



by Mandy Reynolds




Hi! My name is Mandy Reynolds. I am twelve years old and I am an active junior member with the Kelowna Hoofbeats 4-H Club. This is my second year in 4-H.

During my first year, I used Chapie's Dapper Dawn (Dixie) as my project horse. She is a six year old registered Tennessee

Walking Horse, sorrel in colour and 14:3 hands high.

I have to admit that I did not think we would be treated fairly at the shows and clinics. I was wrong. Dixie and I did wonderfully. The club leader, Val Vicars, along with my fellow 4-H members, were kind and helpful. They were very curious about Dixie's unique running walk. Before the year was complete, Dixie had become very skilled at taking curious onlookers for demonstration rides.




Mandy & "Dixie" at Okanagan Stock Show, 1991

We went to the Okanagan Stock Show. I met many new people and learned very

much. We received fifth place ribbons in both the Showmanship Class and Pleasure Class. By the end of the day, I was very tired, but happy and very proud of Dixie. At the year end banquet I was surprised to be nominated as our club's most improved Junior Rider of the Year. The banquet was fun, but having the chance to take my own Tennessee Walking Horse into the 4-H Club was the most fun of all.

In August of 1991 my parents, Art and Sandy Reynolds, purchased a three year old mare from Ken and Ruth Hudson in Lethbridge. Her name was Miss Big Stuff (Missy). She is the most beautiful horse I have ever seen. I had ridden her full brother, Spokane O Joe. He had a wonderfully fast running walk with a very slow canter. He was a joy to ride.

I decided to use Missy as my 1992 4-H project. I started riding her around the middle of January. She was a green broke




Mandy & Miss Big Stuff, 4H Achievement Day 1992

mare when I first started her under saddle. I worked her in the riding ring for about two months at thirty minutes a day, getting a weekly lesson from a trainer/instructor.

At the end of March we entered our first show; a schooling show held at a local riding stable. We were entered in three classes: Maiden Equitation, Maiden Pleasure and Open Pleasure. There were thirteen entries in our Maiden Equitation Class. Missy picked up her lead and was responding beautifully. As we were cantering, someone drove a tractor outside

the arena and Missy could not see what was making all the noise. She sidestepped away from the wall, consequently eliminating our chances in that class. In our next class we took a third place ribbon. This was our very first ribbon so needless to say, it was the most beautiful thing on earth. Our final class was Open Pleasure. We were up against experienced show horses so we didn't place. Regardless, it was a good day - one ribbon for our first time out.

The next show was the Okanagan 4-H Stock Show. This show was made up of several different clubs from the Central Okanagan area. There were over 150 horses at this show. We were divided into several groups. Throughout the week I had riding lessons every day, which I feel helped a lot. The Friday of that week was our inter-club competition. I woke with the jitters. I was busy running back and forth from Missy's stall and the camper. When I was ready for my Showmanship Class I could hardly think straight.

But it was a GREAT day. I received first places in Showmanship Class, Equitation Class and in Pleasure Class. At the wind-up banquet that evening, I received a first place Intermediate trophy and rosette for Overall Equitation Class. That show was a big success!

The next show was the Prince George Exhibition where I competed in the Walking Horse Classes. I received first place in English Pleasure, second place in Western Pleasure and third place in the Water Glass Class. I was invited to compete in the 4-H division where I received third place in Showmanship and first place in the Riding Class.

The next show was the British Columbia Walking Horse Show, held in Quesnel. I came away from that show with two firsts, six seconds, four thirds, two fourths, one fifth and one sixth, for a total of sixteen ribbons. The first place in my Junior Western Pleasure was extra special as I had to work exceptionally hard for this ribbon. I was so happy I cried.

Our next stop was the Interior Provincial Exhibition held in Armstrong, B.C. My Showmanship Class was a disaster. I took sixth place. However, in Equitation Class I received first and Grand Champion and in Pleasure Class I took second and Reserve Grand Champion. I was ecstatic.

