





The Story of Queen's Lil Joe

QUEEN'S LIL JOE
(Hey Joe x Cupp's Oregon Queen),
a chestnut stallion with three
white feet and a blaze face,
was foaled June 20, 1961.
(Marilyn Hudson up) He sired
many good Walkers, one of the
best known in recent years being
Miss Stroll-O-Way, owned by
Matechuks of Cochrane, AB.



We had several calls this year to inquire if Joe was still breeding. We had to put him down last fall after he had a massive stroke. Montana bred, by Hey Joe out of Cupp's Oregon Queen, he was raised and trained by Bob Keyser in the Polson area. If any of you readers from Montana know Bob's whereabouts, I'm sure he would like to know of Joe's passing.

We were privileged to buy this horse in 1972, after Bob had shown him

for three or four years here in Lethbridge at the Rotary Horse Show. Joe was eleven at this time. Bob showed Lil Joe in competition with such notables as Art Harlow, Gladys and Vergil Ferree, Jack and Maureen Newman, Jack Viceroy, Chuck Court, Preach Gray, Ross Howell, Ethna Friesen, Pearl Tompkins and her daughter, Arlene, and the Staleys, all from Montana and Washington. Marjorie Fabro had started showing in the pleasure classes with her beautiful mare, Sizzling 66, along with Frank Smith, ourselves and others. We had some great horse shows at that time.

Lil Joe will be remembered by thousands as the first Tennessee Walking Horse to be shown at the Pacific National Exhibition in Vancouver, B.C., where he spent ten days showing people what this fine breed was all about.

He was our pride and joy, and the most wonderfully gentle horse we had ever seen. One summer we had a group of students from Malaysia visit the area. Never having had the opportunity before, their greatest desire was to ride a horse. So they were brought to our farm to ride our gentlest horse. They were so excited and Joe patiently put up with their yanks and kicks and squeals, and gave them a ride they would never forget. The same thing happened with a group of adult visitors from Switzerland, and they went back to Europe with dreams of someday owning a Walking Horse. What really impressed them was not only his

smooth easy gait but his gentleness as a stallion, his responsiveness and manners, and his impressive figure.


And Joe was even ridden by a Hawaiian Queen! Perhaps some of you may know or have heard of Mrs. Anna Perry-Fiske of Hawaii. She owns one of the largest and finest ranches on the big island, Waimea, South Kohala area. She has for many years put on a bi-annual pageant called "Old Hawaii on Horseback", which includes hundreds of horses and riders in costume. It is quite a big event for the state of Hawaii. In 1974 she was asked to participate as a representative of Hawaii at both the Calgary Stampede Parade and the Lethbridge R.C.M.P Centennial Parade.

She was a most regal and impressive figure. Upon recommendation from the parade officials, she came with her entourage to "try out" Lil Joe. She wanted a horse that would put on a performance and be a credit to her absolutely gorgeous Hawaiian robes and

leis. She completely fell in love with Joe. She said she had never ridden a horse like him before (and she had ridden all her life and many different breeds). Joe performed beautifully, criss-crossing the route at his beautiful flat walk, to thousands of cheering spectators. She said it was the thrill of her life. She wanted to take Joe back to Hawaii with her, price no object, but we couldn't part with him.

(As a matter of interest to those of you who might visit Hawaii, there is a large, wall sized painting of Anna Perry-Fiske on Queen's Lil Joe in the Royal Hawaiian Hotel on Waikiki Beach. And in the book, <u>Hawaii's Incredible Anna</u>, by well known Hawaiian author, Ruth M. Tabrah, there is a full page account of her reception in Calgary and Lethbridge, her impressions and a picture of Lil Joe.)

As you can see, we loved that horse and he will ever be remembered with great fondness.

#### Central Alberta Tennessee Walkers - A.G.M.

C.A.T.W. had a very enjoyable "lunch" meeting in Red Deer, Nov. 4th. We welcomed several new members and spent most of the afternoon (!) making plans for 1990.

