




A lifetime has gone by, and my granddaughter is now older than that "Roy Rogers wannabe". It took me that long but now I finally get to be Roy Rogers all the time when we play cowboy. I may not have Trigger (now stuffed in a rearing position in perpetuity) but I do have his great granddaughter, Uphill Dusty Gold (Honey Boy's Rebel x Uphill Arnica).

An old issue of Walking Horse News inspired me to write and inquire whether it was still being published. In my letter I mentioned that my dream was to own a palomino with Allen's Gold Zephyr bloodlines. Not only was WHN still very much alive and living in Edson, but publisher, Marjorie Lacy, just happened to be a keeper of the golden genes. She had five generations of golden TWH with Allen's Gold Zephyr as base sire. The bad news for me was that she didn't really want to sell any of them! But she did tantalize me with photos of the two youngest, Uphill Dusty Gold (Honey Boy's Rebel x Uphill Arnica) & her filly, Uphill Penny By Chance (also a deep gold).

Well, it took a year of sending psychic messages via the airwaves ("You will let me have one of the golden girls. You will let me have one of the golden girls...") plus phone calls and correspondence. Finally Marjorie agreed to sell either Uphill Dusty Gold (aka Punkin) or her daughter, Penny, but not both. Our entire trip was taken up with excited horse talk, and we were in Edson before we knew it. We enjoyed their wonderful hospitality and got the grand tour of the lovely log home they've built.



A week of Parelli work and "My Gal Trigger" follows me around like I've always dreamed my horse would do. It may be she's looking for those yummy treats, or just wanting her itchy spots scratched, but I like to think it's because she feels about me the way I feel about her. I love every golden inch of her!

Thank you from the bottom of my heart, Marjorie, for enabling me to realize my lifelong dream of owning Trigger, or at least a part thereof. Now I get to be Roy Rogers every time I play cowboy. I'm sure he would be pleased.

TRAINING MYTHUNDERSTANDINGS

LEARNING FROM HORSES: Mama

Everything I've learned about communicating with horses I've learned from horses. Sometimes it took awhile for the lessons they were teaching me to sink in. But the

wisdom they shared with me gradually accumulated and became the system we now teach at Meredith Manor. Particular horses

stand out in my memory.

One was an old style, liver chestnut Quarter mare with those bulgy muscles and little feet who was already doing a lot of things before we bought her to show. She had high withers, the kind that are good for holding a saddle when you're roping or cutting. She had a rather plain, coarse head that might have been ugly except that she had a real soft eye that made you forgive the rest. Her registered name was WMD Aloha and the guy we bought her from called her Mother. That got shortened to Mama, and Mama she was for the rest of her life.

Mama never got overly excited. I remember one time when I was pulling a homemade trailer behind a six-cylinder Chevy truck. In those days, most of the trailers were homemade and nobody had thought of putting springs under them. They were pretty much wooden boxes bolted to axles and the ride must have been pretty rough. The trailer came unhitched when the truck bottomed out going over the crest of a hill and it started to pass me. I managed to block it with the truck and get it stopped so I could rehitch. There wasn't a sound from the trailer. Mama was as calm as anything though the sweat was pouring off her. When Mama got worried, she'd sweat. But that was all.

The incident was even more remarkable when I learned from her previous owner that she'd been in a trailer once that had been hit by a truck. Mama spent an hour in the overturned trailer until they got her out. I always marveled that she'd get back in a trailer at all after all that but Mama was always compliant.

Mama was a great arena horse. Whatever the game was, she knew the drill and she'd just go along. It didn't matter if the rider was flopping around. That was OK. It didn't matter if you gave her the wrong cues. She'd ignore them and do her job. I really came to admire Mama

because, pretty or not, she was so honest about understanding what her job was and going ahead and doing it. We rented her out for classes because all anybody had to do was sit in the saddle and hold the reins. They'd be fine and might even get a ribbon.

My point about Mama is that sometimes horses can be so honest and uncomplicated and unperturbed by whatever you throw at them that you begin to think you're pretty good. Horses like Mama make you think you're someplace even when you haven't done anything yet.

Then along comes the next horse and you find you haven't really got the vocabulary to talk to it and explain what you want it to do. People who buy a really well trained horse with the notion that the horse is going to teach them what they need to know are missing the point. The horse can teach them what the right thing feels like, but the horse can't teach them how to communicate that same feel to another horse. That's a different skill.

