

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# "The CANADIAN" FUTURITY

A `gathering of the clan', perhaps; a family reunion ... that's what the 16th annual Canadian Futurity at Olds, Alberta on Saturday and Sunday, September 19 & 20 reminded me of when I attended this year. Once again there were spectators from every province from British Columbia to Ontario, and Washington State as well. Many exhibitors had to travel hundreds of miles, but I think the long distance award must go to Kathy Ireson of Tomslake in Northern B.C.

All the exhibitors are to be commended for the work and commitment it takes to attend with their young horses. But it has to be worth it, for this Futurity is, in my opinion, the premier show for Canadian breeders of Tennessee Walking Horses. Where else will you get

up to ten minutes of the judge's undivided attention for

your entry? Where else will you receive a marked scorecard with the judge's comments? Exhibitors also all receive Certificates of Participation, a photo of their horse, and possibly a ribbon and cash award. The Canadian Futurity provides an evaluation of each horse entered. This year the judge was Jennie Jackson of Copperopolis, California. Jennie has owned TWH since 1974, and currently breeds, trains and shows them. She holds her judging licence from the Independent Panel of Judges. (See the story "Watchout for Tomorrow" in this issue for more about Jennie and her husband,

There were new faces, and there were some folks who were new to the Futurity but are veteran Walker owners from the forties, fifties and sixties. Bonnie and George Edworthy of Calgary attended on Sunday. George's father, George Edworthy Sr. imported

a TWH colt, Jim-Bob Allen, in the forties. When it was lost due to an accident, he bought the colt's dam, Granny Evins, in foal to the same sire. Granny Evins was the second TWH registered with the Canadian Livestock Records in Ottawa. Her foal became #3 and her second Canadian born filly (by Chief Justice Allen #1) was Tennessee Walker #4 in the Canadian Studbook. George brought slides and photos of all of these historic horses and told us some of their stories. Just like a human family reunion! Bob and Edna Lamport of Vermillion also attended for the first time. Lamports imported TWH #37, Prince Radar, in 1963. Many of you may have seen this roan stallion's name in your Walker's papers.

And so it went. New folks just becoming interested in Walking Horses, and people who have been breeding and promoting them for years. It was great to meet so many of you, and see people comparing pedigrees, looking at photos and figuring out how their horses are related. Again, just like a family reunion!

I have one coloured filly off Sheila Reum's stud, Ringo, a chestnut and white Walker, and my four year old solid chestnut mare, Glory's Super Star. My big mare, Gypsy's Kid Freckles, is bred to Ringo. This year she has a filly by Gen's Terminator; she's just a big, beautiful little thing! I am hoping for two more coloured ones next spring. I will also be standing my studs next spring and will send pictures for ads."

"Is there anybody out there in Saskatchewan that

would be interested in starting a TWH Club to promote the breed? If we get enough interest we could get some little shows started, bring in some judges, and try to help this wonderful, gentle breed. #### MANITOBA NEWS

From DARLENE MOORE, BOISSEVAIN, "July 25 & 26 saw our 30th All Breed Horse Show held in Brandon, Manitoba. There were 17 breeds of horses. The Pony of the Americas and the Miniatures joined our show this year."

The TWH exhibitors were from Shilo, MB, Russell, MB, and Creelman, SK. We had two stallions, one gelding and five mares. My 22 year old triple registered stallion, Majestic's Streaker, won both Supreme Champion Tennessee Walker and Supreme Champion Pinto. My new mare, a gorgeous black and white pinto eight year old, Temptation's Treasured Tiffany, won Champion Pinto mare and Reserve Supreme Champion of the whole breed."

"I LOVE riding my lovely new mare, Tiffany. She is 15:2 hh, a tobiano pinto with equal amounts black and white. She is a ribbon winner provincially in trail, pleasure, reining, keyhole, jumping, dressage - and does great work with cattle. Her walk is fast and her lope/canter is perfect. She has an excellent ground-covering walk too. I'm riding every night - and loving it!"

RUTH RENWICK, MELITA, writes, "I have two

registered Walkers, both big, black, beautiful mares. They are very easy keepers and are too fat right now. We have had lots of rain here (which is unusual) and as a result, the grass is lush. Along with the moisture come mosquitoes to make the horses' lives miserable. The horses race us to the barn when they see us coming, to get some relief from the bugs!"

From BARB FENWICK, "Hi, ya'll from SIDNEY! I have been very busy "horsin around" all summer. I started up a riding school and training facility at my ranch in June and still managed to get a little riding in with a few of the camping guests that come out with their horses to enjoy a ride in Spruce Woods Park, next to my property. The riding school went well. I managed to put 20 students through a primary course I designed. The course teaches Parelli theory and games, horse management and care, then basic English and western riding skills. The children ranged in age from seven to fourteen, with eleven girls and nine boys completing the course. I hosted a fun show for them two weeks ago and they had a great time."

