
SASKATCHEWAN NEWS



and at Spokane I.F.F.H. they won the high Point 3 Gait Light Shod. At Vancouver, Washington, they were Reserve High Point 2 Gait Light Shod. At Vancouver ours were the only two Canadian horses there and we won the High Point and Reserve High Point Light Shod 2 Gait - quite an accomplishment I think!!!"

"Last but not least on our busy schedule was RENO! Besides a lot of fun and luck in the casinos, Ultra's Major Threat and Pride's Blue Frost finished the year off right. In classes of 15 and 16 entries, Major walked away with 2 firsts, 2 seconds, 2 thirds, and 3 fourths. This included two fourths in the English and Western Championship Stake classes. Pride's Blue Frost and Shelley had their share of the awards also with 1 first in the Amateur Owned and Trained English/Western 2 gait Light Shod, second, 2 thirds and a fourth and a fifth. The girls and their horses did Canada proud."

"One of the youngest generation of Fabros is starting her show career off to a flying start too. Coming in fifth at the Wild Rose Specialty on Free 'N EZ Pride all it took for Katie Hagen to get the show bug and make her determined to very her best at the Alberta Celebration. After riding and training every day between the two shows, six year old Katie and Free 'N EZ Pride (or Louie) went on to win first in the Plantation Western Youth 17 and Under, as well as third in the First and Second Year Showing class with 11 adults entered! Katie is definitely looking forward to the 1994 show season as is her Mom and Auntie Shelley and, oh yes, her Grandma!"

"To end this year on a top note, Ultra's Major Threat won the Versatility Stallion Award from the West Coast Tennessee Walker Club - for the second year running - and Pride's Blue Frost won the Versatility Mare Award - for the second year running!"

"Come July, the first baby by Ultra's Major Threat (from Copy's Real Pride) will be on the ground. We are really excited!"

"So all in all we have had a very busy year. We wish everyone the very best in 1994."

RON SMITH, formerly of Magrath. Alberta, recently surfaced in OLIVER, and says, "It is with great pleasure that I renew my subscription to the Walking Horse News. You may wonder at the new address. I moved to B.C. at the end of March '93 to start a new job with the town of Oliver. Unfortunately I have not been able to attend any of the shows in Alberta this past year. I love to attend shows to see the horses that people are confident enough in to bring before public scrutiny. I really think the best horses are at the shows. To be more specific, the 3 gait pleasure classes to me are the real testers of good walking horses. A good trainer can teach a horse to go through gates, pull a buggy or go over jumps, and there are plenty of pretty horses with straight limbs to win halter and conformation classes, but can they really walk out and do a nice easy canter on either lead?"

"My horsing has suffered somewhat with the move but Crescent Merry Knight and I placed 13th in the big 25 mile endurance race in Kelowna in June and the Mayor of Oliver rode him in the local parade. He impressed everyone with a pretty spiffy sidepass at the run-walk. He also canters a nice diagonal facing square (the horse, that is!). There's a name for that in dressage."

"The weather here is pretty hard to take, in that we still haven't any snow (Nov.28) and I believe there were three days of rain this summer. There are plenty of hills right here for riding just out my back yard. I traded my eighty acres in Magrath for three acres here with a few fruit trees. Feeding hay and mucking out corrals is not fun though."

"Next year I will be training another three year old for my brother so will have to sell either Crescent or Pal. (See my classified ad.)"

"I am just over the mountain from Joyce Patterson and Erika Peters so there are getting to be a few of us now in the Okanagan, Similkameen. We'll have to get a ride going next spring!"

greeting, "I would like to wish you all a safe and happy '94. Keep up the good work. Please send a subscription with our good wishes to our friends, the Watkins of Republic, Washington, who are raising Missouri Fox Trotters and Tennessee Walkers."

From ANDY & JUNE ANDERSON, QUESNEL, "Find enclosed our renewal for WHN. We appreciate all the hard work that goes into putting together a very interesting magazine. We especially enjoy all the articles about good using Walking Horses."