Our new President is Sheila Holtz from Stettler, and Jean Rempel of Winfield will be taking care of the Secretary/ Treasurer's jobs. Congratulations to Jean who is now a qualified First Aider!

1990 plans include more trail rides, the Red Deer Classic & Dressage Training show, and the Festival of the Gaits. The club will book a Farmers' Market table in the spring for a fund-raising sale of members' handicrafts.

Saddles, bridles, blankets, brushes and miscellaneous - have we got it all? "Oops! forgot the bug spray" - a must on a summer trail ride; load the horses and "let's go!"

We arrived at the campsite for the Central Alberta Tennessee Walkers' Pine Lake Trail ride Friday evening. A beautiful spot on a small lake, away from the traffic and people had been selected. My group consisted of 6 horses and 5 riders (we always carry a spare). My husband Dan on an Appaloosa mare, my daughter Tina (14) on her Pinto mare, and our friends - Denise on a Thoroughbred gelding, and Tish on a Quarter Horse mare... "What? no Tennessee Walkers?" Jo Kingsland and Caye Marshall met us at the campsite. Jo was not riding as her mare had bruised a leg, but Caye had brought her Fox Trotter mare, "Dolly".

Horses unloaded and tethered, fire started and coffee on, we patiently waited for more daring souls. "Does anyone know why they always put a moon on outhouse doors?" - was the question of the night. No-one had the answer. but there were some fairly colorful suggestions! Jo showed us a new way to eat baked potatoes and carbon (!) I always thought potatoes were supposed to be brown, not black! He's a nervous wreck, but only my pride is hurt. We'll do better in the next herd. Three more herds of cattle and "Royal" was beginning to like them. No more problems after that.

We arrived back in camp around noon. It was too hot to ride until later in the day. Everyone found some cool drinks and a shady place to relax, and spent some time visiting and discussing the morning ride. It would have been nice to see a few more TWH out. That afternoon, Val Sandberg and her daughter Angie joined us with Kama (3/4 TWH) and a bay Arab cross.

Our 3 hour afternoon ride took us north of Pine Lake - up hills, through water, and down some beautiful trails. Great experience for horses and riders. We arrived back at camp around 7pm. Jo had the fire going and we all had a well deserved supper. Jack and Margaret had to leave Saturday evening as their granddaughter wasn't feeling well. #### WINTERIZE YOUR HORSES

Well, it's that time of year again. It's almost as important to winterize your horses as it is to winterize your car! Thank goodness the horses take care of a lot of it themselves.

Feed and water are MORE important on cold, miserable days. A horse needs at least ten gallons of water per day. I try to take the chill off the water via the old tank heater. But bless that idiot (there's one in every crowd) who amuses himself by tossing it around to play, then leaves it lying on the ground. Reminds me of my kids: "But gee, Mom, it was so much fun!" We finally put a stop to that by fitting the top of the tank with a piece of plywood, and leaving just a small hole for them to drink out of.

Did you know that because of the concentrates we feed our horses (and ourselves) these days, that bran should be a part of their winter diet? Bran is very valuable when added to your horse's diet, as it takes away the inflamatory effects of oats and soybeans. Bran is even coming into its own in people's diets. The latest thing is oat bran cereal!

One very important thing to remember though is that, when fed damp, bran has good laxative qualities but when fed dry, it is an astringent. Because of its bland taste, some econolas added will induce the horses to eat it.

The growing season here is so short that I cannot stress too strongly how important it is that your pregnant mares, yearlings, etc. get enough good nutrition through the winter. Protein, minerals, vitamins and fibre are all very important parts of your horse's diet all year round but especially during the winter when they have no source of nutrition except through YOU.

I have a comment I would like to express regarding Grant Kihn's opinion in the Sept./Oct. issue of WHN. I agree with Grant one hundred percent. I would like to see more articles on training. To carry it further, I would dearly love to see clinics, shows, trail rides or anything else for gaited horses in our area. As far as I know, Dawson Creek and Edmonton are the closest points to us which host Walking Horse events.