"Of course they rode my TWH mare, Phantom, and my new gelding, Boomer, which I purchased this summer from Keith Doll of Douglas, MB. Boomer, aka Spitfire's Royal Flush, was here for training. I started him under saddle and soon discovered that he had the heart of a kid and the mind and manners of a 30 year old horse! He quickly became a school horse for my students, who happily rode him around with Parelli halter and rope most of the time, bareback or under English saddle. Another testimony to the wonderful personalities of the Walkers!"

"I also trained several horses this summer for friends and neighbours, but my ultimate goal is to train ONLY TWH in the future. Now that Manitoba is getting a few more Walkers every month, it seems, my dream may become a reality. If anyone is interested in having their Walkers trained the Natural Horsemanship/Parelli style here in Manitoba, you can bet I will be interested in helping them! (My husband has warned me though, that I <u>can't</u> buy every Walker I train, as I did with Boomer!)"

"What I am really excited about is on September 11

I am going to pick up a weanling stud colt that I bought from Kathy and Joe Roehrich of Snow Walker Stable in Crookston, MN. He is a black/white tobiano colt sired by their Versatility High Point Champion, Eldorado's Surprise. I visited their ranch in June and got to ride "Surprise", whose runwalk would put you to sleep in the saddle. "Season's Walking Spirit", or Spirit as we will call him, will, hopefully, put a splash of color in our local stock in a couple of years, as I believe he is the first tobiano TWH stud in Manitoba. Spirit will bring my herd of Walkers up to four, with the only non Walker a cute little tobiano Shetland Pony mare who is basically another yard dog around here."

"I want to close by thanking Walking Horse News for helping us "novices" in the business of having fun with Walkers and for providing a link to so many other Walker owners who share the same goal - to promote and "keep natural" the magnificent Tennessee Walker!"


"We have a BIG up-coming stud colt for a future

"There's talk of a cold winter in Alberta. I hope you all have lots of hay. Good luck to you all at the shows this fall and pleasant trails to pleasure riders out there. See ya sometime in '99!"

From GRACE LARSON, FORSYTH, MONTANA, "Here's the article on Clark Allen, finally done and on its way to you. Ross Howell died in July. He was one of the founders of the Montana Walking Horse Association. He stood Rapid Joe, Chief O' Chiefs, Walkin' Easy, Chief Joseph, Appollo 8 H, Reveille Boy, and so many more good stallions. He and Amy and their daughter, Una Rose, showed all over, including Canada. Ross was our neighbour when I was a very young girl. He and my mother, Marie McBroom, were very close friends and remained so up to his death. I was so glad that I went to see him a year ago. He sent so much history home with mepedigrees, photos, etc. - just priceless! He also put me in touch with Clark Allen's story."

"I have enclosed a color copy of Royal Prairie Rose and her owner, Billie Wolfe of Hayden, Idaho. Rose is a full sister to Tesolin's stallion, Royal Yellowstone Gold. Billie did an outstanding job of showing her this year in yearling classes. She placed second out of five at the Inland Empire Grand Celebration in Spokane. She won Grand Champion at the Kootenai County Fair and Open Horse Show in Northern Idaho. This was over several classes and about 20 horses. "We are looking forward to our next issue of Walking Horse News. The Internet can't beat that!"


"It is midnight and the trucker has just arrived to pick up Carla's mares. So long and happy trails to all."

From ALLANNA JACKSON, LAKESIDE, ARIZONA, "Here are some pictures of my new horses. The colt is Mister Star La Marr 981912 by lucky's Koko Prince. mama is Chance's Comanche Dawn 920078. There's no doubt the colt is Koko's son! He's already teaching himself to untie ropes, open gates,

and get into things. The first three months of his life, Mister was a pure three gaited running walker. He loves to canter and has a talent for flying lead changes. last week little Mister

studiously watched Koko trotting around hollering about Sassy's being out of the corral. A few hours later, Mister decided he could trot too - and did. He's been playing with the trot ever since and also trying to `boing' like a deer. I did see Mister do a little bit of running walk again last night. He'd already been imitating Koko's whinneying at the other horses, not exactly what I wanted him to learn from dear old dad! Sassy and Koko have both helped in teaching the colt not to bite."

"Mister is very affectionate, gregarious, intelligent, willing, funny, opinionated, and a playful little pest. I expect his personality is very similar to what Koko's must have been like when he was a baby."

"Chance's Comanche Dawn, known as Mandy, has been mostly a `appetite with legs' since she arrived. Mandy was bred by Edson Davis of Heavenly Sunshine Farm, Nicholson, Mississippi. She was sold at auction at two years old, purchased by the Lashoones at Water Tower Farm, Vermont, and went to Gary Martin two months later."

"Gary started Mandy under saddle when she was four, the same age she was bred to Tennessee Goldust. She was bred to Koko 30 days after producing the palomino Goldust colt, Martin's Hall of Chance. Consequently Mandy hasn't had much riding, but she's gentle willing and friendly when she gets over being shy, so I expect she'll be a good riding horse once she has some education."

