ALBERTA WALKING HORSE ASSOC. FUTURITY - 1984 by Hilton Hack

The Futurity is a way to prove your judgement as a breeder. When you select mares which reflect top quality, and breed those mares to stallions chosen for strong, desirable traits, the foals of this chosen combination will substantiate your high standards of breeding judgement.

The Futurity not only proves the value of the parents by their nomination, but also gives the resulting foal eligibility to compete for prizes with similar foals, as a weanling and as a yearling, thus gaining recognition and adding to the value of the foal.

The Futurity nomination starts when the mare and stallion which have

been bred are nominated by April 30 of each year.

Payment of fees for the Futurity are relatively small are are made by a certain deadline, as listed below. These fees make up the prizes for the show year and therefore, no fee is returnable after the nomination is made.

Remember, your good judgement as a breeder is reflected with the foal's showing in the Futurity, increasing the value of the parents and offspring. Choose your breeding stock with careful consideration to improve your breeding program as well as the Walking Horse breed.

FUTURITY FOR CANADIAN - BORN FOALS

WEANLING DIVISION ELIGIBILITY:

- -Stallion nomination fee by April 30: AWHA members \$35; non-members \$40. Late nominations accepted until June 30 at an additional 50% premium.
- -Dam nomination fee by April 30. AWHA members \$10; non-members \$15.00 Late nominations accepted until June 30 at 50% premium.
- -Foal (born or not) nomination by July 31. AWHA members \$10; non-members \$15.00.

YEARLING DIVISION ELIGIBILITY

TRAINING YOUR WALKER WITH DIANE MEIS SEPT

QUESTION: When I bought my TWH gelding last year, as a three year old, he would do a real nice running walk, and he did it naturally without any special training. All I had to do was squeeze him. I rode him all summer, mostly in the mountains and on trails that were uneven and rocky. He started to pace on the parts of the trail that were a bit smoother. What should I do to get him back into his good running walk? By way of background, I ride him with a snaffle bit and a light rein. He only gaits when he is under saddle.

ANSWER: It is hard to answer this without seeing the horse and rider work

together, but we can make some stabs at it.

The first thing I can say for sure is that the mountain riding is great for the horse. This type of riding can only help to improve the natural ability of the animal. It allows him to become more aware of himself, and of you and him as a pair.

Now, my guess at the answer to this problem is once again the good old

back-to-basics ... FLAT WALK, FLAT WALK, FLAT WALK;

A Walking Horse must be moving freely and comfortably in the flat walk before he can move into the running walk. This is true for every time yov sit on that horse's back. It is true for any athlete. Sprinters don't just walk to the starting line and take off at maximum speed with the blast of the gun. No matter how many times they race, they warm up their muscles until they're relaxed and ready for maximum use.

A horse as young as yours needs extra attention. He is still so much in the learning stages. He'll believe anything you let him believe. If he is allowed to pace, he will think this is what you want. If, however, he is allowed to work in a long, loose, flat walk, he will carry this movement through into his running walk.

Once you hit a smooth part in the trail, be sure you don't push him on too fast. This is what I would guess has happened. Sure, he has been using himself to maneuver the obstacles, but not with a long, fluid motion. Allow

him to regain this motion on the smooth sections of trail.

Another thing you may want to consider when looking at this problem is feet. I really hope this has nothing to do with it and it probably doesn't. But, how was the horse shod or trimmed when you got him? Has anything changed in this manner? Ask your farrier.

Constantly keep in mind that you are working with a youngster who needs reinforcement for what he does well. This will develop the confidence that

allows him to progress.

THE 'VERSATILE WALKER' BROCHURE

I talked to Debbie Vader, MacKay, AB at the end of January and she says to thank everyone who has sent photos of their Walkers doing all sorts of interesting things. However, she still needs more pictures, and they must be clear and sharp to be suitable for reproduction. She has Walkers in harness hitched to buggies, sleighs, even a plough! She'd really like some of Walkers jumping, doing ranch work, etc. If you have some good photos you'd like to share, please send them to Debbi Vader, Box 130, Niton Junction, AB TOE 180. (In case you missed the Nov./Dec. newsletter, Debbi suggested we all join together to publish a colour brochure showing the versatility of the Walking Horse. So far, Debbi is trying to see if there are enough photos worthy of reproduction in such a brochure. If there are, a 'mock-up' can be made, and the question of how to finance it addressed.

PRICES SURVEY _ Have we heard from YOU yet?

A dozen people have replied so far, with a total of 42 transactions. The highest price reported is \$3200, with the lowest being \$600. Most people feel that they've received their money's worth, but there are exceptions. Prices for foals have been fairly uniform; the greatest variations have been for mature mares. I'm going to wait for more information to come in before I do a detailed analysis. However, I'm sure you will be interested in some of the comments that people have sent in with their survey forms:

"Looks like I tend to buy high and sell low most of the time. I realize what a horse is worth and seldom try to bring people down on the price. When selling, I tend to come down in my price sometimes, simply to place a Walking Horse - I feel I have to do this occasionally to promote the breed. In regard to the issue of pricing a horse in an ad, I have my reasons for not doing it, as I'm sure everyone else has too. I don't price my horses because if it's a young one it may be worth \$1000 today, but \$1500 in sixty days time if you have done a lot of work with him. If you've priced him and someone comes to lock and finds you have raised your price, they don't like it too well. I find that when I run an ad it may be several months later that you get inquiries. So that's why I prefer not to price my horses in an ad."