I tried to get a class going for gaited horses at our annual High Prairie Fall Fair and the committee was willing until they found out how much it costs to import a judge. We have tried showing our horses in the open classes to no avail. They are not built nor do they move like Quarter Horses. If anyone is interested in hosting TWH events in the Peace River - Slave Lake area, drop me a line. I'll sure put forward my best efforts to help stage such happenings. I'll even include my husband, Don, in that pledge!!

Grant is more fortunate than we are. We have never seen a TWH show. We either have to work or just can't afford the travel. It would be nice to have a little knowledge about the different gaits and how to show them. I know that my gelding is a Cadillac to ride, a superb bush horse for hunting, and a real gentleman to handle, but I have never had a chance to show him. I've never even seen that many Walking Horses to make comparisons regarding gaits, etc.

Vern Lauck has a beautiful TWH stallion that he hides down the Banana Belt road. We're always trying to get Vern to show him off! Mr. Kihn, I believe, lives not far away from us in the Winigami Beach area. We saw you in the Stampede Parade, Grant. You and your horse were super. Keep it up!

I found my horse in the bush at Snipe Lake just by chance. I had always heard about Tennessee Walking Horses and when I saw them at Spruce Meadows about six years ago, that settled my mind. Then I heard about a horse for sale that was supposed to be "fancy stepping". He's been bought young at an

auction sale at Grande Prairie. Out of curiosity, I went to look. I fell in love with him, even though on our initial ride he was nearly knee deep in mud. Also, at this time he was a little unkempt and on the thin side and had pie plate hoofs. I went home the very proud owner of "Misty's Chico Ray" (Laddie's Monte Ray x Doll O' the Mist).

The love affair continues. We also own "Roy L Canadian Dancer" (Canadian Crown Royal x Sue's Walking Eagle). He is a beautiful black gelding that can walk like the wind. We purchased him from Jayne Walker of Dawson Creek. Jayne is a lovely lady who also introduced us to the McDonalds of Pouce Coupe. We had the opportunity to view Laddie's Monte Ray and Doll O' the Mist, plus their many other Tennessee Walking Horses. We were so sorry to read about the loss of Ray. These horse people are very kind and hospitable. I would advise anyone to go and visit their farm.

I have also met Joyce Patterson of Cawston, B.C. She is one of my parents' neighbours. When she writes about those trails she rides, I feel very homesick. 

GENIUS' CREATE A MEMORY



This past summer has been an interesting one as my brother Ted and I scoured the Northwest for that perfect Walking Horse. You know the one I mean. The gelding with the perfect disposition, who stands still while you get on and responds lightly to leg and rein aids, who slips easily into a perfect running walk at a squeeze, and into an easy canter with a slight shift in weight and another squeeze, who doesn't shy at anything, and will go off by himself and through or over anything without a fuss. You know the one.

We looked at whole herds in North Dakota and Montana and a few operations in B.C. and Oregon. We attended shows in Magrath, Calgary and Red Deer. In all, we saw over two hundred Walking Horses and what did we find?

First, that there are very few very well trained horses out there at any price, and secondly, that there are another few very well trained and ridden horses that don't have the nice, even cadenced running walk that we were looking for. (Not pacy, not trotty, just right on.)

Solution to the problem, anyone? Well, here is what we did. First, we purchased a stallion named Pride's Dominator with a perfect four beat running walk, head nod and overstride. Furthermore, he has nice coloring with good disposition. The rest we will work on.

We bought another gelding, Sensation's Skipper, with a fantastic, showy running walk and a sliding stop, but who needs a little work on consistency and a good rider.

We also purchased three yearlings from Jackie Kalberer at Umatilla that we hope will make the kind of horses we are really looking for.

Also we bought a beautiful "Pride" and "Go Boy" mare from Tennessee for the new stallion.

To top all of this off, we purchased from the Wrays in Sundre a gelding called Robbie who racks so smoothly that it makes me wonder why we were looking for running walk horses. He also has most of the other qualities we were looking for. (See lower picture, page 21, Sept/Oct WHN.)