"Koko was quite sick the week before the new horses arrived. He cut himself on the inside bulb of his right front foot, and it became infected and was growing proudflesh when we got home from vacation. We treated it with antibiotics but he developed a fever and abcesses from the injections. Then he went down and was on the verge of colicking, in addition to all his other problems. The vet made an emergency call and gave him banamine. In about two hours he was up and almost back to his old self."

"It turns out that his blood tests show `out of sight' levels of protein and liver enzymes, so he's now on the lowest protein diet I can find for a horse that can't chew grass hay. And the cut that started it all is almost healed."

#### **Book Review**

#### GAITS OF GOLD: Selecting, Fitting, and Training the Naturally Gaited Horse by Brenda Imus

In her latest book, *Gaits of Gold*, Brenda Imus has written a volume designed, as she notes in the "Foreword", to be "an understandable, practical guide that will allow them (the gaited horse owners) to measure progress by the hour and the day, rather than by the year." (p. IV.) Her aim is to offer the best possible training techniques to bring out the natural gaits in these horses without resorting to mechanical means or expensive professional trainers.

The initial chapter focuses, as does *Heavenly Gaits*, on the various gaits of the horse, including the 2-beat trot and pace, since some basic understanding of these various gaits is essential to understanding the gait definitions of the amble, rack, running walk, and foxtrot. For those not familiar with the variations of conformation in the soft-gaited breeds, the author describes both the Spanish and English types together with a detailed explanation of how their forms affect functions. Charts and photos illustrate variations in front and rear conformation as the text provides succinct data on the types of movement that generally result from these variations.

With theory behind her, Imus offers a detailed discussion of sources for purchasing gaited horses, along with considerations of soundness, price and temperament. She also lists factors on the checklist during a pre-purchase exam. As a final caution, she insists that "there's never a substitute for good natural gaiting ability, regardless of the horse's age. Avidly look for this, and determine not to settle for anything else. This alone will dramatically increase your chances of a successful horse purchase." (p.67)

For those with a horse ready for work, Imus takes the reader from the basic steps in training a young horse to lead, through "longeing 101", to line driving, to the first ride. For the green-broke horse, exercises in bending, reining back, half-halts, and stretching become the basic steps leading to true collection. While this reviewer makes no claims to training expertise (and has the cancelled checks on training bills to

prove it), she was able to use techniques in this chapter to teach a reluctant three year old (who'd otherwise resisted all his young trainer's efforts) to back willingly in just a few lessons!

Exercises for collection and extension precede the segment on gait training. Starting with the fox-trot, Imus gives instructions on how to request the gait, the general "feel" to expect, and cues to look for in determining if one's mount is performing the desired gait. Techniques for curing the trot and pace, as well as converting one 4-beat gait to a more desired one, are also given.

Chapter 7, "Bit, Saddle & Shoe", focuses on saddles, types of bits, trail bridles, and the effects of hoof angles on the gait each horse performs. The chapter ends with permission for readers to photocopy the shoeing segment for the instruction of farriers not accustomed to working with gaited borses.

As does *Heavenly Gaits*, *Gaits of Gold* provides appealing reading. Although more of a reference manual than the previous work, *Gaits of Gold* is written in a flowing style peppered with intriguing anecdotes from the author's years of experience in handling her own gaited horses. As a reference source, the book would benefit from a simple index, but in spite of this small drawback it deserves consideration as a useful addition to any walking horse owner's equine library.


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### A BIT OF WALKING HORSE HISTORY

#### C.W. `CLARK' ALLEN and RAPID JOE




Clark Allen. Photo dated Jan 1964.

My interview with Mrs. C.W. `Clark' Allen took place at her Billings, Montana apartment last March. Ross Howell had leased Rapid Joe from the Allens, and Ross was the one who suggested that I try to contact Clark. Evie Allen said that Clark had died six years ago at age 79, the age she is now.

They had been married six weeks less than 50 years. Their two daughters are now 53 and 50, and her step-son (Clark's son) is 59. She said that when their children were younger they always did a lot of riding, but none are into horses now.

Evie was excited to talk about their life and their Tennessee Walkers. "Clark dearly loved his horses..." Their small farm had always been a haven for cows, chickens, pigs, baby coons, dogs, cats, and an old horse that their children learned to ride on. They owned and operated Yellowstone Glass. Clark was a glazier by trade. Clark and Evie met on a blind date; horses weren't in their life then. They were married in Washington State during World War II. After three and a half years on the coast, they moved back to Billings.

In the mid fifties, Clark bought the Tennessee Walking Horse stallion, RAPID JOE #453195, at an auction for \$105.00 when Joe was




a twelve year old. They heard about an older mare that was for sale near Ballantine, Montana and Clark was able to buy her, ROAN ALLEN'S WAVE #442729, for \$100.00.

RAPID JOE was sired by THE TRAVELER #350071, a roan horse with bald face, under throat, and four stockings. His dam was NELLIE FLAGG #360239, a chestnut mare sired by YEARICK'S BOURBON KING #360031. Nellie's dam was a HUNTER'S ALLEN F-10 mare with a Saddlebred dam. THE TRAVELER was by ROAN ALLEN F-38. His dam was SEHOY #360124. SEHOY was a sorrel mare also sired by HUNTER'S ALLEN F-10. Again, Saddlebred lineage can be traced through SEHOY'S dam, RUBY II.