The last show of the season was the West Coast Walker Show where I received five firsts, three seconds, one third and one fifth. When I got back home I was glad the show season was over for the year as it was exhausting. I did have a lot of fun though.

At our Year End Banquet I received a plaque for Junior Trail and Equitation. The real surprise came when I was awarded the Junior Aggregate Trophy. It was so big that when I held it at waist level I wasn't able to see over it! This is a perpetual trophy but I have a keeper trophy to remind me of my achievement.

I would like to encourage all young people to join in the fun and the great learning experiences that one can get from the 4-H Program.

In closing, there are many people that I have to thank. These people made it possible for Missy and me to achieve what we did. To VAL VICARS and ELAINE STOLTZ and the rest of our dedicated 4-H Leaders, a very special thank-you. I would like to thank my loving parents, SANDY and ART REYNOLDS. There is one more thank you that I wish to extend. There is one word in the English dictionary which expresses my appreciation for my ever-so-thoughtful trainer, DIANE LARSON, and that is "reverence". ¶


NEWS FROM OUR U.S. SUBSCRIBERS

The L & R Classic competitive trail ride held at Tees is the first ride of the season in Alberta. The course is hilly (you're either going up or down <u>all</u> the time!) with patches of thick bush to negotiate, but the footing was good and the horses just loved it. This year there were 71 horses competing in Open, Intermediate and Novice divisions; 69 horses completed.

Among these were 11 Tennessee Walkers, 3 were in Intermediate level and 8 on the Novice ride. Eight of the TWH placed in the ribbons which are awarded to 6th place in each class of the above divisions e.g. Heavyweight, Lightweight or Junior Rider.




Betty also mentioned that Crescent Gold Dust has been sold to B.C.

STUD BOOK



T.W.H.B.E.A MEMOS

I phoned Bob Cherry to clarify some points on the new blood typing rules and he confirmed the following:

1) All mares must be blood typed before their foals of 1993 can be registered with TWHBEA. Many people are waiting to bloodtype the mare until the foal is old enough to bloodtype as well, but there are already cases of people having foals on the ground and then losing the mare. Mr. Cherry said that the Association is NOT going to waive the rule and register such foals under a hardship clause. That seems pretty tough to me and I said so, but he said the committee was quite firm on the matter.



2) 1993 foals DO NOT HAVE TO BE BLOODTYPED and can be registered provided their sire and dam are both blood typed. There is a little catch here however. If a horse that you breed, raise and sell is then switched with another or has a different set of papers attached to it sometime after you've sold it, YOU may be held liable.

You may voluntarily blood type your foals, and if you do, they will automatically be parentage verified. Upon verification that they can indeed be offspring of the mare and stallion indicated, they will be issued the special blue (blooded?) papers.

3) There is no charge for parentage verification or the special "blue" registration papers. There is also no charge if you wish to send in papers on the horses you have already had blood typed. The Association will mark them "Blood typed" and put a special seal on them, then return them to you.

Canadians who wish to have the blood typing done in Canada to save the hassle of shipping blood across the border may contact the Mann Equitest Laboratory, 335 Laird Road, Unit Four, GUELPH, ON N1H 6J3 Phone (519)836-2400. The cost per kit in 1990 was \$41.20 plus handling charges. ¶



"SECOND CHANCE" SCHOOLING SHOW

Here is a big bouquet to Dianne Little and Robin Whenham. They put 100% effort into the April 24th schooling show.

What a wonderful opportunity this was for horses and riders to team up under Dianne and Robin's professional guidance. Whether you were the littlest rider, more confident teenager or experienced shower, you received personal instruction and attention on how to improve both your riding skills and the gaits of your horse.

Here, especially for me, new ideas on relaxation also surfaced. Dianne said to relax you "think fat!" Well, I am always trying to follow the cosmopolitan version, that is to "think thin". So to "think fat" was both foreign and novel. The "think fat" idea helps riders to tune into the finer station of the horse's sensitive nerve endings. Mastering a "think fat" idea may take work but the results show in deeper nods and longer strides.

