HORSE LORE

Sally Gibb, Blackstock, ON

Here's some "horseman's trivia" which may be useful. Have you ever had a foal and wondered how big it was going to be at maturity? Well, a couple of years ago my farrier (who is very active in Pony Club and is full of interesting trivia) told me that if you measure a horse from the middle of the knee to the hairline on the coronet, that measurement, in inches, will convert to what the animal will be in hands! For example, if you measure from the break in the knee to where the hair starts at the top of the hoof, and get 15 inches, the horse will be 15 hands high at maturity!

I couldn't believe this, so after he told me, my daughter and I took out a tape measure and tried it. And, YES! The inches do correspond to their heights.

Last year my husband came back from a Mennonite place with a four month old draft horse/Hackney cross. She's a stout, big boned build, and we wondered how tall she'd be. Out came the tape measure: 15 1/2 inches. She will only be 15:2 at maturity. She is now two and about 15 hands.

A pony foal we had born this spring measured 13 1/4 inches. Perfect for the girls doing Pony Club games

where they're asked to do vaults on and off the pony. As the foal's mother was a 12:2 Welsh cross and the father was a small Quarter Horse, we really couldn't have been certain of her mature size without the tool of measuring the cannon and ankle.

My last example is quite amazing! I can't help but feel that there is an analogy to Big Ben, an 18 hand world class jumper who came from much smaller (15:3 - 16 hh) parents.

Four years ago on St. Patrick's Day, one of our TWH mares gave birth to a skinny, long legged, look-like-a-moose foal. Both she and the Standardbred father were 15:2 hands - BUT! - both had come from larger (16:1 hh) parents. As I didn't know about the measuring trick when Paddy was born, we didn't measure him until he was over a year old. Voila' Sixteen - no, almost 17 inches! Paddy is now coming four and is 16:3 hands. We hope to have some fun teaching him to be a jumper!

So, everybody, run out with your measuring tapes and see if this works for you. Hope somebody else finds it as useful as I did!

It is much easier for her to keep up to me on my seven year old Tennessee Walker. She has joined horse 4-H (she has been in the beef club for five years) and is really having fun. We live on a 180 head commercial cow ranch so Brandy has to learn to chase cows; we started her on that late last summer, and Lindsay even had her doing a few small jumps."

"We live at Mortlach which is the best field trial grounds in North America. American dog trainers have been coming to our farm since the early 1940s. They train dogs to hunt the prairie chicken. They ride Tennessee Walkers because of their smooth gait, as they spend long days in the saddle at a stiff running walk. 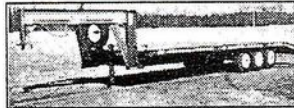
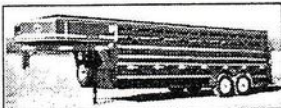
"I enjoyed last year's WHN reading and look forward to more in '96."

SPECIAL NEWS RELEASE

The *Canadian Registry of the Tennessee Walking Horse* is pleased to announce the recent production of a full color, glossy brochure. Following is a brief explanation of its contents, creation, financial circumstances and delivery.

The Western Heritage Centre in Cochrane, Alberta approached one of our Walking Horse owners with regard to our breed submitting to them photographs of some of our horses. They were very specific in what they wanted. We met their deadline and a sufficient supply of photographs were delivered in all categories required. They had already put together a script about our breed and as chance had it, the script was reviewed and found to be somewhat lacking. A new script was submitted along with a sufficient resource of photos and YES, the Tennessee Walking Horse will be represented at the museum.

And so, after a mad rush at collecting and producing that effort, it was suggested that perhaps there was enough material in a form that could be easily transformed into a much needed Canadian Walking Horse brochure. An incredibly expeditious effort went into producing a conceptual brochure that was presented at the March 2, 1996 meeting of the Canadian Registry of the Tennessee Walking Horse Board of Directors. The concept was agreed upon and subsequently a budget approved. From there numerous quotes were solicited and a printing company determined. And then, 'voilà', a brochure.

The new brochure was created to announce the versatility of our breed and we hope you will note that, both in the slogan and pictures chosen. Many thanks go out to all those who contributed pictures. With regard to pictures, it should be noted that any picture represented in the Canadian Registry brochure was selected to represent a quality of our horses best illustrated in that photo, i.e. disposition, trail riding, ranching, show, etc..

All Walking Horse clubs and organizations across Canada can soon expect to be receiving sample brochures. Following that, additional brochures will be offered to all clubs, breeders and individuals on a cost recovery basis. Please contact your local club or the Canadian Registry of the Tennessee Walking Horse for details in this regard.

It is the sincere hope of the Canadian Registry that the brochure will meet and perhaps surpass the expectations of all Canadian Walking Horse owners and breeders and that we can all be proud of having a truly Canadian brochure.