Horse shows are just games people play to have fun with their horses. And as soon as somebody gets really good at the game and starts winning all the ribbons, somebody else decides to change the game so other people have a chance to win.

A true horseman understands how to create a corridor of pressures that create a shape the horse can feel. Those corridors are the same no matter what game the horse is being trained to play or whether he's a baby or an old campaigner or whether he's an Arab or a Quarter horse.

You can be a true horseman without necessarily being a winner in the show game. But the people who win all the performance games are not necessarily horsemen. They may just be riding Mama.


P-N-H in MANITOBA Article & Photos by Jo Kingsland

As a dedicated supporter of Parelli training, I decided to take a much needed break from routine and drive (2700 km total) to Manitoba to attend Barb Fenwick's PNH OUTBACK CAMP. Except for the 35 to 38°C temperatures that week (a little TOO high for me!), it was a perfect trip and I met a wonderful group of people.


Barb, her sister, Gertie, and friend, Crystal, had everything organized so well at Four Seasons Ranch, but due to flight delays instructor Dave Ellis from California arrived late and his P-A equipment followed the day after! Clinic hours were lengthened to make up for lost time. The clinic was billed as Level 1,2,3, and we started on perfecting some of Parelli's "Seven Games". Dave would then digress according to any problems that showed up among the participants, explaining, and usually fixing, those problems right away.

Morning sessions were held in the outdoor arena, except for Sunday when we worked under the shade of the trees on essential knots, and got some good advice on hobbles & hobble training. Afternoons were spent on the trails in Spruce Woods Provincial Park (right next door), with Dave riding Barb's mare, Raven, or, for one day, the Peruvian Paso whose owner had suffered a bit of sunstroke. Evenings we had a chance to discuss things with Dave, always very willing to talk, and then some organized entertainment. One night was Cowboy Poetry & Old Time Tales, another was Country Western Music & Yodelling.

Dave's opening statement showed his concern for the general lack of understanding of what a "Pleasure" horse really is. His comment was that we respect a "Dressage" horse or a "Reining" horse or a "Cutting" horse as highly trained horses, but we forget that a "Pleasure" horse is really the most highly trained horse of all, for it has to be a pleasure to ride, anywhere, anytime and by anybody. Dave's love of trail riding was always evident, in his teaching and in his tales of wilderness camping.


BARB: "But what did you think of Dave the instructor?"


BARB: "What did you enjoy most during the clinic, Phantom?"

Barry says Silver has logged many, many mountain miles since he left here. We originally sold Silver at about 5 months of age to Leta Kelly. When she became ill and had to sell her Walkers, he went to her neighbour, Reg Dee. Then Reg was in a logging accident and his uncle took the horses. Barry bought Silver from him.)

Barry continues, "I contacted Hans Burch at Williams Lake and wound up buying two Walkers from him. They are nicely gaited horses. Both are five year olds. (I was looking for something older; however, I am pleased. I had forgotten what it was like to ride a young horse with their having to get used to their environment and their jumping at the least quick movement!) I was quite impressed with Hans as a horse trainer. He follows Pat Parelli methods."

NATALIE SPECKMAIER, VANCOUVER, writes, "I believe Nicole already wrote to you about the TWH clinic held at her place on June 2 & 3, so I won't report that news. One thing she may not have told you is how impressed Cindy was with the training Kara had invested in her two month old (at the time) filly. She was not just haltered but leading, tying, trailer loading, grooming, hoof handling, clipping and on and on! Cindy also expressed her opinion regarding Nicole's stud colt, saying that he was stallion material and thereby "saving his manhood", as Nicole was unsure whether to leave him intact or not. According to Cindy, Trigger has a wonderful running walk and rocking horse canter. Nice to hear an expert opinion!"



"Nicole, Kara and I camped at the Gaited Horse Show in Armstrong the July long weekend. If I wasn't totally committed to Tennessee Walkers and my "one and only", Trigger, a Peruvian Paso would have tempted me to pull out my cheque book. There were some really nice TWHs, even some for sale, and it was wonderful to see all that beautiful horseflesh strutting its stuff. A fun show."

