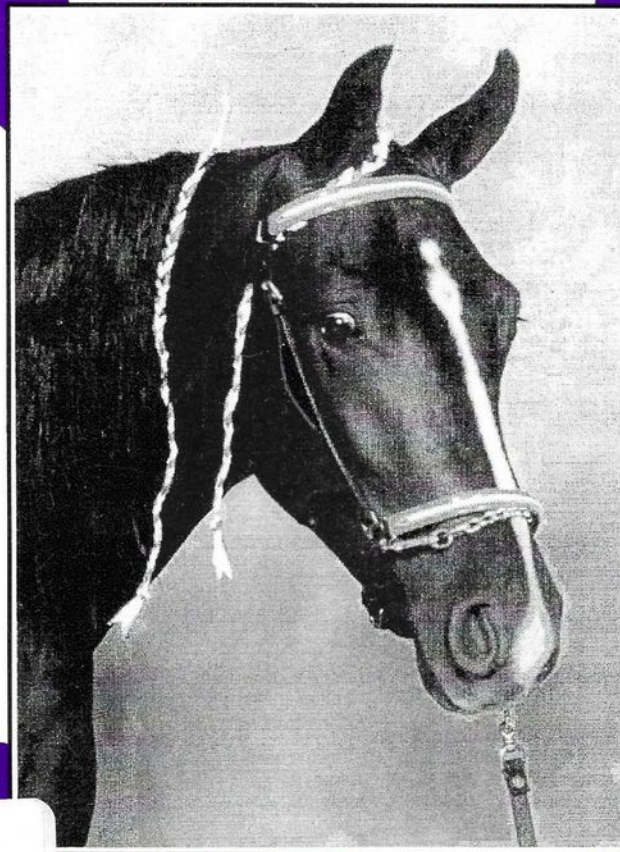

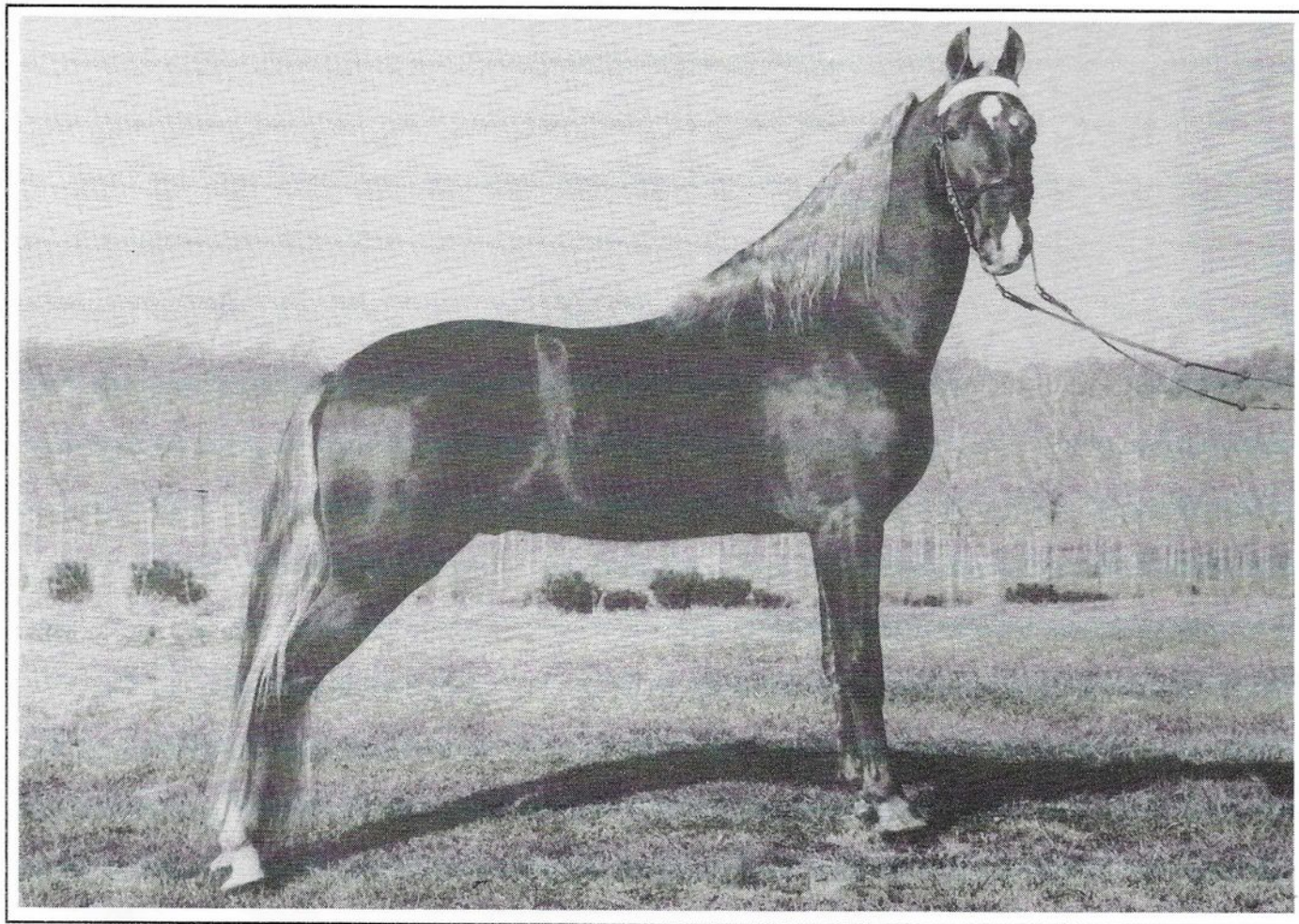

# TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE COMPETITIVE TRAIL RIDERS

Congratulations to all our Tennessee Walking Horse Competitive Trail Riders for "promoting the breed" across Alberta this past season! From Athabasca to Lethbridge, the Tennessee Walking Horse was to be seen by hundreds of horse enthusiasts, displaying their smooth, ground-covering gaits so desirable in long distance riding.

But just what is this sport all about...?

It's a sport for the whole family, using the horses and tack that you already own. Travel all around our province riding new trails in breath-taking scenery while meeting new people!