Another gem Dianne shared with us is the phenomena I'll call arena breath. Arena breath is something like morning breath. With morning breath you don't dare breathe on someone and with arena breath you just don't breathe at all. The current record for holding one's breath while riding around the arena is three laps. If anyone has broken my record,

please contact Guinness (Book of World Records).

"Breathe", Dianne would call out reminding us that lungs going in and out had priority over body position, balance, gait and defensive riding. We watched several times as a nervous horse stopped jumping around in line-up, as the rider breathed.

Robin too, was always available and willing to share her expertise with us. Very important was the way she radiated a kind of energy that could shoot clear across the arena. You got the feeling that she was not looking to judge something wrong but was appreciating something that was going right.

Through her cheerful and friendly attitude she taught us that showing is not painful. Smiling helps to relax the rider and the rider then appears to be enjoying the horse. Smiling at the judge shares with her a positive showing experience. Judges are good people who mostly judge horses from the best down and not from the worst up.

So, after the weekend we rode off into the proverbial sunset with a new perspective. Simply put, to improve our riding, get more from our horses and enjoy being judged - think fat, breathe, and smile.

Many thanks to the C.A.T.W. committee (Norm & Liz Levangie, Ron Bannister) for organising this innovative weekend just in time for the up-coming show season.


I had been meaning to write all summer but somehow "summer", (such as it was) disappeared real quick - one horse event to another. Our girls, 16 year old twins, Tracy & Cindy, and 13 year old Jodi, started showing July 4 and stopped Sept. 19, which was 4-H Achievement Day. No, they were not showing Walkers but they will be next summer. Guaranteed! All three did very well with their Arabians. Cindy and Tracy were chosen to represent the Northwest Region at the 4-H Provincial Show in Brandon after qualifying at the Northwest Regionals in Dauphin. Jodi just missed being on the junior team by one point. We were very proud. They did very well at all the fairs and even brought home some ribbons from Brandon.

But the most important event of the season was, of course, the birth of Wisky's foal. You may remember that I requested a black filly. Instead, Wisky delivered into my hands the funniest looking foal I have ever seen! YES, I got my filly, but NO, she was about as opposite to black as she could be. Would you believe strawberry roan? She has a bald white face, two back stockings that extend above the hocks at the front, white splashes under her chin and neck, a white splash on one side and a white tummy to go with the rest.

Regardless of colour, her birth turned out to be a very special family affair. On April 2 at 4:30 a.m. the five of us were in Wisky's shed with flashlights to "help" and witness the miracle of birth. Our daughters had never seen a mare foal before which made this a very special time. The three girls were sitting on a bale in the corner of the shed and at one point in her labour Wisky got up, turned around and lay down with her head at their feet for comfort and help - which she promptly received.

F88's Tennessee Brandy had arrived. When she was three days old the 4-H club of around 20 children and parents came to see my baby. You can imagine the comments I received on her colour! Several people

Despite the fact that she was lacking (or over endowed) in colour, the rest has been perfect. She has far more character and personality than any other foal we have ever raised. Despite the fact that she is "spoiled", she still knows her limits in terms of proper horse behaviour and is well mannered. She talks to us continually when we are outside or answers to a call from the window. Have we achieved the much talked about "foal imprinting"?

However, after several days it was obvious to my girls and me that this baby was very attached to my husband. Strange! Though he had given in years ago to joining us in our obsession, we were surprised at what was happening. Every time he came outside, and was seen or heard by Brandy, she would "talk" to him. She would quit nursing and leave her mother to run directly to my husband, shoving her nose in his hand and ignoring the rest of us. Soon Brandy was being introduced as his foal.

