

We enjoy putting out the Walking Horse News but we have been skating on thin ice financially. Runs of 350 issues at a time are simply not economical when dealing with the printers. Also, the major cost of our expansion has been financed by the few who have taken out photo ads, and that's not fair.

So we are going to make two changes. First, we are increasing the subscription rate to ten dollars a year starting

1/87. That will help even out the costs.

Secondly, cover photo advertising will only be available on full year contracts. If we have enough people who want this, the covers will be professionally printed as they have been over the past two years. A 16+ hand palomino natural run-walk stallion named Crescent Gold Dust, he gets customers that my other horse, Indigo Boy, who looks like a black Arabian, doesn't get, so we have a better selection for mare owners."

"Have been corresponding with Larry Hauk and have exchanged horse photos ... and am quite impressed with his quality of animals ... with spots too! I'd been looking for a spotted (Tobiano) TWH stallion - and fell into the Palomino horse!"

LAUREL WHITING, ALAMOSA, Colorado, writes, "Dear Canadian Walking Horse News readers, I enjoy your newsletter very much and like to read about doings in Canada in the Walking Horse world. I have a sister in South Central B.C. whom I visit every few years, so feel in tune with Canada a little and really enjoy the country. My husband & I use our Walkers for packing into the wilderness. For years it was just the two of us but recently we started outfitting for small contracts such as Soil Surveys in the National Forest. Large areas of Colorado have been set aside as roadless areas and many trails go into these beautiful mountains. Colorado has over 50 peaks above 14,000 ft so there is plenty of high country!"

"Up until about ten years ago we had grade horses; good, but nothing special. Due to an injury in his early twenties, my husband never enjoyed riding that much. I am a life long horse lover, so realized I'd have to do something to keep my spouse

interested."

"I'd known about Tennessee Walkers while growing up in Illinois, both the show walker and the good pleasure horse. I knew they had good dispositions, ideal when we might have to keep our horses hobbled or picketed on camping trips. I figured they have good withers and a chest shaped to hold a saddle, plus durable feet and legs - after all, look at the abuse the show horses' legs take with the action devices, etc. And, with that

easy gait, we'll enjoy riding more!"

"So 1978 saw us in possession of our first registered TWH, Starwood's Margie 733009. We purchased her from Starwood Ranch, up above Aspen, Colorado. In 1980 we bought Sun Dust Flower Child. Both mares had excellent bloodlines, and in 1983 we bred the two mares to a Pearl Tompkin's bred Shadow's Brantley son. In 1984 both mares produced black fillies. We took a year off from trail riding that summer. In the fall of '84 we went to North Dakota to visit Calvin Miller's Double Diamond Ranch. We liked his horses and after searching through five States for the right kind of horse, we bought a two yr old filly and two lovely weanling fillies plus Sun's Dakota Parader 774902 as a prospective Competitive Trail horse. He has filled the requirements and is a fine horse."

"Now the two fillies we raised from our mares and the two we bought in North Dakota are three year olds. They are coming under saddle and have been fun and easy to train. One we packed lightly on a two week trail ride last year, one will go this summer and one this fall. The fourth filly is owned by an outfitter and is the personal saddle horse of the boss's wife."

"Sundust Flower Child was also sold and is enjoyed by her new owner, 7 yr old Clay, son of a friend. After saddle training we also sold the young mare we bought as a two year old in N.D., and everybody seems happy with their purchases from us. We offer

a two week guarantee on every horse we sell."

"After seeing the vidoetape, A Look into the Past, we feel we know better what the true Walking Horse is. We are fortunate to have 3 out of 5 that are truly excellent according to the standards of the film. I love the footage of Midnight Sun!"

CAROL BRADLEY, WINDSOR, sent in a subscription for new Walker owner Marilyn Fuller of Sydney River, and writes, "Marilyn recently bought the blue roan mare, Miracle in Blue, who came with me from Lexie Cole's in Saskatchewan to Nova Scotia last year. She intends to use the mare as a pleasure and trail horse for herself and her daughter and will, I believe, really enjoy having her. Blue is a very people oriented horse."

"I still have Shades of Autumn, the "pin-up baby" in the July '83 Voice for New England Hoofbeats, for my own horse. Autumn and I competed and placed in two 25 mile Competitive Rides last year, and just did a demonstration at our Provincial Horse Equiganza in Halifax on July 1. It was her first time in the big city and she was excellent. Parades are our next step, I think."