Trail Riding Alberta Conference (TRAC) sanctions rides across our province every spring through fall. Participation can be in one of three different divisions:

**NOVICE:** is open to a rider of any age.

- ☑ mileage not to exceed 25 miles.
- ☑ pace not to exceed 5.5 mph.
- ☑ \*minimum age for the horse is 4 years.

**INTERMEDIATE:** open to a rider of any age.

- ☑ mileage the same as novice.
- ☑ pace not to exceed 7 mph.
- ☑ \*minimum age for the horse is 5 years.

**OPEN:** open to a rider of any age.

- ☑ mileage is double that of novice and intermediate.
- ☑ pace not to exceed 7 mph.
- ☑ \*minimum age for the horse is 5 years.

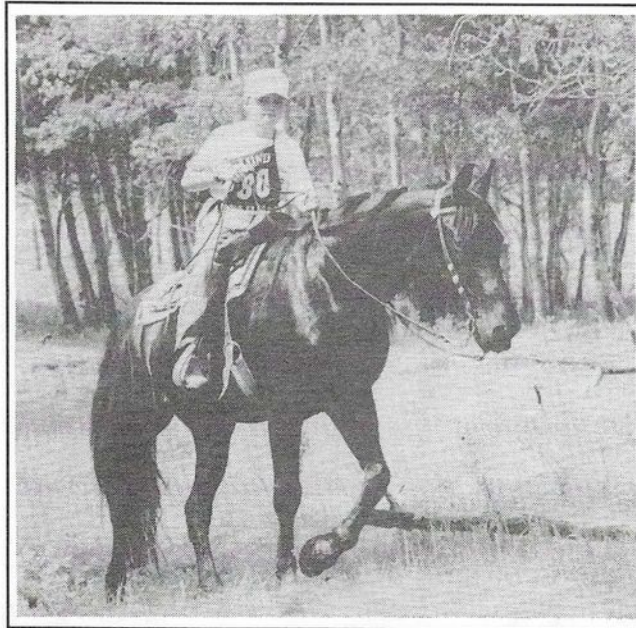
Subdivisions are as follows:

- A. Lightweight Division  
Rider and tack to be at least 140 pounds but less than 190 lbs.
- B. Heavy Weight Division  
Rider and tack weigh 190 lbs or more.
- C. Junior Division  
Riders 16 years of age and under as of Jan. 1.

## A Short Ride Description

At a pre-ride meeting the night before the ride, the course is described in detail and a map is given out. The course is clearly marked with ribbons to help riders find their way. The minimum and maximum ride times will then be announced. The next morning a horse and rider are timed out every thirty seconds. Further information on rules and judging are available in the TRAC Handbook 1997.

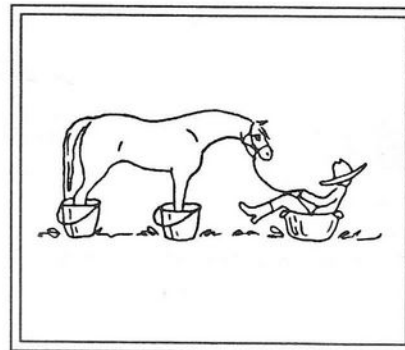

Can anyone give us an <sup>A</sup> photo of Super Duplicate printed in *Walking Horse News*, Jan/Feb 1986 up-date?

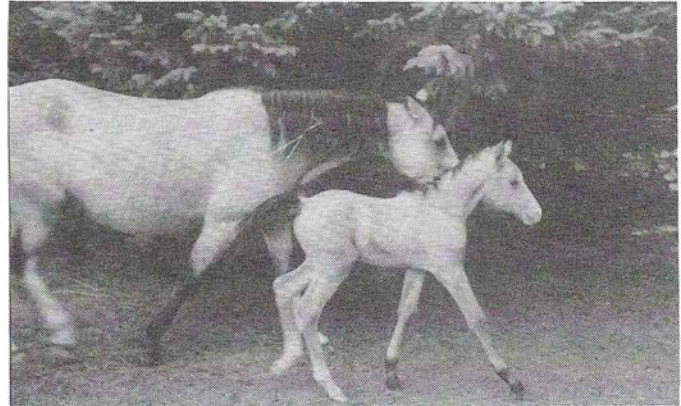

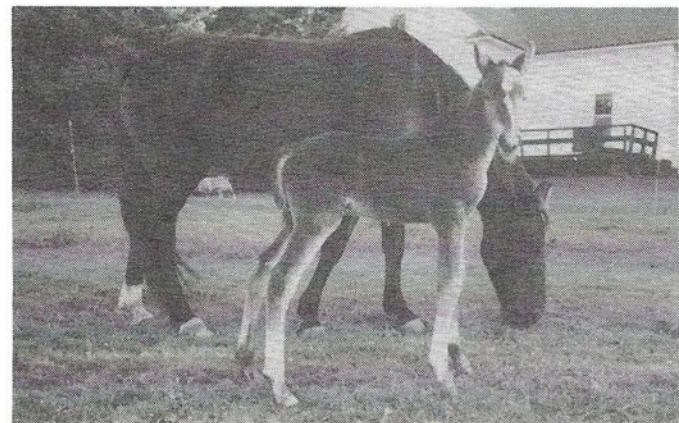


"Scotty" - the buckskin foal at Buckentin's

I had an interesting talk with LEON OLIVER, CORNERSVILLE, TENNESSEE recently. Mr. Oliver has owned Tennessee Walkers all his life, and his father and grandfather also owned them. He knows the history and bloodlines of the breed, and the people who bred them. His stallion, Red Bud's Rascal, died last summer at age 30. He stands a handsome grey grandson of this horse, Bud's Sterling Bullet. It's an education in Walking Horses to talk to Mr. Oliver.

LEE ZIEGLER, BLACK FOREST, COLORADO, writes, "Thank you for the article on the LaMarr horses. It explained a lot. I think my mare, Sarah, really looks a lot like the Margaret LaMarr pictured in it, even if she comes from Buck LaMarr. Her uncle here, a last son of Tamarack Kid, also has that look, although he is a sabino. People are always saying that they look more like Q Horses or T breeds than the typical Walker."

