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

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THE HORSE THAT NO ONE WANTED

When I was young, horses were my passion. I learned to ride bareback (and bare footed) on the ponies I begged my parents to buy.

Before I knew it, the years passed and I found myself looking for a career rather than thinking of horses. After moving all over the province of Ontario, I found myself in Dorion. Here I met Rosemary Hartley who boarded a horse and invited me to join her and some friends for a trail ride. After not being on a horse for ten years, I was instantly hooked! I decided it was time to be a kid again and get back into horses. It was then that the dilemma began: what horse should I buy?

Since Dorion has excellent riding trails, I figured I

wanted a good old, rock-solid trail horse. Nothing fancy - colour didn't matter nor did papers - it just had to be sound and have a nice personality. The money I was looking at spending was around \$1000.00

I spent a lot of time hanging around Denise Ham's farm where Rosemary kept her horse. One of the horses there, a six year old, black Walker, just happened to be for sale. "Just WHAT is a Walker?" I asked. It was all Denise and Rose would talk about. "Once you've ridden one you'll want one," they told me. Rose herself was looking for another Walker as her old mare was due to retire. "What's wrong with this one then?" I asked. "Well, I just don't care for black - but other than that, he seems okay," she replied.

We pulled him out of his stall and as we checked him over, the

comments went something like this: "His head is kind of large. He toes out a bit. Isn't he rather cow-hocked? His back legs aren't very straight..." The asking price for him was \$1800.00 and my thoughts were, "Geesh... Do I want this funny looking horse for that much money? Why does the owner want to sell him after only having had him for three weeks? There must be something wrong with him..."

Despite my apprehension there was something about this fellow that I liked. His canter was as smooth as silk. His personality was very attractive. He was pacey (so I was told). The gaits at that time all looked the same to me but it didn't matter as I didn't have intentions to show. So, with the assurance from Denise that \$1,800.00 was a good price, I bought my first Walker, Midnight's Merry Dan (known as Ebony).

Ebony had many things to learn, even the very basics like being in the barn without other horses, saddling up, getting

used to traffic and mail boxes, and of course, the basics of riding.

Ebony was already six years old by this time. Why was he so green? I learned a little bit about his first years by talking to Raili Tenkula. She had bought him from Marlene Sams in Saskatchewan.

"He was not a very nice looking weanling," she tells me politely. From Raili's place he went up to Eagle River where he had two different homes and wound up at a Quarter Horse barn where he was branded as the "ugly duckling". Then he ended up at an Arabian farm in Dryden where he stayed for a year. Then his owner, figuring there was most certainly SOMETHING wrong with his trot, sold him to Nora Wawia

who boarded him at Denise's.

After three weeks, Nora decided that she just didn't have the time he needed to have spent on him, and that he just wasn't the horse for her, so she had put him up for sale again.

But now Ebony finally had an owner who thought the world of him and called him handsome every day. With regular exercise and attention and Denise's excellent care, Eb put on muscle and his personality blossomed.

After much advice from friends as well as reading about the breed, I have learned a lot about the Tennessee Walker and have found it a real challenge. Ebony and I finally learned together how to runwalk.

This past May we entered our first Walker show at the Minneapolis Summerfest Show. We did better than

I ever expected, coming away with a placing in every class including four seconds and a first! It was a childhood dream come true.

Eb and I still have a lot of learning and work to do but I cherish him dearly and I have learned a valuable lesson from this experience. If you believe in something - stick with it, work hard, and think positive. Ebony knows he's special because I tell him he is, and I have friends like Nancy Kauhman who is always telling me, "Remember, Rachel, you're riding a Cadillac."

With the much needed help of my friends, I hope to continue to dabble in showing and improve Eb's gaits. Thanks so much Denise, Rosemary, Nancy, Shannon, Nora and Jocelyn for your advice, support, and especially, your friendship. It's greatly appreciated.



"As to how the horses are settling in, we had one misfortune. A week after the horses arrived (they got here in beautiful shape thanks to International Horse Movers) our 19 year old gelding, Big, (Big Boy's Little Boy) died of colic. He'd had problems with colic in the past, and it was unlikely that it was related to the move itself, but of course the timing was even harder on all of us than if it had happened at home in Sherwood Park."