After a couple of weeks it was certain whose foal she was. She would even run up to his truck or the tractor he was in to "talk" to him. He would wave to her and she would nicker and then wait at the steps for him to climb down (even if it was running) and scratch and rub her. Needless to say, he had given himself away. The man who scolded his wife and daughters about the silly and personal way

we referred to our horses was suddenly acting just as "horsey". We now knew what went on all day while we were at school and work. Someone was spending an awful lot of time with Baby Clyde. We were on to him. Baby Clyde now includes the rest of us in her family but his voice is still the first one she answers to.

Spring started with ten horses. The girls sold their three 2 year old Quarter Horses, well started, and Cindy also sold her good Arabian mare for she was getting too small for her. The rule at our house is that no one needs more than one horse. The girls didn't want to part with their older horses so the young stuff left - all to good homes. We picked up a black gelding off the track for Cindy's new barrel horse but while his temperament, manners and training progressed very well, we decided he just wasn't what she wanted so he also went to a good home. We then purchased a 2 year old Arabian gelding for Cindy that is a brother to Jodi's mare.

That left us with the girls' three horses, Wisky for me, Bill's saddle horse and Brandy. By this fall he felt Brandy should have a buddy for the winter so a racing bred QH colt was purchased. It seems there are two sides to this rule about one horse each. One person in the family seems to have three! ! At least he

shares so we'll forgive him. He doesn't know it yet but I will have my black Walker someday - even if I have to buy it for him!

I will be having back surgery again in January but now I know after owning Wisky for a year that I will be back in the saddle A.S.A.P. I also hope to take both Wisky and "Baby Clyde" to the All Breed Show in Brandon next summer.

Postscript: April 6 and I couldn't wait any longer. Nine weeks to the day after my back surgery, I took Wisky for a ride of about a mile. Mentally it felt wonderful. Physically I can't go too far yet but I'll go at it nice and slow and hope things continue to improve. There is a poker derby on April 25 that I'll have to miss. Last year they had over 100 riders. I couldn't go then either because Wisky had just foaled and she is now the only horse I can ride. Next year, I guess!

"Baby Clyde's" sire is Sunday's Topper (Chapie's Topper x Sunday Breeze). Her dam, Wisky, was bred by Lexie Cole, at Cabri, Sask. John and Irene Thomas of Road King Walkers, Hamiota, had already bred Wisky when I purchased her from their daughter, Diane Urfer. They owned Sunday's Topper.



The Original Walking Horse

We've been hearing quite a bit lately about old blood and going back to what the Tennessee Walking Horse was. There are two problems with this as it is being done now. First is that the supporters of all this are only going back to 1945 - 1950. A few are going back as far as 1940. The Walking Horse dates back to before the Civil War. Secondly the fans of "old" don't seem to have a clear understanding of what the old Walker really was. They are actually endorsing a middle, or transition style Walker, not the oldest or original Walking Horse. As a result the alleged "old" is just a style variation on what we now have as modern Walkers.

The Original Walking Horse, as opposed to merely old Walking Horse, is so drastically different from what we now call the Tennessee Walking Horse that they constitute an entirely different breed of horse. Furthermore, as unbelievable as it seems, there are still a few Original Walkers around. Walking Horses that have been selectively bred to the original standards for 70 years.

I stumbled on to this fact along about 1986 when I came to the shocking conclusion that my beloved Walking Horse, Sassy, wasn't the kind of horse described by TWBEA brochures and found in the breed journals. Sure, she has Tennessee Walking Horse blood lines and registration papers, which are correct. But she is not the same kind of critter at all. She's low headed, not high headed; low stepping, not high

stepping; and she running walks 6 mph. not 10 mph. The real clincher was that all the training advice for Tennessee Walking Horses got results that were the exact opposite of what they were supposed to! Obviously something was amiss here.

