PEARL TOMPKINS: ON SELECTING A BREEDING STALLION (continued from April News)

"So then you see, that was at the beginning and then they found out that the colts from Go Boy and Midnight Sun were what they called a "golden cross". They had Go Boy's way of going and Midnight Sun's power and size, & they put those two top notch ingredients together and, Boy, that's where they had their "golden cross"."

"But I say that the bad thing about that was they just forgot all about trying to hang on to the Go Boy or the Midnight Sun stuff. They just forgot all about that, and it got pretty darn hard to find a stud that was all

one bloodline. "

"But anyway, I just happened to be plumb lucky - I don't suppose that there was another stud in Tennessee that could say that he was Merry Boy on both sides."

"And now you've got a rough idea of what I was looking for. If you just take a horse that's well proportioned and evenly - you don't want one with a long slim belly on him. He needs substance. I guess that's what you get if

you get one that is compact - proportioned."

"And you start there and he's got a pretty head, he's got a good neck and a good shoulder and a good back and a good hind end and his legs are straight and strong, and then of course you want his way of going. But if he's got the right conformation I think he'll have the right way of going. Usually he will."

"Still, I put that good disposition #1. I wouldn't have a mean stud no matter how good he was. Then also I'd want him to have his natural way of

- A. FLAT WALK The horse's head and neck right from the shoulder will nod up and down very noticeably with the even rhythm of his hind feet. There should be little motion in the rider's body but some forward and backward movement is quite acceptable. The horse's neck should be long, round and relaxed. On solid ground you will be able to hear an even, four-beat sound. The horse should overstride his front foot with his hind foot. His shoulder will reach and pull as if swimming. The hind end will slide up underneath the horse in a nice, smooth motion. His tail will swing from side to side like a pendulum and his ears may flop back and forth while his teeth may click in time to his movement.
- B. <u>RUNNING WALK</u> The horse will just continue forward from the flat walk to the running walk. There will be a bit more speed. The movement should stay very definite and bold. The main difference will be that the rider sits virtually still when the horse slides into the running walk. The other factors remain the same as noted in the flat walk.
- C. PACE The horse's head will swing from side to side. His right feet will hit the ground together and then his left feet. The rider's body will move from side to side.
- D. STEPPING PACE This gait is quite difficult to differentiate from the running walk. The horse's head will nod up and down. There will be overstride. The horse moves forward in an uneven, four-beat gait. The legs on the same side will move at a slightly spaced interval; there will be a break in timing, and then the opposite side will move; ie:1-2--3-4. The stride may be long or short. This gait will lack the bold, straightforward movement of the running walk. The rider will move in a slight side-to-side motion. The stepping pace is quite smooth, but not as smooth as the running walk. E. RACK The rack is difficult to distinguish from a running walk. The most noticeable difference is the lack of head nod in the rack. You will feel & see a shorter, more animated, stride. The horse's hindquarters will have a shorter, tighter movement than they have at the running walk. The shoulders will have more of an up and down motion that disallows reaching & pulling. There will be little or no overstride. The boldness of the flat & running walk will be lost at the rack.
- F. FOX TROT The horse will walk with the front quarters and trot with the hindquarters. There will be a slight up and down motion of the head. You will be able to notice an up and down movement of the horse's hindquarters. He will reach with his front legs and take a shorter up and down step, a trot step, with his hind legs. There may be some overstride.
- G. CÁNTER The canter should be soft and smooth, free rolling and ground-covering. The horse should be moving straight ahead on all four feet, not leaning to one side or the other. There are three beats to the canter. You can see the right hind hit the ground, then left hind and right front together, and then the left front (or the opposite if starting with left hind). On the horse's back you will feel a smooth, rolling motion. The rider should not be leaning to one side or the other.

EDITOR'S NOTE: We all refer to "natural gaited" Walkers, but we all know that Walkers can do many different gaits naturally. All the above gaits are natural gaits to one TWH or another, and some do such a variety that your eye is hardly quick enough to catch one before the horse has changed to another. I was thinking about this 'Natural gaited' expression, and really, it can be applied to any horse, since all horses do several gaits naturally. I could quite truthfully say that my Morgan is naturally gaited - he's a natural trotter, of course! However, TWH owners generally use the term to mean a horse that does a running walk without help from special shoeing or other devices. Let's hear from Ray Corum, Louisville, KY on the subject.