"An interesting sidelight. My mother's family ranches next to the place where the Eatons kept their stock in winter, in N. Wyoming, near Echeta. [Editor's Note: Bill Eaton owned the famous Eaton Dude Ranch and had a Thoroughbred stallion named Jack LaMarr. This horse sired many highly prized cutting and roping horses, but the interesting thing was that all his offspring did a running walk. A daughter of his from a Steel Dust dam, Lady LaMarr, was bred to Billie-Gene, Tom Moss' stallion that was registered in both the TWH and American Saddle Horse stud books, and the offspring of this cross, Patty LaMarr, was registered with the TWHBAA. Thus Patty LaMarr brought a Thoroughbred/Steel Dust line into the Walking Horse breed.]

"When mom's family sold out and moved to town, they sold to the Eatons. This was during the time when Lady LaMarr might well have been pastured there - just beyond the fence line from the places my mom rode. In later years my grandparents moved to Sheridan and remained friendly with the Eatons. We used to go out to the old place and have picnics when we were up in that part of the country."

"I will have to ask my uncle if he remembers the LaMarr horses at rodeos, etc. up there. He cowboied for my great-uncle outside of Buffalo for a while and they did some rope and cutting work. In fact, the first horse I remember riding was my great-uncle's old cutting horse. I don't know if he was gaited or not. Later on, my great-uncle bought me a small horse out of a sale up there, and it was gaited. No

papers, of course, but he did a nice little running walk. I was about eight and that's the first gaited horse I ever rode. I learned how to get him in gear on my own, since no one else knew anything about gaits."

"Small world! (Especially if it involves Wyoming.)"

I received a brochure from BRUSHY CREEK LODGE & RESORT in BLACK, MISSOURI. This holiday destination invites you to take your own horse or ride one of their Fox Trotters through miles of trails in the Mark Twain National Forest. Might be a good place to check out in January or so!

I'd like to remind our U.S. correspondents that postage to Canada is more than the 32 cents within your own country. I think it is 52 cents to Canada but better check to make sure. I get a lot of mail that has been returned to the sender for extra postage! M.C.L.

I've been riding C.G., my Saddlebred, as all the Walkers are too young, or in Dusky's case, too busy being a mom. C.G. is coming along very nicely and, being such a people horse, absolutely adores all the attention."

"We managed to get almost all our hay baled with little or no rain. It's definitely overmature since we weren't able to cut it until the end of August, but there is very little clover. I'm still one happy camper since I thought I'd be buying all my horse hay this year."

"We've been fencing as much as possible this summer - when it wasn't too wet to pound posts. We were able to get posts in for a stallion paddock, a foaling paddock and a new cow/horse pasture. We are planning on plank fences for the paddocks but that will have to wait until Rick gets time to cut the lumber on his sawmill."

"I had a nice (if short) visit with Ullu Zurbriggen on September 21. We had been corresponding back and forth this summer, doing an old-fashioned horse trade, 1990s style: that is, with videos and faxes. Ullu delivered Trigger's Salida del Sol, a two year old palomino filly, to me, and took R Diamond Dark Satin, a yearling black filly, back to Mara with her. I wonder what I'll get by crossing a black and white tobiano with a palomino?"

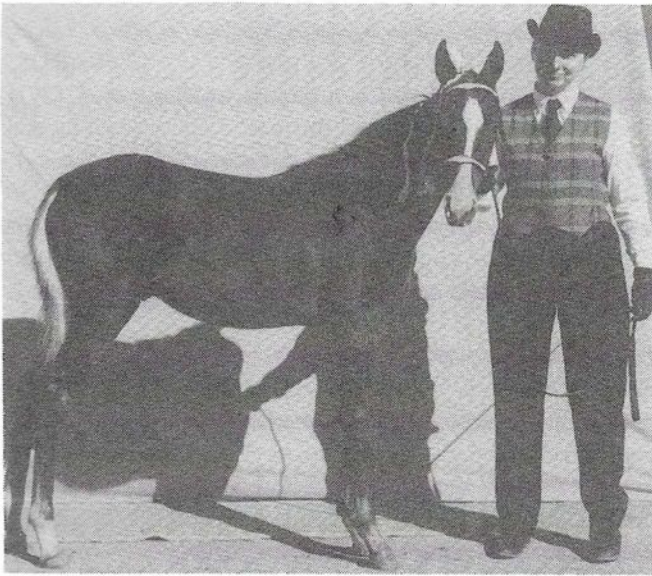

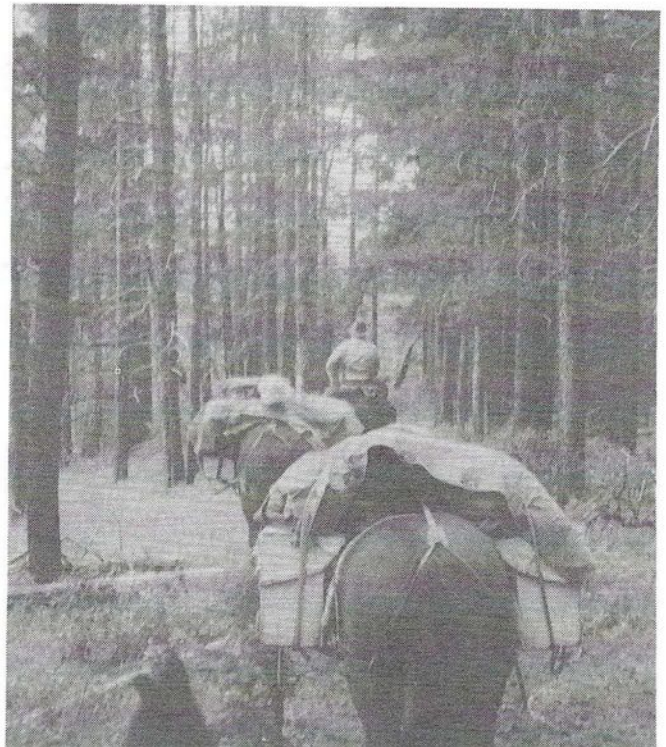
her compliments. They have recently purchased the three year old mares, Rose's Merry Spirit and Fancy's Thunder from Jordan Valley Farm. Congratulations!

