continue to talk to her, saying 'Easy, easy, easy' in a quiet, cadenced tone. In relation to this, gently and firmly take up on the reins and release them consistently with her stride. If you feel even a few strides a bit slower, praise her.

When she does slow a bit, relax your rein hold but as soon as she regains more speed, let the hold (and release) of the reins be firmer. It is important to remember not to jerk the reins; this would only upset the horse. The movement is almost a rolling sort of action; hold, relax; hold, relax;

hold, relax, at the speed you want her to go.

While cantering, do not take a tight, steady hold on the reins. This will make the horse uptight, and cause her to try to get away from the bit by going faster. Also, the horse will be rougher due to her not being relaxed.

Make yourself get out of the horse's mouth.

There are some useful little helpers to develop a slower canter. Canter up a slight incline. Be sure to use the canter cues we discussed earlier. Praise her as she 'rolls' nicely. Don't give up. Turn around, go back down and canter up again. When you get to the top of the incline, canter as far as she will at a nice canter. When she picks up speed, walk her and start again.

Another thing that will work on some horses is to go ahead and let them canter as they would normally. Go along with it as if that is what you want. As the horse gets a bit tired, or is ready to slow, you start right in with the cues for the canter. The horse will then begin to relate your cues with her slower gait. Eventually, as you apply your cues, the horse

will move into a nice canter.

Also, if you are familiar with longeing a horse, this can be a useful exercise. It is almost essential to have an enclosed area to do this exercise. Once again, be sure the horse is well warmed up in the walk and is relaxed. Ask for the canter by voice and a snap of the whip if necessary. Gently pull and release on the longe line as you talk in rhythym with her as you did earlier. Keep in mind it's not a jerk on the line, it's a steady rolling pull and release. If she does a few strides slowly, praise her.

TRAINING WITH DIANE continued

If the mare gets progressively faster, only allow her to canter as long as she will do it slowly. Then, very firmly, bring her down either to a slower canter as we discussed, or right back to the walk, relax her, and start again.

Remember, this will take time. You must be sure that, as the handler, you do a nice 'rocking chair' canter in attitude, voice, and movement. The horse will eventually follow cue and give you a super enjoyable ride.

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

What do you think of current prices for Tennessee Walking Horses in Canada? Are they too high? Too low? About right? Or don't you know what con-

stitutes an average price these days?

I've heard from both buyers and sellers about pricing Walkers. Sellers tend to be reluctant to advertise prices. Buyers are disappointed when there is no price listed on a horse that interests them. Here are some comments. Ann Tonn, B.C. writes, "Why do so few people put a price in their ads? Are the others so ashamed of the price that they dare not mention it? Surely if a note were put at the top of each ad page stating that all prices are subject to change without notice and if ads mentioned 'Firm' or 'Negotiable', then we poor, budget-minded buyers could have a better idea of what is available in the price range we can afford. Without the price in the ad, we must spend money and time inquiring, only to find that the price is, regretfully, beyond our means. How about it, folks?"

In the same vein, Lawrence Simpson, Sask. says, "One thing I would like to see everyone do is put down what they want for the horses when they advertise them for sale in your paper. It saves a lot of phoning and writing. I

sometimes think they are ashamed of what they are asking."

I think the problem most of us have with pricing our Walkers is a lack of information on what they are selling for in general. Consequently we are unsure of what to ask. About the only guides we have are what we ourselves paid for the horse or what it cost us to raise the animal. Training adds another variable, as do age and sex. Inflation throws another curve into it since a dollar now is worth much less than it was ten years ago. If you bought a mare for \$900 in 1971, that doesn't mean that a comparable mare now is worth \$900. She'd be somewhere in the neighbourhood of \$2250 in 1983 dollars;

So perhaps a market survey would help us all out - buyers and sellers. If you have bought or sold a Walker in the past couple of years and would like to help out with this, please fill out the form below and send it in to me.