In answer to your request for my opinion as to what constitutes a

"Natural Gaited Walking Horse", I will submit the following.

Any horse that will consistently do a smooth, four beat running walk barefooted or plain shod is considered to be a natural gaited walking horse. This horse, be it mare or stallion, should pass this trait on to its progeny.

The ability to do the natural running walk is the direct result of the conformation that the sire and dam pass on to their offspring. (See my article on natural walking horse conformation in the April 1981 issue of the Voice magazine.) Thus pedigree is very important in assisting knowledgeable breeders in producing a major percentage of horses with this correct conformation necessary for a natural running walk.

In addition to correct conformation and pedigree, the true, natural gaited walking horse will have a good natured disposition. This contributes greatly to the gait as he will relax to a free and easy way of going more

easily than a nervous or tensed up horse.

So it is absolutely not necessary to use heavy shoes, built up pads, action chains, etc. in order to get the old fashioned, smooth running walk. However, in defense of the 'big lick' show horse, I would say that many of them seen in the ring today are natural gaited walking horses. Their gaits have just been altered by so many different methods that it is hard to select a big lick horse that is sure to produce natural gaited offspring. (I have left myself open to a lot of controversy on this statement.) Here again conformation would be the best deciding factor for the prospective breeder.

It may be hard for the novice walking horse owner to accept or understand the fact that many of the points of conformation such as curved hocks, high head, narrow chest, etc. which help produce the running walk are con-

sidered faults in the conformation of other breeds.

The natural gait of the young horse can be enhanced by proper bitting, hoof trimming and shoeing. The angle of the hoof is very important in helping the horse do the desired gait. Usually the horse that has a tendency to pace will need a low angle hoof (long toe) in front and a higher angle (short toe) in back. The reverse is needed if the horse has a tendency to trot under saddle.

Most older natural gaited Walking Horses that have settled in their gaits will perform a true running walk regardless of the angle or condition of their hooves. I have seen these horses do a smooth four beat running walk with feet that had been neglected while on pasture, where the hooves were cracked, overgrown and misshapened.

Keep up the good work. Most of you folks in Canada use the walking

horse as he was intended to be used.

We held an unusual format clinic here in Edson in July. I phoned around to find 3 or 4 people who were interested in learning more about riding training and conformation of Walking Horses, found a weekend when Diane was free and each person or group 'bought' some time. Lacys and Debbie Vader each booked a day, and Johanssons and the Northfork crew (Jack Gurnett, Jo-Anne & Miles Stern) each booked a half day, and then each of us designed our own clinic; It must have been rather nerve-wracking for Diane - she had no idea what each of us wanted information or instruction on beforehand - but she handled it with aplomb and everyone seemed very satisfied. The first 2 days we were at Uphill Farm and the last day we moved to an arena at McKay near Debbie's place. I recommend this type of clinic highly. For individual help on your riding and training, or help and advice on a particular horse, it just can't be better. Thank you very much, Diane. Dianne Little came with Diane and her help and video-taping were greatly appreciated.

Congratulations to the 1985 AWHA Teen Queen, Kimberley Grayson of Calgary, Princess Stacey Carew of New Serepta, and runners-up Trish Bentz of Calgary and Teresa Lembke of Ponoka. The AWHA Queen contest was held at the Westridge Farms Fun Show in May.

At UPHILL FARM, EDSON, we had a set-back with our pastures this year. After going to the expense and work to clear, break, cultivate and plant a timothy/clover mix on about 25 acres, we had a beautiful lush growth in the spring. The horses loved it and we were happy to be able to quit feeding hay around the beginning of May. We noticed one mare with a white nose seemed to have a bad sunburn after a couple of weeks, and then another got what looked like 'scratches' on her white foot. We mentioned it to the vet but he wasn't too concerned. Then another and another came down with the 'scratches' on white hind feet and someone else got a sunburned nose - and we finally twigged that it was the clover. Apparently too much clover can cause an animal to become sensitive to sunlight and they sunburn whereever the skin is white, as under white markings. So we had to shut the horses out of our beautiful lush pasture to get them off the clover and I've been putting ointment on sunburned feet and legs for the past month or so. All legumes can cause this but apparently alsike clover is most commonly the culprit in horses. The condition is known as trefoil dermatitis/trifoliosis or clover disease. So if you're planting horse pasture, skip the alsike.