ROAN ALLEN'S WAVE was sired by ROAN ALLEN'S KING #411130, a roan with three stockings, strip, and mixed mane and tail. Her dam was MAUD GRAVES X-3034, whose name was changed to WALKALONG WILMA #441975. ROAN ALLEN'S KING was sired by BRANTLEY'S ROAN ALLEN JR. #350066, a sabino roan with

sired by ROAN ALLEN F-38.


I'm sure that Clark had no idea how exceptional the bloodlines of his two foundation Walkers were! It was through Clark Allen and later, Ross Howell, that RAPID JOE finally received the recognition he deserved as a sire. Before Clark bought Joe he had been used as a cow horse at the stockyards owned by Fred Pierce in Billings, MT.

Clark says, in a letter written to Marjorie Lacy in 1989,

"Fred Pierce bought the horses (in Tennessee) and shipped them to Montana in a baggage car. He bought two stallions and five mares. He wrapped their heads in burlap for protection while shipping."

"Fred Pierce was the owner of several big ranches around here, plus the stock yards and a packing house. He used Joe on the ranches, in the mountains and in the stock yards to run cattle; he did it by himself with the reins tied to the horn. He was also an excellent stock horse and had an excellent disposition. He was very gentle, not mean, and gave no problem whatsoever around other horses. We also used him for a lot of "bragging" because we felt we had the best." \*1

Evie said that their girls, Sheryl and Margene, were quite small when they got Joe. The girls would jump on Joe bareback, ride over to the neighbours, get off and play, and Joe would stay right there until they were ready to come home.


When the Allens' first Tennessee Walker foal was born, Clark couldn't decide on a name. Evie said he kept saying, "He IS a Walker" so she suggested the name "He'za Walker". The next year the foal was a filly, so she was named of course, "She'za Walker"!

He'za Walker was the best as far as the Allens were concerned. He was Rapid Joe all over again. Their breeding program which began with Joe and Wave became a herd of 16 chestnuts, bays, buckskins, sorrels and spotted.

Some of their best times were spent with the Quigleys at their ranch near Custer, Montana. Walking Horse people would come from all over Montana to their annual trail ride. Evie called it a big "Horse picnic and barbeque". "Everyone had a hay bale to sit on and people just loved it."

Clark leased RAPID JOE to Delbert R. (Ross) Howell of Polson, Montana in 1968, when Joe was 23 years old. The 1969 TWHBEA Studbook lists the following offspring from Rapid Joe:

COPPERBOTTOM JOE #695025 Sorrel stallion with blaze and 3 stockings. Dam: Patsy Montana T. #611487.

THE LINEBACKER #695028 Sorrel sabino gelding with three stockings, bald, spots, mixed mane and tail. Dam: Drifting Snow Girl #634098. MELU DE LAY #695029 Another sorrel sabino gelding with two stockings, bald, with spots, his dam was Quicksilver of 7-T, a Pearl Tompkins mare.

SHOSHONE'S BEAUTY #695030 Sorrel mare with one sock and one stocking, strip and mixed tail. Dam: Beauty's Shoshone #622667.

MONTENA #695031 Sorrel mare with hind coronet and mixed tail. Her dam was Montana Sheba #6510794.

RAPID RHYTHM #695565 Sorrel mare. Her dam was Chief's Chimes #6510066, who was sired by Chief O' Chiefs #481485. Rapid Rhythm has a daughter, Ree's Ribbon #745668, who is owned by O.V. McCurry of Trego, Montana. When we stopped by OV's in August of 1997, Ribbon, at age 23, was nursing a foal. OV said that Ribbon's foals helped put his son through college. Ribbon is our black roan stallion's (GLL'S Sun Chief) grand dam. [Editor's note: Rapid Rhythm came to Alberta & left a lot of offspring here too. I last heard of her at Drumheller, I think. Does anyone have further info? MCL]

THE GAY PARADER #695032 Black stallion with snip, star, lower lip, and near fore fetlock. His dam was the buckskin champagne mare, Marie LaMarr #501284. She was by Buck LaMarr and out of Black Beauty Allen #440890. Buck LaMarr and Black Beauty Allen were both bred by Tom Moss of Big Horn, Wyoming. The Gay Parader was a top breeding sire in Washington State. This guy could walk and his presence when he entered the ring commanded attention!

JOE'S JOSIE #693260 was bred by Clark Allen. She was out of Rapid Josephine II #511011. This sorrel mare was owned by Murray McCargar of Calgary. Josie became Murray's best friend, dog trainer, and companion. She was shipped to Alberta with He'za and other Clark Allen horses and Murray bought her in 1978. \*2

When Rapid Joe was 25 or 26, one of the Allens' friends wanted to ride him in the parade in Billings. She decked Joe out in a silver mounted saddle, bridle, and breast collar. His hooves were even speckled with gold! Evie said Joe knew he looked pretty. But he was so stiff from his years of working on concrete at the stock yards that he could only go about two blocks.