The other thing that became obvious in our search is that the horses would not perform as well when we less skilled riders were mounted. Solution, anyone? Getting what you want from a Walking Horse takes lots of skill. It's riding lessons for us.


and gait like his papa. Pamela can hardly wait to show him next summer. He is a real people loving horse and loves to eat all kinds of treats."





#### NEW SCHEDULE OF FEES

First of all, take note that the registration fees and transfer fees will increase as of January 1, 1990. If you are a member, the cost of registering foals within the first six months of their lives will go up from \$20 to \$30. For non-members, the increase will be from \$45 to \$60. If you register the foal after six months of age, you'll pay \$60 if a member and \$90 if not.

Transfers too will cost substantially more. All transfers recorded within thirty days have been processed for \$15, whether or not you are a TWHBEA member. After January 1, they will double for members and quadruple for non members.

Also, transfers will have to be signed and dated in the seller's personal handwriting.

Annual membership dues will be raised from \$15 to \$30 per year, effective January 1. This will now include a subscription to the <u>Voice</u> magazine, as well as one free foal registration.

MANDATORY BLOOD TYPING OF ALL TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE STALLIONS

Beginning January 1, 1990, all stallions must be blood typed before their offspring can be registered. Write TWHBEA at Box 286, Lewisburg, TN 37091 for a Blood-Typing Kit request form. When you get the request form, you fill it out and return it to TWHBEA along with \$50 in U.S. funds for every stallion that you require blood typing for, and they will send you the kits. You must then have a licensed veterinarian take the blood samples. The actual typing of the blood is done by the University of California at Davis.

I inquired if this meant that foals born in 1990 from 1989 breedings could not be registered until their sire was blood typed, but did not get a direct answer to my question. Instead, the old blood typing rule in the Corporation By-Laws and Rules was marked in red.


So I guess we have to assume that 1990 foals cannot be registered with TWHBEA unless their sire has been blood typed before their registration applications come in to the Association offices.

#### NEW ALBERTA DIRECTOR

You will be amazed to hear that I, Marjorie Lacy, have been elected as the new Alberta Director for TWHBEA. I certainly was surprised!

However, the by-laws of the Association state that any director that misses two consecutive directors' meetings is automatically removed from the Board, unless the Executive Committee provides a waiver of such automatic removal upon written request of the director involved.

There is very little possibility that I would be able to attend even one meeting a year in Lewisburg. (Public school boards frown on teachers taking off from their classes for such frivolous pursuits.) So I wrote back to say that I would not be able to comply with this regulation, but if they were willing to waive it. I would attempt to represent the 39 Alberta TWHBEA members. Canadians often have unique concerns and problems that the TWHBEA should be aware of. But since there are only about 85 members of the TWHBEA in all of Canada compared to 1485 in Tennessee alone, it will take some loud squeaking to be heard! I will let you know the outcome next issue.





I have had many people ask me, "What is in it for me to register with the Canadian Registry?"

To me, the most important factor, which seems to be overlooked by so many, is the fact that as a member of the Registry, one then has a voice regarding the direction of the breed in the future.

The other thing that is not understood is that an animal that is registered in an out of country registry such as the U.S. is still a product of the U.S., even though it may be bred and born in Canada.

Through the Pedigree Act of Canada, each breed, be it pigs, cows, horses, etc. is allowed one registry and only one registry. A registry that is affiliated with the Canadian Livestock Records Corporation is highly respected throughout the world because of their

reputation for integrity and accuracy, and the regulations of the Pedigree Act of Canada. This in turn will bring a sale over any other registry.

These are not material "give-aways" as to why register Canadian, they are things that are far more important than receiving a subscription to a magazine or a bumper sticker.

As a Walking Horse owner and breeder, my concerns are in preserving the natural gait, without the aids of shoeing and other devices. If my horses were only U.S. registered, I would not be able to exercise these goals, and rightly so because I am not an American citizen.