Alberta Horse Improvement Program Discontinued

Over the past several months, the Horse Industry Section has consulted with a good cross-section of people in the horse industry about the Horse Improvement Program. Through this process, we concluded:

1. There is wide spread industry support for the horse evaluation system that has been developed over the past twenty years. The system is perhaps the best tool in North America for accurately describing marketable traits in horses. Properly applied, the system can give a person an accurate impression of the value of a horse for breeding and/or marketing purposes.
2. The Horse Improvement Program conducted by Alberta Agriculture is no longer an effective way to use the evaluation system. This special show is not attracting sufficient breeders or horses to maintain industry credibility. It is costly for people to prepare and attend the program, and loss of money was a detriment to participation.
3. Breed Improvement should be an industry initiative. Our function is to assist breeders and breed organizations when possible and appropriate.

As a result the government sponsored Horse Improvement Program has been discontinued. The Horse Industry Section is still strongly committed to the evaluation concept and look forward to working in partnership with breeders or breed groups in this area. We would like to thank the hundreds of individuals who have participated and/or helped in planning and conducting the program over the past twenty years.

First Clinic of the Season

In mid March Dianne Little conducted a clinic on achieving the flat walk at Cloudwalker Stables arena, Strathmore, AB. The clinic was a two day course for riders, horses, ground attendants and observers, entitled "Walk before you Run". Dianne did her usual thoroughly professional job and introduced some very innovative approaches for training and understanding the flat walk. Each rider was video taped on opening day and again toward the end of the clinic. The tapes were a testament to the achievements made over the two day period. Tape copies were made available for each rider.

As it turned out the clinic grew into more than an instructional session. The two days blossomed into a period of fellowship, horse talk, and good relaxed fun. All of which was underlain by the boundless energy and enthusiasm of Dianne Little. Bill and Deloris of

Cloudwalker Stables added western hospitality with hotcakes & coffee on opening morning and lunches each day.

Dianne concentrated on showing the very different abilities of each horse and how to ride to achieve the best flat walk possible. Though the Tennessee Walking Horse is inherently a 4 beat walker, the horse does not achieve this result without training and patience. Dianne spent the two days working individually and in groups with the riders showing how to achieve the loose, head bobbing, driving four beat walk. The effectiveness of her message became evident as the clinic progressed.

Dianne is being pressed to do more of this work and at a later date this year will be conducting a clinic devoted to the canter.

TROUBLE'S CONTRIBUTION TO THE TWH BREED

Very little has been written about Trouble 370306 even though he was a World's Champion Walking Stallion, and in 1946, he was Senior Grand Champion of the Iowa State Stallion Show.

Trouble is listed in the Register of the Tennessee Walking Horse Breeders' Association studbook, Volume I, as a sorrel horse with both hind socks, star and snip, foaled May 20, 1936. He was by Last Chance out of Nellie Essay. His sire, Last Chance, was bred by A.M. Dement of Wartrace, Tennessee. Last Chance, a chestnut, was by Hunter's Allen F-10 out of Merry Legs F-4. Trouble's dam, Nellie Essay, was bred by Sam Lentz and registered as the property of S.A. Peterson, Farmington, Tenn. She was a sorrel mare with star by Red Hal out of Sadie B. by Sims' Wilkes F-37. S.A. Peterson was also listed as Trouble's breeder though the horse was registered the property of Beech & Endsley, Belfast, Tenn.

Trouble's half brother, John A.'s Chance 491026, by Last Chance out of Goldust Maid, was a prominent palomino stallion. Vance Paschal said he was the best yellow breeding stallion he'd ever seen. Trouble, however, never gained recognition as a prominent TWH stallion even though his get have had a significant impact on the TWH breed in the West & Canada. Trouble was trained by Elsie Darrah's husband, Carl, and spent his last years on their farm in Kansas.

Silvertip-Rickey 473752 was by Trouble out of Strolling Beauty A. 430763. (She was by Last Chance Jr. 390091 who was a full brother to Trouble). Rickey, in turn, sired 4 stallions: Lightfoot Rickey 501200, Reveille Boy 570415, Golden Copperbottom 550224, and Rickey's Silver Star 591257.

Lightfoot Rickey sired Colonel D., a white horse that was the grandsire of Red Cloud V. 653075, one of Gene Autrey's Champions.

