



ALBERTA NEWS

JEAN REMPEL, WINFIELD, writes, "As you know, my whole household has been disrupted, and now I'm no longer nursing my husband, John, I can't seem to get down to working with the horses yet. I will still carry on with the farm, cattle, and my horses. Just need to get myself into gear again."

"Diane's mare, Chapie's Belle, finally foaled her colt by Answer to Prayer on April 26. Gypsy promptly stole it through the fence and wouldn't let Belle anywhere near the fence without kicking and biting her. I banned Gypsy to the cows' pasture

where she'll stay until she foals."

(Later, May 5) "Brought Gypsy back in this morning. She just had a sorrel and white pinto filly. I hope Misty catches on and has hers soon!" "Gypsy's filly is only 3/4 Walker but overstrides nearly six inches at the flat walk. "

(Later again, May 7) "Misty foaled a sorrel colt yesterday. Got a card for a baby boy, to present it to Mary. She didn't know it was to be hers, so she is really

happy to own a purebred Walker foal."

"I am planning on attending the May 21 to 23 campout and the Festival of the Gaits, trying Basic Level I dressage with Luke also, plus a couple of shows this

(May 9) "Yesterday I sold my 1/2 Walker mare, Sun's Midnight Gypsy and her filly to Gilbert Swaren of Whitecourt. Please send a year's subscription to Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Swaren with my compliments."

At UPHILL FARM, we had a surprise visit from Wynn Armstrong. She was driving up from Salt Lake City, on her way to visit at Wetaskiwin and then going on to Fort St. John. Wynn still owns two Tennessee Walkers, the palomino stallion, Uphill Golden Laddy, that she bought from us as a weanling, and The Painted Fairy, a "lit up" sorrel and white mare that came from Beisels at Drayton Valley.

We also had a short visit with JACK & MARGARET GURNETT & JO-ANN STERN on the May long weekend. They brought Honey Boy's Rebel up from Rimbey for us. Jack & Margaret recently bought the gelding, Northfork Dan D. (He'za Walker x Merry Boy's Snowbird) from Paul Duvall. We enjoyed seeing their photos of last summer's pack trip into the mountains.

From JACK KERNS, EDMONTON, "Just a note to let you know we are still okay but hot doing much with Walkers. We had an unusual occurence at our daughter's acreage at Calgary (Springbank). Two half Walkers from our Radar horse and a mother and daughter of TB breeding, hence about 3/4 brother and sister, died of infection of the gutteral pouch."

"The first was a gelding I sent down in 1984. He had been at Whitemud Riding place all winter and was in very good shape. However, he seemed listless as the summer progressed and in the middle of the winter they found him after following a trickle of blood from the feeding area. He had bled to death."

"His 3/4 sister, who had been raised separately, was sent to the same farm the next year. She raised one foal. After about a year there, she began to act the same way. She started to bleed from the nose and throat, and after a vet inspection

confirming the same diagnosis, was sent to the plant."

"Both deaths were confirmed. Apparently this condition is caused by a fungus infection which weakens the artery or arteries in the gutteral box region, causing the loss of blood. We were told we could keep the mare alive by giving blood thickening drugs, which we did for a while. But as the condition did not improve, we decided to let her go."

"The only explanation the veterinarian and I can see is that both the horses must have contracted something when they were foals, as at weaning time they were sent to Olds College for the winter and had excellent care, or that it was an inherent weakness. They were separated as yearlings and the gelding was five when

he died, and the mare was eight. No other horses at the Springbank acreage were ever affected, and the sire and dams showed no symptoms. Just one of the horse mysteries, I guess."

"I'm making a two wheel, wooden spoke cart with a one and a half inch rubber rim and using car seats for a more comfortable ride."

"I really enjoy the new format of the paper and the news."

LAVERNE LUNDGARD, HINES CREEK, phoned. He has hurt his back and needs to cut down his horse herd of approximately twenty Tennessee Walkers. (See his ad in this issue.) It seems to be a bad year for losing a lot of good Walker brood mares. Laverne lost his foundation mare, Sun's Fair Lady F.F. this spring. He has a number of her daughters however, and his stallion, Sundance Lad, by Little Wonder out of Andadore's Sue.