I am proud of my Canadian stock, and all my horses are truly Canadian because they are all registered in the Canadian Registry.

#### ALBERTA NEWS

LOIS AUNE & HERMAN PETERS, AWARE FARMS, FAIRVIEW, write, "Herman and I moved to our own place in June, '89, with nothing here but 50 acres of worn out and weedy cropland. We put in oats and underseeded hay on most of that. We thought we had a mover for the double wide lined up in May; we had to be moved by June 30 as the place we were renting had sold. At the last minute he backed out and we were stuck with moving this 24 by 40 ourselves, without experience or equipment - definitely not a recommended pastime! We sincerely hope you can keep it up."

From GLEN & SHEILA REUM, RYLEY, "We want to send a one year <u>Walking Horse News</u> subscription to Cheryl von Tettenborn of the Round Hill, AB area. Bernhard and Cheryl bought our gelding, Thing's Bomber. We'll sure miss the faithful friend. He was our rope horse, hunting and packing horse. He enjoyed jumping over things and herding cattle. cart and cars and big trucks never bothered him. I never feared my kids riding him alone because he was the most reliable baby sitter I had around the farm. When nothing else would start, Bomber pulled big round hay bales and barrels of water on the stoneboat. It didn't matter what it was, work or play, or just going for a smooth ride, he had it all - flat walk, smooth run walk, and a lope that could go for miles as if rocking in an easy chair. 
"It is always a pleasure to get out in the back country and just sit back and

#### A TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE TRAIL RIDERS' DIARY

Hi, how's things in your part of the country? Things are going good at the Janni's. Another riding season just about over. This is our 2nd year with our Tennessee Walkers and our first year using them in a new sport. Competitive Trail Riding. We knew from last year that Walkers make excellent mountain horses, but we now know they also make excellent competitive horses. It was a great season! Thought we would write and share some of it with you:

February. We answered Don & Jo-Anne MacDonald's ad for Royal Dictator, a big black yearling stud colt out of Go Boy's Crown Royal. They sent pictures of him and a copy of his registration paper and after numerous phone calls (our phone bills are terrible) we decided to buy him. We realized that we should geld Chapie (Chapie's Caribou) because although he is beautiful, at the age of 3 we didn't think he was big enough for stallion duties.

April 28th. Our first competitive ride. Kaledon, BC, which is over by Penticton. Beautiful country. Gary was riding Revy (Monteray Reveille) a 5 yr. old gelding, and I was riding Tera (Monteray Masterpiece) a 4 yr. old mare. I have to tell you, we were in ARAB COUNTRY!! There was a total of about 40 riders. Tera and I won 5th place in the Novice Lightweight Division.

May. We decided to sell both Chapie and Revy and buy another mare. So then we would have 4 mares and one stallion. We started to look for an older mare with some different color & around 15.2 HH. A good friend of ours, Doreen Weibe, was also looking for an older mare for herself. This prompted a shopping trip to Lethbridge, Alberta, to Walt & Mavis Glover's. They had a few Reg'd TWH for sale. We bought a big 11 yr. old palomino mare named Trouble's Misty, and Doreen bought a BIG 10 yr. old black mare named Canadian Ginger, in foal to a beautiful stallion named Canadian Blue. Upon arrival at our place, the two mares were put into separate pens and put on a strict diet (these two girls hadn't been used for a few years, sort of just hung around, had babies and ate LOTS of good groceries). Goldie (Trouble's Misty) went onto a nice gradual conditioning program. She was to become Gary's new mount and little did she know that she was embarking on a new career as a competitive trail horse!

June. The arrival of our new colt, Royal Dictator. Don & Jo-Anne delivered 3 horses to our place. Our colt; a gelding for Erika Peters of Keremeos; and a filly for Carol Kirk of Fruitvale. Joyce Paterson accompanied the Peters family to our place to pick up their horse. It was a busy and very enjoyable weekend.

