TWHBEA DIRECTOR'S REPORT from Diane Sept, Calgary

As the Alberta Director to the Tennessee Walking Horse Breeders' and Exhibitors' Association, I attended the two Board of Directors meetings held in 1984. One was on May 26 and the other on December 1. These meetings were held at the TWHBEA headquarters in Lewisburg, Tennessee. There were 32 directors from various States at the May meeting and 34 at the December meeting.

Canada reached another milestone this year. Due to the number of Walking Horses registered with the TWHBEA, we were allowed another Director. This new 'Region 1' Director will have the big job of representing Saskatchewan, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, Hawaii and Alaska. Unfortunately the directorship has not yet been filled. Mrs. Mae Dingwall and Mrs. Nick Brown had to decline the position. Another ballot is being circulated.

With the addition of the Region 1 Director, Canada will have three representatives to the Association. Don McDonald is the Director for British Columbia. Until the addition of the third director, Don had B.C. plus the Region 1 area.

Of special interest to most Canadians are the interest and activities for the pleasure Walking Horse. There are more and more pleasure horses taking part in Hey Days and shows. The Breeders' Association sponsors many of these activities and awards prizes for achievements in these categories.

At both the May and December meetings information on the Canadian Walking Horse Association Registry was presented and discussed. Dr. Warner Earle Fusselle, Chairman of the Sales and Promotion Division of the TWHBEA is working with the Canadian group.

Many other topics were discussed but, of course, they were mostly to do with U.S. functions.

REPORT ON THE GAITED HORSE EVENT IN CENTRAL ALBERTA by J.M. Kingsland

REPORT ON THE CLINIC & DEMOS, YWHA SHOW, July 28/84 by Windi Scott

Two demonstrations were put on. Many Walking Horse owners and fans were delighted to be shown the surprisingly smooth gaited Peruvian Pasos. These horses showed remarkable agility, good dispositions and sturdy conformation. The tack used was of special interest to spectators. We were also honored by a demonstration of the Icelandic Horse. Although they are a small breed, they surprised us by easily winning the jumping class. The 'Tölt' is a smooth, four beat gait which distinguishes the breed and their 'Flying Pace' took everyone by storm. These small horses also displayed good manners and even dispositions.

The clinic on Sunday was a success, having over 15 horses in attendance. Mr. Lane Curry shared his vast knowledge of training and showing Walkers. He focused on gaits, conformation, and head-set, as well as giving tips on sitting the Walking Horse to best advantage. Mr. Curry stressed the importance of proper tack for the horse, spending time demonstrating various bits and a running martingale he developed himself. Many of us know we have our work cut out for us in preparation for future shows.

SASKATCHEWAN CLINIC REPORT by Lexie Cole

The clinic at Hazlet, Sask. on Sept. 29 & 30 was very successful. We had ten riders and several spectators, which is excellent for our first clinic in this area. We had people come all the way from Manitoba. In fact, most of those present had come from a fair distance. Everyone was really eager and full of enthusiasm. Diane Sept was excellent. She's very good at putting people at ease. I really enjoyed having her stay with me; I had so many things to ask her. (I kept her up past her bedtime each night!)

The two days just weren't enough time; they just scratched the surface and made us want to know more. I hope we can plan another clinic for the spring and have Diane back again.

JO KINGSLAND, ALIX, had a ride for gaited horses this summer. Out of 31 who turned out, 8 were mounted on gaited horses, but a good time was had by all.

At the Calgary Competitive Trail Ride, Carol Hall came in 3rd in the Novice Division with her Walker. At the Edmonton Ride, Helen Williamson came in 4th on Jester's Rondevous and Carol Hall took 5th on Pride of Woodrow.

At Innisfail Trail Ride, June 9, Henry Matechuk won Best of Breed, Rayne Hack was 4th in Heavy Weight Novice, Beverly Bertsch took 2nd, Light Weight Novice and Marlin Matechuk was 3rd, Light Weight Novice.

At the Parkland Arabian Ride, Red Deer, July 20 to 22, Lara Hack took 1st in Junior Novice, Claudia Hack in Heavyweight Novice was 3rd and Hilton was 6th.