ROSEMARY JORDAN, LEDUC, phoned to say that they responded to an invitation from Sangudo Kinsmen and together with the Goin family and Marilyn Armstrong, put on a Breed Demonstration at Sangudo, AB. on the May long weekend. They had their stallion, Answer To Prayer going under sidesaddle, and 6 yr. old Scott Jordan demonstrating Happy Jo Girl's gentle disposition by walking between her legs while she stood ground tied in the centre of the arena! Marilyn was commentator, and they were asked to repeat this popular event for the evening performances. Sangudo people were excellent hosts, and asked the Tennessee Walkers to come again next year!



P&R Recovery In Walkers

Somebody asked about Walkers having slower P&R recovery due to the gait awhile back. I haven't done competitive trail riding so I'm not sure, but common sense and general knowledge of athletics and conditioning (I ran track for 5 years and have run regularly until the last few months including winning in road races, so I know a little something about it.) says that this idea is absurd. A Walking Horse requires conditioning the same as any other breed. That conditioning should be done at the gaits we want the horse to use: running walk, flat walk and possibly canter or gallop depending upon whether it is a competitive trail ride or an endurance ride. Any horse or human develops

strength and condition only in those muscles that are being conditioned which is why marathoners would not do well in a long distance swim meet. It uses different muscles or muscles in different ways.

A walker that is conditioned to travel 50 miles at a running walk is not better or worse off than a trotter conditioned to trot 50 miles. The horse's muscles are used to the work load. The number of muscles involved and the amount of force generated has little effect on whether or not those muscles are conditioned to do that load. To condition a horse at the pace and then somehow make him running walk in competition would create problems, but that is impossible.

Since the horse will do what he has practiced, particularly when he gets tired, if conditioned at the pace he will pace and can pace for as long as his conditioning permits. Same for the running walk.

The recovery rate is directly related to the body's ability to mobilize fuel and oxygen sources to supply the muscles that are working and how quickly the body can replenish those sources when his work stops. How the muscles are working or what is causing the deficit is of little consequence to the system. Likewise, how many muscles are working is of little consequence except as it relates to the body's ability and conditioning to deal with that load. In essence, it isn't the cause of the load, but the relation between the load that is currently placed on the animal and it's physical conditioning for coping with that load that is the recovery rate.

A walker that recovers more slowly than other horses is in poorer physical condition than the other horses. There's no ducking the fact that when that happens, the rider didn't push the horse hard enough or bring him along carefully enough to get him into the condition necessary to complete the ride as easily as the other horses. It's rider error and the breed of the horse has nothing to do with it. Nor does it matter what gait he's doing. Now I'll get off my soap box.





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

* MORE ON PADS, SHOES and CHAINS

Last month I reported that a U.S. Federal Judge had ruled that Walkers would not be allowed to show in pads. Since then, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has released the following interim ruling for showing big lick Tennessee Walkers.

- "1. a) From April 25, 1988 to July 31, 1988, horses will be allowed to show in no more than 3" of pads.
- b) From August 1, 1988, to October 31, 1988, horses will be allowed to show in no more than 2" of pads.
- c) After November 1, 1988, horses will be allowed to show in no more than 1/2" of pad and a 1/2 " rim pad.
- No more than a six ounce chain will be allowed.
- 3. At this time, a shoe weighing no more than 16 ounces will be allowed on yearlings. No weight limit on two year olds or older. No weight to be attached to the hoof wall, pad or outside surface of the horse shoe."

This is an interim ruling only. Public response to it will be accepted until JUNE 27, 1988. Letters may be sent to:



I don't know if it's appropriate for us, as Canadians, to write concerning a U.S. law. However, that's up to each individual. I felt that everyone who owns Walkers would want to be informed of what has been happening on the U.S. showherse scene.

The above interim rules do cut back drastically on the pads, and reduce the weight of chains allowed, but don't seem to address the problem of soring which could very well become more acute if people expect the same high action previously achieved with 4" pads and heavier chains.

Personally, I'd like to see pads, chains and heavy shoes eliminated entirely. Then perhaps Walkers could get back to breeding for the kind of performance that made them the most sought after breed of the 1940s.