July 1st. Competitive ride at Pincher Creek, Alberta. Absolutely beautiful country. A great ride. There was about 80 riders in total. Tera and I won 4th place in the Novice Lightweight division. Goldie didn't place in the Novice Heavyweight division, but she did extremely well for her. She vetted-in sound without any problems.

Aug.6th. Competitive ride at Calgary, in the Kannanaskis country. We rode the area of the course the day before the ride. What beautiful country. But we made a mistake this trip by bringing some new fly repellent for the horses that we never tried before. We sprayed both Goldie and Tera with it. Sure enough, Tera had an allergic reaction to it and broke out in great big huge welts all over her body. Needless to say I didn't compete with her. Gary decided not to compete either and we returned home.

Sept.2nd. We attended our annual fall horse show at home in Trail. The Trail Horseman's Society made a special class for Reg'd TWH this year, just a halter class mind you, but it's a start. (We put up such a big stink last year because they wouldn't make a separate class for Walkers and they told us not to bother entering them in any of the other classes because they wouldn't judge them). So this year EVERYBODY (all the walkers in our area) went to the show! It turned out to be the biggest halter class in the whole show! (We'll fix 'em!) Anyway, our colt (Royal Dictator) now named DJ, won 1st place! Ginger (Canadian Ginger) won 2nd, Tera (Monteray Masterpiece) won 3rd, and our beautiful 2 yr. old filly, Indianna (Royal Bay Quest) won 4th. They all behaved and did us proud. We also put on a demonstration ride during the lunch break and believe me, all eyes watched. Later, people told us how impressed they were. There was one lady there (a quarter horse person) who got to ride one of the walkers. She fell in love with it and now she wants to buy a walker for herself!

Sept.23rd. Our last competitive ride for the season. It was the most exciting. It was at Falkland, BC, which is over by Kamloops. It was quite a challenging trail, there was a few hairy places. There was about 80 riders total. Again we were in ARAB COUNTRY! Tera and I won 2nd place in the Level 1 Lightweight class! We placed 2nd to Clint Keller who is an Open Class competitive rider who rode on the BC team (on an Arab) last year. The only reason Clint was in Level 1 was because he was accompanying his 2 children. Needless to say we were pretty proud of Tera. BUT, we were also pretty proud of Goldie. She placed 4th in the Level 1 Heavyweight class!

"THE CANADIAN REGISTRY OF THE TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE".


Sounds good, doesn't it?



## WEST COAST T.W.C. FESTIVAL AND CLINIC A HUGE SUCCESS THANKS TO T.W.H.B.E.A. SPONSORSHIP

Although south-western British Columbia is next door to Washington state where Walkers abound, the breed is relatively poorly known in our local area. Traveling long distances with horses has never been easy, particularly where international travel is concerned. Requirements for vet. checks at the border mean that travel is restricted to week-days making it especially difficult for people who work. This made it very difficult for British Columbians to draw on the resources south of the border. However, the TWHBEA has been very supportive of club activities in Canada.

The West Coast Tennessee Walker Club has over the past few years been putting out a concerted effort to promote awareness and appreciation of the pleasure Tennessee Walking Horse. As a result of some hard work and dedication by club members, the number of participants and spectators in our shows and clinics has increased each year. This year the WCTWC held its Third Annual Fall Festival in Aldergrove, B.C. on September 16th followed by a clinic on the 17th. Our approach was to show the horses first and then based on the observations in the show to have the judge provide us with suggestions for improvement the following day. The horses shown came from all over the Fraser Valley and spectators came from as far away as Keremeos and Quesnel (an 8 hour drive). Our judge and clinician was Mrs. Ann Kuykendall from Muskogee, Oklahoma, Her visit was sponsored by TWHBEA, an indication of their recognition of the developing industry in our area. It was Mrs.Kuykendall's second visit to the Fraser Valley. Her first visit took place about two and a half years ago. At that time she offered valuable advice which club members have been putting to good use. This year we felt we could use an evaluation on how we have been doing and where to go next.