"The rest of the horses have adapted well and both of our geldings, Chapie's Bay Gem, and Masterpiece of Valor, are becoming veteran trail horses, tackling the hills and gullies around the ranch where they are boarded. Our mare, Senator's Black Silk, had a lovely solid black filly on May 24. Of course, we are calling her "Victoria" given that she was born on Victoria Day (in Canada of course). The filly looks a lot like her father, David Warhaft's stallion, Gold Legacy. We're not selling her, though we've had a number of inquiries about her. She's the only foal at the sixty horse ranch, so she's gotten tons of attention and is a real people-oriented horse already. The picture is typical of our evenings these days."




"We've one foal to report, a gorgeous solid black stud colt born June 1 out of Midnight's Lil Maud by Royal Dictator."

"I shall miss the daily contact with Twilight but it will be wonderful not to have to carry water all through our







Anyway, these two will last me for as long as I'll be able to ride, I do believe."

"There's a halter show next week. I've never taken anyone into a show but I think I'll take Blue Bell in as she's quieter. Will show DeeDee next year in halter; by then she'll be good."

I still have two very well fed horses for sale - a tall 15 hand mare and the half Walker 14:1 hand little mare. See my ad. I see in the last issue that there are lots of new foals, so good luck, everyone, and happy trails!"

LINDA CHRISTIE, QUESNEL, sent the photo and information about Shadow's North Sage and also had this to say: "Thank you for doing such a nice job on my ad and for reprinting it. I have sold three and have five still to sell."

From WAYNE LAXDAL, QUESNEL, "Just a short question to you and the Walking Horse News readers. Do any of you know whether "plain shod" Tennessee Walking Horses are kept by anyone in the state of New South Wales, Australia?"

"We are planning to retire to Ellenborough, New South Wales, Australia, in approximately 84 months (providing we don't win a lottery sooner than that!). Our interest in Walking Horses will, I'm sure, continue when we retire, and perhaps obtaining a couple of these horses there might be possible. If you have any names and addresses of TWH breeders in New South Wales, Australia, we'd appreciate hearing about or from them. Thanks and happy trails to all."





British Westerners Association Western Hall Of Fame.

Our congratulations to Margaret Gosling of Claresholm, Alberta on being named to the Hall of Fame of the *British Westerners Association*.

Margaret was first a member of the Western Horseman's Association in Britain, an association founded by Les Gosling in 1968. He had learned to ride Western when he was stationed in Alberta as a Flying Instructor during the war. Through his efforts the W.H.A. became affiliated to the British Horse Society. This was a great achievement as the B.H.S. took a lot of convincing that Western Riding was, and is, another serious riding discipline.

However, the W.H.A. was only for <u>riders</u> and there were many people interested in the "Western tradition" who were not (yet) riders. It was because of the disappointment of all these people who were nonetheless truly interested in the West that Margaret, and Johnnie Roper, founded the *British Westerners Association* in 1973. Western weekends and two Round-Ups a year are held, with horsemanship being an important part of the activities. Margaret and her horse, Amber, did much to promote interest in Western riding and the B.W.A. with demonstrations, displays of Western riding and television appearances.

Both these associations are still going strong in Britain though their founders (Margaret and Les Gosling) are now married and living in Canada! This year Margaret was honoured by the B.W.A. by being named to their Hall of Fame. Congratulations!

Editors' Note: Sadly, news has just reached us that Les Gosling passed away recently after suffering a heart attack in mid September. Our sympathies, Margaret.

BLOOD TYPING 1995 FOALS

For those of you registering your Walkers with TWHBEA, you do NOT have to have a veterinarian take the blood from foals whose parents are already bloodtyped and on file with TWHBEA. You can save yourself money by taking the blood yourself, using a kit obtained from Mann Equitest in Guelph, Ontario, and then shipping it to them for bloodtyping.

Jo-Anne McDonald did this with some of her '95 foals, enclosing a note to Mann Equitest saying that this was acceptable to the registry, and she says the results were back to her in three weeks. She then sent the bloodtyping documents on to TWHBEA so they could proceed with registering her foals. Thanks for running a "test case" for us, Jo-Anne.