June is almost here, and I'm speculating on the colour of the foal expected on our farm. This one should predict. Mother is a red be easy to chestnut, so she must carry both genes for red colour. Father is a black that is known to sire lighter colours, so he must carry one gene for red, as well as the one for black. Therefore, it would seem that there's a fifty - fifty chance of either black or chestnut. There's also the possibility of bay if mother carries the gene for bay patterning, which is not expressed because she has no gene for black pigment. However, combined with a gene for black colour from the sire, the result could be a bay foal. Mother was bred to black stallions twice before, and produced one black colt and one red colt. Also. since both her parents were blacks, she probably doesn't have the bay pattern gene. (Anyway, I'll be happy with a healthy filly of any colour!)

I was also asked if one can get a blue roan from the mating of a black and a red/ strawberry roan. This is certainly a possibility. Jo-Anne Stern has a fine blue roan gelding from a roan sire and a black mare. Joyce Patterson was thrilled this year to get a blue roan colt from her black mare and Dianne Ogden's roan stallion. It just depends whether the gene for roaning is inherited along with that for black colour. Voilà A blue roan. Sorrel with roaning gives you red or strawberry roan.

Colour inheritance in horses is fascinating, and needs a lot more research. I did come across some more information that may explain some of our Tennessee Walking Horse "mystery" roans. The Sabino colour pattern may just be the key to roans which appear unexpectedly from sorrel parents, and to the occasional pure white that is foaled from roan parents.

But more on that next time. Good luck with Your foals, whatever their colour!

TWHBEA STUD BOOKS

A couple of months ago I sent for a set of the TWHBEA Stud Books. There are seven books still available of the nine published from the beginning of the registry in 1935 to volume 9 published in 1948. They are available for \$35.00 (U.S.) from the TWHBEA, Box 286, LEWISBURG, Tenn. 37091.

These books are a treasury of information. I think you'd be interested in some excerpts.

This month, since I have new foals on my mind, let's see what the founders of the breed registry had to say about colour and markings.

TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION OF AMERICA

DESCRIPTION OF COLOR AND MARKINGS FOR REGISTRATION

Walking Horses are of many colors, sorrel, black, roan, white, bay, brown, grey and yellow.

COLOR

- 1. SORREL. This varies from a light liver to a washy yellow. Never have black mane and tail.
- .2. CHESTNUT (sorrel). This varies from a light liver color to a dark liver color and copper shades. Never have black mane and tail.
- 3. BLACK. This is the darkest hue. If any doubt arises in determining between dark brown and black, the black can be determined by noting the fine black hair on the muzzle.
- 4. ROAN (red). This is produced by the intermingling of sorrel, white and yellow hairs.

ROAN (strawberry). Produced by the intermingling of sorrel, white and yellow hairs speckled with white.

ROAN (chestnut). This is a mixture of chestnut and white hairs.

ROAN (blue). This is a mixture of blue and white hairs occasionally intermingled with yellow hairs.

- 5. WHITE. Hairs being without color or of the hue of pure snow.
- 6. BAY. This varies from a light red to a dark rich red shade, almost brown and between these a mahogany (blood bay).
- 7. BROWN. A dark color, inclined to redness, almost black. Distinguished from black by noting the fine tan or brown hairs on the muzzle or flanks.
 - 8. GREY. This is a mixture of black and white hairs.
 - 9. YELLOW. Color resembling gold.

On the Legs

Coronets, fetlocks, socks, and stockings are all noted when white. Sometimes stockings reach above knees and hocks. Foals without any white are said to be "SOLID COLOR." Brands and accidental markings are not noted.

ON THE BODY

White spots or patches in any position on the body should be noted.

MARKS-ON THE HEAD

STAR, a white mark, generally more or less rounded in the center of the forehead. It can be large, small, irregular, or faint.

STRIP, a narrow white stripe down the face, usually in the center.

BLAZE, a broad splash of white down the face, which may be distinct from the star and snip or may embrace both.

BALD, a very exaggerated blaze.

SNIP, a white mark between the nostrils.

MANE AND TAIL

Only white or flaxen manes and tails are mentioned. Flaxen is a golden or linen color to almost white. As most breeders speak of them as "flax mane and tail," they have been written thus: FLAX and not FLAXEN.



The Growth Stages of a Walker Foal

Within the first 2 weeks of birth, a foal should show you whether or not he is going to be naturally gaited. This little fellow at 4 days old, moves with enormous overstride and reaches out with his forelegs – just like "Mom". A real looseness about him that makes him definitely a Walking Horse and no other breed.

