





# PERFORMANCE (?) CLASS FOR WEANLINGS & YEARLINGS



Something NEW was offered July 15, 1995 for weanlings and yearlings. Called the "In Hand Trail Class", it was held during the Northwest Pleasure Tennessee Walking Horse Association show at the Eugene, Oregon fairgrounds.

Three yearlings worked the obstacles individually while the other yearlings were required to patiently await their turn.

The first obstacle was a back through "L"; the second was two 8 inch step overs; the third was a bridge. After completing the three obstacles, the handler moved to the yearling's off side and worked the obstacles again, increasing the degree of difficulty.

This class certainly held the audience's attention, and many positive comments were overheard. Many said they were making plans to enter their youngsters the next time the class is offered. Perhaps this will be the incentive needed to bring out more foals.

Having the In Hand Trail Class right after the colts' halter classes allowed exhibitors to take their

youngsters home if they wished instead of having to rent a stall and wait for the trail classes the following day.

The first place ribbon and a bunch of carrots went to the filly, Catsandra, owned by Wyant's Winter Springs, Cheshire, Oregon. She was shown by Beth Lee, Assistant Trainer at Moonshadow Stables, Walton, Oregon.

Second place winner was The Tracker, owned by Bob & Cheryl Wendel, Flying W Ranch, Carlton, Oregon, shown by Bob Wendel.

The third place winner was Gunslinger's Midnite Dance owned by Sam & Chris Potter, shown by Chris Potter.

# BRITISH COLUMBIA NEWS

DEB EGOLF, LAST STOP WALKING HORSES, COURTENAY, writes, "I have some terrific news about my three year old stallion, Gold Strike Nugget. I took him to Vancouver, Washington, and put him in three flat shod classes. They were huge - 15 horses to a class or more. Neither one of us had ever been to any horse show. He had five weeks training by Phil Thomson of T.L.C. Stables. Phil took him in two Western Performance classes and placed third in the first class and fourth in the Championship class. Hey - I won some American dollars!"

"After that I thought, "Hey, I can do this", so I entered an amateur class. Well, goes to show ya why I hired Phil ... I placed DEAD last. I looked like a puppet with my hands up under my chin and a grimace rather than a grin on my face. I got the cure. No more showing for me."

"I did have tremendous compliments by many professional stable owners saying that the colt looked and moved like a horse called Trip My Trigger in Tennessee."

"Anyhow, I am so proud of the little guy (he's now

15:1 hh) that I've sent a picture along so all Tennessee Walking Horse Canadian fans can see that a green horse and rider can have a lot of fun south of the border."

From SHEILA COBURN, KREEK SIDE WALKERS, PRINCE GEORGE, "We are having a spectacular Indian summer. We needed it as August was rain, rain, rain."

"We've had a bad year for vets. Shadow (our stallion, now 23) was sick with colic. Two weeks later we had his teeth floated and the vet tranquilized him as he had a lot of hooks. The next day Kirk went out to feed after supper and found him with a stick just below his eye. We didn't dare remove it as we weren't sure it hadn't penetrated the eye. There was a lot of discharge. Once again the vet came out and tranquilized him, and removed the stick. It hadn't gone into the eyeball and the end of the stick was blunt so the wound was clean. The vet left it to drain and gave him a good dose of penicillin. I gave him two more shots the next day and the eye looked great, almost healed. But then the next day he was listless and showing mild colic signs so the vet came out again. He couldn't get the tube down - I think poor Shadow was sick of vets - and he didn't dare tranquilize him again. The vet wasn't sure if Shadow was reacting to two days in a row of being tranquilized or to the penicillin. We had to order a substitute antibiotic which took a week."

"This was the Friday of the long weekend and our vet gave me his home phone number to keep him posted throughout the weekend - which was his weekend off. It sure is nice to have a vet who cares."

"Shadow has come through it okay but he sure had us worried for a while."

"Don and Jo-Anne McDonald came for a visit and we went down to Quesnel to see Lea Berge and Cindy Botkin. Lea purchased the gorgeous spotted stud colt, Successful Shadow, from McDonalds last spring. Cindy rode him for us and he is quite something, reminiscent of Tsuniah's Sunday. We were glad to see that Cindy is back training. She had her paddocks full."