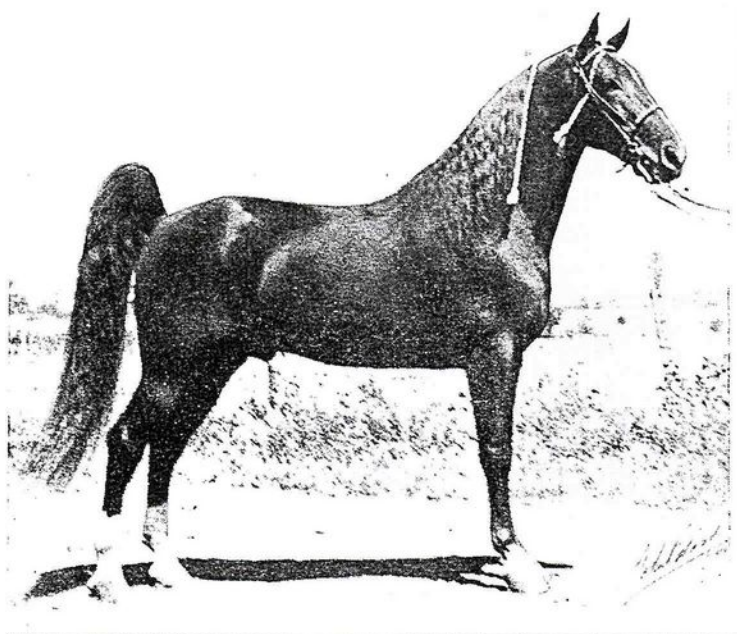

Sago (Black Beauty II) 540714, a granddaughter of Trouble, was a well known foundation mare in Western Montana and Alberta, Canada. She was by Silvertip-Rickey out of Black Beauty Allen 440890. Pearl Tompkins bought her from my mother, Marie McBroom, when she was 6 years old.

Beauty's Sage King, out of Sago by Hey Joe, became a prominent Canadian breeding stallion. He was born April 25, 1960 on Pearl Tompkin's ranch. In October of 1967 he was sold to Doreen Stanley-Clarke, Alberta. During this time he sired the good Alberta stallion, King's Stormy Mist. When he was 18 years old McDonald Farms bought him. Sage King continued to sire foals until he was 30 years old. He died at age 32. Jo-Anne McDonald wrote Sage King's story which can be found in the Jan/Feb, 1988 issue of the *Walking Horse News*. Sage King was a great-grandson of Trouble, and passed on Trouble's bloodlines to many mares, stallions, and geldings throughout the Western states and Canada.

Trouble's Josephine 442379 by Trouble out of Josephine McDaniel 440364 was the dam of Midnight Trouble 530774. Midnight Trouble sired Trouble's Honey 684664. Trouble's Honey was owned and bred by Clarence Pursley of Kremlin, Montana, and then owned by Marsha Wickman of Conrad, Montana until her death in July of 1992. Marsha Wickman's mares, King Pin's Honey B

891354 & Barons Nut N Honey 901566 are out of Trouble's Honey. Rainbow's Treasure 773833, owned by Glenna Holm of Rosebud, Montana is a granddaughter of Trouble's Honey.

Joseph's Trouble R. 816721, a grandson of Trouble's Josephine, stands at stud near Pomeroy, WA. He is owned by Larry & Juli Trushenski.

A buckskin stallion, Classic Cadillac 905593, owned by Linda Wuest of Coer d'Alene, Idaho goes back to Trouble's Josephine through the stallion Sun's Golden Trouble 570602.

Nugget's Summer Sun CDN 845, TWHBEA 908041, is a palomino stallion standing at Tenkula Farm, Nolalu, Ontario, Canada. He is owned by Raili Tenkula. He goes back to Trouble through Big Sky Trouble Boy, Midnight Trouble, and Trouble's Josephine. Big Sky Trouble Boy's picture (with Frank Smith seated) is on page 15 of the May-June 1992 issue of the *Walking Horse News*. Raili Tenkula's foundation mare, Melody O' Rollin Hills 590245, went back to Trouble through Colonel D., Lightfoot Rickey, and Silvertip-Rickey. She was bred & trained by my mother, Marie McBroom. Her story & pedigree can be found in the July-August 1992 issue of the *Walking Horse News*.

Chancer's Troubles 826689, a black stallion owned by Peter Raab of Bellingham, WA goes back to Trouble through his dam, Stormy Trouble 601058 who was out of Trouble's Josephine.

Sundown's Woodstock 812913, a bay stallion, owned by Woodhills Walkers, Smith, Alberta, is by Boothill's Sundown whose dam was Lassie's Shadow by Beauty's Sage King, a great-grandson of Trouble.

El Brillante 856629 is a chestnut stallion owned by Henriette Petrich of Arlington, WA. He goes back to Trouble through his sire, Merry Go Rambler 686595 whose dam was Spring Valley Rose 642888. Rose was sired by Golden Sun's Trouble 570602 whose dam was Trouble's Josephine. He also goes back to Trouble through Reveille Boy & Chiquita Sago 550695. She was a great-granddaughter of Trouble and Reveille Boy was a grandson.

The palomino stallion, Never Say Never 834581, owned by Margaret Muers of Arlington, WA is out of Trouble's Foxy Lady 762789. Foxy Lady was sired by Golden Sun's Trouble. (Note: from what I can understand by pedigrees & reg. numbers, Sun's Golden Trouble 570602 & Golden Sun's Trouble 570602 are the same stallion)

Merry Go Rambler 686595, the chestnut stallion, owned by Janet Franklin of Otis Orchards, WA goes back to Trouble through his dam, Spring Valley Rose by Golden Sun's Trouble.