FREE FOAL REGISTRATION

Don't forget that you can claim a free foal registration if you are a TWHBEA member. You must apply for it before the foal is six months old, however, so don't let the time creep past you.

STALLION REPORTS

Your stallion report was due in to TWHBEA postmarked on or before October 15. This is mandatory and a penalty is assessed if you do not file.

NEW DIRECTOR

By the time the next News comes out in December, Albertans will have a new director. I have served two consecutive terms and under the by-laws of the association, that is the maximum.



Our team consisted of Susan Sevcenko driving Toddy's Perfect Lady, Erika Peters riding Canadian Champion, Grethe Broholm Sorensen riding and driving Midnight Toddy and Charis Cooper riding Joie's Cindy Lady.

The format of the competition has changed. There are now five events: Compulsory Skills, Precision Driving, Barrel Race (with four barrels), Jeopardy Trail, and Jeopardy Jumping. Two members of our team must go into each event to be eligible for any prize money. If both team members get through a class without disqualification and don't make the top six placings they get \$200 and Four Points. Prize money pay-out for each event is: 1st = \$900, 2nd = \$750, 3rd = \$600, 4th = \$400, 5th = \$300, 6th =

\$250, 7th and up = \$200. Prize money paid out for the Overall Top Six Placings is: 1st = \$2500, 2nd = \$1700, 3rd = \$1000, 4th = \$800, 5th = \$600 and 6th = \$400.

We did not place in the top six of Compulsory Skills, Precision Driving, Barrel Race or Jeopardy Jumping. We placed sixth in the Jeopardy Trail class. In this class the Paints who were fourth and the Pintos who were fifth and Grethe & I who were sixth, all had the same score of 410 points. However, the Paints and Pintos were a shade faster and time was the deciding factor, as there was no ride-off. Grethe and Toddy tied for top spot in points and second in time in the Precision Driving, but the combined scores of both team horses were needed to place.

The entry fee this year was \$1334.00 and we received \$1050.00 in prize money. We feel that we gave the Tennessee Walking Horse breed good representation as we

were seen by thousands of people from different parts of the world and received many favorable comments, some of these coming from the Spruce Meadows staff.

I would like to see these classes in our own shows so more people would consider competing outside the Walker circle. So please get out and practise these events. The Tennessee Walking Horse is to be one of the featured breeds next year when they showcase "Pleasure Breeds for the World", so we had better be ready to put on a good show. I will keep you posted on this coming event.

Our sponsor this year was G & W Cycle World, Calgary. The team members send special thanks to Trisha and Barry Steeves, Dianne and Dennis Little for the great jackets which were very welcome when the weather started out so stormy and COLD! The bright colors made us stand out in the crowd.

Note: A condition of entry in the Battle of the Breeds is that we must have a Breed Booth at the same time. AWHA paid the \$1070.00 cost of the booth and these four girls volunteered to pay their way into the Battle competition as long as they could keep their prize monies. They put in a lot of preparatory work and put four good horses out in front of thousands of spectators. Well done, and thank you Grethe, Erika, Susan and Charis for promoting the breed in such a practical, active way. Jo Kingsland, AWHA


Saturday morning came earlier than I expected and started with the Model classes. The Model classes tempt exhibitors to compete for the prettiest horse title.. The

youths entered in two gait classes so by splitting these classes the youths received their own classes, championships and High Point Youth trophy. What a great group of kids they are and so serious about their showing. Youths competing for High Point awards entered regular two gait classes as well as specific Youth classes. Plantation Youth Championship went to Neil Benner (Strike The Gold) and Western Youth Championship went to Alicia Zimmerman (Dakota Midnight Jewel). When they rode "down to the wire" and all points were added up, Alicia Zimmerman won the High Point Youth Trophy with Erin Innocent (Bopper's Classic Echo) taking reserve. This was a tough competition and congratulations go out to both girls.

The Junior Horse division held the greatest number of entries with some very deserving horses taking first and second placings right through to the championships.

The Light Shod Championship classes, both Plantation and Western really heated up with 10 entries in each of them.

The Three Gait classes had only six entries. Over the two days Shadow's Koko Boy, owned & ridden by Donna Edwards won High Point Three Gait Horse, with Toddy's Commander (Grethe Sorensen) taking Reserve.