MARION MILLS, TATELKUZ LAKE RESORT, VANDERHOOF, writes, "Our resort saw many visitors this summer from as far away as Germany. Many had their first ride on a Tennessee Walking Horse. The smooth ride and willing, gentle nature of the TWH won the admiration of all our guests, even those who didn't ride but preferred to "visit" the horses over the fence."

"Presently we have a promotion crew from Germany filming and photographing the lodge and yes, the horses, for advertising back in Deutschland for next year. 
I had a phone call from MARSHA TRINDER of RUSSELL who was looking for some informative



My partnership with Randy Johnson was an excellent way to get started and learn from someone who has achieved a large measure of success."

"Both Randy and I bred some of our mares to Legacy. As well, I thank Monty Gwynne and Morley Holman for choosing him this year. Generator's Black Rain was busy too. I bred some of my own mares to him and again thank yous go out to Windy Scott-Hansen, Delores Boeyenga, Dr. Darren Neilson and Keith Frey."

This is the Saturday prior to Horse Improvement to enable Futurity participants to attend both events.

# Congratulations

I would like to congratulate the show organizers and the competitors on the success of the 1995 Canadian Walking Horse Futurity. I have shown in Quarter Horse and Paint shows as well as on the open circuit in Saskatchewan, and this Futurity stacks up very well against any of them.

The show was very well run, making the most of the facility; the horses were beautifully fitted, groomed to perfection and presented very professionally. I think everyone should be proud of themselves!

One thing about the stabling: some of the older stalls

were fairly dangerous for foals. I don't know what can be done about this but I am sure that Dianne Little did her best in arranging everyone.

I really was extremely impressed with the quality and presentation of these horses - they could have held their heads high at almost any show. However, folks must try to remember not to get "carried away" with the braids, clippers, blankets, etcetera, especially with those babies. One is not going to change a fuzzy weanling into a slick show horse overnight. Let the natural beauty and personality of the horse shine through.

Also remember that some of these horses have never "been to town", so to speak. Isn't that enough stress? Why parade them up and down a noisy crowded show barn until all hours?

I liked the individual showing format of the Futurity. This system is <u>very</u> pleasant to show in. By keeping tabs on the program and what is happening in the ring, one doesn't have to stand around forever waiting for a class, one doesn't take forever IN a class, and one doesn't have to deal with a bunch of overwrought babies.

Also, this way the judge does not have to face a large class of horses all at once. In a situation that invariably ends up short of time, the flashiest, prettiest, but not necessarily the most correct horse, wins. This has gotten a lot of breeds in trouble, and I hope we, as proud Walking Horse owners, can avoid it.

I also like this system because it allows the horse to be judged as an individual, against the judge's idea of a perfect horse, rather than against a bunch of others who may or may not be well or poorly conformed.

I enjoyed the way the performance classes were done (despite, as groom, having to stand so long holding a saddle! Perhaps the saddle could be set on a cloth brought along for that purpose.) We all know how much movement can be influenced by training, so it is very important that the horses be evaluated by conformation as well.

All in all, I was very impressed by the Futurity and the horses. This is a great show of a great breed, with a lot of opportunity for growth. Let's see YOU there next year!


# NORTHERN ALBERTA TENNESSEE WALKER CLUB

The first director elected from Alberta to the TWHBEA National (shouldn't that be "International?) Board was Ellwood Smith of Donalda.

In the "News Round-up" Mae Dingwall of Castleton, Ontario had sent in the results of their Fun Show and guess who I saw listed in the results? New subscriber Sally Gibb had placed second in the Tenn. Walking Horse, Plantation Pleasure, Open Tack, riding Cindy's Sun. Placing first was Keith Gibb of Greenbank on Bum's Ebony Critique. What a coincidence!

The News was five pages long including one page of ads. It was still being printed using the purple ink Spiritmaster copier.

On the first page of the 1985 Nov/Dec. issue I was asking the whereabouts of "lost subscribers" Ben & Darlene Herback, trying to buy copies of the new *Echo of Hoofbeats*, second edition, for the seven subscribers who had expressed an interest in getting a copy, and asking all to note TWHBEA's new blood-typing regulations regarding stallions foaled after 1985. Does it seem like ten years ago that blood-typing first came on the scene?

The News was also taking on the task of "official communicator" for the Canadian Walking Horse Association.

