Our very best wishes for a Merry Christmas to all of you.




"I have enclosed a photo of a Labour Day ride we organized in the Larose Forest. The long forestry roads here are ideal for a Walking Horse. One can stretch them out and walk on at a good clip for miles and miles. Sage, my 19 year old TWH (the one with the white blaze) is in the middle. He was the only TWH at the ride and loved "showing off" his strut. "Mr. Showbiz" is always full of himself when he has an audience. He's an excellent ambassador for his breed. There is growing interest in Walkers in this area but none are available."

" Will keep in touch about my search. Keep up the good work. I always read the News from cover to cover."

MANITOBA NEWS

ORLLA PARADINE, BINSCARTH, writes, "Please find enclosed my cheque for renewal to the excellent magazine you girls publish. It is always read from cover to cover. I just wish it came every month."

"The horses are fine. Wisky is fat. sassy and starting to fuzz up a bit in preparation for winter. Baby Clyde is also fuzzing up. I don't think she'll make 15hh like her Mom. I'm not even sure if she'll make 14:2hh! Guess it isn't fair to compare her to our 15 hand OH yearling. Baby Clyde is much smarter. They both willingly accept the bridle and saddle, have been ground driven so that they turn, walk, jog, back and whoa. They both willingly. accept my youngest daughter sitting and lying on them. They are all ready to go for next year. "Breaking" won't be much of a problem."



"Earlier in the spring we had all the horses in for trimming, bridle paths, fetlocks, etc. Baby Clyde had been introduced to clippers and clipped regularly last year. However, on this particular day she refused to stand to be clipped. She reared, jumped, pawed and was, in general, a terror. No amount of quiet firm handling did the trick. A lightning storm was coming so I finally got fed up, and twitched her for the five minutes it took to finish the job."

"A few days later we went out to see if we could figure out the problem. We started very calmly and quietly, only to be met with the same atrocious behaviour. I decided, "No more nice lady", and went to the shed for a chain shank. Just as we were leaving the staging area, someone said, "So, Leola, just how long has it been since you were on a horse?


I thought for a minute, then replied, "Oh, around twenty years."

It seems miraculous but we have successfully bred our stallions by shipping cooled semen, and we have two of our own mares in foal to Sun's Remembrance (who stands in Florida) by Federal Expressed semen."

"You need a good equine veterinarian at your end, one who can tell you exactly when you should receive your semen shipment, one that knows precisely (within hours) when your mare will ovulate. This can be determined by manual

From JOYCE PATTERSON, CAWSTON, "I've still got these darn shingles. They started August 13. The pain and irritation have let up a bit and I'm resting better but I will sure be glad when they're healed."

"The weather was lovely Saturday so I took a short slow ride with Joan and her new Fox Trotter mare. She's a dark golden Palomino, 14:2 hh and very sensible."

"Got up this morning to snow on Fairview and Apex Mountains. Oh, what a terrible thought! But the weatherman says we're going to get a few nice days yet, before winter."

"I bought my old gray Walking Pony Of America back from Russ Davies last April. She was born April 24, 1976. Russ had her for ten years and trained her for harness, so I'll drive her this winter. She was the very first Walking Pony to be raised here at Cawston. I bought a registered Walker mare from Friesen Farms (F.F.) in Abbotsford and bred the big 15:2 hh mare to Mrs. Keyser's 49 inch registered Welsh stud. The little filly arrived early one morning, as black as

coal. In three or four days you could see tiny white hairs around her eyes and now, 17 years later, the old girl is snow white (except when she rolls in her favorite damp mud hole)."

"Anyway, I think that crossing the big registered Walking mare down to the Welsh stud produces a much better. useable small horse than the other way around. Usually the offspring are 14 to 14:2 hh. Pride is 14:2 hh and usually running a bit heavy. I also had two W.P.O.A.s from Lillooet in '78. They were from Welsh mares and a big Walking stallion. One, Prairie Rose, was really quite serviceable as she was 53 1/2 inches tall, quiet and not too hard to handle. The other, Prairie Dawn, was a real goer from "H". She'd have made a good chariot pony. She was too darn fast for a smaller kid to hold and too short for an adult to ride. I found the cross of TWH mare to a Welsh stallion better. Just a thought for anyone going into W.P.O.A."