The next question was, "What is Sassy if she's not a Tennessee Walking Horse?" I started researching to find out. The conclusion suggested by the research was even more startling. Sassy is indeed a Walking Horse ... a match for the ideal Walker of 1920! Sassy was simply in the wrong decade, by about 60 years! I promptly expanded my research. Just how tyical of original Walkers is Sassy, and are there others like her somewhere? After looking carefully through the discarded standards, overlooked advice and obscure anecdotes, I finally met the Walking Horse Albert Dement and Jim Brantlev envisioned it. This is the Walking Horse that the Tennessee Walking Horse Breeders' Association was founded to promote and keep track of. The Walking Horse that TWHBA and its successor, TWHBEA, lost in the middle 1940's.

To find the very first Walking Horse we have to go back to Lexington, Kentucky in 1836. There a man by name of Higgins Chinn bred an unidentified daughter of Isaac Johnson's Copperbottom to the stallion known as Canadian Tom Hal. This blue roan stallion was registered with the American Saddle Register as number 3237. Canadian Tom Hal was a Canadian Pacer.

Isaac Johnson's Copperbottom can be assumed to be a descendent of Copperbottom, a horse also believed to be a Canadian Pacer. The dam of this unknown Copperbottom mare was an equally unknown daughter of the Thoroughbred stallion, Tarquin.



Mr. Chinn's mare produced a sorrel sabino colt with a bald face and four stockings. The colt was named Bald Stockings and grew up to establish a reputation as one of the best and fastest saddle horses of his day. The thing that really made Bald Stockings stand out was his running walk gait. He was the first horse to display a distinctly recognized running walk. Bald Stocking sired some running walk gaited horses but for 30 years the gait was virtually unheard of.

The Civil War changed that. During the war a great upheaval and shuffling of horses occurred. Northern animals were brought south, Southern aniamals were raided, traded, stolen and moved north. Many horses were killed and many more turned loose to fend for themselves and breed as they pleased. Out of the chaos emerged three more stallions known for siring running walk gaited horses.

The first of these horses was the stallion we now know as Gibson's Tom Hal F-20. This bay roan stallion has two different pedigrees assigned to him

depending on whether you believe the American Trotting Register or TWHBEA records.

Trotting Register assigned Gibson's Tom Hal number 16934 and listed him as being sired by the pacing stallion, Bay Tom, out of Julia Johnson. Bay Tom is listed as a son of Bald Stockings. Julia Johnson was by Adam's Stump out of Julia. Adam's Stump was by Stump the Dealer, a son of the imported Thoroughbred stallion, Timberlon. Julia was by Whip. It is not clear whether the ATR lists the breeder of Gibson's Tom Hal or whether that came from orginal research done by W.J. McGill but breeder was H.Clay Sanders Petersburg, TN. Gibson's Tom Hal acquired his permanent name from Thomas Gibson of Spring Hill, TN. who owned him for a time; but he died the property of F.G. Buford of Buford, TN.

The TWHBEA foundation list considers Gibson's Tom Hal F-20 a son of Kittrel's Tom Hal by Canadian Tom Hal. TWHBEA agrees that Julia Johnson was the dam of Gibson's Tom Hal but credits a Mr. Biggers of Petersburg, TN. as the breeder. There is some question as to whether Kitrell's Tom Hal actually existed, though a pedigree was eventually established for him. There is also no clear identification of which Mr. Biggers was meant, if indeed a Mr. Biggers had anything to do with the horse at all.

Whether Gibson's Tom Hal was a grandson of Bald Stockings or only a grand nephew, he established a family of running walk gaited horses along with his more famous pacing race horses. Gibson's Tom Hal was foaled in 1862 and died in 1890.

It was only a year later, 1893, that Confederate Captain Nathaniel Boone of Boonesville, TN. acquired an unidentified mare. Union troops passing through Boonesville dropped the mare at Capt. Boone's place, took another horse and went on. Twenty five days later the mare produced a grey colt that became known as Boone's Grey John. Grey John proved to be a Walking Horse and a sire of Walking Horses. He was famous for his 7-8 mph running walk and quickly established a family of running walk gaited horses. TWHBA records have assigned a pedigree to Grey John where he appears as ancestor of

some of the foundation horses. However, considering his orgin, such a pedigree must be considered false. We can be quite sure that the Union troops did not leave a pedigree and stallion report when dumping the mare on an enemy Captain!