"We do not show very much; horses are used for every type of work that we need to do. We drive them, use them as cow horses, and may I say, do a very good job of it too. We use our horses to pack out moose and other game from the back country. Then they are hooked to a rubber tired wagon to pull our camping equipment and game back to we left the trucks, usually anywhere from 14 to 20 miles. We ride them over very rough country and find that they can go all day. Our Walkers are working horses and we like the job they do. We find them very willing and not hard to adjust to any new chore that we have for them to do."

"I wish to stress that Walkers are not just show horses. Ours would show well in the show ring - they have good conformation. But our desire is to show them as working horses. We like what we can do with them and they do it willingly. They can take any kind of weather and stay in good shape and sound. I'd like to see more articles on using Walkers."

HANS BURCH, TEEPEE HEART RANCH, BIG CREEK, writes, "Freckles (Keen's Blue Shadow) is doing okay. We used her in the trail string for one season and now she is retired to the brood mare band. This spring she had an excellent blue roan filly Tsuniah's by Tripple Reward. However, the filly was diagnosed to have Idiopathic Laryngeal Hemiplegia so I had to put her down. What a shame! Freckles' black filly, Rockette's Blue Shadow, is turning two this spring and I hope to have enough time to start her. She is well gaited with good bone and withers."

"Star (Uphill North Star) developed into a good looking stallion, standing 15 hands and at present a bit overweight! His first offspring were born last spring, to two of my mares and two outside grade mares. The results were two buckskin colts, one sorrel filly with light flaxen mane & tail and a dark chestnut colt with flaxen mane/tail. Star did all the breeding this year except for two "try out" mares for my two year old stallion, Duchess' Royal Topper (Sunday's Topper x My Duchess Delight). (Picture in May/June '93, page 30) I did not preg test the mares but from what I see so far there will be eight foals in spring."

"The loss of My Duchess Delight was a tragedy. But thanks to my faithful friends, Walt & Elsie Mychaluck and Art Warner, and goat's milk, little "H.B." survived and looks like a super stallion prospect."

"I was interested in the article on equine dentistry in the last WHN. I have done most of the tooth floating on my horses in the past again because of the terrible cost of getting a vet out here, leave alone there being 40 to 50 horses to do. I've ended up buying \$400 worth of dentistry tools. It would be interesting to know more and I'd be thrilled to take a course either in Nebraska or here in Canada."

"Would you please send complimentary issues to some new TWH owners? Mike Bunyan of Big Creek is the new owner of Bee Honor Sunny Dream and Linda and Carson Smith of Hanceville are the new owners of a two year old gelding by Go Shadow Go Son out of a non registered mare by Colonel Amble Man #621652, whose sire was Black Watch #600116. (I've often wondered if this Black Watch stallion was the foundation sire for Black Watch Farms.) The best of luck to newcomers to the wonderful world of the Tennessee Walking Horse."

The CLRC registration number or a photocopy of both sides of the TWHBEA registration certificate of the sire and dam.

The existing age limit of two years will be observed on completely unregistered horses.

Horses over two years old will be by approval of the Board of Directors.

Horses of any age foaled in Canada or imported more than six months ago will be registered if the application includes a photocopy of both sides of their TWHBEA registration certificate.

Horses of any age imported less than six months ago will be registered if the application includes a photocopy of both sides of their TWHBEA registration certificate and a copy of the Canada Customs document showing that GST has been paid at the border.

There will be no change to the requirement for signatures, descriptions, etc.



TWHBEA MEMOS

by Marjorie C. Lacy, Alberta Director

I received this reply from Bob Cherry regarding Canada being considered one region with provinces splitting off as they acquire 25 or more members. You will recall from the TWHBEA Memos in the Nov/Dec issue that this suggestion had been accepted and was to be implemented last August, according to Mr. Cherry's letter of Dec.15/92. On Dec.14/93, however, he wrote,

"With regard to your suggestion that we develop regions (for election purposes) made up only of provinces, we have decided against that revision at this time. The reason being that Canada is so large - East to West as well as North to South, that it makes more sense to regionalize the western provinces of Canada with the north western states of the U.S. eastern provinces with the north eastern states."