"Chespa, Joey and Pride are doing just fine - they've been doing nothing since I got shingles. Little Joe has grown a bit bigger since I got him last year. I'm very pleased with him. Thanks, Shelly."

"Only seven weeks left before Christmas. Boy, this year just flew by! Merry Christmas, Everyone, and good luck in 1994, from Joyce and Ponies."

"Secret, my nine year old gelding, was the only TWH on the ride, and as far as I know, the only TWH this far north."

"I had my daughter ride Secret this year. She came in first and also won the trophy for the best condition horse."

"Secret and I have put on many miles this year, in trail rides, poker rides, competitive rides and just plain pleasure rides."

"I have been enjoying the Walking Horse News since 1990. Keep up the good work."

DEBRA JACK, ARMSTRONG, faxed the following news from CAITHNESS CROFT: "We very busy with promotional activities this year. Tsuniah's Sunday went to Equitana '93 to represent the TWHBEA in March. Equitana was almost beyond belief, with 18 pavilions packed full of every kind of horse-related display imaginable. There were 350,000 visitors and Sunday was an excellent breed ambassador; in fact he received has much fan mail since returning."

"In the beginning of June, Tsuniah's Sunday and Generator's Mystique were honoured to lead the opening ceremonies for the National at Spruce Meadows. Then in early September, Sunday with Mary Jo Neu up, Rhinestone Dolly with Matthew

Slingsby up and The Legend with Russ Keyser up represented the Tennessee Walking Horse at the I.P.E., Interior B.C.'s largest exposition. We were pleased to have Mandy Reynolds of Kelowna join us on her TWH mare, Miss Big Stuff."

"We were able to expand our European contacts as a result of Equitana '93. In June, Suyin Oldenburg from the Netherlands spent ten days with us, learning all she could from Russ Keyser, as she prepares a book on Walking Horse training for the European market."

"We have sold three horses to Europe far. thus Suyin purchased The Sensation. This two year old bay stallion will remain with Russ Keyser for further training and promotion before heading to Europe where he is expected to stand at stud. On November 15, Sage's Morning Mist and Tsuniah's Deep Deep Trouble, both in foal to The Legend, boarded a KLM flight of Vancouver bound for Netherlands. We wish Suyin well with her new horses."

"We have had other visitors from Europe and in late September, due to popular demand, Russ Keyser returned to Europe where he, Bob Cherry and farrier Jeff Frantz put on a ten day clinic in Germany."

"We had a good show season this year. Our new young mare, Generator's Mystique, had an undefeated show season here in Canada and the Northwest U.S. She earned two World Championship titles with Mary Jo Neu up in Shelbyville in August. In addition, she earned one Reserve World Championship with Russ Keyser, and was fifth in the Plantation World Grand Championship, the only newcomer to crack the top five."

"Of course, the highlight of the Celebration this year was Mary Jo's two World Championships. We are very proud of Mary Jo, who is the first Canadian to win at the Celebration. Mary Jo has been part of our program almost from the beginning, grooming, working and showing almost all our horses. She has worked closely with Keyser and has an excellent knowledge of the Tennessee Walking Horse, and has become an invaluable member of our team."

"This year we became a Corporate

Sponsor of the Celebration, something we thoroughly enjoyed."

"We had four foals this past spring, and at this time, all are looking great. Sage's Morning Mist gave us a sorrel filly with flaxen mane and tail (Legend's Morning Glory), Gen's Pride and Joy gave us a jet black filly (Legend's Mirror Image), Pride's Pin Up Lady gave us a very flashy liver chestnut filly with flaxen mane and tail (Legend's Cover Girl) and Gen's Zsa Zsa gave us our one stud colt, liver chestnut with flaxen mane and tail (The Future Vision).

"Our breeding program expanded this year as more mares were brought to The Legend. We also bred several mares using shipped semen and are pleased to say that 100% of the mares bred this way were confirmed in foal."