# THOUGHTS ON BUYING A FOAL

When people make the decision to buy a Plantation Tennessee Walking Horse, they have several options. They can invest in anything from a fully trained push-button trail or show horse (which can be quite expensive) to a new foal who is hardly dry from being born (usually considerably less expensive). Most people gravitate to the middle of these choices .... a horse that's been trained to saddle with various degrees of work done on its gaits. But if a person enjoys training and developing his own horse and the special relationship that goes with this, a weanling or yearling can be a very rewarding investment.

Many people turn away from the purchase of a young horse who hasn't been started under saddle. They may not feel confident starting their own horse until they discover that this sort of training is really quite simple. However, upon closer questioning, we often discover that the real reason people shy away from purchasing that young baby is because they are afraid they will end up with a horse that is not naturally gaited ... and therefore, a very difficult horse to market or enjoy. There are several things that can help make your purchase of young horses much less hazardous. It can even turn out to be a lot of fun!

One of the most important things you need to keep in mind is that, when you are watching these youngsters move, you are watching an unfinished product. Their gaits are not going to have the polish or consistency of the older, trained horse. But there are a few things to look for that will help you to choose the best moving foal for your plantation purposes.

First of all, watch the overall movement of the foal while it is walking in the pasture. Encourage the youngster to move around at a walk, perhaps by hazing him along with or without his dam. You can't tell as much when the foal is frisking, cantering or doing any intermediate gait that strikes his fancy. Encourage a simple walk, nothing more. Watch how the foal uses his head and neck to propel him



forward. When the foal moves is his head/neck moving up and down with the whole shoulder following suit? Or does the head move into a high position and shake rather than nod? Ideal flat walks, and therefore running walks, are produced by long low movements during the building stage. If a foal uses his whole head, neck and shoulder to move forward, you have more power working for the gait. When the foal moves his head into a higher position, it shows a tendency to move in a more vertical direction rather than horizontal. The foal may someday lack the ability to move forward strongly and loosely.

Shoulder movement is of vital importance and makes the difference between the average foal and that exceptional mover that could give you the most for your time and money. As the foal moves forward, watch for a rolling shoulder motion. Does the front leg move forward just enough to set back down on the ground again? Or does the front leg swing forward to the end of its extension ability and then drop back to be placed on the ground? An excellent shoulder movement should make the leg look as if it wants to move forward farther than what it really has to. This shows a loose, fluid, powerful potential that will give you that deep strong head nod and stride that allows speed without sacrificing form.

One wouldn't dream of buying a Walking Horse without first checking out the rear stride. Foals may fool you here. If they are in their long legged stage, they may overstride much more than they will when they grow into their legs. Overstride may be misleading at times. But you can still watch the way the hind legs move forward. Do they sweep forward and use their whole extending ability? Or do they just place the feet on the ground without having the appearance of trying to go the limit? A foal or youngster may be rather awkward on its feet from one time to another. Again, don't watch for perfection. Watch for POTENTIAL.

We've concentrated on the movements of the foal rather than the actual gait because foals and youngsters are not always in the best position to show you their "wares". Long legs, friskiness, shyness ... many things can account for a foal refusing to show you a running walk in the pasture. This is why you watch for its moves first. As you become familiar with the foal as you watch it, you can begin to study its flat walk. This is as good a gauge for future running walk potential as any you could name outside of witnessing the actual running walk itself. If the foal can exhibit a good cadenced flat walk, your chances of a good cadenced running walk are excellent.

We've discussed the various qualities that make up a high quality plantation prospect. But what happens if you find a foal that touches your heart with its personality (foals can be very delightsome creatures) but you feel that it lacks something in the way it moves? Do not despair too much if your choice trots or paces up to greet you. Although a foal of this type should not command top dollar, it should also not be dismissed as plantation material.

A trotty foal is not the end of the world. Notice, first of all, if the foal does nothing but trot. If you see it shuffle as it comes out of a canter, be reassured. Watch his sire and dam and see how they move. If the mare and stallion are both able to perform a running walk, you can be pretty confident that the foal will also. If you are dealing with a reputable and a knowledgeable breeder, he can probably tell you how the sire and dam moved when they were young. Most trotty foals loosen up with age so that they are able to perform a barefooted flat walk and later, a running walk, once they have been under saddle a short time, if not immediately.