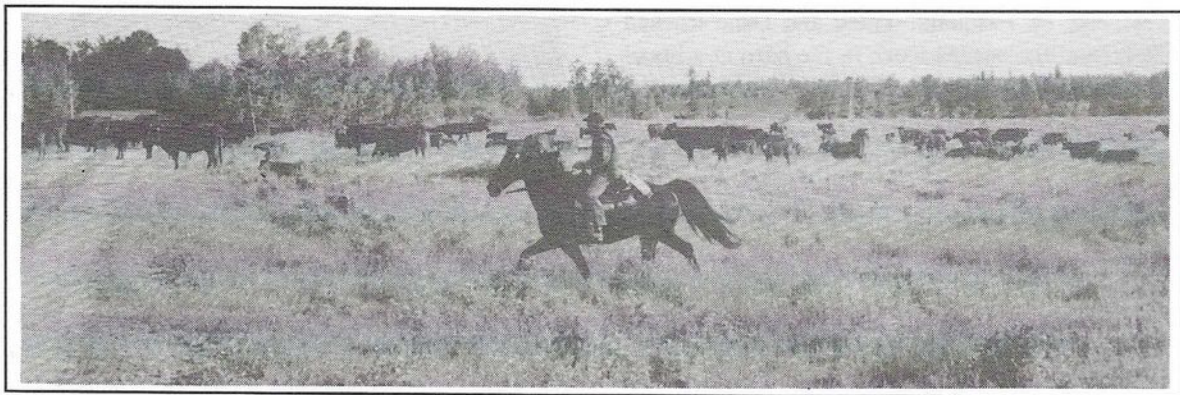

# Exciting You Bet - The 1997 Stallion Service Auction

The buzz of voices and air of excitement came from the serious bidders, entertainment seekers, and futurity entrants as they waited for the stallion service auction to begin. They gathered to see Tennessee Walking Horses that would be paraded during the bidding. This year, the crowd would see up close and under one roof, the progeny and the stallions whose services breeders had generously donated to help fund the AWWA.

The stallions in the service auction were impeccably bred representing the finest qualities that mare owners seek to be reproduced in their colts. Not only did those stallions sport purple blooded pedigrees but they also offered animated gaits, temperament and beauty to the walking horse industry. Some of these stallions were proving themselves at shows where they were currently being judged under tough competition against the best of the breed standards. Others were proving their ability to pass on their superior traits as their offspring competed in the show ring.

Eight of the ten stallions were sired by World Grand Champions and two were grandsons of WGC. Nine of the dams of these sires were by WGC's and one by the premier stallion of all times, Pride of Midnight. Eight of the stallions had substantial show records, six were consistently producing futurity ribbon winners. All of these stallions through pedigree, performance or offspring offered every breeder the greatest opportunity to produce future futurity winners, show hoes or incredibly beautiful pleasure horses.

From past auctions, the AWWA paid money to the highest point weanling filly and colt at the Canadian Futurity that resulted from the auction. This year the winners were Lyla Goin who showed a filly by the Legend owned by Debra Jack and Jack Garnet's colt by Dressed for Success owned by McDonald farms. Now bidders and stallion owners were preparing to take advantage of additions to the auction program.

Starting this year, AWWA would pay out a minimum of \$250.00 for first place, \$150 for second and \$100 for third place to both weanling and stallion owner. The stallion owners also gained in a new breeder's class where they would

compete against each other with one of the progeny from a mare owned and nominated by the stallion owner.

First stallion rode in was *Coins Double Play*. To a fury of bidding four of his futurity colts led in for the crowd. *Coins Double Play* owned by Laurie and Dale Innocent, achieved the highest donated stud service.

The second service sold was from the sire of 1997

TWHBEA National Futurity Three Year Old Lite Shod Reserve Champion. *The Legend* was 1988 and 1989 Four Year Old Reserve Champion and owned by Deb Jack.

Following was Randy Johnson who delivered a crowd treat in an unprecedented viewing of the largest display of colts by one stallion at one time. The service donated was from *My Touch Of Pride*. Then, came *Final New York Edition*, rode by owner Val Lorenzy. This beautiful three gaited stallion was no stranger to the show ring as he made

winning passes for the bidding crowd.

The next service sold from the aging and long time producer of futurity colts *Go Shadow Go*. It was donated by Helen Williamson. He was followed by *Royal Dictator*, the sire of seven futurity ribbon winners and is owned by Carla Ennis. Colts by both stallions were exhibited.

A generous donation of three services came from Jonel and Ray Reis. Ray judged the Wild Rose Show two years ago. First service sold was from 1990 Reserve and 1989 and 1991 Show Pleasure World Grand *Coins Sir Arthur*. The second came from *Time To Glow*, multiple West Coast Stake and Amateur Specialty Champion. The third came from head shaking big striding *Dramatic Gold* who sired four world champions. *Dramatic Gold* captured the second highest bid.

Lastly, rode in the ring and showing off in a big way was the fancy stallion *Generators Icy Hot* owned by Ted Smith.

All services donated sold to a total of \$3,800.00 The success of this stallion auction can be attributed to owners who stand valuable stallions, discriminating bidders who saw the opportunities made available through the AWWA, and to those people who donated their time and energy at the auction. ## "The Canadian" Futurity - A Commitment to Excellence

As I was driving back home on Sunday, Sept 21/97 from the 15th Canadian Walking Horse Futurity held in Olds Alberta, I found myself seriously reviewing the two day event. How would I sum up the event? Did we achieve our goals? What would we repeat, delete or change for next year?

Success is the word that came to mind first which I thought best described this monumental event. Exact details on the success of the breeders will be covered in other articles, but here are some facts that you should know that I feel made this Futurity an outstanding event and why if you missed it, you missed the best Walking Horse event in Canada.

This year's Futurity had 158 horses registered. This was a 25% increase over 1996 registrations. Of the 158 horses registered for the Futurity, approximately 115 arrived at the event to participate. This is a 26% increase over 1996. These realities greatly exceeded our calculated projections and confirmed that our decision to go to a two (2) day event was indeed a necessity.