"We also obtained a new yearling colt, Coin's Double Play, in April. A gorgeous liver chestnut colt with white mane and tail, he has been left with Bobby Richards in Tennessee, where he was undefeated at halter and was crowned the International Yearling Grand Champion, an honour we were very excited about."

"1993 has seen some major changes for Caithness Croft, as we have relocated our show operations to Tennessee. While our breeding operation will remain in Armstrong, Russ has set up his training operation in Cornersville, Tenn. and we look forward to participating in the show rings of Tennessee and surrounding area. Russ has Generator's Mystique, Gen's Diamond Lil and Coin's Double Play, along with our three Legend yearlings, Legend's First Lady, Legendary Lady and The Distinguished Gentleman, for the winter."

"With the show horses in Tennessee. it will be a quiet winter here at Caithness Croft. Tsuniah's Sunday and The Legend are both "barefoot boys" for the winter, enjoying an opportunity to spend some time outside. This is a very new experience for The Legend and it seems one he is enjoying. In the spring Sunday will in all likelihood make the trip to Tennessee to be reunited with trainer. As for Legend, we are undecided. Mary Jo and I are really enjoying playing with him and we plan to introduce him to some trail rides in the spring. Of course he will ...cont'd >

"We wish you all a very Merry Christmas and all the best in the New Year."



PEACE AREA NEWS



From the desk (ie: kitchen table) of ELISABETH AUGART of SCATTERED SPREAD RANCHING in SPRINGBANK, "Report of the





DUSTY FILES - 15 Years Ago in WHN

Volume 2, #5 from October of 1978 had six pages and began with a report on the DeWinton Clinic. About 60 people from B.C., Alberta, Saskatchewan and Montana attended to hear the TWHBEA's Sis Wolaver (now Sis Osborne), John Price and Lee Liles tell us all about Walkers. Mr. and Mrs. Larry Malick and Helen Williamson and family were instrumental in organizing it.

There were eight new subscribers welcomed. I notice that of those, only Mr. & Mrs. K.K.Coburn are still subscribing all these years later.

A note about shows says that the turn-out at Lloydminster was disappointing with only the Davies of Duffield and Helen and Carol Williamson of Calgary bringing some Walkers to show.

Advertisers included Darlene Moore of Boissevain, Bill Howes of Ardrossan, George Keillor of Vanderhoof and Jack Chapman of Stettler, all with partbreds for sale. Marjorie Fabro of Kimberley, Helmut Penner of Kamloops and Arne Hauge of Calgary all had purebred Walkers for sale.

10 Years Ago in WHN

Volume VII, #6 had an interesting item - a discussion on TWH prices. I think I'll reprint the whole thing here and see what you all think ten years later:

WHAT DO YOU THINK?

What do you think of current prices for Tennessee Walking Horses? Are they too high? Too low? About right? Or don't you know what constitutes an average price these days?

I've heard from both buyers and sellers about pricing Walkers. Sellers tend to be reluctant to advertise prices. Buyers are disappointed when there is no price listed on a horse that interests them. Here are some comments.

Ann Tonn, B.C. writes, "Why do so few people put a price in their ads? Are the others so ashamed of the price that they dare not mention it? Surely if a note were put at the top of each ad stating that all prices are subject to change without notice, and if ads mentioned "Firm" or "Negotiable", then we poor, budget minded buyers could have a better idea of what is available in the price range we can afford. Without the price in the ad we must spend money and time inquiring, only to find that the price is, regretfully, beyond our means. How about it, Folks?"

In the same vein, Lawrence Simpson, Rosetown, Sask. says, "One thing I would like to see everyone do is put down what they want for the horses when they advertise them for sale in your paper. It saves a lot of phoning and writing. I sometimes think they are ashamed of what they are asking."

I think the problem most of us have with pricing our Walkers is a lack of information on what they are selling for in general. Consequently, we are unsure of what to ask. About the only guidelines we have are what we ourselves paid for the horse or what it cost us to raise the animal. Training adds another variable, as do age and sex. Inflation throws another curve into it since a dollar now is worth much less than it was ten years ago. If you bought a mare for \$900 in 1971, that means that a comparable mare would be somewhere in the neighbourhood of \$2250 in 1983 dollars!