Toddy's Perfect Lady owned & ridden by Grethe Sorensen, fulfilled the Super Horse Award requirements (by entering & competing in specified classes) and so received the Super Horse Award.

Let's think about three gait for a second. When we were really little kids we galloped our stick horses all over the yard ON THE CORRECT LEAD!!! As pre-teens we probably thought two gait meant fast and three gait meant faster. Please don't add here, "and some of us never grew up".) At the first few Tennessee Walking Horse shows we all cantered our horses. Probably we didn't know any better. Now none of us canter. Well, at least not in public (it's a shame).

The shows this year held great opportunities to jump into 3 gait classes with many maiden, novice, and 1st year canter horse or rider classes. Where were we? We were still hanging around again with the two gait crowd. I hear for next year, that the youth are going to challenge the adults in the three gait open divisions. Are we going to let these kids beat us? I say NO! Take up the gauntlet and let's get going 3 gait!!! CENTRAL ALBERTA TENNESSEE WALKERS Competitive Trail Riding Report

August 19th. saw six Tennessee Walking Horses out on the trail at the Sundre AB. Competitive Trail Ride. Four Walkers were in the Novice Division while two were in the Intermediate Division.

The day was hot, even though there had been a couple of inches of rain the day before, the trail was tough with lots of mud and water to ride through but once you got up on the hills the view was lovely as we wound along the hillsides. Everyone was finished fairly early as each division had their own vet, so everyone was clocked out just after 8 a.m. 30 seconds apart with a 10 to 15 minute wait between the open, intermediate, and novice riders.

There was some confusion on the first part of the trail as a seismic crew had ribboned a trail with the same color ribbon through the bush just short of where we were to come out on to the trunk road.

Sunday morning Awards saw four of the six Walking Horses place; in Novice LWT - Dixie's Hot Chocolate (Dixie Verstraete) 1st with a score of 297 points, Novice HWT - Midnight Tin Drum (Rod Ball) 3rd with a score of 288. In Intermediate LWT - A Touch Of Classic (Mary Kruger) tied for 1st with a score of 297, and in Intermediate HWT - Golden Nugget (Diane Rempel) 5th with a score of 292.

Northfork Sky Walker (Jean Rempel) no placing. "Luke" pulled a hind shoe off damaging part of the hoof wall. The vet gave us a grade 2 lameness so no placing. Also, as we missed

about a mile of trail where the seismic had ribboned we had to ride about 3 miles extra to go and complete the course. Golden Dream (Sheila Haines) no placing. Due to a tack problem Sheila couldn't go with me to do the missed trail. Her score was 293. Results: Novice LWT - A Touch of Classic (Wendy Warren) 2nd with a score of 292; Novice HWT - Golden Nugget (Diane Rempel) 3rd with a score of 289. Best Gaited Horse Award - A Touch of Classic.

Wendy Warren is a friend of Diane's who has been helping condition Classic this year. This was Wendy's first competitive ride, and now she owns a nice halter (Best Gaited Horse Award) and no horse (though we know she can't wait to have her own horse one day).

Also on Sept 3rd three other Walking horses were out on the Klondike Trail at Fort Assiniboine AB. riding for Multiple Sclerosis. Northfork Sky Walker (Jean Rempel), Black Bart (Linda Block) and Golden Dream (Sheila Haines) were part of the 283 registered riders & drivers doing their part by riding thirty miles for M.S. They raised a total of \$41324.33.



GOOD HORSEKEEPING TIPS

I heard this from the Youngs at Lac La Biche, Alberta. Mix some oil of citronella into Vaseline (petroleum jelly) and apply it to your horse's ears, belly, underarms and face - any place the sandflies, black flies, buffalo gnats and other such tiny evil biting creatures are causing welts and pain.

It does help repel them and the Vaseline is soothing to the bites already inflicted. I just rub it onto my hands and then rub it into the horse's belly, face or whatever. It seems to keep the little pests out of the horse's ears too. (And I get nice soft, citronella smelling hands out of it too!)

You can get a small bottle of oil of citronella at the drugstore for about \$5.00. I put 2 to 3 teaspoons of it into half a jar of Vaseline, mix it thoroughly and let it sit to allow the scent to permeate the ointment.