The quality of horses was excellent and for the first time, we had more horses competing that were not weanlings. In previous years, the number of horses in the weanling classes exceeded the total number of all the other classes put together. We had record numbers in our performance classes. This shows the commitment of breeders to the stock that they are producing by continuing to show them. The high participation rate demonstrated clearly the acceptance of the new Futurity format.

The AWAH stallion service auction took place on the first day. All of the ten (10) services offered were sold and, in most cases, close to the market value. The total sums collected equaled the best year that the AWAH has ever had for this event. Some of the stallions were present to be showcased and this was also well received by the audience. Seeing the stallions with their progeny following made for a very impressive presentation. The participation by both breeders and bidders was exciting and demonstrated clearly that the concept is supported. It is evident that this event is here to stay and will only get bigger and better. On the financial side, it is a win/win event for the stallion owners and the sponsoring groups. And lets not forget the owners of the winning babies, two years down the road.

The "Parade of Sale Horses", a first time event for the Futurity, also occurred on the first day. There were 15

horses paraded for sale, and to the best of my knowledge, 7 of these horses have been, or are in the final process of being sold. There were also a couple of other sale transactions that occurred on the grounds. So, it would appear that this event has also found a niche at the Futurity and it will undoubtedly expand in the coming years.

"The Canadian" Store Front was another first time event this year. The merchandise sold over the two days totaled approximately \$1400.00. Some of this included used apparel. Used tack was also available. We have received a lot of positive comments on "TheCanadian" Store Front. I also need to tell everyone here that there is still merchandise from the store that can be purchased for that special Christmas gift: Walking horse hats; T-shirts; belt buckles; CRTWH decals; magnetic Walking Horse signs; CRTWH brochures. Please contact Dianne Little at 403-271-7391 to order. This event too is sure to expand.

We also had additional exhibitors with booths at the Futurity. The "*Walking Horses News*" and the "*Canadian Walking Horse WEB site*" (<http://www.islandnet.com/~mueller/whorse.htm>) were also present. Both received a lot of attention.

The three new classes at the Futurity were all a hit. The Obstacle Driving Course, the Yearlings-in-Hand, and the Produce of Dam were very well received. Thank you to the people who donated the three new trophies for these events.

The Futurity 1997, paid out a record \$6500 in prize money. Winners received their money as they received their ribbons. We also had corporate sponsors for the first time. Our thanks to Lammls Western Wear, The Steve-Lock Trailer Locking System, Easy Rider Division of AWAH, G.W.Cycle World Ltd. and Calgary Paving Ltd.. We sincerely appreciate their support.

The Futurity attracted a lot of new people to the breed as well as a lot of long time breeders who came to visit and renew acquaintances. A record number of out of province visitors and competitors were present.

Even with all these successes comes the reality of growing pains. Stabling became a major issue this year. Our Futurity is outgrowing the accommodation now available in Olds. In addition to finding more stabling for our event, we may also have to invoke a stall pre-payment system to take care of last minute no-shows that had booked stalls.



These issues will be addressed and resolved.

We had to make changes when our Saturday caterer did not show up for the event. This resulted in us not having food for our planned social on the Saturday evening at the arena. Luckily most people socialized anyway before heading out for more formal meals later in the evening. Quick action secured a replacement caterer for Sunday to feed the masses on the grounds. This too will be remedied for next year.

We need to balance the class schedule for the two days. Sunday was busier than Saturday. Our new computerized record keeping system will be fine tuned and the two day class schedule will be balanced. Our system is capable of producing participant certificates that will be mailed out this year. Next year they will be presented at the show.

And last but not least, we have to expand our group of dedicated volunteers. Our success is dependent upon "committed volunteers" as well as "committed competitors." As our event grows larger in numbers of horses and competitors, we also have to expand our squadron of volunteers. So, if you are not competing next year then please consider getting involved by volunteering. We certainly can use your help! Just let us know your interest area.

Please feel free to forward your comments to us. All concerns, suggestions and bouquets are welcomed. Concerns and suggestions will be reviewed and considered.

In closing I would like to sincerely express my personal thanks to everyone who got involved, as a breeder, exhibitor, sponsor, volunteer or spectator. Our breed is better in Canada because you participated in "The CANADIAN" Futurity, 1997. Commitment to the excellence of this event such as was seen this year is sure to guarantee the continued growth and good reputation of the Tennessee Walking Horse breed in Canada. See you again at "The CANADIAN" in 1998.

There was a form to fill out for advertising your stallion in the WHN Stallion Directory March/April '1983. Cost was \$2.00.

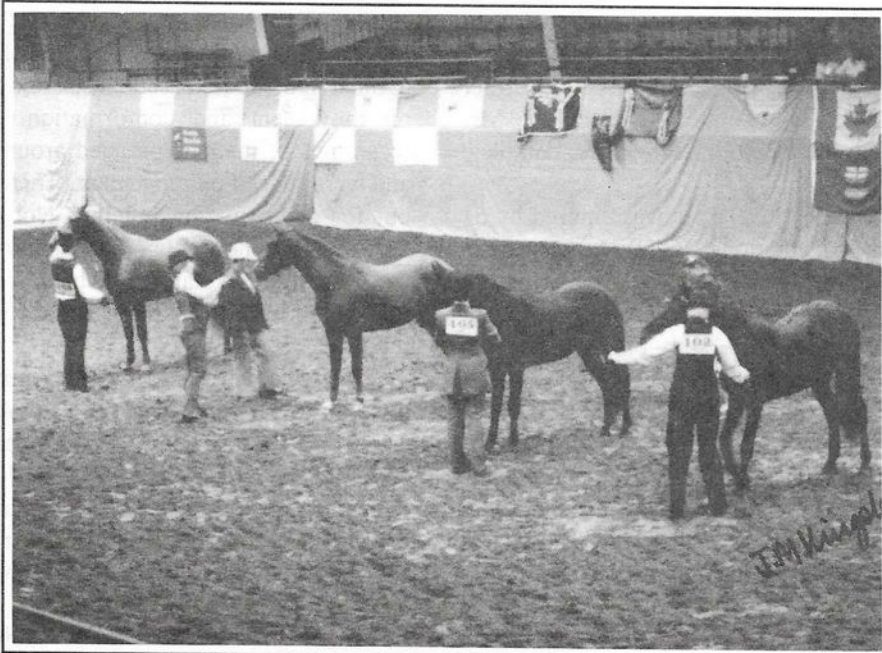
High Point Horse of the Camrose Show of August 14/82 was Whispering Chella, owned by Helen Williamson and ridden by Carol Williamson.