Clark could not bear to see Joe suffer or end up at a rendering plant. He ended Joe's life with a bullet; a loving, courageous, and humane way to bring to an end the life of such a valuable old stallion.

When Clark's health started failing, he was forced to sell his Tennessee Walkers. He'za Walker was sold to Arne Hauge of Kalispell, Montana. Arne took He'za to Calgary when he was a twelve year old in 1976. A year and a half later, He'za was sold to Dave and Pam Gunderson of Cremona, Alberta. In 1981 Charles and Marjorie Lacy of Edson, AB bought him, with Jack Gurnett, and He'za lived his final years on Jack & Margaret Gurnett's Northfork Farm near Rimbey. He'za died at age 19.

The line of Rapid Joe and his son, He'za Walker, lives on in Northfork Sky Walker. Jean Rempel bought Sky Walker from Jack Gurnett in May of 1987. "Luke", as he is called, is, as far as we know, the only stallion by He'za standing in Alberta. Luke passes on to his get those great bloodlines of Rapid Joe and Roan Allen's Wave, historical bloodlines combined nearly forty years ago.

Clark Allen brought a great stallion from the obscurity of the stock yards to create a breeding program that continues on today.



Alberta elects a director to the TWHBEA Board this fall for a three year term. The two who are standing for election are RANDY JOHNSON of Sherwood Park, who is just completing his first three year term, and LAURIE INNOCENT of Rosalind. Ballots were sent out in September to all TWHBEA members and must be returned and in the ballot box in Tennessee by October 15.

There is also a proposed by-law change regarding the number of Directors to represent the various states, regions or provinces. The reason given for the proposed by-law change is to have a more productive board.

"As the number of board members continues to grow, it becomes increasingly difficult to inform that many people." said Craig Evans, Member at Large.

"It's equally as difficult for that many board members to effectively participate under the time constraints of two weekend meetings per year. The alternatives are to proportionately downsize the board, or let the board continue to grow and increase the length of the convention."

The motion was that the TWHBEA appoint a committee to investigate and study 'why' we have sore and drugged horses, and 'why' we have bad and dishonest judging, with the details to be made public in the *Voice* magazine and any other media that would accept it."


#### INTERIOR GAITED HORSE SHOW

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### TRAINING MYTH-UNDERSTANDINGS

### Working In Corridors (HEEDING - Part 2 of 3)

Heeding is a horse communication system that proceeds in small, horse logical steps that never create fear or antagonism in the horse. It requires being consistent in the moves you make around the horse, introducing just one small bite of information at a time, and making sure that new information is just one step away from what the horse already understands. Heeding builds a solid foundation that the horse and trainer can use to play reining or show jumping or dressage or any other game they decide to play.

In a relationship with a horse, the best place to start is at a distance. So last time we talked about how you start the heeding relationship at a distance. You turn the horse loose in an arena and just "play", by following him in a way that builds his confidence that you are not an attacker. You establish an imaginary line running through your shoulders and the horse's shoulders and consistently keep your body facing in the same direction as the horse.

The horse begins to associate the posture with the freedom to move forward. When you step behind this line, you put pressure on the horse to move forward. If you step ahead of this line, you restrict him a little. As you and your horse get to playing together and paying more attention to one another, you can eventually use these actions to encourage the horse to turn in another direction or change speed. For example, you can step ahead of the shoulder line, turn, and ask the horse for a turn.

But in the beginning, you just play and wait until the horse stops to signal he accepts you and wants to approach. When he does, you turn your shoulders parallel to the horse's body and start making friends by scratching and "grooming" him from his chest up to his favorite places. The horse begins to associate that shoulder position with standing still and relaxing.

After grooming, you snap a lead rope on his halter, and you change the game a little. You start asking the horse to follow you, literally step by step. In the bginning, you want to match your steps to the horse's steps. When he picks up his right fore foot, you pick up your right foot. When he moves his left, you move yours. Take a look at how your horse is standing. The front foot that's a little behind is most likely the one he'll pick up first when you ask him to move off with you.

The reason for matching the horse's footfalls is because everyone starts out trying to develop a langage with the horse by telling it a hundred things to do. That doesn't work. In the beginning, you match exactly what the horse is doing. Eventually, the horse understands that matching strides is the game. Then you can change the game a liitle again and start asking him to match exactly what you are doing.

The first time, you kind of move him over along the wall quietly, then stop and scratch him. Then you obviously turn from facing toward him to facing with him in the same direction. You start to walk, anticipating which foot the horse

is going to move first. Just as you start to walk, you reach back with the whip and encourage him with a little rustle or shake to go forward. He can see your feet move in his peripheral vision, he can hear the rustle behind him, and he can see it's open in front of him. It's an easy decision to step forward. Now you are "leading" the horse, not just physically, but mentally.

When you start teaching your horse to heed, you walk along the wall of an arena. The wall creates one side of a corridor while you, with the lead rope in your hand and a whip sticking behind you, are the other wall. The "walls" create a shape the horse can feel. A methodical corridor of pressures create shapes the horse can understand.