TIME TO TRAIN

In our last issue, we had a question from Theresa and Mal Astles of Kinburn, Ontario about the best age to start riding a Walker.

They asked, "We understand that a Walker is best left until the fourth year before being ridden. Is this correct?"

Dear Theresa & Mal,

You don't have to wait until your Walker is four before you do any riding at all, but I will say that you need to be very careful of how much and what kind of riding you do before he is that age.

I got my first horse, a 3 1/2 year old Morgan gelding, about thirty years ago. I read everything I could find about horses, but a lot of it had a Morgan slant. Mary Jean Vasiloff, a well known breeder of purebred "Whippoorwill" Morgans, was one of the popular writers then. She was adamant that you should not get on a horse before he was three. A two year old could be trained to drive, learn about being responsive to the bridle, and become used to many new sights and sensations at this age without causing stress to his still developing leg bones. She also made the point that two year olds are still mentally immature.

Many other authorities agree. Karen Rodin Paulo, in an article "Conditioning for Endurance" (Western Horseman, Aug.'83) says, "Many endurance enthusiasts agree that the longer you wait to break your horse, the better. Preferably, stay off your horse until he is at least three; some people prefer to wait until the horse is five. Very seldom will endurance prospects be broke at the age of two; the common belief is to allow the horse time to grow and mature. The horse that is not ridden hard as a youngster will normally have a longer, more useful life than the horse that is used hard at the ages of one, two or three. This is mainly because their young bodies were not overstressed while they were still growing at a fairly rapid pace."

Dr. Tony J. Cunha, Dean Emeritis, School of Agriculture, California State Polytechnic University at Pomona, California, writes, in the November '86 Horse and Rider, "If we assume that a human has a lifespan of 70 years and the horse has a lifespan of 20 years, then a two year old horse might be comparable to a seven year old human. Most horses start training at one year of age, which is comparable to a human starting to train at three and a half years of age. At this young age, a horse's legs, bone, body, and its physiology system are not fully developed, especially when most are of the opinion that a horse does not mature until it is four or five years old."

One of the reasons that riding (and longing) can be so damaging to a youngster is the fact that their bones are not mature. In the October '77 Western Horseman, Vet's Corner, Ruth B. James, D.V.M. writes, "Compounding the problem is the fact that these animals are often under two

years of age. Their epiphyseal plates (the areas from which the bones grow) are not yet solidly formed and are still basically held together by cartilage. This is an ideal situation for damage to the joint surfaces and/or epiphyseal cartilages."

Robert M. Miller, D.V.M. wrote an article in Western Horseman, May '80, entitled "Too Young, Too Fat, Too Fast" in which he gives his opinion as to why European horses have gained the reputation of being much hardier than North American breeds. In a nutshell, he thinks that the reason is starting them too young, working them too hard and fast, and overfeeding them! In Europe, horses (other than race horses) are rarely put into training until ages three or four, and are then brought along slowly.

I did find one veterinarian who approves of starting two year olds. Here is what R.A. Greene, D.V.M. says in an article in *Horse of Course!*, November'79. He says, "The real problem is not in determining at what age work, or saddle training, should begin - the real problem is in knowing how much work is too much work for any given individual at a given stage of their development. Asking too much of any individual of any age can result in the production of a physical or emotional cripple that no amount of rehabilitation can salvage." ...

"I try to ride all of our two-year old Quarter Horses lightly for thirty days before turning them out to "grow up". And when I say lightly - I mean LIGHTLY. Over the thirty day period I spend a total of less than 10 hours in the saddle and the horses are trained EVERY day. By the end of that time, they are "broke to safely ride on down the road." They sure aren't "finished" but they'll walk, jog, lope, and back a few steps willingly. And, they're not afraid of rocks, trees, mud puddles, cows and cars, either."

"Training sessions start at ten minutes (by the clock) and work up gradually to a thirty minute "graduation" trail ride. Truthfully, on most days, I spend more time grooming and tacking up than I do in the saddle, but both of us enjoy every minute of it."

