

CANADIAN NATIONAL COMPETITIVE TRAIL RIDE

The National Competitive Trail Ride held near Kamloops on August 28 and 29 was a beautiful ride, with all possible terrain variation. 42 1/2 miles in length, at a speed of seven miles per hour, it was quite a challenge.

Most provinces were represented and lots of different horse breeds, from Mustangs to Paso Finos, Standardbreds, Thoroughbreds, Quarter Horses, Peruvian Pasos, Arabs. Welsh Ponies and two Tennessee Walkers!

I entered Champ in the intermediate division, 42 1/2 miles on Saturday, and the 23 1/2 miles on Sunday as adult sponsor for my eight year old daughter, Jennifer. This last was not part of the competition but Champ had to pass all the vet checks in order to finish the ride with Jennifer.

Friday's pre-vet exam was disappointing when the veterinarian thought Champ was lame or had a sore back. None of the three vets were able to confirm either soreness or lameness but they were sure that there was something not just right! I started to worry too

and was ready to pull him out of the competition. Our team coach, Bill, urged me to start and then see at the first vet check how things were. According to Bill and Garry Janni, Champ would start out in a strong trot but when circled would fall into a run-walk or a pace, nodding his head inconsistently. It really looked like he could be lame. I appreciated the veterinarians' concerns and started out very carefully.

We came to the first vet check and the veterinarian commented on how nice and loose Champ was moving now - he must have been stiff the day before! We passed the second and third vet checks and finished in very good spirits and condition with no signs of lameness or sore back. But, we were 11 minutes late. We'd stopped too many times to take pictures, but it was worth it!

At the Sunday morning vet check, Champ trotted out and back, to the vet's delight. We rode the 23 1/2 miles and he felt like he'd never done the 42 1/2 miler the day before. Champ's score on the second day was was 298 points out of 300. Was there really something wrong on Friday? ? We don't think so, but 15 points were still taken off his score card. There was nothing else wrong with him and we placed third over all. Champ's and attitude, behaviour, performance were, like always, superb. He truly honoured his name; he Champion.

Betty Ann Janni and Tera (Monteray Msterpiece) were one of the few pairs who finished the two day 85 mile ride. 36 riders started the ride and 13 finished. Betty Ann and Tera placed fourth over all in good condition. A Masterpiece performance, Congratulations!

That the breed couldn't handle the fast pace for the higher levels of the sport. After she did so well, she sure

KEITH DOLL, DOUGLAS, sent along an interesting package of information from their All Breed Show as well as the magazine Horse Country, which carried a write-up on the Challenge Class at that show. Keith writes, "Our All Breed Show in July was a great success. Our horse numbers were up by 50 percent. I don't know if it could be attributed to the new Challenge Class or not. The Challenge Class itself, even with only five entries, was a great crowd pleaser."

"We had ten Walkers at the All Breed Show. Paula Winske brought her stallion, Zepher's Zepher, up from New Rockford, N.D. Unfortunately, somewhere on the trip injured his hip, which greatly hindered his performance. Our performance classes were small. Darlene Moore and Paula Winske were the only ones in the saddle classes. Darlene and her stallion, Majestic Streaker, were winners in both the two gaited and water glass classes. Darlene's 4 yr old mare was the only harness entry. Darlene has Fantasia driving beautifully now and they did a great demonstration. Darlene's Majestic Streaker was Champion Stallion and Champion of the Breed. My mare, Dakota Dusty Doll (Dakota Midnight x M.C.'s Baldie) was Champion Mare and Reserve Champion. Ι have absentmindedly misplaced the show results but everybody had a good time and we Walker people had our traditional Saturday night supper get-together."

I've enclosed copies of the reg. papers of the five fillies Bea and I showed. Prairie Blue Belle (Caribou's Spit Fire x M.C.'s Baldie) has the identical face markings as Shadow's Laddie, who was on the July/Aug. cover. I'm wondering if there's any relationship through Laddie's Monte Ray. Any idea of the pedigree of Shadow's Laddie?." (Note: there probably is some relationship since Shadow's Laddie and M.C.'s Baldie were both bred by Chapmans at Stettler.)

"I sold my little 4 yr old gelding, Caribou Kimbrook, in the spring. I had him driving just great. A young man bought him and drove him at a few country fairs. Darlene showed against him and said Kim was showing really nicely."

I think the position balances them better and also my 190 lbs might be sufficient weight for them without the saddle's weight. 

"We will be standing Sun Chief at stud in 1993. He will be three in May of '93."



HORSEMAN'S DIGEST Book Review THE PLANTATION TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE: A Guide for Amateur Competitors by Vickie Mazzola

Whether you are a recent convert to Tennessee Walking Horses or a long time devotee of the breed, you realize how elusive and frustrating is the search for written information on the breed. There is little published about our breed. Information currently or previously written is difficult to find, presently out of print, deals with the show horse, is devoted to show results, intended as promotion, or tells us nothing we didn't before. We desperately seek information no matter how meagre: therefore anything concerning Tennessee Walking Horses is greeted excitement.