The Hot Spot 912143, a chestnut & white pinto stallion owned by Janet Franklin of Otis Orchards, WA goes back to Trouble through his dam, Best Wishes 840663. Best Wishes is a granddaughter of Trouble's Peek - A - Boo.

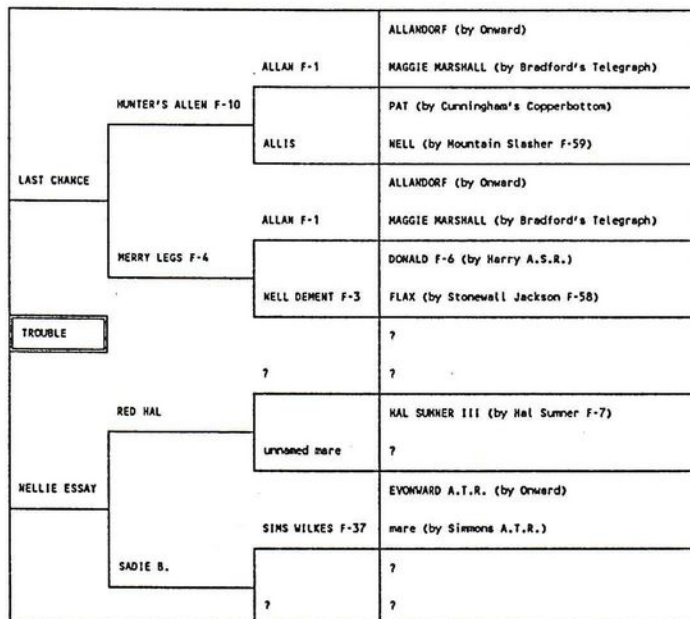
Velvet Spirit F-88 905591, a black stallion owned by Janet Franklin, also goes back to Trouble through his dam's sire, Merry Go Rambler 686595, whose dam was Spring Valley Rose by Golden Sun's Trouble.

Rita's Pride 893714 is a chestnut stallion whose sire is out of Trouble's Foxy Lady 762789. Foxy Lady is by the stallion, Trouble's Sugartime 662916 who is by Golden Sun's Trouble out of Trouble's Josephine.

Allen's Secret Star 770417, a chestnut stallion owned by Beverly Davie of Ahsahka, Idaho goes back to Trouble six times through Beauty's Sage King 602247, HD's Easy Money 590519 (a mare), Colonel D. 540856, Golden Copperbottom 550224, Vonnie-Marie 540635, and Silvertip-Rickey who was the sire or grandsire of these stallions and mares.

Thing's Last Son 792829, a black stallion owned by Russ and Barbara DeVore of Polson, Montana goes back to Trouble through Lightfoot Rickey 501200 & Cherokee Rose 11 550056, both of these through Silvertip-Rickey.

Dee-Jay's Bee Bopper 873583, a chestnut stallion



bred by Marlin Matechuk of Cochrane, Alberta, is by Beauty's Trail's End 752154 (Bopper was the top 2 year old in the 1989 Alberta Horse Improvement class and the AWhA Futurity.) Beauty's Trail's End's dam was Sago (Black Beauty 11) by Silvertip-Rickey, a son of Trouble. Many Alberta horses trace back to Trouble through Beauty's Trail's End, a great grandson.

Freckles Mc. 708006, a strawberry roan sabino owned by John Nolin of Sedro Wooley, WA goes back to Trouble through Rickey's Silver Star 591257 who is by Silvertip-Rickey.

Sparky By Golly 881119, a strawberry roan sabino stallion, owned by Don & Joann Sapaugh of Scio, Oregon goes back to Trouble through Freckles Mc.

Trailmasters Thor 886662 goes back to Trouble 4 times through The Going Thing 692116 whose dam was Syringa Lady 612388 out of a mare named Miss Petunia 571156 whose sire was Lightfoot Rickey. His dam was Rocky's Flying Angel 721787, a mare by Gold Rush Rocky 664916 out of Miss Petunia whose dam, Cherokee Rose II 5500056, was sired by Silvertip-Rickey. Her dam was Dixie LaMarr 474575.

Miss Petunia was bred by Ethna Friesen's husband, John. She was line bred to Silvertip-Rickey. Several of Ethna's broodmares were out of Miss Petunia by Gold Rush Rocky. These mares passed on their Trouble bloodlines to many TWH throughout the West and Canada.

Rose Harmon of Elk, WA owns a palomino mare, Sun's Orphan Lady 892255 who traces back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey and Midnight Trouble. Her colt, Merryman's May Day took 1st place in the weanling class at the Inland Empire TWH show in 1994.