If a trotty foal is less than a month or so old and still has rather long legs, chances are good he will not be a loose, good-going foal. But many foals begin to trot in the pasture from time to time or most of the time and it's not the end of the world. Watch them as they come out of the trot. If he shuffles, he's going to be just fine. The foal just jumps over the running walk into the trot because he doesn't know any better. Proper and consistent halter training will strengthen and develop his running walk potential. If the trotty foal has a good flat walk with good moves, you can feel comfortable about his future. Trotty foals often don't have the stride or looseness of the more laterally gaited foals. But, at the same time, many trotty foals develop into excellent horses. As a trotty foal grows and is developed by his handler, all but the worst quality will loosen up with age and work. Under saddle, trotty horses maintain their running walk very satisfactorily. But, again, a consistently trotty foal should not command top dollar because he will need work that a naturally run-walking foal won't require.

Pacey foals don't always stay pacey ... just as trotty foals don't always stay trotty. If the sire and the dam are pacey, there is less chance of the foal squaring up as he matures. If one or both of the parents are honestly gaited, the foal may fulfill your needs by the time it's been under saddle a month or so, if not sooner. Many times, as a pacey foal matures, he also squares up bit by bit. One day, you may be surprised to see the horse trotting from the pasture for his daily water. If halter or saddle training up to now has done nothing to square up (tighten up, collect) the pacey horse, you should immediately start again from the beginning. Your horse has reached the stage where he may be able to respond better to your training.

Lastly, if your foal choice performs a "hard" trot or "hard" pace, try to find another foal.


It might be wise to mention here that the discussion of foal movement and selection in this article is based on the premise that the foal will be trained and gaited without the use of artificial aids. If you plan to make use of special shoeing, chains or weight in the training of your plantation horse, you don't have to be quite as particular in the choice of your foal. But if you wish to train your plantation foal as naturally as possible, you need to rely upon its natural potential. The more naturally moving your foal choice, the more you should expect to pay for it.

After you've studied the foal moving in the pasture, study its parents if you can. Remember that, while older horses may be more sure of their movements, they may also be showing the effects of their training ... for the better or for the worse. If the dam has been a broodmare most of her life, she will probably be as close to natural as possible. Watch for the same head, neck, shoulder and rear movements as you did in the foal.

Another point to watch for with the mare is her disposition. Foals learn much of their outlook from their dams. If the mare is aggressive, studies show that the foal will grow up with the same aggressive tendencies. If the mare is timid, the foal will be inclined in the same direction. If the dam has some bad habit, the foal will have this in his repertoire of responses or behavior patterns. The dam is the foal's most influential element until man steps into the picture. If the foal has been handled extensively and properly, many bad tendencies of the mare can be partially or completely overridden. So, the mare gives the foal more than just genetic potential.

The sire has his own importance in the value of his offspring. Don't be lenient with the qualities of the stallion just because he is a show ring winner. Infalliblity of our judges has never been proven and their choices (or their unchoices) should always be questioned. The stallion should

undergo the same scrutiny as the foal. While he may impress you with his bearing, you may discover that he doesn't move well from the shoulder. Or perhaps his stride is tight rather than flowing and loose. It is also well to remember that many times the natural tendencies of a show horse have been quelled by over-zealous trainers or owners. This is true not only for show horses, but for any horse that has been trained to saddle.

Buying from a <u>reputable breeder</u> may cost a little more but there are advantages. A reputable breeder is anxious to keep his reputation clean and honest. He will want to nurture as much repeat business as possible. The breeder should also have a more thorough knowledge of the background of his horses' pedigrees, way of going, disposition, etc. He can tell you if there are certain "standout" characteristics of a cross you are considering. You may also have the advantage of viewing the sire, dam and siblings on the premises for comparison.

If you are an inexperienced buyer or looking for your first horse, take another person with you who has had experience with plantation horses and knows what to look for. Make sure the foal has been regularly wormed and get a record of the types and times of worming. Papers should be in order and according to TWHBEA, the seller should transfer the papers.