BRITISH COLUMBIA NEWS

SHEILA COBURN, PRINCE GEORGE, sent along a subscription for JOHN & LOR-RAINE BERRYMAN of 70 MILE HOUSE, and writes, "They bought a mare, Shadow's Tamarack, and filly, Shadow's Flashy Miss C., from us this year and I'm sure they'd enjoy hearing the TWH news. Also, we have one stud colt this yr, A chestnut roan with 3 white sox, a wide blaze and a white border in his tail - very flashy. He's by Shadow's Super 7 out of Midnight's Heather."

"High Valley Holdings just up the road from us have a palomino filly born Aug. 10/84. She's a real sweety. (Shadow's Brown Allen x Dusty's Gold Queen). This makes 3 palomino foals from their mare. She's a palomino herself, but out of our Shadow, who is black, and their stud, who is dark Brown. Pretty consistent."

"We've had a lot of people drop in this year, including couples from Washington and Georgia who own Walkers,"

"Oh - just about forgot to mention it! We bought a horse, Miss Namra K. She's a great trail horse and can really get out and go."

From LETA KELLY, PRITCHARD, "Was happy to get my News, and especially enjoyed some old memories revived by the part about the Walkers at Penticton, that Jim Brown brought up. I bought three of them. I really liked the big roan mare that Edna Hugo got. She was my favorite and I hadn't known that she died so young. Her mother was a pretty black mare, Belle, who was sold to the coast. Belle never did the walk. Old Okanagan Roan Ace was a darling roan stallion. Mr. Brown let me have him for a month one summer and I rode him a lot. Little Wonder is his son. I'd just got a new saddle on a Little Wonder tree and it was so comfortable that I named the colt after the saddle. "

"Silver's first foal is born - a chestnut filly. He did that on his own before I even realized he knew how. (Uphill Gold 'N Silver was allowed to run with Leta's mares as a yearling and sired this foal at about 16 or 17 months of age!) The Rotzetters of Clearwater bought my beautiful big black mare, Pepper, and the filly was a surprise bonus. They want another TWH to match Pepper, pure black, very tall and refined. They are really nice people and really love and care for their animals. "

Leta has not been well and has sold all but two of her horses. She plans to sell them as well and get an Icelandic Horse - as she says, "easy gaits and small to mount." Silver, the weanling she bought from us, has been sold to Leta's Neighbours, Reg & Linda Dee. They wrote to say that he's now 16 hh and a very nice colt, their only Walker at present, though both have owned TWH before.

I was very pleased to receive some photos of Silver's first baby from Heidi ROTZETTER, CLEARWATER. She's a fine, upstanding filly, born Aug. 15. The mother, Jo's Black Pepper(Perfect Humoresque x Midnight Spitfire) is a solid black, the sire, Silver(He'za Walker x Lady's Merry Mist) a palomino, and the filly appears to be shedding out to be a black chestnut.

JOYCE PATTERSON, CAWSTON, writes, "I've been on one overnight ride up to Flat Iron, Juniper Ridge and Joe Basin. The trails were very poor; so much rain has washed the rocks bare and it's very slippery going. Saw around 50 wild sheep and a lot of deer and a black bear up on Juniper Ridge. I rode my grey Registered Walking Pony of America. She's very good in the hills My other two reg'd TWH mares are doing fine too and have been on a few shorter rides this year. They are only 3 and 4 years old, so don't want to overdo them. I didn't make it to the 100 Mile ride this year - got sick for 5 days in July and didn't want to chance it. Oh well, maybe next year... I try to keep all three of my mares exercised several times a week but if my daughter isn't going to ride more often, I might have to consider letting one of them go come spring. The two young mares are improving every time they're taken out."

BRITISH COLUMBIA NEWS

ANN TONN, SURREY, writes, "Hi, we've been keeping busy this summer and there's quite a bit of news. I've been working with my stallion, Sun's Rocky Velvet, and he's doing very well. We bought him last fall and between the time we purchased him and the time he was delivered 1½ months later, somebody must have mistreated him. He had been wild and untrained, but arrived head-shy and afraid of people. He's still wary of strangers but is working very well for us and hasn't a mean bone in his body. And is he ever gorgeous! He's very flashy and does a lovely running walk on the longeline and in the field. I'm looking forward to riding him."