So perhaps a market survey would help us all out - buyers and sellers. If you have bought or sold a Walker in the past couple of years and would like to help out with this, please fill out the form below and send it in to me. All information will be kept absolutely confidential. I'll tabulate the information I receive and report back to you in a future

issue on average prices and highs and lows out of number received. Send the form anonymously if you like.

The TWHBEA now recognizes 3 Canadian provinces, each with a Director to represent it.

SASKATCHEWAN & MANITOBA are part of Region #3, along with four mid-western States.

QUEBEC & NEW BRUNSWICK are part of Region #4 along with 8 eastern States, Germany and the Netherlands.

I suggested to Mr. Bob Cherry, Executive Director of TWHBEA, that Canada should be considered one region with one director. Then each province would get its own director when it reached sufficient membership, just as has already happened with Alberta, B.C. and Ontario.

He replied, "Please be assured that in August of 1993 when we align and realign our states and regions for our Directors election, we will develop a region made up of only Canadian provinces, and they may break out of that region just as our states break out. It's an excellent idea and thank you for bringing it to my attention."

I will let you know when I hear anything further on this.

I am again unable to attend the Annual General meeting of TWHBEA on Dec. 4, but I wrote President Bill Harlin Jr., Steve Wirts, Pleasure Horse Div., Jack Mitchell, Enforcement Div. and Bob Cherry, Executive Director, with these concerns.

1)I support bloodtyping of foals only when they go into the breeding herd or begin showing. I don't think it's necessary to bloodtype them before then.

Victoria Chism, a Tennessee Director, is pushing for this amendment to the present rules.

2) To make the registry as honest as we possibly can at this time, I believe that parentage verification should be done whenever the info is available on all mares and stallions that are producing or siring foals. Those that don't match the parents listed on their papers should have their papers re-issued "Parentage unknown" on them. We shouldn't just turn a blind eye to false pedigrees we have the information knowledge to correct them.

3)Since there is apparently a problem in the flat shod ranks of show horses with people using shoes larger and heavier than the rules state, enforcement must be stepped up and no time out should be allowed if a horse throws a shoe in competition. The latter was Mrs. Osborne's suggestion in her article, "If the Shoe Fits, Wear It", in the Sept/Oct'93 Voice.

I'd like to hear from you on any of these matters.



[Editor's Note: I asked Rose if she would write this story for WHN. Russ and Rose were among the very first Walking Horse owners I got to know back in the early seventies. We spent some enjoyable times together. We helped put on a TWH demonstration or two at Lloydminster and we were three of the five founding members of the Yellowhead Club, formed in 1979. There are many untold adventures here but, as Rose says, "To tell the story properly would fill a book."]

Russell Davies of Duffield, Alberta passed away on August 14, 1993 from cancer. He was 66 years old.

Russ not only loved horses, but was a skilled rider and an avid horseman. He especially enjoyed working with colts, gentling and training them under saddle and in harness.



Russ on Sam, Laura on Sing Song. Waterglass class, Lloydminster show.


It was not until about 17 years ago during a visit to Calvin and Maxine Miller's Double Diamond Ranch at Rhame, North Dakota, that he really got "hooked" on the Tennessee Walking Horse. We bought three head from Millers that fall, two yearlings, Ebony's Miss Image and Ebony's Dakota Spell, and a five year old sorrel mare, Flyer's Sing Song. Russ enjoyed working around them. Bringing out their true gait was a challenge and they were great to ride.

Russ was working full time for Calgary Power at the Sundance plant as well as farming a rented quarter bordering Duffield. This didn't leave much time to enjoy his horses but for the next few years he always had a few. Some

we bought, some we raised. If we bought a new horse, another had to be sold, so the members of the herd were always changing. The only two that stayed around for years were Sing Song and later Pride, a Walking Pony we bought from Joyce Patterson at Cawston.