Very rapid growth of the skeleton follows, nourished by his dam's milk-and the pretty baby becomes an ugly duckling and quite ungainly. For the next 3-4 months their way of moving should be totally ignored as they develop their muscles and constantly experiment with their feet.


By the fall of the first year a young "horse" is becoming apparent. Balance is improving as the overall development is more complete. Yes, you can see that the Walking Horse walk is there but don't be too anxious for the running walk for at least another year.

Now I have ridden everything from the cornbroom to horses, including the milk cow. The bones in a horse's back may not be designed to carry weight but have you ever tried sitting on a cowor even tried riding one?



Cows seem to have the idea that we should be riding horses, as they duck, dodge, and turn into a snake under you and if you manage to stay aboard, said cow will likely hurry you on your way when you dismount with a well-aimed hook of the horn or head, or a swift cow-kick when you're not looking.

I can't imagine rounding up horsesor cows - with a cow as a mount. Cows really aren't meant for speed, unless they decide to run away - mainly if you want them in a corral.

We all know that the cow, or cattle called oxen, were used years ago as draft animals pulling huge covered wagons or two-wheeled Red River carts across the country. They carried settlers with their families, household goods, farm implements and maybe a couple of hogs and a few chickens, with a milk cow haltered to the back. Riding out to scout the lay of the land for the night's

camp spot - now, that was horse work. The cow was for milk and butter.

As the settlers settled down to farming, the oxen plowed the fields while the horse - if the farmer was so lucky to have one - was ridden to town (if one was close by) and to hunt game as fresh meat for the table; also to keep track of the milk cows.

As the country became more settled, oxen trains hauling goods to far flung town and village stores were slowly replaced by mules and horses, and they by trains, trucks and airplanes. The settlers also changed from oxen to draft horses for field work. Cows, being used only for beef or milk, still weren't being ridden.

Tractors took over the work in the fields, and now you may only see a yoke of oxen in a parade, and if you're lucky, maybe a cow ridden with a saddle and a halter. I have seen pictures of this in old magazines, but that will be all as cows haven't been used for more than milk and beef since the oxen hauled the settlers across the country, and plowed the first fields. <>

C.A.T.W. MAY WEEKEND CAMP-OUT

A Poker Ride, a First-Aid talk, a demonstration of packing a pack-horse and an introduction to Three Day Eventing (together with lots of trail riding along the Blindman River valley) were all fitted in to our club's first camp weekend. Twelve horses took part and the weather was just glorious - we even saw fireflies one evening, a rare occurrance in this area.

Irene Block of Breton was the lucky (cash) winner of the Poker Ride organised by A.W.H.A., and Sandra von Lippa, Dewinton won the race to find 10 essential items that all good campers should have on hand. Her prize was a can of "Fiddle-Faddle"!

Gord Cordick, Area Co-ordinator for St.John's Ambulance, went over the emergency handling of all sorts of injuries that we might see while out with our horses; when to move an injured person (to hospital), and when NOT to move them; HOW to move them; temporary bandaging and dressing of injuries; and even emergency mid-wifery, were all discussed. St.John's offers a first aid course which is not expensive, and all sporting events should have a trained First-Aider present.

Lorne Ertman, owner of Summit Outfitters, brought along a full set of Pack-horse equipment and demonstrated the training, saddling and loading of a pack horse. Our first attempt to pack one of the horses in camp had to be abandoned - when the horse objected to the idea! so the full rigging was set up on a 45 gallon barrel, (which didn't need any training). We learned the arts of balancing panniers and tying the diamond hitch to secure everything. Afterwards. Lorne accepted a ride on a TWH and was amazed at the different feel of the W.H. walk. We traded catalogs/ W.H.News, and felt that we had made a

new friend. Lorne also offers video tapes on "Packing Horses" (to rent or buy) that give good instruction to anyone interested in trying this age-old way of travelling.

On Monday, 3 riders experienced "Combined Training" for the first time. Each did a little dressage, then a 3minute X-country run (uphill, downhill and over deadfall), followed by some pole work - in lieu of stadium jumping. To compete in Three Day Eventing a rider must have the horse under complete control (the reason for the dressage) and then be able to maintain an easy, comfortable, controlled canter to negotiate the X-Country course. The final stadium work proves that the horse is still balanced and controlled after the excitement of the X-Country run.

We all left camp knowing a lot more about our horses, their needs and future training requirements.