Jo-Anne McDonald owned Laddie's Monte Ray 685131 (deceased), a sorrel stallion that went back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey twice, once through Reveille Boy and once through Lightfoot Rickey. Laddie's Monte Ray sired Kary's Jeepers who is the grandsire of the palomino stallion, Nugget's Summer Sun. Jo-Anne said they have 11 mares that go back to Trouble through Sago (Black Beauty II), Rickey's Silver Star, or Reveille Boy. These 3 were all sired by Silvertip-Rickey. McDonald's young stallion, Canadian Yankee 931816, goes back to Trouble through Rickey's Silver Star and a palomino mare named Golden Gold Glory 622662. Canadian Yankee was sired by Go Boy's Crown Royal and will replace him as a McDonald Farms sire.

J. Hazel Paton of Oxbow, Sask. sent me the pedigree of her 28 year old mare that goes back to Trouble through

his daughter, Trouble's Josephine. This mare was bred by the late Calvin Miller of Rhame, ND. Glover's Allen 400257 and Trouble's Josephine 442379 had Lady High Heels 473441. Lady High Heels and Golden Sun Allen had Lady's High Calico 540232. Lady's High Calico was the dam of the Millers' well known stallion, Sun's Merry Man 620157, by Reycliff Mid-Merry 561395. Sun's Merry Man and Playboy's Misty Doll 633836 had Sun's Misty Dew 677162, Hazel's mare. Sun's Merry Man, a great great grandson of Trouble, passed along Trouble's genes to many Walking Horses, especially in the western U.S. and Canada.

Ann Coleman of Loveland, CO writes that her mare, Ott's Betty Boo, goes back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey 5 times. Ann purchased Betty Boo from Robert Ott of Apache Junction, Arizona. Mr. Ott used to live near Paradise, Montana where he raised Tennessee Walkers.

Mike & Gaylynn Wagner of Helena, Montana own the sorrel stallion, Sun's Dashing Diamond 887939. This stallion goes back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey.

Pam & Bill Loney of White Sulphur Springs, Montana own the mare, Montana Midnight 882829. This chestnut mare goes back to Trouble on her dam's side through Midnight Bond 765371 sired by Rocky's Gold Bond 702746. Gold Bond was sired by Gold Rush Rocky 664916 who goes back to Trouble through Sugartime's Pride. Rocky's Gold Bond's dam was Miss Petunia by Lightfoot Rickey out of Cherokee Rose. All of these go back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey. Pam said that Montana Midnight had a colt in 1995 by their Generator stallion that they named Montana Rickey.

Ethna Friesen bred the mare Sacia's Pride 745076 owned by Allanna Jackson, who writes *Backyard Walkin'*, and also wrote the very helpful book, *Training Tips*". Sacia's Pride goes back to Trouble through her sire, Gold Rush Rocky, whose dam, Sugartime's Pride 633085, is by Frosty's Stormy Son 601423 by Rickey's Frosty Son 531155 by Silvertip-Rickey. Frosty's Stormy Son's dam was a chestnut mare named Holly 511017 who was also by Silvertip-Rickey out of Ruby Jones 431032. My mother, Marie McBroom, bought Ruby Jones from Tom Moss in 1949 or 1950.

Jo-Anne McDonald said they also have 3 mares that go back to Trouble through Mack K's Handshaker.

Mack K's Handshaker 561320 is the well known stallion that started the Shaker line of TWH. Many people are unaware that he is a grandson of Trouble. Trouble and Black Nancy Mc. 441895 had the mare, Deep Purple 411908. The cross between Deep Purple and Midnight Mack

K. 490450 resulted in Mack K's Handshaker.

The Handshaker line is probably the most numerous branch of the family that has disseminated Trouble's genes throughout the breed. Shaker's Shocker, a son of Mack K's Handshaker, was a great grandson of Trouble.

Snethen's Magic Fire 881279 owned by John Nolin of Sedro Wooley, WA is a dark chestnut horse with 4 stockings that goes back to Trouble through Mack K's Handshaker on his dam's side and Silvertip-Rickey on his sire's side.

Handshaker's Thing 892719 a brown stallion owned by Russ and Barbara DeVore of Polson, Montana goes back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey on his sire's side, and through Mack K's Handshaker on his dam's side.

A pinto stallion that goes back to Trouble is Bar Max 906864. This horse stands at stud at J. Decker's Walking Horses in Oologah, Oklahoma.

Earl Jones of Powell, Wyoming raised TWH for many years and quite a few of his mares went back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey. Our mare, Tegun's Mountain Fawn, was purchased from Earl in 1989. O.V.McCurry of Trego, Montana has brood mares that go

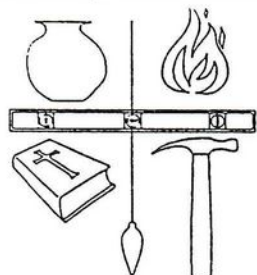
back to Trouble through Silvertip-Rickey. Our stallion, GLL's Sun Chief, was purchased from Mr.McCurry in 1992. GLL'S Sun Chief 904047 goes back to Trouble 5 times. Our mare, Tegun's Mt. Fawn 861954 goes back to Trouble 3 times. Their off spring, a pinto filly, Chief's Mountain Honey is owned by Pam Loney of White Sulphur Springs, Montana.