So, there you have some opinions of people who are authorities in their field. You may want to start your colt lightly at two or you may just want to do ground work and driving with him, and leave the riding until he's three. Just remember that he's not mature until about age five, so don't over do the work and training while he's a youngster. That way he'll still be sound, fresh and fit when he's twenty five!

I WANT TO KNOW...

ROSEMARY HARTLEY, NIPIGON, writes,

"We have a problem with some of the horses here rubbing their tails and manes; not all, but especially my gelding. The horses are all on a worming schedule and the test for worms has come back negative."

"We do have sand flies. The bug dope does not seem to help. Several suggestions to put oil mixtures on their tails seems to help, but not entirely. Wraps don't stay on and neither do tail bags, which we can't use anyway since the horses need their tails. Any suggestions for relief for our itchy horses and to take the disappointment off our faces as we see their beautiful tails all snarled into a "rat's nest" on top?"

Dear Rosemary,

With itchy tails, pinworms (Oxyuris equi) are always the first thing I suspect. If these have been ruled out, you could try washing the horse thoroughly around the tail area, then rinsing away any soap. Sometimes accumulated dirt and grime will start up an itch. I've sometimes had good luck stopping a horse from rubbing its tail by washing and drying, followed by an application of a mixture of petroleum jelly and oil of citronella (see Good Horsekeeping Tips), reapplied daily. The petroleum jelly is soothing and the oil of citronella repels bugs. At least it can't hurt to try it!

Sometimes bored horses in a small enclosure will scratch, almost for something to do, it seems. Changing their surroundings to something more stimulating might help in this situation.

Do any of our readers have helpful tips for this problem?

Dear Rosemary,

My first suspicion when I see a horse, especially a gelding, scratching his tail, is - a dirty sheath that needs cleaning. He can't get at the itch but he has to do SOMETHING, so he scratches his tail into a rat's nest. Washing out the sheath with warm water and removing the greasy clods that collect in there, may just solve your gelding's problem. Don't be shy! The gentle massaging with a soft, warm wet cloth usually encourages a gelding to "drop" making the job very much easier.

Mares can have a similar problem with the waxy, oily secretion that builds up between the teats.

Another possibility is lice. The base of the tail and under the mane are prime sites for these little bloodsuckers. Putting a little louse powder on these areas when they are clean and dry won't do any harm and may be just what's needed.



Biography of the Biography

Canada's Walking Horses have been greatly influenced by something at the 1960 National Tennessee Walking Horse Celebration in Shelbyville, Tennessee, U.S.A. It was not a horse, but the pre-publication sale of a book that was not yet complete, a book that sold out the first printing of 10,000 copies and went into a second printing of 20,000 copies within three months. The name of this best selling Walking Horse book is *Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse* by Ben A. Green.

What has that got to do with Canada's Walking Horses? Pearl Tompkins has credited a winter spent studying Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse as the basis for her decision to concentrate on the Merry Boy line. Pearl's interpretation of what she read helped shape the Canadian Walking Horse, particularly in western Canada.

It is important to note that this choice of bloodlines was strictly Pearl's interpretation. Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse itself does not endorse any one family of Walking Horses. The book salutes all of the best Walking Horses in the first 124 years of the breed's existence, 1837 - 1960, including families that are nearly extinct now. It says little about Merry Boy. In fact Biography can truly be said to be the most thoroughly objective work ever written about the Tennessee Walking Horse breed. Here's why.

Ben A. Green, author of *Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse* was not a horseman. He had never owned or ridden a horse at the time *Biography* was published. Ben Green was a newspaper man, editor of the Shelbyville Times-Gazette, a 5 day a week newspaper.


Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse was the second of three books Ben Green wrote and the only one on horses. His first book was A History of Tuscaloosa, Alabama 1816 - 1949, which has been reprinted. His third book, The Legacy of Jack Daniels, written in 1961, is the history of the Jack Daniels whiskey distillery in Lynchburg, Tennessee. The rights to this book were purchased by the Jack Daniels company and the book used in promotions and tours of the distillery.

Ben Green describes Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse as "a newspaperman's version of the 'Big Story' of the Tennessee Walking Horse." At the time the book was written the standards of professionalism in the newspaper trade included objectivity. Ben Green alludes to this standard in his foreward:

"Every effort has been made to present facts as fully qualified facts, opinions as clearly expressed opinions. Any deviation from this policy is unintentional, and corrections will be appreciated."