"Nicole, Kara and I camped in Golden Ears Park for a couple of days last week and had some awesome rides. The main horse corral there has been taken over by a rental outfit that trailers in some 40 horses per day with trail rides going out hourly. The corrals that had been there for years were removed, and permanent hitching posts erected inside a rent-a-fence type enclosure. Apart from those, there was one public hitching area. The traffic in horses, people, and vehicles in one day was ten times more than we'd ever seen there in all the times we'd camped there. To add insult to injury, a security guy came by on our first evening while we were roasting marshmallows and told us we couldn't camp overnight. Past experience had a camp ranger visiting us most evenings to advise that the gates were closing in case we weren't planning to stay overnight. After a very long discussion, he left to confer with his superior and promised to return the following evening with a verdict i.e. we'd have to leave, or pay a fee (how? since we weren't allowed to camp overnight). We didn't see him again."

"The result of all that was a letter written by me to Parks B.C. asking whether an impact study had been done before they leased out the facilities to a commercial riding stable, and why hadn't there been public input when the subject of a lease came up. I've donated money for the upkeep of those trails and resent a commercial operation being the beneficiary of my donation. We'll see if there is a sane answer to my letter."

From FAY ZILKOWSKY, KNUTSFORD, "We are trying to cut back our horse herd, so we can spend more time on our riding stock. The rest end up getting neglected because I am totally devoted to riding. I want to keep 4 horses so I can have a spare since I totally wear out a set of shoes on one horse every 4 to 5 weeks. I am on my way out the door right now to a week long Parelli camp."

From JO-ANNE McDONALD, McDONALD FARMS, POUCE COUPE, "We sold a two year old spotted Walker gelding. Elsie Crook of Fort St. John bought the black and white gelding, Successful Masterpiece (Dressed for Success x Sage King's Black Beauty). 
ONTARIO NEWS

"If you are travelling through this area, do stop in. If your horses need a rest and drink, we can find a pen to put them in. We live 1 1/2 miles from main highway # 93 in lake county."



This exquisite creature – gone. He always came when called, those curly ears forward, head bobbing, happy. He loved the attention. He loved flaunting it in front of his pasture mates. His emotions were always so easy to read through his facial expressions, his body language.

We were becoming attuned to one another. He would come to me for guidance and reassurance when uncertain of what I was trying to communicate to him.

He could be sly, playing on my penchant to give him the benefit of the doubt, enjoying his ability to fool me. I'm pretty certain he was smarter than me, but he was willing to wait for me to catch up. Now I never will.

When he first came to me in December 1999, his preferred gait was the pace, which I found beautiful to watch. It was so effortless for him; he flowed along and he had smooth transitions into the canter. He made me laugh because while gearing up, he would have so many gaits to choose from that he would seem to get entangled in his legs, then he would hit his pace and glide. Gearing down again became choppy while he chose a gait. Carol Hall, his trainer, told me he could rack too, but I never got good enough to recognize his rack.

By spring, 2001, he rarely paced. His running walk was his first choice followed by a smart looking, clean trot, then his canter. His transitions were much smoother and he rarely tangled his legs. He seemed so much more comfortable in his skin.

So many stories... I can't believe we will have no more. I can't believe *he* is no more.





CANADIAN REGISTRY OF THE TENNESSEE WALKING HORSE NEWS & NOTES

TAKING DNA SAMPLES by Jean Rempel, President, CRTWH

This year both the <u>SIRE & DAM</u> of a foal must be either blood typed or DNA profiled and on record before the foal may be registered with CLRC. If you are using DNA profiling, here are some suggestions when pulling mane hair samples. We hope these will help you avoid common problems with your horses' DNA samples.

- [1] Pull double the amount called for in the kit.
- [2] Check to see if you are getting the roots (the little bulbs at the end of each hair), but don't touch them.
- [3] Have your DNA hair kit prepared before you pull the hair and place it on the kit immediately, especially when you are pulling multiple samples.
- [4] Wear gloves. (I found it was easier to pull hair with a glove on). Change gloves between horses if possible when pulling multiple samples.
- [5] Make sure you do not touch the hair roots. (You don't want your own DNA on them!)
- [6] Place each kit in its own envelope.
- [7] DO NOT SEND YOUR REMITTANCE AT THIS TIME. You will be invoiced by the Canadian Registry of the Tennessee Walking Horse (CRTWH) on completion of the test. You will receive your DNA certificate at the same time
- [8] Mail each kit separately to Maxxam Equitest, 335 Laird Road, Unit 4, Guelph, Ontario, N1H 6J3

The following are some problems that the lab has run into, with suggestions on how to avoid them:

INSUFFICIENT HAIR SAMPLES FOR TESTING. Where there weren't enough hair roots included in the sample, the test must be run again. This means that Maxxam charges for that test and will be charging again when you send in the new sample, which means you will be paying twice. This happens because they have to run the test before they know if they have enough material. We suggest you send double the amount requested.