This book was recently published and deals exclusively with our breed. In the words of the author Vickie Mazzola of Memphis, Tennessee, "... this book concerns itself with the training and showing of plantation Tennessee Walking Horses, both heavy shod and lite shod".

Don't let the word "Competitors" in the title fool you into thinking this book is only of interest to people". Don't let the word "Plantation" fool you into thinking this book is only about shoes. Rather, focus on the word "AMATEUR". Most Tennessee Walking Horse owners are amateurs. Canadian professionals involved in the TWH industry are too few and far between, are only interested in the show ring, have little time to spare, or can not answer questions to your satisfaction. Because this book is liberally sprinkled with quotations from many professionals in the TWH industry, the reader is the beneficiary of a wide variety opinions. As well as quoting current professionals, the author makes frequent use of quotations from Dr. Bob Womack's book The Echo of Hoofbeats and Ben Green's book

The History of the Tennessee Walking Horse.

The reader is exposed to both historical and current viewpoints, is able to compare both, and arrive at his own conclusions.

How many times have you heard terms or


concepts you did not understand? "Behind the bit, light shoes, plantation shoes, way of going, dog walk, training aid, etc." The answer to one question leads to another question. This book can be used as a resource to provide some basic knowledge in answering many of your questions. It does not contain all the answers to all the questions, but it can provide a good base. Technical errors occur in a few places. I would advise the reader to seek further information on the canter, and the action of bits.

I found the chapters "What the Judges See", "Words of Advice", and "Training Tips" most interesting. These chapters were in quotation format, and gave me the feeling of a dialogue with a variety of people. It was reassuring to discover not all judges, trainers, or competitors hold the same opinions or assign the same level of importance to certain qualities of the horse. There is room within our breed for individual differences.

It is refreshing to meet an author who encourages the reader to grow, warns the reader about pitfalls, and believes, "Nothing can replace plenty of patience and proper training". She recommends the reader seeks knowledge and assistance from farriers, other TWH owners, other equine disciplines, and trainers. She advises the reader to abstain from the use of certain training devices without more knowledge.

I would never suggest that this is the most complete book written on the Tennessee Walking Horse, but I recommend it as a basic source of information. The bibliography is extensive and could prove valuable for those seeking information. It certainly provides an overview of the breed. At best, this book will answer many of your questions and lead you to further searches. At worst, this book will provide interesting reading.

Truth in Advertising

Just what is a truthful advertisement about a horse? We expect advertisements and promotions to be truthful. In fact we have laws governing the truthfulness of advertisements. Manufacturers frequently supply various kinds of warranties and guarantees designed to insure that the product does perform as advertised. But horses aren't manufactured. No two are exactly alike. They also have intelligence and personality which makes guaranteeing anything difficult, if not impossible. Horses are notoriously good at making liars of their owners, even when the owner is trying to be truthful.

In our modern society horses are kept for enjoyment. We do not need horses. They satisfy emotional needs perhaps. They may gratify our egos. Ultimately the real reason for having horses is to fulfill our fantasies. Promotion and advertisement of horses is thus oriented toward convincing prospective buyers that this one particular horse or breed is the ultimate horse of her dreams.

Subjecting fantasies to objective performance standards is difficult. There is no uniform agreement as to what the ideal horse should be. My fantasy is not the same as yours so my ideal horse is not the same. This may have something to do with why we have more different breeds of horses now than any other time in history. This lack of a uniform objective plus the perceptions and expectations we read into the ad may result in what seems to be false advertising.

It is quite true that there are those individuals who really are intent on

deceiving horse buyers. However most sellers are trying to present the horse truthfully. The discrepancies betweem the real horse and the ideal our minds conceive when we read the ad may seem like false advertising. But is it really? Consider some of the following sample ads. What kind of mental picture do you have of the horse described in each ad? Are the ads truthful?

* Registered Tennessee Walker mare, 17 year old, 14.3 hand chestnut. Good manners, well trained. Partially blind left eye, mild arthritis in both front pasterns, shies but has no other vices.


Is this ad true? Probably. How much is this horse worth? Would you buy it? Would you take it if it were free?

* Mountain trail horse! Sane, sensible, sure footed Walking horse. 10 years experience on mountain trails. Neck reins, ground ties, will picket or stake out. Small, but will carry 200 lbs. all day.

What would you expect to do with a horse like that? What interests is the potential buyer going to have?

* Show off your patriotic spirit in the next parade! Carry our national flag on this beautiful Tennessee Walker. Experienced both alone and leading groups in parades.