What do those of you in Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Quebec, the Maritimes and the Territories think? Would you rather be represented by one Canadian director, or are you happy being included with the nearest U.S. states, and other countries?

Also from Mr. Cherry's Dec.14/93 "For your information, blood letter: typing resolutions that were adopted at the May Board meeting were brought to the for additional consideration. Recommendations were made and approved for some administrative and alterations. However, the resolution that requires parentage verification as a prerequisite to registration (for foals born after September 30, 1993), was not altered in any way."

Finally, in reply to my query as to what happened to the TWHBEA policy, announced a few years back, that "As soon as the computer program is written, we will immediately begin adding the color of the sire and dam to the registration

certificates", Mr. Cherry says,

"... This is the first time I have ever seen this particular memo, and I am told that it has not been sent out of this office in several years. I would suggest if you want to pursue this matter, please make your proposal directly to our new Breeders Committee Vice President, Phil Snodgrass."

Well, TWHBEA members? Is it worth anything to you to have the colour of sire and dam on a horse's registration papers? Let me know if it is, and if so, I'll pursue the issue.

Getting on to some new business, I've had an inquiry about the necessity of having a veterinarian draw the blood for parentage verification blood tests on foals. For some who live in remote areas it is almost impossible to get a vet out to do this. An item in the minutes of the Dec 4/93 TWHBEA Board of Directors meeting seems to address this problem. It states on page 8 of the minutes,

"Upon motion by Mr. Keenan, seconded by Mr Woodlee, ACTION WAS TAKEN, to allow someone other than a vet to draw the blood on foals born after 9/30/93, when the sire and dam's blood type is already on file with the lab."

PROOF OF PARENTAGE


An article in the Nov.'93 Equus #193, sent to me by Jayne Walker of Dawson Creek, outlines the new DNA testing for horses that is being developed by Equine Genetics Research Partners (Molecular Tool Inc. and The Jockey Club).

This involves taking a mucous swab and mailing it to the lab for analysis. DNA testing is said to be more accurate, simpler and less expensive than blood typing. Blood breaks down quickly and the Jockey Club spokesman says they have a six percent retest variable on blood samples. DNA, however, is very stable, and they hope to make the new test simple and straightforward enough so owners can collect and send the sample themselves, saving the veterinary fees.

Sounds great. Good luck and hurry on with it! \P



WALKERS ACROSS THE ATLANTIC

It was one of those rare weekends in the life of a busy secondary teacher. The paperwork load was light and I actually had time to read my newest Gaitway issue. Browsing through the classifieds I skimmed over to the section marked "Personally Yours". An ad there attracted my attention: "Friends of Plantation Walking Horses in Germany would like to make contact with Plantation horse people in the U.S."


"How interesting", I thought. "We probably aren't the kind of folks they wish to contact. We are not major breeders, we don't show much, and only trail ride at home. But what if no one else in this whole country writes them! That would be terrible!" I got out my old typewriter and inserted a sheet of paper, wishing I remembered more of my elementary school German. "Dear Herr Holstermann...," I began.

"The answer came several months later, due to some confusion in overseas magazine delivery. Josef Holstermann, a vocational-level teacher living in Bad Zwischenahn, and his wife, Hilke, had first bought a gray Hanoverian gelding. One of the native German warmblood breeds, individual had proven experience in dressage and jumping. The big beauty had been too highstrung for pleasure trail riding, however, and they began looking for a calmer breed. In this search they learned of the smoothgaited Tennessee Walkers. These were very rare in North Germany though, and the owners they met were very unsure Hermann with sabino ANGEL LUCY SUE of what the walk really was and how to

train for it. After reading all he could find, Josef flew to the Maryland farm of Andrew Shaw in 1989. There he learned a lot about the breed by asking and riding. He also bought a chestnut roan mare, very flashy but unsettled in her gaits. With patience and lots of flat-walking, Josef developed R-2 D-2 into a calm, true-gaited walking mare, safe enough even for his small children.