DNA HAIR KITS THAT HAVE BEEN ACCIDENTALLY MIXED UP WHEN PULLING MULTIPLE SAMPLES. We suggest you have someone help you when you are pulling multiple samples. Pull the hair, then have your helper fasten it in the kit, and mark and close that kit before going on to the next horse.

CONTAMINATION OF HAIR SAMPLES. This can be caused by the mixing of hair samples from two or more horses, or by your handling of the hair roots. Pulling multiple samples without washing hands or without changing gloves may also cause cross contamination. We suggest you have a helper as noted above, or take samples from only one horse at a time. Also it's important to wash your hands or change gloves between taking samples. Do not touch the roots of the hair you have pulled!

Good luck for a trouble-free test. (Do it now while the weather's warm, before you HAVE to wear gloves!)

The Canadian Registry of the Tennessee Walking Horse and 'The Canadian' Tennessee Walking Horse Futurity appreciate your commitment, support and understanding.

Difficult circumstances require difficult decisions. The decision to cancel 'The Canadian' was not done without considering our committed sponsors, competitors, breeders and volunteers. For 18 years weather, distance, hard work, frustration, politics, lack of stalls, late night showing, absence of ribbons, accidents, and vehicle breakdowns have not deterred committed people and horses from competing at 'The Canadian'. In the nineteenth year we faced circumstances unheard of in our lifetime. As one person stated, "Who would have thought a horror so far away would have an impact on a horse show in a small town?"

We are cognizant and appreciative of the hard work and dedication of owners, breeders and exhibitors. We share their disappointment in not having the opportunity to present their horses to the judge and audience. We understand the importance of allowing your horses to be seen by spectators, friends, family, potential buyers and mare owners. However, the disappointment everyone feels is insignificant when compared to the devastation and suffering of those in New York City and Washington.

It is not possible to reschedule 'The Canadian' in 2001. A venue with a minimum of 65 stalls is essential. Facilities with that capacity are limited and at this late date there are none available and affordable. 'The Canadian' promises all exhibitors a certified Tennessee Walking Horse judge. It was impossible to hire a qualified substitute judge and guarantee that judge would arrive in Canada by September 15, 2001.

As a result of these unusual circumstances, the Futurity committee of the Canadian Registry of the Tennessee Walking Horse will do the following:

- 1. All horses entered in 'The Canadian' for 2001 will retain their eligibility for 2002.
- 2. All entry fees and stall fees will be returned immediately to all owners.
- 3. All Stallion and Mare Nomination fees will be retained by 'The Canadian' to enable the weanling entries to continue to compete in future years.
- Committed owners and breeders of three, four and five year olds horses who were entered in 2001 will be accommodated.
 - a. In 2002 a Special Two Gait Performance Class will be added. This class is for those horses entered in the Two Gait Performance class in 2001. These four year old horses will not compete in the regular Two Gait Performance Class for 3 year olds. They will compete with their peers.
 - b. In 2002 a Special Three Gait Performance Class will be added. This class is for those horses entered in the Three Gait Performance class in 2001. These horses will not compete in the regular Three Gait Performance Class for 4 or 5 year olds. They will compete with their peers.

Mister Moves Away

Five horses were just too many for my back yard. Mister Star La Marr's antics amused me. His stubborn pushiness infuriated me. He was only two and a half years old and had not yet been ridden but he already had more education than most gaited horses ever get. He wasn't the stallion prospect his breeder intended but he'd make a nice trail horse.

There seemed to be a strong market for Walking Horse trail geldings in California so in the fall of 2000 I advertised Mister in the *California Horse Trader*. I would never have known the ad had run if my California pen pals hadn't clipped it out and mailed it to me.

I advertised both Blue and Mister in the *Arizona Horse* in December and January. This netted four calls about Blue and none about Mister.