Quick! How many Tennessee Walker Stallions are there in Canada? Twenty? Fifty? A hundred?

Jo and I were looking at the Alberta Morgan Horse Directory the other day, and I was amazed at how the Morgans have proliferated since the seventies.

Then I got out the Stallion Parade catalog put out by TWHABC. They held this all breed promotion on April 23 & 24 at Quesnel and in it were featured six Tennessee Walker stallions.

So, just for curiosity's sake, I started going through the WHN address lists to see how many TWH stallions I could remember. Checking the B.C. subscribers, I found 21 stallions; nine blacks, eight chestnut or sorrels, two yellows and two roans.

Those are only the handful that I happen to know of. There are many more. What's happened to stallions we used to hear of, such as Big Sky Trouble Boy, Prairie Breeze, Lady's Captain W., Red Eagle Mack K., Ebony Walking Eagle, Boothills Sundown ... The list could go on and on.

Getting into the list of Alberta subscribers, I came up with 34 stallions; sixteen blacks, eight sorrels or chestnuts, two brown/blacks, three sorrel roans, one each of blue roan, white, yellow, bay and blue/grulla. I can think of eight more owned by people who no longer subscribe to the News.

From the Saskatchewan list I came up with seven stallions; three blacks, a chestnut, a bay, and two colour unknown.

In Manitoba I know of five TWH studs; two blacks, two chestnuts and a roan, and in Ontario I only know of two owned by subscribers.

So in all, I came up with over seventy Tennessee Walking Horse stallions owned by WHN subscribers, with another dozen or more that we know are (or were) out there, owned by non subscribers. That's eighty to eighty five stallions! Now consider that I know of only a fraction of the Walkers in the country and think how many there must be.

Wouldn't it be great if we could compile a stallion listing that would include all these horses, along with their breeding, size, colour, etc.? I'd love to have a directory like that to refer to. What do YOU think? Please write and let us know your opinion. Maybe we can get something going.







WHY REGISTER CANADIAN?

By: Les Burwash, Horse Industry Branch, Alberta Agriculture

The most important reason for registering animals with a Canadian registry is that this gives the individual horse and the breed a Canadian identity. Canadian pedigreed livestock are among the best in the world. With the expansion of international markets and the increasing image of our Canadian horses, it is becoming more critical that the animals be identified as Canadian.

Pedigreed animals that are registered through Canadian associations have the protection of the Animal Pedigree Act. This is a federal act that regulates how breed associations must operate and how animals can be registered and transferred. The Canadian system is one of the most respected in the world. Because an animal can only be registered in one association and only one association can register a breed of animals in Canada, there is no conflict as to who is recognized or not, making it far superior to that in the United States.

Animals should be registered in or transferred into the stud book of the country where the owner resides. This procedure is common with other livestock and important for maintaining integrity of breeds and their associations. This requires open-minded, unselfish cooperative associations in all countries. The practice of having animals with registration papers from two different countries is expensive and confusing for breeders and owners.

This time of the year I spend a lot of time thinking about new foals, how they will turn out, whether they'll have the gait we're all striving for firmly fixed in their being, what size and colour they'll end up, whether they'll take after dam or sire, have a sweet nature or be hard headed little devils. It is fascinating to speculate. I truly think that we now have all the bloodlines right here in Canada to produce excellent Walking Horses for every purpose.

But what about once those new foals are here? I think very few of us are doing our part to make sure they achieve their potential. We have lots and lots of breeders but only a handful of people who train.

Think about the calls you get for Walking Horses. It's the solid, dependable, well broke horse that's in demand, isn't it?

And how many of those are there? Not many - anyone who owns one rarely parts with it!

Dr. Dave Whitaker, quoted in Echo of Hoofbeats by Dr. Womack, says:

"My observation was that many of the owners and handlers lacked real basic understanding of what it takes to make a nice plantation horse and the number of hours needed in the saddle to arrive at the kind of horse believed to be ideal. I do believe that the genetic potential in Canada is little different from that in the States. The main difference appeared to be in training or a lack thereof."

I know that the best running walk I've ever ridden appeared after the third day and fifty miles of riding. I've had that mare for eight years and she's never done as well before or since.

Walkers were bred to be everyday, long distance riding or working horses. They need LOTS of riding, not just a mile or two every second or third weekend. And how many of us have the time?

What's the answer? I wish I knew.

What do you think?