"About your inquiry about pricing horses. I feel that this is such a difficult thing due to so many variables. The price of the stud fee, how long one has had the horse (if a young one) regarding costs of de-worming, farrier. feed, etc. Then comes the price of training. Oh, that is something few will pay for, yet most buyers want a well trained horse! Then comes the definition of 'trained'. Some could care less if a horse is trained (& I mean trained) to lift its feet, not spock at unexpected little things, be set in its gaits, take its leads, etc. Most just expect the horse to have this training, never thinking about all the hours that someone has spent teaching the horse. So this aspect dopends on the seller's ability to sell. Now if one is selling a horse they have only ridden and not raised, then they usually expect to get their money out and maybe a little more."

"If I have raised a fcal and sell it as a yearling, halter broken and easy to handle, then \$1000 is what a good foal is worth. Now add some training and \$1500 is equivalent to being broken to maybe move forward at a good flat walk, and understanding what the bit and reins are about. But 2 months training on an unbroken horse is not much when someone has to start from scratch. Thus I feel that most of our horses are underpriced, if they are 6 or 7 years old and trained. Then again, some people are truly not interested in an exceptionally well trained horse. Maybe most do not recognize the well moving horse nor realize that it is training that makes them stand out from the others. So I feel that it is very difficult to define a selling price, other than what a seller thinks he requires and what a horse is worth to the buyer. I do feel that if a horse is advertised, the price should be indicated in the ad."

"I've found that the same price tag applied to several different horses of the same age and training will create different reactions in me, depending on the animal's pedigree, over-all appearance and temperament. It's all a matter of personal taste, I suppose."

"I've had several people tell me lately that they'd sure like to have a Walker -'Man, they're smooth - but they sure are the most expensive horses around! Why, quarter Horses are a quarter of the price.' And I have reached the point where I am saying, Fine, get yourself a QH then, and bounce off into the sunset. Other people may want to raise horses at a loss, but I don't. Think of the breeder's investment in brood stock (especially in the most expessive breed around!), facilities, feed, vet care, not to mention time. Very few do better than break even. Shell out a fair price & Ride with Pride on a Tennessee Walker."

BETTY MOTHERWELL wrote this letter while in Denver. She has since re-

turned to Quesnel.

"The saddest news I have at this time is the untimely death of the great and gorgeous 'Mr. Barker' in September. He was 20 yrs old. He was my first Walking Horse, a champion & a gentleman, who really opened up the horizons of my life, engendering a pride that had only one way to go - into a breeding program to get more of what he had to give."

"The good news is that Laurie & Sherrie Sharp of Quesnel are taking over where I left off, being the proud owners of two Barker sons; the 15:3 hand two yr old golden sorrel, Barker's B.B. Ace, and the six month old liver chestnut, Barker's Gemini. B.B. took over Barker's harem this year, in the same manner he won his first competitive class in Prince George (out of 6) in August. The Sharps also have two Barker fillies; yearling Rawyards Moon Maiden and weanling Barker's Last Dawn, whom you'll be hearing more about I'm sure."

"Unfortunately, we had to cancel our trip to Calgary for the Yearling Futurity, as my colt, Rawyard's Barker Sun, (also 15:3) developed a sand crack which made him unfit for travelling, so Maiden had to stay home too."

"We had two 1983 fillies - both by Randy's Mr. Barker and out of Betty's Early Dawn and Midnight Star F.F."

From HELEN WILLIAMSON, CALGARY, "I am looking forward to the downhill slide of spring as the days are growing noticeably longer. This year we are expecting 3 mares to foal from AI with frozen semen. We bred 4 mares and got 3 in foal, which is a very good rate. As good, if not better than, hand breeding. These will be the first Canadian foals as a result of this type of breeding."

THE BREEDERS' CORNER by Marjorie C. Lacy

"Horse breeding is one part art, one part science and two parts obsession. (Quoted from an article in <u>Equus</u>, Oct.'83, by Bobbie Lieberman.)

For years the horse breeder's motto has been, 'Breed the best to the best - and hope for the best.'

But that is no longer enough. There's something else we should be doing

too, and that is paying attention to WHAT we are trying to produce.

What kind of Walkers do you want to raise? Plantation show horses or long distance endurance mounts? Family pleasure horses or model halter horses? Field trial horses or big-lick show animals?

If you stoped think about your goal in breeding Walkers, you will find that it defines the type of horse you breed and the characteristics that are

most valuable in your program.

Correct conformation, smooth gaits, and a gentle disposition are important to all of us, but since horses are all too rarely perfect, we have to decide what qualities are absolutely essential and which we'd be willing to compromise on a bit. If you are raising family pleasure horses, you'd have to put disposition right at the top of your list. Endurance horses? Sound conformation and gait. And so on.