When you are looking for the plantation foal of your dreams, you may sacrifice bloodlines for gait ... or gait for disposition ... or conformation for bloodlines. Your possiblities are endless. But it is important that you find the best foal for your life style. Absolutely "not-kidding-around natural" run-walk foals are top-of-the-line and should command a high price, of course. Trotty or pacey-type foals will usually give you a fine gaited ride ... you just have to help them along a little. With the right kind of halter and saddle handling, in 10 years you'll probably not be able to tell the difference. But these foals should be lower in price and you shouldn't expect more from them than they are able to give you in a short amount of time. "Time Is Money" and that is true when it comes to plantation foals. Save your money and spend more time in training. Or spend your money and invest less time in training. It's your choice.

Dear Rosemary,

A number of years ago in August my daughter's young gelding was also rubbing his mane and tail out. From a lovely semi-curly mane he had only a ragged rat's nest left in no time.

The neighbour stopped by the day we were getting ready to clip off this mess that used to be a mane. He said the gelding might have mane/hair worms. MANE WORMS?? HAIR WORMS?? An IVERMECTIN type wormer should fix it, he said. So it was off to the vet's for a tube of Eqvalan paste.

We had been using a Cutter and Wonder wormer type wormer at that time. On the instructions with the Eqvalan liquid both HAIRWORMS and NECK THREADWORMS were listed as parasitic infections.

Well a few days after worming with the Ivermectin type wormer the gelding had quit rubbing his neck and tail. It worked!

# GOOD HORSEKEEPING TIPS

Weaning foals is always an anxious time for all concerned. We have found the safest and least painful way for us is to take the mare completely away and leave the foal in its accustomed pasture with its usual herd - all except Mum. There will be a lot of running around and whinnying for a day or so, but they settle down after that. It's best if you have established a creep feeder before taking the mare away so the foal can continue to get its extra feed there. Otherwise, this is your chance to make it love you by catching it and giving it some grain and TLC every day!

Of course, it helps to have a LOT of land or an accommodating neighbour. You will need to pasture the mare out of sight and hearing for two months or more. It will take that long to break the bond between them so the mare won't allow the foal to nurse again when they are reunited.

# SHOPPING FOR A FOAL

by Jean L. Rempel

Now many people say the foal they want has to be a beautiful spotted black and white, or a shiny coal black, or a flaxen sorrel or ... It must have neat well matched socks on the hind legs and a perfect star on the forehead, or four matching stockings or ... I have heard this often over the years, and in fact, as a preteen my dream foal/horse looked just like Trigger. But I could compromise. It could be cream to golden buckskin with a long flowing mane and tail - or perhaps I'd settle for a jet black with a flowing snow white mane and tail and no other markings. (I have yet to see one like this). But that was the perfect horse in a 10 year old's eyes.

Now that I'm a little older and wiser, the first thing I look at when shopping for a foal is the legs and feet. Are the front legs straight? (Sometimes it is tough to decide as that baby stands there and turns its legs, both front and hind, into a puzzle.) Do the hind legs look like they should? Do the hooves fit the horse's build? Remember - NO HOOVES, NO HORSE.

Next: are the head, neck and shoulder right? Do the legs, head, neck, shoulder and the rest of the body look like it all belongs together? If you're not sure, check a description on conformation and/or ask a knowledgeable horse person.

Now let's see this foal move. If it's halter trained I want to see the youngster moving, both on a lead and and turned loose. (Loose will often show better movement, especially if the foal is worried about mama when being

led.) I want to see some overstride and a loose relaxed movement - but with a briskness to it. It is a real plus if the sire, dam and /or other offspring from the same age group and up to mature horses are available and can be seen.

A good disposition is a must. I look at the sire's and dam's dispositions as an indiction of what the foal's disposition will be. Also does the foal seem to be friendly when you are looking at it?

Pedigree? As a breeder, I now want youngsters with a pedigree that will go well with my stallions' bloodlines.

At the very bottom of my list of requirements (and so far away from the opening sentences of this article!) is color. I have never ridden a good horse that was a bad color. I certainly have ridden some bad mannered, poorly broke, spooky, stumbling, poor type horses that were real good colors. So now color really means nothing to me, though I still have preferences for certain ones.

So, in a nutshell, I look for good legs, head and neck put on right, good movement, disposition, and pedigree in that order.

If you are looking to buy a foal and are having a problem deciding if it is built properly, don't be afraid of asking someone else that is knowledgeable for help. It's your money that you will be investing and you want the best that you can get for it.