As spokesman for the German Friends of the Tennessee Walker, a division of the German Singlefooting Horse Association, Josef often

received calls from people wanting his recommendation for a good prospect. Because none were available, he and a friend, Hermann Mueller, had planned a visit to Middle Tennessee to "look behind the curtain of the Walking Horse industry" and hopefully purchase two or three mares for export. They wanted natural walking, liteshod mares between three and six years old, ideally to foal in the summer of 1992. Geldings would not be considered since the German department of agriculture classed nonbreeding



stock as "sport horses", requiring an import fee of 25 percent of the purchase price. Because another acquaintance had mares lined up for their inspection and purchase, Josef simply wanted to meet us, and in our company visit some breeding farms in the area. Through letters and phone calls, we agreed to meet at the Pleasure Walking Horse Association of Tennessee Spring Sale in Murfreesboro.

The fourth of April was a bright cool Saturday. We arrived first at the MTSU Livestock arena, purchased a catalog, and waited. In this


interim we met Suzanna Most who invited us to visit the Most Stock Farm with our new friends. After their arrival, Josef and Hermann seemed to enjoy the parade of horses at the sale but Josef expressed dis-appointment that so few of the entries were presented at the running walk. In

the heartland of Walking Horse country he had expected Walking horses to walk! We explained that many pleasure riders prefer speed at four beats to the slower running walk. and never train their flatshod walkers to walk. Then we invited them to drive to our farm, where we had a horse that could walk. We caught Spur, our young gelding, only ridden three or four times since the fall. Just started in the canter, the colt showed them all three gaits, then co-operated for a photo session while Josef rode and Hermann handled the camcorder.

As darkness fell, we formulated an agenda of activities First ride in Tenne for the next few days. We learned that the mares presented by their other connection paced! So instead of just barnstorming, we were hoping to find, in only five days time, good walking mares in foal. Ideally, three, since the air cargo

This Sunday we started polocrosse. I'm riding Dust's Shadow, Chelsah is on Ventur and Dixie Verstraete is on a halfbred Walking Horse. The general idea of polocrosse is as follows, though the terminology may not be correct.

The playing field has three parts. The field has two ends and a middle. At both ends are goal poles that the ball must go through for the team to score.

There are two teams of three players. I will call the teams "Team Red" and "Team Blue". Each team has a player called "Number 1", "Number 2" and "Number 3". All Blue and Red team members can play the middle field but no members can enter the field ends except Number 1 and Number 3.

So, the teams line up. The coach flings the ball down the center of the teams and everyone tries to catch it with their polocrosse stick. Only number 1 can score and then only from within their end. If Number 1 gets the ball while in the middle, he must bounce the ball within the end before scoring.

Number 2's job is to cover the middle area. For example, Red Number 2 picks up the ball or takes it away from a blue team member by striking the blue's polocrosse stick. Red Number 2 then passes the ball to another red team member or passes it directly to Red Number 1 so she can score.

Number 3's job is to defend the goal end and prevent the opposite team's Number 1 from scoring. For example, Red Number 3 must try to get the ball away from Blue Number 1 and pass it up the field so the Red team can score.

Now try to appreciate what it's really like for the first time players. Our job is to score by capturing the ball with a polocrosse stick. The stick has a netted end on it. I expected the stick to look something like a long armed tennis racquet with an end complete with butterfly catching net. That would be handy when trying to catch a ball that looks the size of a cannon ball when it is thrown right at you. Instead, you feel like you are holding up a riding crop with a small vegetable strainer tied to it. Keep in mind that the size of the ball is an illusion. It is really the size of a marble when you are trying to pick it up off the ground!