What mental picture do you have of this horse? If you're like most people you pictured a high headed, high stepping horse of some flashy ... cont'd>



color or markings equipped with a fancy
silver saddle. If the horse turned out to
be a low headed, low going, chestnut with
no markings was it falsely advertised?
The horse really does carry the U.S. Flag
in parades. The owner has photos and
video to prove it.

* Proven Show horse. Midnight Sun, Merry Go Boy breeding. Versatility trained. Places well in all breed shows. English, Western, Equitation, Trail, Reining, and more. Registered Tennessee Walking horse with 3 good gaits. Pretty head, clean legs. Has always been plain shod. Loads, hauls and unloads easily.

That may sound like just the horse to try for a Versatility Championship with. If you bought the horse and discovered it trots in pasture, doesn't like stalls and is afraid of clippers, was it falsely advertised? Did the ad say anything about clipping, stabling or pure gaitedness? Now if the horse had been presented to you in a stall perfectly clipped and braided you might have reason to presume it was accustomed to these things. But if you found the horse running loose in a 1 field with a run-in shed shedding winter hair in clouds, was it implied that it would tolerate clippers and stabling?

* Great family horse, docile, gentle, well trained, perfect manners. This little walking horse mare can be trusted with the smallest child but is spirited enough for adults to



enjoy. Could be 4H project.

That one sounds too good to be true. A horse like that would be worth her weight in gold. You buy the horse for your children or grandchildren. The first day the 10 year old jumps on and takes the new horse over to that construction site down the next road. The horse takes one look at a bull dozer clanging and chuffing toward them and bolts for home. Was the horse misrepresented? (The child did arrive home on top of the horse, unharmed but badly frightened.)

The next day you decide to check out the horse for yourself. You look up from cleaning a front hoof to discover the 2 year old, whom you thought was safely indoors, walking under the mare's belly. Before you can safely get to the child he has stopped behind her back legs and started pulling her tail. The mare is standing still as a stone, her head turned toward the baby, one ear cocked listening to him. Now do you think the horse was misrepresented?


* Proven broodmare. Foundation style Walking Horse. Linebred to Thornton's Glamour Girl. Correct movement, natural running walk, superior disposition, pretty head, straight legs and passes them on to her foals. Also rides. Crosses well with Wilson's Allen line. Should not be bred to Merry Boy line.

What do all these ads have in common? They are all factual. What the ads actually say is true. But not everything you might read into them or assume about the horses is true. What kind of mental picture do you have of each horse? What performance expectations do you have for each horse? Do you picture these horses the same or differently?

Now I'll let you in on a secret. All six ads are for THE EXACT SAME horse!!

No, this isn't made up. The horse is real. Her name is Sacia's Pride. She is not for sale at any price.

ADVERTISE - WITH A CLASS(IFIED) AD!

I am always surprised at how few people make use of the classified ads in our paper. I know these ads are often the very first part of the News that are read. I also know that over the years we've sold hundreds of Tennessee Walkers for those who have advertised with us. It's also a very inexpensive way to keep your name in front of the Walking Horse community. So why not advertise?

First you have to write a good ad. State clearly at the beginning of the ad just what you have for sale. For example

GENTLE, WELL BROKE TWH GELDING

Here you have a horse to be sold on the basis of his usablity. He's a gelding so his breeding isn't of too much interest, and your first words are designed to attract the attention of those looking for a dependable saddle horse.

But don't stop there. People want to know how old he is, how tall, what colour

(sometimes even what markings), any special training or experience he's had, and especially, what price. If you can include something to personalize the horse, all the better. Let's say your ad looks something like this:

GENTLE, WELL BROKE TWH GELDING. 9yr old, 15 hh bay with star. Star's Twinkle #839999, Can.#345, has been ridden and packed in the mtns, and driven. A willing, easy-going fellow, Twinky loves long twilight rides and never shies. \$2200.00.

That's worth \$2.50 per insertion at our current rates, but don't forget to include your name, phone number and mailing address and count those words or numbers. Now send it in with your cheque, and don't be shy about letting it run for several issues. If the horse sells after the first insertion, let us know and we'll cancel the ad ...cont'd>

Class...Ad. cont'd... and give you a credit.

When advertising mares, stallions and young stock, always include pedigree information. You'd be surprised at how many people are interested in certain bloodlines. So put the sire and dam behind the horse's name or state the bloodlines the horse represents and offer "pedigree and photos on request"....


For example:

UPHILL MISS MANNERS (Honey Boy's Rebel x Canadian Rainbow). Linebred Go Boy's Shadow filly.

In addition, folks are going to want to know age, height, colour, markings, training, disposition, etc. so supply all that you can, in view of the animal's age and stage of training. Sometimes you have to say something like "Should mature at xx hands" or "Will be a smaller Walker" but do try to include all the details buyers want to know. They would rather you told them in your ad, than have to phone (usually long distance) to find out.

So now with your ad in place, all you have to do is stay home and answer the phone. Good luck selling your Walker!