"My mare, A Touch of Pride, is finally in foal to Rocky and is due in May. This will be a first offspring for them both."

"I met Debbie Modderman who has a 15 year old Walker mare which is now boarding at our place."

"Our 2 yr old, Canadian Blue Boogie, is from Threat and he is just a walking giant. We are extremely pleased with him. Of course, Star's Major Invasion who is 4 now is just doing great - great mountain horse, bush, whatever you want to do with him, he'll do it."

We have two beautiful colts this year by Sounds of Invasion (Smoky) - a bay with 4 high stockings and a neat blaze, out of Sugar's Fancy Star; he's going to be a tall one. Received the following very interesting letter from Mr. ED ZACHARY of OLDS: "I thoroughly enjoy the News. I've met a couple of Walker breeders -Mr. Hack from Calgary and Mr. Gurnett from Rimbey. I have never had a ride on a Walker as yet. My first exposure to the breed was back in the forties. A Mrs. Waterberry of Erickson, Manitoba brought a couple in from the U.S. from a P.K. Fisher. I used to get sales lists from Mr. Fisher. He raised & sold to Roy Rogers a horse named Allen's Gold Zepher (by Wilson's Allen), a beautiful palomino with 4 white stockings and a full blaze. He was trained to do tricks to a 'T'. There was quite a story back of that horse. I actually saw Allen's Gold Zepher on T.V. one day, named, of course, Trigger Junior. Thanks for the paper." And thanks for the interesting info, ±d. There are quite a few descendants of Allen's Gold Zepher up in this area.

From Grant Kihn, McLennan, "Just thought I'd drop you a line to say we are alive and well. Enclosed is our renewal for another year. Keep up the good work and if possible, more on training and shoeing."

"Uphill Firefly(He'za x Merry Mist) is doing well, growing like a weed. She is very quiet and I've been on her a couple of times, just to get her reaction to it. She takes to it like she knows it's her purpose in life. I can hardly wait to get down to some serious training. Would sure be interested in any trail rides planned for our area."

I heard from the Lamports at Vermilion. They are well but finding the early winter a trial, having to start feeding so early. Old Radar is still hanging in there, at 25 one of the pioneers of the breed still alive.

Speaking of the early winter we've had in Alberta brings me to a note from ELSIE MACKAY, MANNVILLE: "It's been a long, long winter, Folks; please don't forget those horses that have been put out to pasture for the winter. I've heard of a few cases of badly neglected horses, some very close to home, that have starved to death. So let's make sure to check that they do have something to eat once they've pawed through all that snow. I guess it comes down to the bare facts that if we can't afford to look after them we'd better sell them to someone who can - or there's always the meat plant. Better that than starvation!" A timely reminder, Elsie. Horses on pasture can go down in condition very quickly, and it's not always easy to notice with their long winter hair, unless you check regularly and run your hands over their ribs, rump and backbone. Also there can be one that's thin among a herd that is doing well, so check them all.

JACK KERNS, EDMONTON, writes, "We have purchased an American bred Larigo stallion, Mar-Vel's Mr. Red. He's a Larigo bred, American type Shetland, 44", broke to drive and very well mannered; solid chestnut in colour."

"I've been getting material from someone in the States (California) about soring, high shoeing, crippling, etc. I throw it away as the senders don't give their names or address. If they did, I would forward it to you. I wish someone would do something about other problems; eg. docking tails, breaking tails, high shoeing, chains, etc. on Hackneys & Shetlands & American Saddlers. I saw a vet cut 2" off all four hooves of a Hackney pony, and the animal went normally after with some trimming." Editor's note: I too have received packages of information detailing the abuses inflicted on the Tennessee Walker 'high performance' horse. It makes very up-setting reading. However, I agree with Jack that if the authors & compilers of this information won't sign their names to it, then I won't reprint it. It's time everyone interested in the breed has the courage to make a stand on this issue of abuse of show horses - no matter which side they are on.

TRAINING YOUR WALKER WITH DIANE SEPT

Question: We have a 2½ year old Tennessee Walking Horse. He's very loose and long striding. He tends to pace when speeding allong at liberty or when urged on at halter. Occasionally we've seen him run-walk. How would you start this youngster, so as to bring out the runwalk and suppress the pace?