"Autumn and Blue are still the only two registered Walkers in N.S. I still own the old black mare, Sue with no papers. She has now produced two large half-Arab babies, which bring a lot of favourable attention to their Walking Horse side because they are so big and elegant. The two and a half yr old colt is now 15:3 hh (Arab daddy is 14:1; mother is 15:3) and looks like a three day eventing prospect, with lots of size, substance, good temperament and action. This year's foal was a black filly that looks like a very good TWH with a bit of a dished face. She is sold, and Mother, who can't be ridden because of an injured arthritic shoulder, has been engaged to produce another such for a man who wants a big smart horse several years down the road. (Captain Susie's Rent-A-Womb.)"

"The magazine is great and very helpful. Much amused by Dawn Sigurdson's article, On Dressage, Walkers and Warmbloods. It's just about a year ago that I was able to attend the Canadian Walking Horse Registry's Annual Meeting in Calgary and include a visit to the Stampede and the horse exhibits there. Maybe shows are primarily for publicity, to popularize a breed and make it better known; a "showcase" to introduce it to new people? But how many new faces do you see at shows?

Perhaps if we spent some time thinking about the "why" of shows, it would clarify people's expectations.

HORSE FEATHERS! by Larry Hauk

I have seen and ridden Walking Horses brought to Canada by dog trainers from the deep south since 1957 - thirty years. I've listened to the owners brag about that wonderful smooth gait, and I must admit that some are great. I saw the 1986 Hobbema and Ponoka Horse Shows. And I've been using Walkers in my ranch work for the past several years.

I've read all kinds of things about Walkers in the Western Horseman from 1948 to the present, and it seems to me that about three kinds are needed.

First, those for the dog chasers. They are ridden all day and are tougher'n nails and old shoe leather. As soon as a dog slams on point, they are off into a gallop to get there before the dog can creep in and chase up the birds. This sort of riding is done for most of three months.

A second type would be for the show people to play with, going around the ring in those turtle-speed gaits. Some one wrote to <u>Walking Horse News</u> that Walkers were not race horses. THAT I found out this spring when I had to bring a cow that needed help in calving to the corral. The 15:1 1/2 hand Walker I was riding had all he could do to head off that Limousin cow.

That kind of work calls for a sort of versatility that is needed without the horse tying his legs into knots. Surely I shouldn't have to keep a Quarter Horse for emergency stand-by when that little bit of extra speed is needed. One good leap is all it takes sometimes to save an extra mile of chasing. Some can do it. That would be a third type.

WHY NOT GAITED DRESSAGE ?

The day - was June 13th, 1987, the place - Red Deer, Alberta, Canada, the event - the FIRST EVER DRESSAGE TEST FOR TENNESSEE WALKING HORSES, and the mike called out for "Joan Arychuk to the holding area, please".

This was the day I had trained Mitches Shadow for, for months on end. Nervousness was not the issue for me. The issue was "how were my riding skills going to compare with the other competitors?".

The pattern was simple, a series of diagonals, circles, cantering and halts, and in five minutes it was all over. I left the dressage ring and the next contestant entered.

That question still flew through my mind - "how did my riding compare?" - as I watched the other contestants perform the same-pattern that I had just completed.

My answer came half an hour later, as we lined up before the Judge, Heidi Schultz. First and second places were called out, and then - to my great joy - "Joan Arychuk and Mitches Shadow...THIRD"....

To keep a third place in this event will require a lot of training and patience with Shadow as we work together next year towards extended and collected gaits, and even aim for Pirouettes and Kurs.

Thank you so much Jo, for dreaming a dream into reality. Thank you Heidi, for coming and judging our horses.

I too, realised a dream this day. I was so shocked, when I purchased my first TWH, to find out that I would not be allowed to enter any of the dressage competitions — unless I taught my horse to trot. This seemed to be so short-sighted when you understand that dressage training is tremendously beneficial to both HORSE and RIDER, that I determined to do something about it. Competitions add a bit of spice, and reward for all the dedication that goes into training, especially for those—like Joan—who are striving to improve themselves and their horses.