You walk down the wall and as you approach the end of the arena, the horse will think the corridor is blocked. To turn, you turn the line running through your shoulders and the horse's shoulders. You don't pull the head over because if you pull on the lead, you teach the horse to lean on the lead. And if you teach him to lean on the lead, he will always think that he can lean on any aid you put on. So as you reach the end of the arena, you have to fall back a tiny bit, turning your shoulders away from the horse so that you open up one side of the corridor. Now you can bring him around the end and show him that the corridor bends. You do the same thing on the next wall.

If you have a situation where he wants to run off in front of you or you are having trouble getting him to stop, don't yank on the lead. Walk straight into the arena corner to stop him. Give him lots of scratching and loving to let him know that halting was the right answer. Then make a turn, go across to the next wal and do the same thing. Before you know it you will be able to stop before you get into the corner and he will stop with you. The control is being transferred to you.

Heeding gets the relationship between you and your horse to the point where you can communicate exactly where you want each step and how long the stride should be. That is where real control comes from. Once you have the horse working in a horse-logical corridor of physical pressures on the ground, you'll change the game again and ask him to work in a corridor of pressures (aids) created by a rider sitting on his back. The more methodical you are about the kinds of moves you use, the easier it is to get the horse in the habit of paying attention to you. And the more accurately you speak this lanuage, the more relaxed and calm the horse will be.

### WATCHOUT FOR TOMORROW


In 1954, White Star, a white mare by Sir Maugray entered the Celebration oval to compete for the 16th World Grand Championship of the Tennessee Walking Horse breed. This maximal sabino daughter of Sir Maugray and the Merry Boy daughter, Crain's Merry Lady, was not the first white horse to accept this challenge. At the initial Celebration in 1939, competition was so close between the Wilson's Allen gelding, Strolling Jim, and the white mare, Lillie White, that judge Clyde Westbrooks rode both the mare and the gelding for the other judges. Lillie White had to settle for reserve championship honors, making White Star, in 1954, the first white horse to win the World Grand Championship. What was also significant about White Star's win was the fact that she was the last flatshod horse to garner the tricolor. Beginning with the stallion, Go Boy's Shadow's, victory in 1955, all World Grand Champions since have worn built-up shoes and some sort of action device.

In 1998, some 45 Celebrations later, another "horse of a different color" appeared as a contender for the World Grand Championship. Hailing from the state of California, Champagne Watchout, a 17 hand amber champagne junior stallion, with his owners, Nathan and Jennie

Jackson, entered the four year old stallion preliminary as a qualifier for the 1998 World Grand Championship stake. What is significant about this stallion's challenge is that Watchout is not a padded show walker, but a heads-up, big-striding, liteshod horse.

The story began about 20 years ago when Jennie was still a juvenile competitor. Her family acquired a lovely mahogany bay mare for plantation competition. Jennie fell in love with the mare, changing her name to Walkin Bay Lady. Jennie and Lady won a wallful of ribbons in plantation competition, but the team was separated when her parents decided they must sell the mare. As a teenager, Jennie accepted their decision, although she missed the mare's place in her life.

As an adult, Jennie became a professional trainer of Tennessee Walkers and Ponies of the Americas, combining this demanding career with raising her five children, thanks to the support and assistance of her husband, Nathan. In the fall of 1995, she received two champagne colored colts for breaking. They came from the ranch of Jack and Bea

Kinkade, promoters of the champagne line of Walkers founded by the noted show mare, Champagne Lady Diane. The Kinkades would keep one, the second would be available to the Jacksons.

The 18 month old colts were named Champagne Suede and Champagne Watchout. At 18 months, Suede was near maturity, filled out, sleek, fit and beautiful. Watchout, though the same age, was underweight, all legs, and obviously still growing. Jack Kinkade decided that Suede would be retained by him and his wife. The Jacksons could have Watchout.

In a phone conversation, Jennie asked Mr. Kinkade about Watchout's pedigree. She knew that his sire was Champagne Lookout, a grandson of Champagne Lady. What was Watchout's dam's breeding? Jack Kinkade told her that his dam was named Walkin Bay Lady.

"Our family named a mare Walkin Bay Lady," Jennie protested. There must be some initials with that name."

"I have the papers in front of me," Kinkade replied. "The mare's full name is Walkin Bay Lady."

Walkin Bay Lady had returned to Jennie Jackson through her yearling son, Champagne Watchout.

Although not fully matured as a two year old, Champagne Watchout competed quite successfully in liteshod classes. He made the trip east to compete in the International, and went on to the National Celebration to tie tenth in the Two Year Old Liteshod Class with Nathan Jackson aboard. Champagne Watchout finished a successful 1997 season with a big win in the Western States Celebration at Reno, Nevada, again with Nathan in the irons. The victory in Reno marked a turning point in the big colt's career.