In March 2001 I mentioned to Grace Larson that I wanted to sell a horse or two. Grace suggested the internet and offered to help. She was impressed with the picture that had been in *California Horse Trader*. After I'd outlined Mister's character, movement, pedigree, care, training and performance potential, Grace recommended raising his price by \$250! Three days after Mister's listing appeared on the internet, we got an inquiry from Pam in California asking for a video.

My Dad was camera man while I handled Mister. We videotaped the results of 2 1/2 years of ground training. This included sacking out, haltering, standing tied, hoof handling, leading from both sides, turns on forehand and hindquarters, sort of sidepassing, walking over logs, ground tying, saddling, lunging both directions at walk and lope, and trailer loading. The lunging was Mister's current work. He hadn't been in the trailer for over a year. He was on his best behavior so I didn't have to edit. I added footage of Mister at liberty to show his character and antics. The video concluded with Mister's nose-to-bucket challenge of a backhoe that was working beside his fence.

Ten days later I got a very enthusiastic message from Pam. She'd been looking for a horse for her husband but after a week of riding an Arabian mare across the Mojave desert she wanted Mister for herself. Mister was going to Perris, California, not far from Hemet, where I grew up. We both wanted to move Mister as soon as possible so he could adapt to the desert before it really got hot.

Mister's trailer loading skills were excellent but he hadn't been hauled any further than half a mile down the road since moving from Massachusetts to Arizona at two months old. I decided to give him a shakedown cruise before taking him to California. Mister loaded perfectly and we set off. I headed down the new road to Show Low, then up Highway 260 to Pinetop-Lakeside. Mister rode well. I stopped at the police station to turn in some lost keys I'd found and checked on Mister. He was calm but had a new cut over his right eyebrow. I never did figure out how he did it. The cut wasn't serious so I hauled him up to Woodland Lake Park where I unloaded him for a short walk.

Mister had never been there before and got excited. As soon as I opened the trailer door he charged out backwards, forcing his way underneath the butt bar. Mister scraped a patch of hair off the middle of his back and bruised himself enough that he decided to settle down and obey me. He was a perfect little gentleman as I led him along a trail he'd never seen before. Back at the trailer he was so eager to get in he fidgeted while I groomed him then jumped into the trailer as soon as I'd let him. At home I parked the rig and waited until Mister was standing quietly before opening the trailer. This time he stood still until I told him to back up, then backed out quietly. I praised him lavishly, treated his wounds and turned him loose in his corral. Pam had already paid for Mister so I called the vet about his cut and scrapes and emailed Pam. The vet said it didn't really need treatment and would heal in about 10 days.

It is about 600 miles from Lakeside, AZ to Perris, CA. After some deliberation I decided to recruit an assistant driver and make it a one-day trip. Mister's health certificate had not come the night before we were scheduled to leave. The next morning I called Pam to reschedule and turned the horses out to graze. Mister spent the first 10 minutes romping around the yard and soon had the other horses frolicking too. An hour later the vet called to say the health certificate had arrived. He would leave it at the tack shop in Show Low for me to pick up on my way out of town. I called Pam again to say we were back on the original schedule.

Koko's farewell to Mister was to attack him while Mister was standing tied beside the water tank. Mister untied himself trying to dodge Koko and galloped around the corral. He was so excited it took two of us to catch him after I'd locked up Koko. Despite that delay we were on the road within an hour.

Mister handled the mountain roads better than I'd hoped. A new freeway let us go diagonally across the Phoenix metroplex, saving at least 45 minutes.

We stopped for a fast food lunch in Litchfield Park, parked in what meager shade we could find and left Mister standing in the trailer with a pan of water in the manger under his nose. He spilled more than he drank. I took the water pan out before we started on the long, hot run across the desert to the Colorado river which is the Arizona/California state line.

Several hours later we crossed the river and stopped at the California inspection station. Mister got a brief rest while the inspectors checked his paperwork and recorded his move to California. Having the correct paperwork made it easy.

After the inspection we continued another 30 miles to a rest area where I gave Mister a dose of electrolyte paste and offered him more water while Dad and I took a break to stretch our legs. This time Mister drank most of the water. When Mister had drunk all he would we continued west.

Dusk found us on the outskirts of Banning, CA, where we stopped for supper. Mister got a longer rest and more water, which he drank. He was riding well but getting tired and we still had 75 miles to go.