A few years later yet another running walk gaited stallion was foaled. Earnheart's Brook's F-25. He too was a product of the Civil War. His breeder. Mike Earnheart, was a farrier who shod horses for both Union and Confederate troops. An unidentified Union officer left stallion known as Old Driver with Earnheart. Earnheart bred Old Driver to an unidentified mare to get the stallion, Young Driver. Young Driver was then bred to an unspecified daughter of Brown Pilot, a son of the vicious black, Canadian Pacing Pilot. The colt by Young Driver was named Earnheart's Brooks. He too was running walk gaited and sired running walk gaited horses.

Again we have some confusion as to pedigree. Earnheart's Brooks was designated F-25 by TWHBA and assigned a pedigree which lists him as being by Hardison's Brooks F-24 out of an unknown pacing mare. Brooks F-24 is then considered a son of Brown Pilot. In other words, the stallion Brooks is assigned the pedigree that other sources attribute to the mother of Earnheart's Brooks while Young Driver and Old Driver drop out of the TWHBA listing completely.


As with Grey John the pedigree of Earnheart's Brooks was of little consequence. He established his own name and his own family of running walk horses. A rivalry soon developed between people who liked Grey John horses and those who favored offspring of Earnheart's Brooks. A show was arranged between the two families. It was generally acknowledged that Earnheart's Brooks was the showier and better trained of the two stallions but the offspring of Grey John won the contest.

The Brooks, Grey John and Hal families had become well established as producers of running walk gaited horses when Allan finally appeared on the scene in 1902. Allan, foaled in 1886, is generally credited as the "founder" of the Tennessee Walking Horse. It should be

noted that James Brantley picked him because he believed Allan would cross well with Walking mares. These Walking mares were the running walk gaited daughters and grandaughters of Bald Stockings, Gibson's Tom Hal, Boone's Grey John and Earnheart's Brooks. Allan had been a failure as a sire of trotting race horses: chances are he would have done no better as a sire of Walking Horses if it had not been for the running walk heritage of the mares he was bred to. Ben Green, author of Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse, has gone so far as to suggest that the Walking Horse breed could have become basically the same as it was in 1960 even if Allan F-1 had never lived.

Second guessing history is always a useless, though occasionly entertaining, activity. Allan refined and improved the first few generations of Walking Horses and soon dominated the breed. He was an outcross for the heavily linebred Brooks, Hal, and Grey John families. That fact that Allan did bring new bloodlines to the Walking Horse may well be the key to his success.

We've been linebreeding to Allan for 9-10 generations now. Instead of getting excited about Midnight Sun, Merry Go Boy, Merry Boy and Last Chance, maybe we ought to be looking for a long lost family of Brooks, Hal or Grey John horses ¶

HOW I GOT STARTED WITH WALKERS

Having been involved with horses for most of my life, almost exclusively with Quarter Horses (I still have one), I was somewhat bemused when a friend talked me into looking at a Tennessee Walking Horse for the sake of my back. Back injuries have made it painful for me to ride for great lengths of time.

I saw an ad for Tennessee Walking Horses just south of us in Duncan, B.C. at the farm of Dan and Marly MacDonald. I telephoned and made arrangements to drive the two and a half hours to have a look.

What I saw when I got there was a herd of quiet beautiful horses. As we got closer to these horses, they came to meet us. They all came to be petted one at a time, no pushing and shoving, and not a bite mark on any of them.

I, had a choice of four or five. One particular mare had really caught my eye and apparently, I had caught hers too, as she was reluctant to leave when the others wandered off. I have always purchased my horses first by personality and feeling, and secondly, conformation. The gentleness

and serenity and a look of intelligence were certainly there. As for conformation, I didn't even know what a TWH was supposed to look like. But the basics -straight legs, good teeth and hooves, good coat and basic over all good proportion - were there.