Even before the victory at Reno, Nathan and Jennie Jackson were discussing a change and a challenge for their stallion's future. Nathan explains, "We were talking about how special this horse is. I asked Jennie, 'Where are we going with this horse?' I felt led by God that he had sent this horse back to Jennie as a special gift. I felt that it was our mission to take the breed 'back to the future', to return to the time when flatshod horses could successfully compete for the breed's World Grand Championship. Husband\exhibitor and wife\trainer decided that in 1998 their unusual-colored stallion would attempt something not tried for over forty years. He would vie for the breed's World Grand Championship, shod in liteshod shoes.

The Jacksons knew the NHSC Rulebook, but studied it again. Rule 58 states that a horse may change divisions, going up or down, one time per year. To avoid confusion on the issue, the Jacksons elected to withhold Champagne Watchout from competition in 1998. To avoid damage to his legs, they conditioned him for the challenge not by saddle work, but by swimming. Over the winter of 1997-1998, for a period of eight months, Watchout swam six days a week at a Thoroughbred lay-up farm. Unlike his stablemates at the farm, who run only in one direction, Watchout must perform both ways of the showring. For this reason, he swam both the directions in the exercise pool. At the end of the eight months, Watchout was in top condition!

Watchout's first scheduled showring outing in 1998 was Class 69, Four Year Old Stallions. Because the horse would be competing flatshod in a class normally featuring built-up shoes and braced tails, the rulebook proved vague in its definitions of how Watchout should appear. The Jacksons left the decision over the necessity for action devices and a humane braced tail to the Celebration officials. Their objective was simply to compete in the same ring with the other four year old stallions, thereby qualifying for the final class on Saturday, September 5. Nathan said, "We know we're

bucking the system, but it's a system full of holes that needs to be bucked."

The Jacksons' efforts to "buck the system" captured the attention of the Middle Tennessee media, as both *The Nashville Tennessean* and the Nashville affiliate of ABC News, WKRN, Channel 2, carried coverage of the Jacksons' proposed foray into the heat of show horse competition. CEO Ron Thomas, Celebration officials, and others protested, however, insisting that the horse was pleasure shod and should compete as such. Their opinions prevailed, and though the Celebration's rules were bent to allow the big amber stallion to pay fees for pleasure classes after the August 5th deadline, Champagne Watchout and Nathan Jackson took to the rail in Shelbyville only in the pleasure ranks.

What the future holds for Jackson, Watchout, and others who would like to see the title of World Grand Champion revert to horses gaiting in a natural style remains a question for the year, and the century, to come!


#### I'D LIKE TO KNOW...

#### Original Walking Horse Standards

Gait Analysis: DEFINITIONS FLAT - FOOT WALK

SEQUENCE: Left hind leg, left foreleg, right hind leg, right foreleg.

TIMING: Four precisely even hoof beats per stride (square four beat) with a distinct pause between each hoof beat.

pock, pock, pock, pock

WEIGHT SUPPORT: The horse is supported by two or three legs at all times during the stride. When only two legs support, it is always one foreleg and one hind leg. The support pattern is 3,2,3,2,3,2,3,2,3.

BALANCE/COUNTERBALANCE: The head and neck move in a vertical nod which flows out of the shoulders. The head is down when both hind legs and one foreleg are fully supporting weight. The head is up when both forelegs and one hind leg are fully supporting weight. The horse nods "yes" twice per stride. The nod moves up and down the center line of the body but variations in conformation and/or timing may create an upside down "V" nod in which the head nods down to the left when the left foreleg is supporting weight, up to the center, down to the right when the right foreleg is supporting weight and up to the center. The head nod coordinates with the support pattern of the legs thus: 3 (head down), 2, 3 (head up), 2, 3, (head down), 2, 3 (head up).

WEIGHT TRANSFER: The horse steps from hoof to hoof so that each hoof is flat on the ground and fully supporting weight before the next hoof in sequence touches the ground and remains flat on the ground until the next hoof is also flat on the ground. This may be referred to as a flat - foot transfer.

#### 1993 ORIGINAL RUNNING WALK DEFINITION

SEQUENCE: Left hind leg, left foreleg, right hind leg, right foreleg.

TIMING: Four precisely even hoof beats per stride (square four beat) with a brief but distinct pause between hoofbeats.

Pock, pock, pock

WEIGHT SUPPORT: Weight is supported on three legs, then two legs, then three legs in an alternating 3,2,3,2,3,2,3,2,3 support pattern. When the horse has only two legs on the ground, it is always one foreleg and one hind leg.

BALANCE/COUNTERBALANCE: A vertical nod of the head and neck with no swing, sway or circling movement. The withers and back remain level as the horse nods. Or the withers will rise slightly when the head is down and drop slightly when the head is up. At no time should the head and withers move together. When viewed from the front, the head moves up and

down the centerline of the body. The head is down when both hind legs and one foreleg are supporting weight.

An upside down "V" nod is also acceptable if the relationship between the nod, timing and support pattern are the same as the straight nod in all other ways. The head nods down to the left when the left foreleg and both hind legs are supporting weight; up to the center when both forelegs and one hind leg support; and down to the right when the right foreleg and both hind legs are supporting.