Two years after we got our first Walkers, we went down to Millers again and brought back Sun's Country Sam and a brood mare, Flyer's Bumble Bee, full sister to Sing Song. Russ broke Sam to ride. Laura, our third daughter, had taken Sing Song on as a 4-H Light Horse project. She showed her a number of times and came home with quite a few ribbons. Laura and Russ used to put on reining demonstrations with the two sorrels.

After the girls left home, Russ became more interested in trail riding. Sing Song was well broke and gentle, and




Russ and "Mac"

Rose began riding the trails with Russ. Usually Russ was mounted on a green colt.

Mac, a grandson of Midnight Sun, the

big black gelding he bought at Stoughton, Sask. was perhaps the most memorable horse Russ owned. There was only one thing wrong with Mac - he was just too fast! Russ hated riding alone, so we sold Mac and bought Pride, the Walking Pony.

Sing Song and Pride were the perfect pair for trail riding. They were both sure footed, quiet and dependable, and would boogie right along. It was a very sad day for us when Sing Song had to be put down at age 17. We were riding in the Cyprus Hills of Southern Saskatchewan when she developed a twisted bowel.

After this, Rose graduated to riding Pride and once again Russ was mounted on a green colt.

Russ retired just before Christmas, 1987. He started restoring horse drawn vehicles and breaking his horses to drive double in harness. He also started hooking all-wool saddle blankets.

Pride became his "breaking horse". She was not too happy with her new chore but she tolerated being hitched up with a green colt in harness. The team was put to good use as there is always something that needs to be hauled around a farm. Russ also enjoyed taking grandchildren and friends for rides behind his high spirited Walking Horses. The first team he broke out were Peace River Nugget and Peace River Breeze, two fillies we'd bought from Laverne Lundgard. Russ drove the pair in a number of parades and playdays.

In the summer of 1991 Rose and Russ rode Pride and Breeze as outriders on the

Lindbergh Wagon Train. We really enjoyed ourselves. All we needed was a sturdy team of Walkers and a light Covered Wagon - what a way to spend the summer!

With two more teams coming up - a team of roans we'd raised and a team of sorrels we'd purchased - Russ decided to sell Nugget and Breeze. As he said, "If I keep them I'll never get around to training these youngsters!" So Laverne bought back Nugget and Breeze.

The summer of 1992 we found the "makings" of our wagon in Cadomin - an old democrat chassis. Russ got right to work on making the undercarriage, and the wheels we bought from the Amish Ontario. The "makings" of our wagon team found in Absarokee. Montana. Aadland had two well matched sisters. They were white, big and strong, and well gaited. One was a three year old, and the other was a long yearling. The two young teams he'd been working with went to Daryl Roth of Darwell so Russ would have more time to devote to his new horses.

Then, just before Christmas last year, Russ learned that he had terminal cancer and that his days were numbered. But life still goes on. He spent the winter driving Pride and Snow White when the weather was nice, and working on the democrat in the garage or hooking his

rugs when it was colder.

This spring he sold the team of whites to Daryl Roth and Pride back to Joyce Patterson. We had a farm sale on May 1st and soon after we delivered Pride to her former home in Cawston.

On June 3rd we left for Alaska. We had planned this trip for years. Our friends, Larry and Nettie Selland, had their motor home and Russ and I had our truck and camper. Russ' health was failing but we were not too worried. Both Nettie and Larry were good drivers and could take over our outfit if the need arose. We put in fairly short days but Russ drove every mile to Alaska and back. We enjoyed the trip. While we were in Anchorage Russ tried to trace Mark Green. the man to whom we'd sold "Snowy" (Traveler Snowey W. 783686) years ago. He learned that Mark had left Alaska a few years back and had later passed away. The people remembered Mark's big white horse but didn't know what had become of him.

After we returned home from the trip the first week in July, Russ' health was failing fast. We took him into the Misericordia Hospital in Edmonton on July 30 and he passed away on August 14.

The last 17 years of raising, training and promoting Tennessee Walking Horses were happy ones for Russ as he loved working with the gaited horses. He wasn't a man for the show ring but he enjoyed showing his horses on a more personal level - on the trails he loved to ride or with the teams he loved to drive. The horses he gathered, raised and owned are scattered from Manitoba to Alaska and his hand-made saddle blankets were sold to people throughout Saskatchewan, Alberta, B.C., Montana, Nevada and Washington.