Ben had 35 years of practise at writing objectively in his profession, but he also knew when to drop the role of reporter and become personally involved, as we'll hear about later. His quest for accuracy was aided by the fact that he had no personal interest in horses. His personal interest was in the history and its value to those of us who love the Walking Horse.

Ben Green devoted nearly half of his book to the "community miracle" of the National Celebration. He reported the first enforcement of the first law against soring and considered it the most significant thing to come out of the 1960 Celebration. He also quotes predictions made by the nationally respected veterinarian, Dr. J.M. Jones of Lewisburg, Tennessee, that the Tennessee Walking Horse breed would cease to exist if soring and man-made gaits become the performance standard. Dr. Jones is just one of





many experts quoted in the book who insist that the hereditary running walk is the essential characteristic that defines the breed.

Thirty five years later we find that what happened inside the show ring at the 1960 Celebration did not stop soring. Soring got worse, not better, during the 1960's and is still a problem today. Today the abundance of ambling pacers, rackers, trotters, and horses so mixed gaited they don't know what to do demonstrates that the Tennessee Walking Horse breed is losing its gait and identity, just as Dr. Jones prophesied.

The passage of time has shown that the most significant thing to come out of the 1960 Celebration was Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse. The book sparked its own "community miracle" in an international community of Walking Horse lovers. It gave focus and direction to breeding programs throughout North America. This book has been the catalyst and vital reference source for the plantation Walking Horse industry and continues to play a significant role in saving the Walking Horse breed from the self-destructive course the show industry has chosen.

It was no accident that publication of the book coincided, as closely as possible, with the 1960 Celebration. 1960 marked the beginning of the centennial of the Walking Horse. It was Leland C. Fritzsche, breeder of Fritzsche's Merry Boy, who suggested that the centennial be the occasion for a massive Tennessee Walking Horse promotion campaign. His suggestion determined the publication date of the *Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse*. Ben Green saw the future of the breed and focused his promotion campaign on the pleasure Walker.

It is customary, when publishing a book, to complete the manuscript, then print it. Composition and production are sequential. Newspapers, on the other hand, are produced from back to front and from inside to outside with production and compositon going on simultaneously. The less dated items go to the press while the time sensitive front news pages are being written.

Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse was produced newspaper style. The book was printed by the

Parthenon Press in Nashville, Tennessee. As soon as Ben finished writing a chapter he drove to Nashville to deliver it to the printer for typesetting. A second trip to Nashville was required to pick up the galley proofs. When these were corrected a third trip was required to return them to Nashville for the actual printing. In between trips Ben wrote another chapter. It was a hectic but familiar routine for the editor of a daily newspaper.

This book schedule, wrapped around his full time job as news editor, no doubt helped Ben through those first dark days after his beloved wife, Alice, died on Aug. 11, 1960. The book is dedicated to Alice Green and states that her death occurred "as the last chapter of this book was being written." There are hints within the book itself that this last chapter to be written was actually Chapter VII, which is the middle of the book. It includes the results of the 1960 Celebration.

Ben Green married again in Aug. 1961. During the breed centennial, 1961 - 1965, Ben travelled around the country speaking to various groups to promote both his book and the breed. He was named an Ambassador of Good Will for the Tennessee Walking Horse by the Governor of Tennessee. In 1962 he started *Voice of the Tennessee Walking Horse* magazine, which is now the official breed joural published by the TWHBEA.

At one point Ben bought a registered Tennessee Walking Horse mare as part of promoting the book. The mare proved to be in foal. Ben still had no interest in horses but kept and cared for the mare until after the foal was born because that was the honorable thing to do. The foal, a filly, was named "Dolly" in honor of Ben's son, Bruce's, fiancée. The mare and foal were both sold as soon as it was convenient to do so.

It is this same son, the Very Reverend Bruce Green, Grace Episcopal Church, Carthage, Missouri, who has so graciously supplied the information given here and served as representive of the Green family in permitting Four Craftsmen Publishing to publish an authorized, revised edition of *Biography of the Tennessee Walking Horse* ISBN 0 - 9639644 - 2 - 9, which will be available later this year.