I took my polocrosse stick. I could see that I was going to need much practice. As far as my horse went, I was certain he would get in the

spirit of things quickly. Dust, however, clearly saw that the arena was not the place for him to be and felt that we should get out - now! In fact, he was willing to leave on his own if he had to.

Finally I got close to Chelsah who was looking VERY worried. She said the balls scared Ventur. Well, picture a racquetball court and ten players. The balls are bouncing off the walls and going everywhere. Naturally that arena scene was concerning Ventur and his idea of safety.

Now - Places, Everyone! I can safely speak for all ten riders there. Without a doubt this was the most fun I have ever had on horseback. Everyone has a position to play and rules to follow. But when that little ball was loose in the middle and four or five riders were trying desperately to pick it up, it reminded me of a big pot of soup and everyone with a spoon was after the pea.

This was a good group of people. They passed the ball like in an egg and spoon race to Chelsah so she could participate and when someone caught a long shot, both teams cheered. The two men showing us how to play were patient, enthusiastic and encouraging. The one coach even went so far as to point out the grass stains on his helmet so we would appreciate the rule that all riders wear protective headgear.

This winter we will practice polocrosse in an arena and when spring comes we will move outdoors. Then the field will be large enough to canter in and by that time we hope we can pick up the ball from the ground or catch it while on the move. We will have a new motto. It will go something like this:

May polocrosse be the game for you.


May your horse be easy to train.





ICELANDIC HORSES

DO YOU KNOW YOUR GAITED HORSES?

by Christine Schwartz

Two-beat, three-beat, four-beat, fifth gait... While it can be hard enough to keep the three gaits of most horses straight, the gaited horses throw in a few extra challenges. Find out how much you really know about gaited horses.

- 1. What is a gaited horse? A horse with high stepping action and a flashy gait: Go to 7. A horse with a smooth four-beat gait: Go to 4.
- 2. For a bad back or desire to just have fun and not work so hard riding, a gaited horse is the answer. Why bounce when you can have a smooth ride? Finish up with question 37.
- 3. No, speed has little to do with smoothness. Some gaited horses will do their gait at the speed of a fast trot or medium canter all without a bounce. Back to 13.
- 4. Smooth is the right answer. Ease over to 16.
- 5. Gaited horses have little to do with status. Many of them are not overly fancy to look at, but furry family friends living in the pasture behind the house. Back to 33, we're almost done.
- 6. It takes little effort to sit well on a gaited horse, which is why many beginner riders or people with bad backs look very comfortable on a gaited horse. Back to 13.
- 7. Which of the gaited breeds has the fewest color restrictions? Peruvians: Go to 17. Icelandics: Go to 26. Tennessee Walkers: Go to 35.
- 8. Sorry, although there are high stepping gaited horses it is the order in which they move the legs that makes a gaited horse, not the height and flashiness. Try again at number 1.
- 9. You hit the right answer. When "in gait" these horses move in the same footfall as the walk, hind right, front

right, hind left, front left, just faster. One foot always maintains contact with the ground, eliminating the phase where the horse is in the air, changing from one diagonal to the other as they do in the trot. On to 21.


- 10. While some Fox Trotters or Paso Finos may occasionally throw in a mixture of 5 different gaits (walk,trot,canter,middle gait and pace) they are not supposed to do it. Scramble back to 16.
- 11. Are gaited horses: Man made, Go to 25. Naturally gaited, Go to 20.
- 12. Plain and simple, no. You might once in awhile get a gaited offspring, but it is by no means guaranteed and some gaited breeds are against crossing. Back to 21. 13. Why are gaited horses smoother than those that trot? They move slower than trotting horses. Go to 3. Their riders have learned to sit the gaits better. Go to 6. They always maintain contact with the ground. Go to 9.
- 14. Sorry, no 5 gaits in these breeds. Many Peruvians are forbidden to canter, making them two-gaited. Walkers have a walk, running walk and canter. Try 16 again.
- 15. Peruvian Paso, Paso Fino, Icelandic Horse, Missouri Fox Trotter, American Saddlebred, Tennessee Walker.
- 16. Which breeds are claimed to be 5 gaited? Tennessee Walker and Peruvian Pasos. Go to 14. American Saddlebred and Icelandic Horses. Go to 18.