Fifty years ago, my mother, Marie McBroom, saw Trouble's picture in a catalog in 1946. She said all of the foundation TWH and champions were in that catalog. She found out about the Walking Horse registry through that same catalog and wrote to the TWHBEA in Lewisburg, TN. That is how she found Silvertip-Rickey.

Trouble's Josephine, Silvertip-Rickey, and Deep Purple, Mack K's Handshaker's dam, passed their sire, Trouble's, foundation blood on to strengthen the gait, conformation, and elegance of hundreds of Tennessee Walking Horses. Pintos, palominos, bays, blacks, buckskins, browns, sorrels, and chestnuts - all have given us a bit of Trouble.

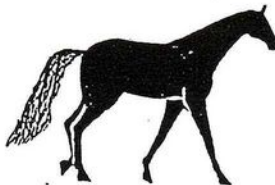

FROM THE DUSTY FILES OF WHN

15 Years Ago in WHN - March/April, 1981

Four pages of text and seven of ads made up the fifth annual stallion edition of WHN.

A Riders' and Judges' Clinic with Dr. Bob Womack was announced on the first page, to be held at Williamson's Westridge Farms, Priddis on May 9 & 10.

Some items from the news: Roberta Brebner, Williams Lake, B.C. reported that she'd just returned from a trip to Arkansas where she purchased a 3 year old black mare (Perfection's Gay Lad x Copy's Chi Omega). Mae & David Dingwall of Castleton, ON had purchased a 5 year old sorrel mare (Delight's Heir x a Society Man mare) named Society Lady T. in Shelbyville. Mrs. Alex Patterson of Cawston, B.C. had sold her big roan TWH mare, Ladybird and purchased Sunbeam's Molly B. from Fabros of Kimberley. Betty Motherwell & Sandra Karl of Quesnel had just purchased 4 mares and Sandra had bought Rockette's Rocket from Gladys Ferree of Kalispell, MT.

10 Years Ago in WHN - March/April, 1986

On the cover was a picture of Alberta's first TWHBEA Director, Ellwood (Al) Smith of Donalda, with his TWH mare, Marquita's Rambler.

Articles included Training with Diane Sept, Colour Inheritance in TWH by M. Lacy, Why Won't My Walking Horse Walk? by Beverley McPherson, and Thoughts on Training a Young Walker by John Gardner. There was the usual news roundup from across Canada and the U.S. plus reports from the YWHA and CWHA, and Jo Kingsland's Manes & Tales.

5 pages of classified ads and two of stallion photo ads rounded out the issue. Stallions featured were Ebony's Jack Daniels 753715, Kary's Jeepers 756166, Rockette's Rocket 732407, Red Carbon and Delight's Shadow Man.

THE BOOKSHELF

HORSEFEATHERS - Facts versus Myths about your Horse's Health

by David W. Ramey, D.V.M.

Listed on the cover as "The perfect antidote to misinformation about equine health care" this 211 page book is just that. Where most "vet books" make me feel that horses must be the most sickly, accident prone animals ever known, reading *Horsefeathers* restores my belief in the saying, "As healthy as a horse".

Horsefeathers is organized into six parts:

- I. The Things Done to (and for) Horses - diagnostics, therapeutics and drugs;
- II. Feeds and Feeding - what's in the feed, feeding the adult horse, and youth, pregnancy and other stresses;
- III. Routine Care - vaccination, deworming and teeth;
- IV. When Things Go Wrong - colics, strangles and wounds;
- V. The Musculoskeletal System - legs, hooves and navicular disease (the big myth);
- VI. Miscellany - Behaviour and pet peeves.

There is a wealth of common sense as well as veterinary information in this book, presented in an entertaining and humorous way, and backed up with full references for every chapter. Anyone reading it will come away with a better understanding of the horse, and less tendency to jump to conclusions about the animal's health. And unlike most vet books, you'll chuckle as you read it.

For almost all horse breeds the majority of stallions cover less than three mares, and the majority of owners have less than three mares. Few mares are bred by quality stallions because too many mare owners own stallions. Many foals are not marketable.

Most mare owners cannot justify owning a stallion if profitability is a main goal. In general, mares are best sent to breeding farms. The three primary areas to consider when selecting a stallion to breed your good mare are: the stallion, farm and cost.

The Stallion

The stallion contributes half of the genetic makeup of the foal. The selection of the stallion should be based primarily on his production record. Look for a stallion that has proven he can consistently produce foals that can perform well and are in demand in the marketplace.

As a basic criteria, buyers want a horse that meets a minimum standard for conformation and temperament. This means the horse is required to be attractive, sound, athletic and easily trained. When comparing stallions, use a percentage of those that fit the selection criteria (i.e. X percent foals earned points, won championships or are being used on ranches).