Jocelyne & Stewart Steele of Erickson, MB had dispersed most of their Walkers. The horses they raised were named with the prefix "Whirlpool". Ed & Marlene Desrosiers of Jaffray, B.C. had purchased Whirlpool Dixie Jo and Miller's Misty Max. The winner of the first TWH class in Eastern

We now have 8 half blood TWH mares to breed back to our new stallion that we bought last June from Evelyn Wocknitz of Tappen, B.C. - Ebony Walking Eagle."

## A BIT OF WALKING HORSE HISTORY

Treasure's owner, Glenna Holm, was raised on a ranch near Valley City, North Dakota. Her father bought Glenna and her sisters a "pacing mare" with a gaited foal at side. That mare had another gaited foal from a Thoroughbred stallion after they bought her.

Glenna's mother was afraid of horses and her father didn't like them. He offered to buy his girls new bicycles if they would sell their horses. Glenna said they never did get a bicycle.

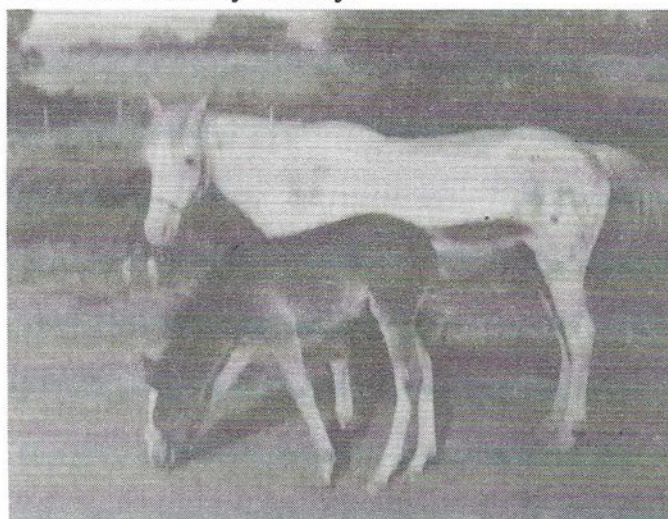
By 1975 Glenna was married and she and her husband, Gary, were living in Box Elder, Montana. Glenna was teaching kindergarten and Head Start; Gary was Superintendent of Schools. One day Glenna happened to see a Tennessee Walking Horse mare listed for sale in the Great Falls Tribune. She said this was the first ad she'd seen for a Tennessee Walker. Her childhood memories of gaited horses prompted her to talk Gary into going to "look". She said he wondered why when they saw the mare.

"Mitchy's Rainbow" was thin and full of fleas but Glenna knew she'd found her gaited horse. She powdered, wormed and fed her, and when the mare reached optimum condition, she was bred to Wright's Perfection 721240. Rainbow's Treasure was the result.

I will only mention a few of the early walking horses and owners that are on Treasure's registration papers. Her dam, Mitchy's Rainbow,

was originally owned by Pearl Tompkins of Big Arm, Montana. Her maternal grandsire, Mitch's Comet 580821, was a blue roan with two stockings and a strip. He was by the white stallion, Snow Prince Allen 501452, and his dam was Mitchy Mitch 540597 (Silvertip-Rickey 473752 X Kismet Allen 475069).

Snow Prince Allen shows up in the pedigrees of horses that Ethna Friesen of Polson, Montana, raised and sold. Mitchy Mitch was a sorrel roan horse with white markings. Homer Davis of Libby, Montana, owned this stallion. Silvertip-Rickey was owned by my mother, Marie McBroom of Big Arm, Montana. Kismet Allen, foaled May 4, 1947, was owned by Katherine D. Williams of Alder, Montana. Kismet was roan with hind stockings, bald face, near fore coronet, on withers, and mixed mane and tail. Kismet was sold to Mrs. Farrel Fellows of Polson, who traded Kismet and her half-sister, Breezy, to Mom for their first foals by Rickey.

Golden Sun Allen 461763 is also on Treasure's pedigree. This chestnut stallion was owned by Bill Nolf of Bothel, Washington. Mr. Nolf purchased him from Berdie Raab. Golden Sun Allen was a very popular breeding stallion in Western Washington in the fifties, sixties and



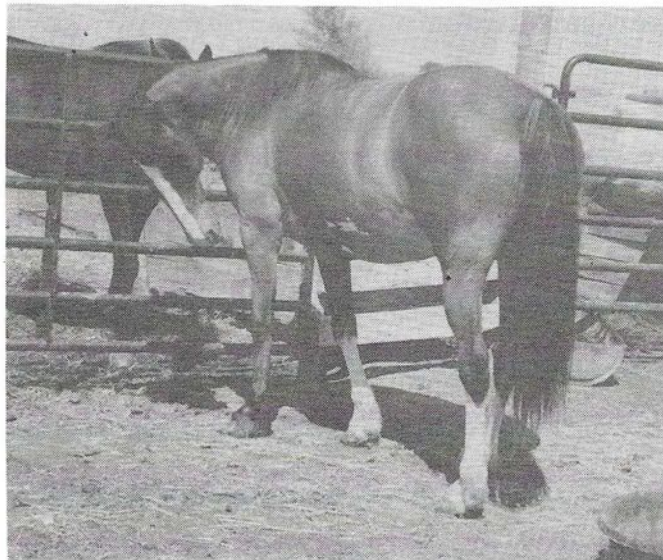
seventies. (The 1993 Tennessee Walking Horse Stallion Directory by Judith Westall includes this horse's photo and pedigree.)

Midnight Mack K. 490450 and Merry Boy 350189 were prominent sires appearing in Treasure's top pedigree line.