Missouri Fox Trotters and Paso Finos. Go to 10.

- 17. No, Peruvians have some of the strictest color rules. White on the face and high socks are not liked; it is said to distract from the horse. Give 7 another look.
- 18. This is the right answer. Both breeds walk, trot and canter. The Saddlebred's other two gaits are the running walk and the rack, both four beat gaits. The Icelandic has a four beat gait called the

tolt and many of them also show the flying pace. Rack or tolt quickly on to 11.

19. Sorry, wrong guess, Camels pace, cows and cats prefer to trot. Pace back to 23 for another try.

20. Gaited horses do their gaits naturally. Some may need to be taught to do so, but it is virtually impossible to teach a strictly trotting breed an easy four beat gait. 7 is next.

21. When crossing a gaited with a non -gaited breed, do you get a gaited foal? Yes. Go to 36. No. Go to 12. Maybe. Go to 24.

22. Yes, worldwide about 15 to 20 percent of all horses are gaited. It is mostly in North America where we have a number of different gaited breeds, but still many more non-gaited horses. On to 33.

23. Which other animals perform a four beat gait? Camels, cats and cows. Go to 19. Some dogs, zebras and elephants. Go to 29.

24. Maybe so, but you never know and it is always advisable to stay within the rather than to experiment. especially with breeds that have been pure for some time. Straight ahead to 27. 25. Sorry, wrong answer. While in some gaited breeds the action may be man-made, footfall of the gait is still natural. About 2000 years ago most breeds were gaited but with breeding bigger horses and using them for driving many lost their ability to show a smooth gait. Bounce back to 11.

26. The more colorful the merrier. An old Icelandic saying tells that "a good horse has no color". Pintos are often found and liked as well as all shades of dun, bay, black, palomino and grey. On to 13.

27. Which two breeds are allowed to pace? Peruvian Pasos and Paso Finos. Go to 30. Icelandics and Standardbreds. Go to 32. 28. Add a few. In countries where horses are used all day long to work, riders preferred the smoother horses and encouraged their breeding. Back to 31.

29. Right again. Many dogs, especially the larger breeds prefer a running walk or amble. Zebras are naturally gaited and so are elephants. Could you imagine a two ton elephant pounding down on his diagonal if he was trotting. A running walk is much softer and more efficient for such a large animal. On to 31.

30. While Paso may sound close to pace and many Peruvian's gaits are closer to the pace than a trot, a pure pace is not liked in the breed. Back to 27.

31. How many gaited breeds are there in the world? 30 - 60: Go to 22. 10 - 30: Go to 28. 1 - 10: Go to 34.

32. Standardbreds are paced at the racetrack, pulling a sulky. Icelandics are also raced at the pace, but with a rider on their back. A slow pace is not liked in any breed; the pace is a racing gait. Pace on to 23.

33. So why is it people like the gaited horse? They are fun and comfortable. Go to 2. They are a great status symbol. Go to 5.

34. There are 1 -10 gaited breeds in North America, but many more in the world. China, Mongolia and Russia for example have quite a few small gaited horses. Try again at 31.

35. Not quite wrong, but also not right enough to let you go on. The Tennessee Walking Horse Registry had some typical restrictions, such as discouraging pintos, although a strong trend has developed toward more color. Back to 7 for another try.

36. No, back to 21.

37. Great ride!!! If you didn't get bounced or lost on the trail, the quickest route home took 21 steps. 1. 4. 16. 18. 11. 20. 7. 26. 13. 9. 21. 24. 27. 32. 23. 29. 31. 22. 33. 2 and 37.