So our first step as breeders is to visualize an 'ideal horse' of the kind we want to produce, and then keep this image sharply focused in our minds as we select breeding stock. After all, as the old saying goes, 'If

you don't know where you're going, you may end up somewhere else.

Now, as it says in the opening quotation, horse breeding is only one part science, so even if you have a very clear picture of where you want to go, you still may end up 'somewhere else'. (That's when the 2 parts obsession comes ini) But we'll talk about that in a future column.

It was in response to her question about the numbering of registered horses & if that tells their age. It says, "In most cases the first 2 digits of the number is the year foaled, but not always. Most people register the foal the year it is born and the first 2 digits are actually the year we do the registering here at the office. This was the case up until the year 1980, when we changed the rule to read that the year foaled would determine the first 2 digits. Now, anything first registered with us that was born before the year 1980 will carry a 1979 number regardless of year foaled. After that, you can depend on the first 2 digits to tell you the year foaled."

I saw a note in <u>The Walking Way</u> - "Cedar Creek Farm(Poplar, Wisconsin) congratulates Lexie Cole, Cabri, Sask. on her purchase of 4 beautiful plantation mares. Lexie is a Canadian breeder who bought Prayer of a Promise, in foal to The Good News, as an addition to her broodmare band. She also purchased Sensational Lover, a beautiful daughter of Sensational Shadow, and plans are to breed her to The Good News before leaving April 1 for her new home across the border. In it, it says he was just under 16 hands and at maturity averaged 1350 lbs, a black horse produced by a cross between a bay and a chestnut. I had thought he was a much taller horse. Keith wrote, "We did get a good start on our 2 yr old mare, Flash of Diamonds. I organized a couple of trail rides this fall after the weather cooled down. Jared rode Flash in both of them and they both did very well for beginners. Don Unrau of Hamiota came down with his stallion, Super Duplicate. Don has him going very well. A number of people have expressed concern over the high proportion of stallions we seem to have in the Tennessee Walking Horse breed here in Canada.

Here is what Elna Konkin, Edgewater, B.C. says,
"In the 1983 stallion issue of the newsletter, there are 39 stallions advertised, which is great - I, for one, like to know what is available, but -I know of 4 stallions that aren't advertised out of just the few owners I'm personally acquainted with. Now I'm wondering how many more there might be as it seems to me we're getting a very high percentage of stallions. Are all the horse colts born of such high caliber (i.e. conformation, gait, disposition) that we, as breeders can afford to leave 20 to 30% of them as stallions "Please look at what's happened with the Arabian in the last couple of decades. Why are so many of the arabian in the last couple of

decades. Why are so many of the really concerned breeders putting up such big dollars to promote the gelding futurities and versatility programs for geldings? Because just five years ago in the Arab registry, there was one stallion per five geldings, and they were not that good as far as representing the breed was concerned; It should not have been allowed to happen."

"I cannot believe that the majority are willing to forgo quality in fa-

your of quantity."

"Arabians are not the only breed this has happened to. Look at Thoroughbreds, Quarter Horses, Appys - the Appaloosa was once a very distinctive horse; now it is a colour breed. If that is to be our fate we would be the multi-colour breed!"

Perhaps the Icelandic Pony Registry has the right idea, where the animal has to be mature and of a certain standard of conformation and gaits before it is eligible for registration. What do you think?"

Elna brings up some interesting points. Registration on inspection sounds like a pretty good idea - until you start to ask, 'Who is going to do it?' As every horse show judge knows, there are many different opinions on the quality of a particular horse. And, as we have all observed, the judges don't always agree themselves.

Another difficulty we have, as Walker breeders, is the vexing question of gaits. When it comes right down to it, if our horses do not do the gait they are famous for, what is the use of their being considered a breed? was told last week that there wasn't any point in buying a Walker, since the person speaking felt that he could find as many easy-gaited horses in the general horse population, and anyway, half the Walkers weren't easy-gaited. That's really bad news, if people feel like that about our horses - and it probably has a lot to do with what we have been emphasizing in our breeding programs. It might also reflect a lack of knowhow in training.

We have another problem when it comes to breeding Walkers and that is the low population of these horses, and how scattered around they are. In many cases, if you are going to raise Walkers, you have to own your own herd sire, even if you have only a couple of mares. The distances are simply too far to truck mares. Mind you, things are improving a lot in that regard now

compared to 5 or 6 years ago.

I guess in a society such as ours, we must rely on the wisdom and good judgement of the individual breeders to stand quality stallions. We must also keep in mind that different people have different uses for their horses and one that suits me perfectly might seem a sorry animal to you. It does put great responsibility on those of us who raise horses to know as much as we can about our breed; to recognize sound conformation, straight legs, a trainable disposition and all the other factors that make up an honest horse. From the Alta. Ag. Horse Management booklet: 'For every colt born, only about 1 in 200 needs to be retained for breeding stock. With broader use of AI, this may become 1 in 500. The time, feed, care & money that goes into breeding, training, raising & maintaining a horse is too great to sacrifice quality of stallions for quantity." What do YOU think?