So I bought myself a three year old TWH mare that was halter broke. She is Jessie Dee's daughter and we call her Cassi (Jessie Dee's Cassi).


Five months later I have absolutely no regrets. She is everything and more of what you hear a Walker is. She works well under saddle (Western) and is almost ready to pull a cart. She is very inquisitive, afraid of nothing and is the most easily trained horse I have ever owned. She's an absolute joy to be around.

I will always have a Quarter Horse for barrel racing and Western games, but I will also have a TWH for the pleasure of riding and the absolute pleasure of owning a horse.

I am glad I allowed myself to be talked into buying a horse I knew very little about.

REPLY TO DAVE HUGHES' IN MY OPINION

"Our other horse is an eighteen year old gelding which can walk but prefers to pace. He is an all-round good child's and beginner's horse and worth the \$2000.00 purchase price."

"We must agree that the purchase price of a horse should more reflect its nature and ability rather than its breeding or name. It is unfortunate that Mr. Hughes was not able to find a suitable Walker during his two year search. We hope that many more people will become acquainted with the Tennessee Walking Horse breed and enjoy them as much as we do. We hope that most will not be turned off by the high price of a name."

PINTO SERIES * OVERO PATTERNS

It was in 1985 when my bay TWH mare, bred to a chestnut son of Midnight Sun, produced a WHITE stud colt. He had only a few red roan hairs along the edges of his ears, his poll, his withers and on the top of his tail, but he did have dark eyes. What a shock! Where did this mostly white colt come from?? The mare was bay and showed a few roan hairs in her summer coat. She had four high white socks, a wide blaze that extended down over her lower lip. She had nine foundation horses on her papers, and was intensely bred ROAN ALLEN. On her sire's papers was Curlee's Spotted Allen.

After having been "into Pintos' from 1959 - 1972, I should have immediately recognized the colt (which I named The Roan Ranger) as an Overo. This incident started me researching the Overo color in the Tennessee Walking Horse.

The Overo pattern is recessive, in that the "color" can remain hidden for several generations and then appear again, seemingly out of nowhere (like my white colt).

The TWH registry now recognizes the Tobiano and the Overo spotting patterns, but actually there are three distinct Overo patterns:

The most common Overo pattern (at least among the Quarter Horses) is the classic Frame White Overo: a dark outline seeming to run all the way around the horse, with the horse having dark legs (unless the horse has socks), and white in its middle, like a Picture Frame. The face is often bald, apron or bonnet, and they have a tendency towards blue or white eyes. The pattern edges often appear ragged, and white rarely crosses the backline, unless the horse has an extreme amount of white. With the excessive white comes the possiblity of lethal white foals.

A Very Rare Overo pattern is Splash White: they look like a solid colored horse that has literally galloped through a puddle of white paint. Legs, belly, and chest are white, and the face is often white.

The Sabino (sa-bean-oh) coloration was quite popular in the early Tennessee Walkers. Curlee's Spotted Allen as seen in Dr. Womack's video, A Look Into The Past, is a Sabino. It is interesting to note that the Sabino roan colored horses are becoming popular again. At one time they were called Christmas Tree horses. Today, some refer to them as being lit-up roans. I believe that the Sabino coloration is Sabino Roan, unconnected to a True Roan, and that most all of the Reg. Tennessee Walkers carry the Sabino gene, since most have at least one Sabino Roan colored horse on their papers!!

With the Sabino pattern, the white seems to spread from the hind legs up to the belly, with races and jagged roan edges. There can often be detached markings, such as solid front legs with a white spot on the knee (Merry Boy). The face usually has a white blaze with a pigmented area on the muzzle, and white often extends down to the underlip and sometimes down the throat. Entirely white individuals are born which lead normal lives, and they in turn produce a VERY high percentage of Lit-up Roan Sabinos.

Incidentally, the Sabino genotype is also prevalent in the Clydesdale breed, and they do not register roan colored stallions, putting an effective stop to any potential Lit-up Roans or White Foals. ¶