If a stallion is young and/or has not sired foals so the true siring ability of the stallion can be assessed, mare owners should look at the performance record and conformation of the stallion himself. It has been proven that the better a horse performs, the more likely he will sire foals that can also perform. As well, the better the conformation and temperament, the more likely he will sire desirable foals, thereby reducing the risk.

A stallion's pedigree can provide insight into his ability to sire marketable foals. Pedigree is only useful if the stallion has a desirable conformation and style. Beware of horses where you have to look at the grandparents or further back to find individuals that have produced.

When assessing the pedigree, all individuals on the same level in a pedigree contribute equally to the genetic makeup. As well, for each generation you go back, the genetic contribution is reduced by half.

In other words, sires and dams contribute twice as much genetically as grandparents. Stallions standing at stud with no production or performance records by and out of parents that also have no production or performance records have significantly less chance of producing foals that can perform or are marketable.

The Farm

The farm where a stallion stands at stud is an important factor in determining where to breed your mare. The farm must have adequate facilities to handle the incoming mares. The management of the farm is as important as the horse for getting mares in foal.

Mare owners should ask questions about the farm and management. How many mares do you plan to breed to the stallion? What was the conception rate per cycle and the percentage of mares that had foals from those bred last year? When do you want mares to arrive? How long are they there on average?

The Cost


The last area of concern is cost and return. There are two costs associated with sending mares to be bred - the service fee and mare care/veterinary fee. Mare owners should look at the expected total cost of getting the mare in foal relative to the foal's expected return.

Stallions that are in the hands of owners who have programs that enhance the marketability and who will help you market your foals are worth more than those who do not. Find out the sale price range of offspring from the stallion. This will provide an idea of whether the resulting foal has a good chance of meeting production costs.

In summary, the selection of a stallion can make or break your breeding program. Plan on attending sales and other activities where you can find the stallion's offspring. Try to determine if they stack up and then make your decision based on facts and comparisons.

WHEN IS A HORSE SHOW NOT A HORSE SHOW?

- WHEN IT IS "THE CANADIAN FUTURITY"

Horses from time immemorial have provoked competition, initially between themselves for survival, and in recent history between horse owners for pride and economics. Horse shows have evolved from simple Saturday night get-togethers to multi-day shows drawing people from a large area. There will always be a horse show of some sort where a few owners get together to compare animals.

Once man became a factor in the competition, complication followed. In competitions such as racing, the winner was easily determined, but in other competitions the winner was not so readily identified. Consequently opinion was invited on the merits of individual horses - judges were invented. Through the years horse shows became the format to decide which horse best exemplified the best of all characteristics. Today each horse or class is judged on criteria determined by the governing body of specific breeds (Arabian, Tennessee Walker etc.), or specific disciplines (hunters, jumpers, dressage etc.). It is the judge's responsibility to decide the winners based on this set of criteria.

Most Canadian horse shows employ one judge, usually a specialist in a specific breed or discipline. The entire class enters the ring one after another. Each entry is assessed on individual merit and compared with every other entry in the class. The judge then places (or pins) the class from first to sixth place based upon the prescribed criteria for that class. The judge is not required to provide any written materials other than placings; he is not required to justify his opinion unless a protest is filed. It is rare for the opinion of a judge to be overturned unless he has violated some rule.

For Tennessee Walking Horse line, in hand or halter classes the horse is judged 40% on Way of Going, 30% on Conformation and Appearance, and 30% on Manners.

"The Canadian Futurity" of the Tennessee Walking Horse employs one judge, a Tennessee Walking Horse pleasure horse specialist. Each horse is presented to the judge as an individual entry, and the judge evaluates each horse. The written evaluation includes a numeral score in each area as well as general comments on the horse. Without totalling the score, the judge turns in his evaluation sheet on each horse before he evaluates the next horse. The assistant secretary totals the evaluation sheet and enters all figures in the computer. When all the horses in a class have been evaluated, the totals are compared and the horses pinned. Each horse is not compared to other horses, but is judged according to the breed standard. The owner receives a copy of the evaluation of his horse and other statistics for the class (high score, low score, range of scores and averages).

The evaluation criteria for the Futurity Weanling,

Yearling and Two Year Old classes is, Front limbs 20 points; Hind limbs 20 points; Head, neck, body, and balance 20 points; type 20 points; and Movement 60 points, for a total of 140 points.

The philosophy of "The Canadian Futurity" is not that of a traditional horse show designed to pick the best horse; but rather to evaluate each horse, identifying strengths and weaknesses and communicate this to the owner. The goal is the improvement of the Tennessee Walking Horse in Canada. The Futurity is interested in the early identification of young horses based on soundness and movement. The Futurity evaluates and identifies potential. This potential may not always be realized, but there are elements common to most successful animals no matter where and how the horse is to be used. The emphasis placed on each of these elements is in keeping with what has been identified as the desirable characteristics required in our horses. The Futurity encourages breeders to develop a plan and produce horses to meet the breed standard. The objective is not to make all horses the same, but to identify the sound, athletic, and trainable horse - a horse which is marketable whether for show or for using. The breeder who does this is rewarded and recognized by the Futurity and other breeders, but ultimately by the final judge - the buyers in the marketplace.