A total of 35 classes in the show (lite-shod only) gave spectators ample opportunity to view the Walkers in action. To maximise our learning time with Mrs.

Kuykendall we requested that she comment after each class on her criteria for placements and on areas where improvements were needed. Her job was not easy. In addition to the TWH classes, the show also had open classes where TWH competed against Thoroughbreds, Appaloosas, and Quarter Horses among others. Our approach to promoting the TWH has been to expose the breed to other horse-people by inviting them to our shows. This has proven to be a useful way of gaining interest and respect from other breed owners and trainers.

Three high-point blankets were awarded at the end of the show. The Open High-Point blanket was awarded to Revel's Many Spots, an Appaloosa ridden by Debbie Smith of Maple Ridge. The Tennessee Walking Horse High-Point (Mares & Geldings) blanket was awarded to "A Touch of Pride" ridden by Ann Tonn of Delta. This 10 year old Montana bred (by Majestic Black Royal) mare was born in B.C. and has produced 4 foals to carry on the Merry Go Boy, Ebony Masterpiece, and Midnight Sun genes she carries. The Tennessee Walking Horse High-Point (Stallions) blanket was awarded to "Ebony's Playmaker" ridden by Judy Rogalsky of Aldergrove. Despite his 20+ years, Ebony put on an impressive performance. Ebony's Playmaker (a son of Ebony Masterpiece) came to B.C. from Robert Smith Farm of Elma, Washington and has many previous show honours as well as competitive trail ride championships to his credit.

The day after the show Mrs.Kuykendall held a clinic with the theme of "Corrective Showing" in which show participants were able to learn techniques for improving their showing and riding skills. Mrs.Kuykendall's comments were much appreciated despite the bruising some egos took. Her friendliness, warmth and wealth of knowledge were highly appreciated by all.

The WCTWC wishes to extend its appreciation to the TWHBEA for sponsoring Mrs.Kuykendall's visit and also for the loan of the display unit. Although we faced many difficulties with Canadian

customs, we were able to have the use of the display for the B.C. Horse Council, Horse Improvement program where a tremendous number of horse enthusiasts were able to view the display. This kind of valuable support by the parent organization will help the breed flourish and extend into heretofore unknown markets.


### CHEVEAUX TRAINING STABLES SEMINAR

The week of October 2-7 I escaped my responsibilities at home and headed south to Cheveaux Training Stables which is located 20 miles south of Portland, Oregon in a beautiful rolling landscape dotted with hazelnut and apple orchards. Mrs. Diane Gueck is owner and trainer at this facility. She was originally raised in England and has a hunterjumper background, but since coming to Oregon some 25 years ago she has been involved with American Saddlebreds and Tennessee Walking Horses. The number of champion horses and the number of winning riders CTS has produced is ample testimonial to her success as a trainer and instructor.

This was the fourth annual week-long training seminar held at CTS. In the spring there is also a three-day equitation seminar. My fellow students (9 at this session) came from all over the United States, W. Virginia, Minnesota, Utah, Wyoming, California, and Oregon. They represented all types of backgrounds and levels of expertise. One worked at a breeding and training farm, another had back-country outfitting experience. All together it was a very interesting group and apart from the clinic's instruction we were able to share our background experiences and provide eachother with horse related trivia and tips.

The daily seminar routine consisted of a morning lecture followed by practical work on training. The week started with work on foals and progressed to developing and showing the "finished" horse. During the afternoon, participants were able to ride either their own horses or the CTS school horses. One of the great advantages of the seminar was the variety of horses we were exposed to. All of them had different gaits which we were able to feel and to observe as others rode them. It was also interesting to note the difference which various riding skills made in the gaits. Clinic participants were given the opportunity to ride two champion walking horses; Plantation champion "Goldfever" and International Lite-shod Plantation Grand Champion "Magic's Pride and Joy".

Altogether, the seminar was a very valuable experience and I would recommend it to anyone who is seriously interested in developing greater skills with their walking horses.