Here is one last challenge. Can you identify the breed logos? #15 will give you the correct answer.

HOW TO MAKE A NEW FRIEND (VIA CANADA POST?)



In the July/August issue of WHN, Shirley Hancock of Balzac wrote that she MUST write to me (Hazel Paton) but that she hadn't got a letter away yet. They are the present owners of Merry Man's Velvet, a mare that I once owned. So on September 11/93 I wrote to Shirley in case she was too busy to write. A package of photos of Velvet, taken at our place nine years ago, and a separate letter, were started off on what proved to be "an incredible journey".

Harvesting went on and eventually ended on October 22. Still there was no reply from Shirley, which seemed a bit strange since she'd seemed quite interested in contacting me. By November 8th I could stand it no longer for I was worried about my snapshots. I got a telephone number for the Hancocks and placed my call.

That call proved interesting indeed, for Shirley sounded so friendly (and worried too). She said SHE had written to ME and sent a package of pictures on October 29, the day after she had received my September 11 letter! Well, where was her letter and where were the two sets of photos? And what had been going on since Sept. 11 until Oct.28 to delay my original letter?

After our chat on the phone we sat back and waited. On November 16 I called Shirley again

I promptly phoned Shirley at Balzac to tell her the news. She could scarcely believe the journey that letter had made. I wrote to her again, enclosing her snapshots, and returned the envelope to her by Xpresspost again (which cost over \$3.00).

However, in two days Shirley had her pictures and my letter. She in turn phoned me and we had another great long talk - who says horse people aren't great? Someday we may meet but until then, we'll always wonder where the heck were our letters and why letters have to go by special post nowadays to ensure their arrival.

Trains used to take the most important letters for a few cents. Progress? Complain if you have ANY problems – at least you might get an apology, even if the lost letter takes half a lifetime to arrive!







clinic was put on in Germany September by Russ Keyser, Bob Cherry and a farrier, Jeff Frantz. Although Germany not familiar with the Tennessee Walking Horse breed nor with the long toe that is required with the heavy plantation shoe and/or the stacked pads that are used on the "high performance" horses, they have such a history of equine knowledge that only those who are new to the equine world and do not understand the physiology of the horse will accept this type of shoeing.

Germany has long been a leader in the art of horsemanship, and horses have been a focus in German culture for the past 400 years. Such government supported facilities as the Hanover Riding School and the Spanish Riding School which celebrated their 400th year of existence have contributed to the population having an appreciation for the art of classical riding. These schools have produced such masters as Von Schultheisz, Niendorff and Reiner Klimke who are world acclaimed for their knowledge and ability.

The German people have a great respect and appreciation for the horse. Let's hope that our breed is presented to them as a horse of natural gait that does not require long toes or a weighted shoe.



UNIFORMITY OF OWNERSHIP

Do you know that nagging and repetition is one of the most stressful things we have to put up with in this life? Do you know that reading this article is much less painful than going to the Dentist (or maybe not). All records should be uniform, that is, membership, dams and all offspring should be in the same name. There are several ways to register your animals. You can register as a partnership (John and Joanna Doe), as a farm or ranch (Same old Doe Uniform Ranch), or as an individual (Joanna Doe). Once this tough decision has been made, the rest is easy. You apply for a membership in the name you have chosen, request tattoo letters in that name (for breeds requiring tattooing), apply for registration of all offspring in that name as well. The seller may know you personally, therefore, it is your responsibility when you purchase any animals, especially dams, that you make sure you advise the seller the exact name you want to appear on the transfer application. Now you are probably wondering about the sires (we must not forget the dear old dads). Well, it is desirable to have the sires in the same name as the membership, dams and offspring, but it is not as important, since it is the recorded ownership of the dam that determines the breeder and owner of the offspring. The breeder is determined by the recorded owner of the dam at the time of service. The owner is determined by the recorded owner of the dam at time of birth.