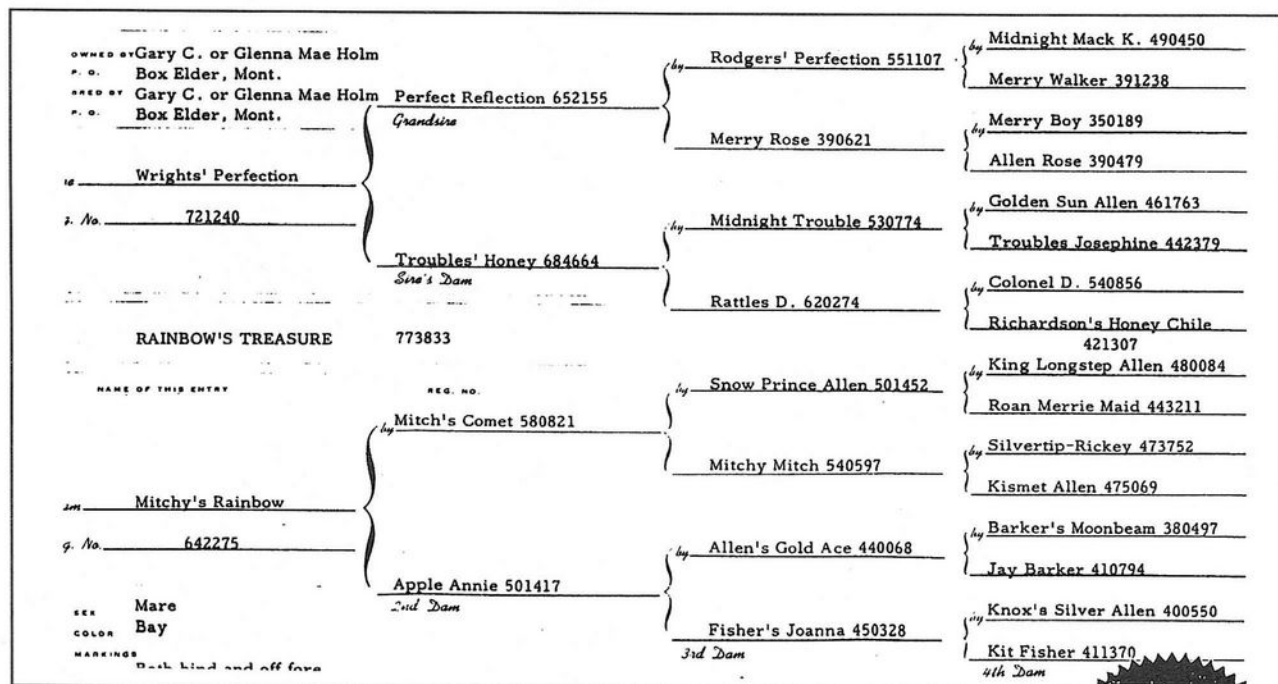
Pearl Tompkins, Homer Davis, and Ethna Friesen are all deceased now. My mother is in her seventies. Mr. Wright sold his horses before he died, with some going to Miller Outfitters and others to Clarence Pursley of Kremlin, Montana. When Pursley's horses were dispersed, Marsha Wickman of Conrad, Montana bought Trouble's Honey 684664, the dam of Wright's Perfection. Marsha owned this mare until she died in 1992 at age 24.

The pedigree of Rainbow's Treasure traces back to the old horses that make this breed so great. She has disposition, gait, conformation and color, and passes this on through her offspring. Glenna has enjoyed many hours of smooth riding. Gary wasn't raised around horses but enjoys riding May's Treasure and caring for their Tennessee Walkers.

Gary and Glenna have retired from teaching and now own the Longhorn Bar and Supper Club in Rosebud, Montana. If you are passing through Montana on Interstate 94, stop and have supper at the Longhorn. Gary and Glenna will be glad to show you their Tennessee Walkers and the beautiful Yellowstone River country, and Rainbow's Treasure will proudly display her "gaited treasures" for your viewing pleasure.

## OUR READERS WRITE:

### The First Walkers in Canada

LAKE DUNCAN, RAYMOND, AB writes, "Marjorie's *"The First Walkers in Canada"* was of great interest to us. My Uncle Charles Asplund brought Walkers to his ranch in the Pass in the early to mid-forties. He even had a stallion. He loaned us a gelding to use on our farm at Glenwood. The gelding died of old age in 1964. He was one of the best cow horses I have ever seen. He could cut any calf from a herd just for the fun of it. I have tried to find out who the stallion was, who this gelding was, and where they came from. My uncle died in 1962 and his wife died in 1992, and though my cousins can remember seeing registration papers, they are not to be found now. I am sure that there will be a record somewhere as my uncle had registered cattle and kept strict books and records when it came to them. I'm sure he was the same with his horses. I will keep looking."

STU PRITCHARD, CALGARY, writes, "In regards to Marjorie's article on the First Walkers in Canada, I submit the following quotation from the book, *Ann's Story*, by Ann Clifford. The use of Tennessee Walkers on the Bar "U" ranch occurred before 1947. The stallion, named "Rex Stonewall", was in the Grey Cup Parade in Toronto in 1948. I am doing some work on tracing his offspring. No luck so far."

"The Bar "U" ranch was owned by Pat Burns and he had other ranches throughout the area. A couple of these were in the Springbank area of west Calgary. Marjorie's article mentioned George Edworthy of the Shagganappi Ranch. This would have been in the same area. I wonder???"

From *Ann's Story: A Great Ranching Empire and the People who Made it Work* by Ann Clifford, available from Ann Clifford Memories, Box 1149, NANTON, AB T0L 1R0 for \$35.60 with postage & handling.