Answer: With a colt like you describe, as I picture him, you have a lot of work to do before you worry about the running walk. Of course the goal is a well trained horse with a nice running walk.

Your training work begins any time you are in "ear shot" of your horse. If you see him doing something good - square flat walk, running walk, canter, even a rack - praise him. Now, I don't expect you to go rushing out in the field with carrots to pet him and make over him. Just praise him with your voice.

When handling the horse, whether at halter or under saddle, don't push him to the point of pacing. The more often he paces when you are "in control" the more of a habit it will become. If, however, he should slip into a pace while you are handling him, scold him.

You may be lucky and find that once you get on this colt the weight of the rider and tack is enough to get him to square up a bit. If the colt is real pacey though, there are many things you need to keep in mind. As a rider (trainer), you must not do anything that enhances the pace. Be sure that you don't allow your body to swing side to side in the saddle. Keep yourself riding straight ahead.

When you first start riding him, concentrate on an evenly spaced 4-beat flat walk. How naturally pacey he is will determine ho fast you will be able to let him walk out. Yes, some horses will pace at the "flat-walk" speed.

In the case of a horse that does pace at a slow speed, the reason is probably one of two. Either he is uptight or scared and therefore isn't able to relax enough to stretch out and walk. This horse will be taking very short pace steps. The other possibility is that he is lazy or lethargic. In this case he will probably be moving in a loose, almost sloppy, side to side movement.

With the first type, losts of patient, relaxed riding should solve the problem. When he relaxes, praise him. If he starts to tighten up and pace again, turn him in a circle and talk quietly to him. This quite often will help to bring a horse to a square walk. Work him over obstacles such as small logs, twigs, or poles. This will give the horse something else to think about other than being scared. It will also get him to relax and stretch his neck and therefore take a longer stride.

Some of the exercises you can use for the above mentioned horse will work for the lazy pacer. Try turning this horse in a circle. But, **this** is not to relax him. Tap him on a bit. See if it causes him to break up the pace. Try it many times. Use varying sized circles. If it doesn't work after experimenting with it, give it up. If he does tak a squarer stride, praise him. Let him walk until he starts to pace again and start over. The main thing here is to be immediate with your reactionso that he doesn't get anymore pace in than absolutely necessary before you correct him.

Working over obstacles usually works very well with the type of horse because they have to pay attention to what is going on so as not to trip over the items in front of them. Once again, tap this horse forward a bit so as to keep some impulsion flowing so that he doesn't just keep dropping back to a sluggish pace.

Another exercise to try is to stop your horse, back him up, and drive him forward. If he walks nicely, praise him and allow him to continue to walk as long as it remains a 4-beat, straight ahead movement.

When you have established a good flat walk you can begin to ask for more speed. As you push the horse on, you will find that the above exercises continue to work. With the uptight horse you may have to drop back to the flat wlak often in order to relax him and allow for a long stride. Remember, do not expect a big burst of speed at the running walk immediately. Ask for just a bit more speed. Allow this to become comfortable and easy for the horse. Then ask for a bit more. I promise, if you push too fast the pacey horse will pace. But, if you keep in mind at all times what you are working with, you

SHOULD BE ABLE TO OVERCOME THE PROBLEM. You are teaching the horse that he is to move one leg at a time. We want him to learn his math the very old-fashioned way ... 1+1+1+1=4. We don't want him ever to think that 2+2=4. We must discourage that, no matter how many times it needs to be explained.

If you find that there is absolutely no way the horse will move squarely as you ask for more speed, try another idea. Canter him. When you bring him down from the canter, push him a bit with your legs as you touch him back with the reins. This will cause him to continue driving with his hind legs and yet drop back to a walk. We don't want him to slow to a dog walk; we want him to move forward. If he does even a couple of strides in a semblance of a running walk, praise him!

The whole idea when working a horse like this is to do things - anything - that force him to break up the pace. This means that you really have to stay on your toes so as not to let him slip in a couple of pace steps. The work will take a long time, but, if you spend the time on his early stages of training, the end result will be a horse you can enjoy for years and years. Good Luck!