The head nod coordinates with the support pattern of the legs thus: 3 (head down), 2,3 (head up), 2,3 (head down), 2,3 (head up),2,3 (head down).

WEIGHT TRANSFER: Weight is transferred from one hoof to the next by rolling or flowing across the hoof from heel to toe. At the moment of transfer the horse is supported by three legs. One leg is directly under the horse with the hoof flat on the ground fully supporting weight. The hoof that is accepting weight is supporting with the heel. The hoof that is releasing weight is supporting with the toe. This is a rolling weight transfer.

An overstride of 6" - 24" is desirable.

#### 1995 FOXTROT DEFINITION

SEQUENCE: Left hind leg, left foreleg, right hind leg, right foreleg, left hind leg.

TIMING: Uneven four beats per stride. The interval between the set down of the left hind leg and the left foreleg is longer than the interval between set down of the left foreleg and right hind leg. The interval between the set down of the right hind leg and right foreleg is longer than the interval between the set down of the right foreleg and left hind leg.

pock, pock, pock, pock

WEIGHT SUPPORT: The weight support pattern is 3,2,3,2,3,2,3,2,3. When the horse is supported on only two legs it is always one hind leg and one foreleg.

BALANCE/COUNTERBALANCE: An upside down "V" head nod in which the head nods down to the left when the left foreleg is supporting weight, up to the center, down to the right when the right foreleg is supporting weight and up to the center. The head nod coordinates with the support pattern of the legs thus: 3 (head down), 2, 3 (head up), 2, 3 (head down), 2, 3 (head up), 2, 3 (head down).

WEIGHT TRANSFER: The fox trot uses a rolling weight transfer. Weight is transferred from one hoof to the next by rolling or flowing across the hoof from heel to toe. At the moment of transfer the horse is supported by three legs.

#### 1995 STEPPING PACE DEFINITION

SEQUENCE: Left hind leg, left foreleg, right hind leg, right foreleg, left hind leg.

TIMING: Uneven four beats per stride. Both left legs lift off together but the left hind leg sets down before the left foreleg, then both right legs lift off together but the right hind leg sets down before the right foreleg. The interval between the set down of the left hind and the left foreleg is shorter than the time between set down of the left foreleg and the right hind leg. The time between the set down of the right hind and the right foreleg is shorter than the interval between the set down of the right foreleg and left hind leg.

pock, pock, pock, pock,

WEIGHT SUPPORT: The support pattern is 3,2,3,2,3,2,3,2,3. When the horse is supported on only two legs it is always one hind leg and one foreleg.

BALANCE/COUNTERBALANCE: A side to side sway or roll of the body, which increases as the gait becomes more lateral and decreases as it becomes more even. The head nods in a "V" motion: up toward the left when the left foreleg is bearing weight, down to the center, up to the right when the right foreleg is bearing weight and down to the center.

WEIGHT TRANSFER: The stepping pace uses a rolling weight transfer with no suspension phases. Weight is transferred from one hoof to the next by rolling or flowing across the hoof from heel to toe. The hoof that is releasing weight is supporting with the toe. The hoof that is accepting weight is supporting with the heel. The horse is supported by three legs at the moment of transfer.

NOTES: The stepping pace is a natural gait with a speed range of 5 - 10 miles per hour and the longest overstride among gaits having a three leg weight support pattern. It is the most common middle gait of the modern Tennessee Walking Horse and Spotted Saddle Horse. The stepping pace is frequently mistaken for a flat walk or running walk by Tennessee Walking Horse trainers, instructors, judges, breeders, riders and owners. The stepping pace is the easiest four - beat gait for the rider to get since it is what most multigaited horses do when ridden haphazardly or too fast. The stepping pace is quite prevalent in the Foxtrotter breed where it is often mistaken for the foxtrot. The stepping pace is also the "slow gait" of the five - gaited Saddlebred.

#### 1995 RACK DEFINITION

SEQUENCE: Left hind leg, left foreleg, right hind leg, right foreleg.

TIMING: Four precisely even hoof beats per stride (square four beat) with very brief but distinct pause between hoofbeats.

peck, peck, peck, peck.


WEIGHT SUPPORT: Weight is supported on one hind leg, then two legs - one hind leg and one foreleg, then one foreleg, then two legs - one hind leg and one foreleg, then one hind leg in a 1,2,1,2,1,2,1,2,1 support pattern.

BALANCE/COUNTERBALANCE: The horse's body rocks back and forth as the horse moves from hind leg support to foreleg support. The head and neck are held straight up and move forward and back in a pecking motion. The neck is back with the forehand up when weight is supported on a single hind leg. The neck is forward with the forehand down when weight is supported on a single foreleg.

WEIGHT TRANSFER: Weight is transferred from one hoof to the next by rolling or flowing across the hoof from heel to toe. At the moment of transfer the horse is supported by two legs, one foreleg and one hind leg. The hoof accepting weight is supporting with the heel. The hoof that is releasing weight is supporting with the toe. This is a rolling weight transfer.

The rack is a natural gait and in its natural form does not harm the horse.