*"At the top of the hill, before entering the yard there were huge corrals which were used for hand breeding. They would take the stud up the hill and he would select the dam or mare. All this was recorded in a register book. The same thing happened when they were breeding light saddle horses. We had some beautiful thoroughbred stallions. The Company would buy them from the racing association, but the colts could not be registered. Once we had a lovely American Tennessee Walker or gated stud caled Rex Stonewall purchased from Archie Currie at Burns Plant."*

*"We had a Tennessee Walker by the name of Rex*

*Stonewall. A beautiful chestnut. This stallion was bought from Archie Currie who was barn boss at the Burns Packing Plant. Currie was a wonderful horseman. From one of the Ranchers close to the Bar U, P. Burns Ranches bought a lovely Palimino Stallion called Sun Dog. A dapple cream color."*

*"These last two went to Toronto with the 1948 Football team. I have a nice picture of them on Parade day with the Mayor of Toronto riding Rex Stonewall and Sun Dog in the rear."*

JACK GURNETT, BLUFFTON, told me that he spent a lot of time in the Calgary area in the forties and fifties and remembers a herd of roan horses in an area near Calgary now known as George Edworthy Park.

TRISH LAUGHLIN, CARVEL, phoned with her new address, so I asked her about the Walkers her mother rode in Manitoba. She said her mother, Donna Rowand, rode a TWH named Smoky Mountain Colonel for McDonald Farms in the Brandon Winter Fair of 1958. She also rode the Saddlebreds Conowingo Belle and Alice K. Denmark for owner Lil Isaacs. Trish is going to try to find out more about these people and horses from her mother and possibly even share a photo or two with us.

Now we need a print-out of the first fifty or so Tennessee Walkers registered with Canadian Livestock Records. Some of these horses that people have heard about might be listed there, along with their owners. Perhaps Eldon Eadie can help us out here. ??

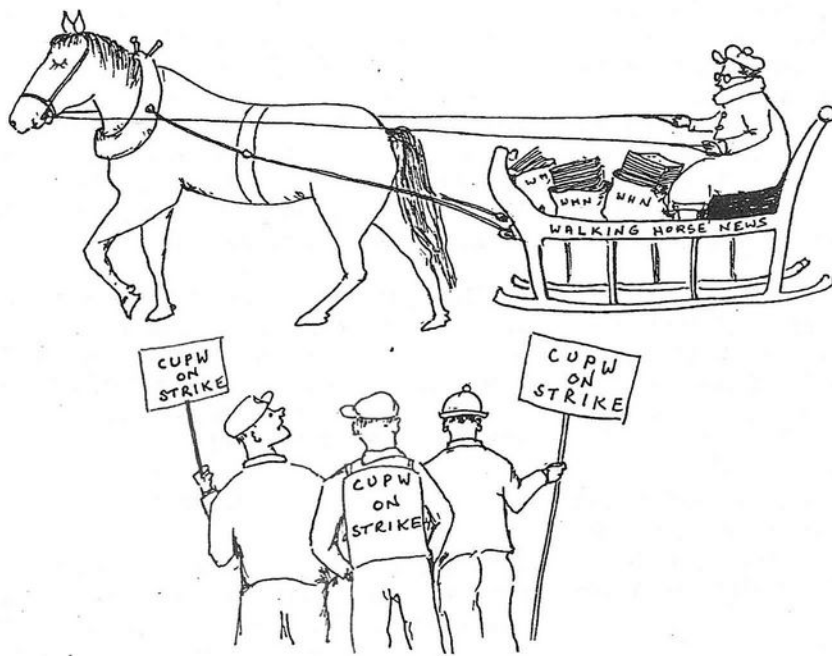
In Our Next Issue:

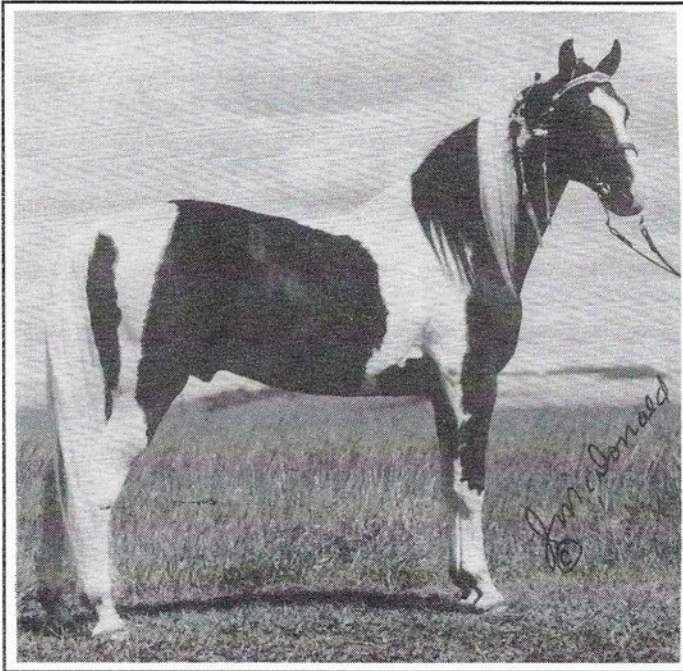

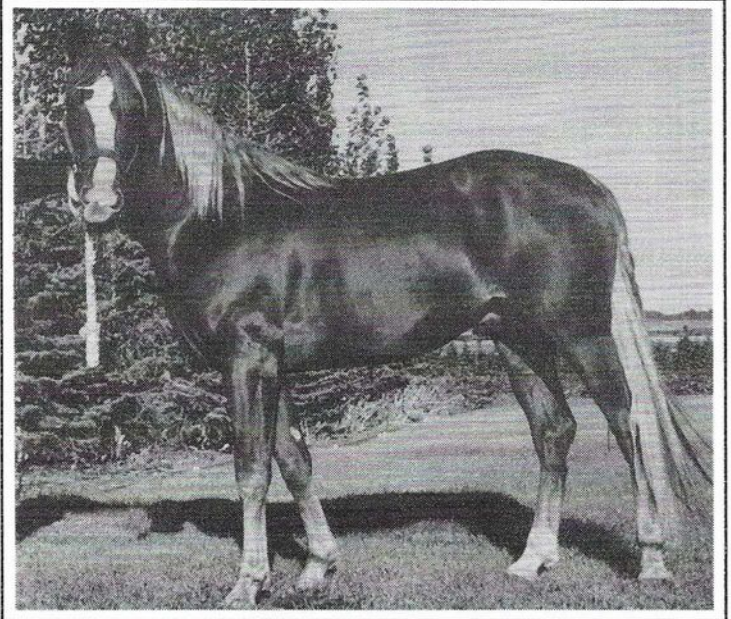