As far as I know, this was the first such competition ever held - anywhere! It was a great honor to have Heidi Schultz (a Champion Dressage Rider herself) to judge. The competitors were praised for their high standard of riding, and neat presentations.

I look forward to this becoming an annual event, to the acceptance of the ground rules of gaits, transitions and movements for the TWH, and to the encouragement of riding the naturally gaited horse using the natural riding aids.



ONE SPECIAL FAMILY OF Walking Horses

My FIRST EXPERIENCE with Walking Horses was 40 odd years ago when I spent the summers on my uncle's farm in Howard County, Missouri. There was an old fellow who lived up the road whose habit it was to go to town every Saturday and get very drunk. His friends would put him on his horse, tie up the reins and start him home. I always watched him go by late in the afternoon and that horse was going at as true a walk as a horse can do and, as I remember it, better than 7 miles an hour. Having been a breeder of and very much interested in the modern Walking Horse, I have so many times remembered that particular horse. He had no reining or any control whatsoever, and yet his form was perfect. I could not help but compare that to many of our modern Walking Horses that revert to pacing horses when they are casually ridden in the Western manner. In my opinion, that is the bane of the Walking Horses, and entirely too many of them do it.



Some 20 years ago Bill Eaton, president of the famous Eaton's Dude Ranch, owned a registered Thoroughbred horse named Jack LaMarr. I did not know the horse but I did know intimately 6 or 7 of his colts. They were mostly out of Steel Dust or Quarter Horse mares. They were very highly prized for cutting and roping horses in rodeos. What impressed me so much was the fact that every one of them did a running walk. It was not as long as we want now, but it was a true, square running walk and, of course, with that ancestry, there was no tendency to do the lateral gaits.

Mrs. Bill (Patty) Eaton owned a mare by this horse, out of a Steel Dust dam, named Lady LaMarr. In her early days this mare had quite a local reputation in short races. Later she became Mrs. Eaton's private mount, and when she was about 18 years old and was going to be retired, I suggested if she

would give me the mare, I would take her back to Missouri and see that she was never out in another snow storm. My offer was accepted, and I bred her to Billie-Gene, a horse I owned that was registered both in the Tennessee Walking Horse association and in the American Saddle Horse association. He was in my public stud and bred to everything from Shetland ponies to draft mares. I never saw one of his colts that didn't do a running walk. That mating produced Patty LaMarr, a bay mare of extremely good conformation, a great deal of life and a running walker. We did not ride her much because we wanted her to start having colts. After bringing her to Wyoming I bred her to Yellow Jacket, a beautiful palomino colored horse of straight Allen breeding. That produced Flash La-Marr, a good walking horse. As a twoyear-old I sold him on the Pacific Coast when he won big classes as a parade horse and numerous Palomino stallion classes. Before I sold him I bred him to

Black Beauty Allen, a mare that has more Roan Allen breeding than any other mare I own. That produced Buck LaMarr, a buckskin as his name implies, and a horse of most outstanding conformation. This is the third season I have used him in my breeding operations. We have left, as this is written, three yearling fillies and one yearling stud by him, and so far have two stud colts in 1948. We like them all very much. Counting the old Thoroughbred horse, that makes 6 generations from him and 2 generations before we introduced the Allen breeding.

The results have been very interesting. They are all horses that fit well for Western uses, and yet they are all running walkers. Not a one of them has a tendency to pace. Lady LaMarr only had the one colt, although Patty La-Marr has produced several that we liked, but I only traced down one line to show the six generations. Some of them might be criticized as not having enough reach, but they are absolutely square. Maybe we have gone far enough with this LaMarr strain, and when the yearling fillies are old enough to breed, we will probably introduce another Allen bred stallion. However, we started out with the idea that we could breed away from the pacing tendency instead of trying to make show ring riders out of every one who buys one of our horses.

The gentleman who formed the Tennessee Walking Horse association (and incidentally I was the first Director outside of Tennessee), were very wise in making arrangements in the early days so that such an outcross as this was possible. Lady LaMarr was put on the approved list because I had affidavits that

she and her half brothers and sisters did a true running walk. Billie-Gene was registered because I had affidavits from men who had seen over 100 of his colts, all doing a running walk. I believe these rules have been taken off now, and I believe wisely so, because the Tennessee Walking Horse has become an established breed. By allowing other than Allen's to be registered in the early days, they now have horses that are not too closely related.