Russ, his horses and his blankets, will long be remembered.







On November 6 I went down to a Paso Fino Open House at Pinal Mountain Paso Finos in Globe. I spent about four hours watching and being an unofficial information source on Finos.

One couple I talked to have dogs for dog trials and have seen a lot of Walkers and Fox Trotters. They are both of average height and said, several times, that they really liked the Fino's size (between 14 and 15 hands). Several people commented favorably on the size of the Fino and liked them better than Walkers for that reason. The one lady who does dog trials was asking why the riders had their hands so high on the Finos. I was able to tell her about posture and gait. She knew enough about collection and getting strung out to understand it right away and a few minutes later tried riding one of the Finos.

Right after talking to them another lady and I were watching a Fino gelding that wanted to trocha when going from a walk to a canter. I knew the horse could corto because I'd seen him doing it earlier when his owner was riding him. I told the lady why he wasn't gaiting and what the rider could do about it and assured her that he could gait. I didn't realize that his owner was sitting on the fence in front of us until she turned around and thanked me for my comments about how nicely she'd had the horse going earlier.

It wasn't more than a couple of minutes later that Carol, the hostess and



owner of Pinal Mtn. Paso Finos, brought that gelding over and offered to let me ride him. I don't think she knew that I'd been telling people how to ride them! The people I'd been talking to were all hanging around watching while I tried to ride the corto as well as I talked on a horse I'd never been on before. He still wanted to trocha but I did get what seemed like a decent corto most of the time.

The open house was a pleasant change of gait. No one was trying to claim that the Fino was better than other gaited breeds. The people who knew I had a Walker didn't bad mouth the Walker or try to force me to get a Fino. Every Fino on the property had genuinely inherited the natural corto gait, though there were a variety of styles. Some of the horses were inclined to trocha and others tended to be a little pacy but everybody was perfectly honest about it when it happened. One of the Finos, a gorgeous buckskin, moved like an extremely tight Walker, complete with very slight head nod.

The spectators who had never seen Finos before could see when the horses were on gait and when they were off a little bit. During the course of the afternoon I talked to several people who got more and more interested as they talked and asked questions. After a while they felt like they really could ride one and get it to perform correctly. And they did.

Spectators weren't overwhelmed by the difficulty of riding the corto, because it isn't hard. They weren't fed a bunch of conflicting standards and then made to feel stupid for getting confused.

The demonstration performances were all good. They didn't have to explain away any funny business because there wasn't any to explain. All the horses had been worked enough to perform correctly at whatever level was appropriate for their age and development. Every horse old enough to wear a saddle was ridden at one time or another during the afternoon.

Most of them were what Carol termed

"emerald green broke". For \$4000 to \$7000 you can buy a green broke Paso Fino from Pinal Mtn. Paso Finos. What you get is a purebred registered mare or gelding with excellent conformation, a gentle disposition, and the correct natural gait. These horses have been handled from birth, and are esy to shoe, doctor, clip, groom, lead, load or just plain mess around with.

You can ride them with any saddle you like or no saddle at all. They have been trained with a simple leather or rope bosal and are extremely resonsive to leg aids and weight shifts. They will walk, corto, canter, and stop faster than you can from any gait. They stand perfectly still for as long as you want. They will back in a straight line, sidepass both directions, turn on the forehand or the hindquarters, open gates, go over obstacles, go out on the trail or in to

town. Some of them have been started on cattle and used for team sorting. You can mount or dismount from either side, pull on their ears, put your legs up on their shoulders, lean back on their hips, pull their tails, poke their flanks, etc. If you get off balance while mounting, they'll step underneath you to help you on.

Carol considers all that "green broke"! How many \$4000 Walkers are green broke that way at any age? She has most of her horses doing it in the first 45 days under saddle. The horses aren't started under saddle until after their third birthday. The first three years they get lots of ground work, ponying and handling.

But no, I'm not going to buy one. The corto gait is too busy for my tastes. \P