All horse shows are a shop window for buyers and a stimulus to breeding. Horse shows encourage breeders in that fascinating attempt to produce perfection, and without shows markets for young stock would be reduced. Variations of opinion make show business a fascinating conundrum.

The primary focus of a traditional horse show is competition based upon comparison - each horse competes against every other horse. The primary focus of the Futurity is improvement based upon evaluation - each horse competes against himself and the breed standard. A traditional horse show looks at today. The Futurity looks at tomorrow.

DRIVING, LEARNED ON THE FARM

I first drove a team at the very old age of about 6 years. You can laugh - but I thought I was in perfect control of approximately two tons of horseflesh and farm wagon. What I didn't know was that I was only holding the reins. The team was well trained and knew their job which at that time was going back home after the trip to town.

Now some of you may remember the milk wagons that delivered milk daily from the dairy to homes in the towns and cities. The milkman went from door to door with his bottles of milk and cream while the horse pulling the wagon stopped at the same houses every day without anyone

at the reins. Logging horses too were trained to haul logs from the bush without anyone at the reins, just voice commands to guide them. All these horses were well trained for their jobs.

I learned to drive as a teenager, skidding firewood with a single horse, and later on doing it with the team. I still prefer to start a horse to drive with a log, tree or a stoneboat. With a log or tree there is no danger of its tipping over (you are walking) or running up into the horse's hind legs, and it gets used to something being pulled behind. A light stoneboat is okay but watch out that it doesn't slide into the horse. A car hood is in my opinion one of the worst things to use. It may slide easily but it also may slide into the horse and pull from side to side.

If your horse has been under saddle for a few years when you decide to train him to drive, don't be surprised if he lets you know with a look that you are not in the saddle yet when you ask him to move out. (This is nearly the same look he uses to say, "That's tight enough!" when you tighten the girth).

After starting your horse in driving by pulling a log, the cutter is my choice of vehicle to go on to. It is easy to pull and there is less chance of tipping over, and if a green driving horse gets a bit out of hand you can drive him out into deeper snow, the same as training a saddlehorse in the snow or water.

To hook your horse up to a single horse cutter or cart, you lift the shafts up (two people can do this quite easily) and pull the vehicle into place. I have done this single handed after the horse has grown accustomed to the shafts confining him. If you back your horse into the shafts you risk a broken or bent shaft if he steps on it. (Hooking up a team is simple as there is only a pole between the horses). Traces are hooked to the singletree so as to leave ample room for the horse to walk without hitting his hind legs.

Tennessee Walking Horses need extra room from their legs to the singletree because of their stride. (As every horse is different, you may need to adjust, then move the horse ahead, then readjust). This room also has to be allowed for where the harness is fastened from the britching and/or the crupper to the shafts. The shaft carriers slide on, and the shaft hobbles hold the shafts down so they don't bounce up and down. I have seen unhobbled shafts raise right off a horse that started to buck in the shafts.

When hooking up a team, you still need to make sure that there is ample room between the singletrees and hind legs. Trace chains are hooked so that both horses will be pulling equally.

Remember to make wide turns as the cutter or two wheel cart is not flexible. The horse is confined by the shafts and must learn to turn himself and the vehicle as one. A four wheeled wagon turns from the reach (the front wheels are attached to the reach similar to a car's front steering wheels). If you turn your single horse or team too

sharply you risk jackknifing and upsetting the wagon. Lots of practice makes for good driving.

Driving in the winter is what I like the most now - the song of sleigh bells in the quiet stillness of a mild snowy day.

I'D LIKE TO KNOW ...

How to Deal with a Mare that has "Exciting Ideas"...



My nineteen year old mare, J.D. (Jeune Fille Dawn), is very excitable and silly during her heat periods. During this time she runs her pen and squeals very loudly. If I take her out for a ride she is almost uncontrollable if she sees or hears anything in the distance that she cannot identify.

J.D. is normally easy going and sensible. I bought her as a riding horse, knowing that she could not have foals. Do you have any suggestions?

Dear Hazel,

Your mare sounds like one of the few mares that become uncontrollable when she is in estrus (heat). Many horse owners notice a change in attitude when mares are in estrus, but not to the extent that you describe. Since the mare is older and you have no desire to have a foal, the suggestion is to have the mare ovariectomized (spayed). This in essence makes a "female gelding" and should eliminate the problem.

There are basically three procedures that could be used to ovariectomize the mare. The Transvaginal Ovariectomy is probably the least expensive and least traumatic to the mare.

Contact your veterinarian to assess the mare, give a recommendation on the procedure to use and give a cost.

This to me is the likely solution to your problem.