The wind blows through Banning Pass so often and so hard that it is home to a large wind powered electric generating plant. We'd heard so much in the news about the rolling brown-outs in California I was surprised to see many of the wind turbines parked. It wasn't for lack of wind! We were spared sandstorms as darkness fell but fought a head wind so strong it slowed traffic and consumed fuel at an alarming rate. The wind subsided as we turned southwest on the final leg to Perris. Despite his fatigue Mister rode well through Lamb's Canyon. We were into familiar territory that has changed so much in 25 years we didn't recognize it.

Pam's directions were excellent. We found her place in the dark with no trouble, in a subdivision atop a hill that was nothing but brush when we left California in 1978. We parked in Pam's yard and when Mister had resigned himself to more standing in the trailer I let him out. He stood until I told him to "back up." Pam watched as he backed out perfectly, then threw her arms around his neck in a big hug. Mister liked that just fine!

Pam decided to turn Mister out for a while before putting him in a stall for the night. After 12 hours on the trailer Mister staggered and wobbled his way to the arena. He recovered his land legs within a few minutes and enthusiastically attacked the hay I'd brought. He was so busy eating he hardly noticed when I said my last goodbye and told him to be a gentleman for Pam. There was a lump in my throat as we drove east to Hemet to spend the rest of the night with Barbara, the family friend who introduced me to Walkers back in 1976.

The next morning, after a too brief visit with Barbara, Dad and I made the long drive home. The trip was uneventful and about two hours faster without a horse.

A few days later Pam e-mailed me saying her husband and friends were so impressed with Mister that they wanted three more just like him! I had to tell her that Mister is unique. She reported that Mister had settled in like he was born there. She was impressed that he'd walked up to her in the dark when she went to put him in the barn about half an hour after we left. The first morning she'd turned him out with her yearlings and he played nicely with them. When she drove her tractor outside the fence Mister chased the tractor. He nickered at her every time she came out the back door.

A week later Pam cheerfully reported that she'd taken Mister for a walk and nothing fazed him! When a windstorm blew some empty feed sacks across the arena her Arabians were so frightened they almost jumped the fence. Mister chased the sacks, caught one and carried it around the arena in his teeth, further traumatizing the Arabians. She was laughing about it. I told her Mister was just helping her sack them out.

Pam asked about clipping Mister. I told her he'd never seen electric clippers. A few days later Pam reported that when she'd clipped Mister's nose and around his hooves he'd gone to sleep! The following week she body-clipped him. He stood perfectly and when she was done he pranced around showing off how handsome he was. Pam thanked me several times for doing such a good job training Mister.

Poor training lowered the value of Sam's Blue Blaze by 33% despite her speed, style, color, and foal by a World Champion stallion from the most fashionable bloodlines. Good training increased Mister Star La Marr's value by 300% without regard for his color or pedigree.

FROM FOUNDATIONS TO THE FUTURE

GAITS OF GOLD: VIDEO CLINIC A Review by Franne Brandon

Fans of Brenda Imus' previous works, Heavenly Gaits and Gaits of Gold, now have another medium in which to benefit from her instructional skills. Gaits of Gold: Video Clinic, was developed, as Imus explains in her prologue, as the result of requests by readers of her books that she produce a video clinic to provide tips for improving the gaits of their horses of various breeds.

The video begins with an explanatory ramble which notes that the video is designed for pleasure and trail riders who want to improve or develop the gait at which their horse is the happiest, regardless of breed affiliation. The clinician works toward improving what the horse does as its gait of preference. No effort is made to change the horse's gait style to meet the demands of its breed registry. No attempt is made to produce finished show ring stock in any of the clips that comprise this video. Imus' persistent emphasis is on developing that way of going which each horse prefers to its maximum potential.

The video is divided into three distinct and separate segments, so that it is possible to watch and learn a section at a time. The first segment provides a video demonstration of all the various gaits that a horse can perform, including the two beat trot on a longe line, and a pace demonstrated by an Appaloosa. These are done at both regular speed and in slow motion. Each clip is prefaced by a strong audio cadence of hoofbeats illustrated by horseshoes moving in the pattern of footfalls for that gait. Following the trot and pace, the tape presents a lengthy explanation of the walk, treating it as the basis for the other 4-beat gaits. Each of the gaits stepping pace, foxtrot, running walk, rack - are defined so that the viewer can become aware of the differences in each. This segment finishes with the canter. All of the gait clips are demonstrated by a horse in gait in both normal and slow motion footage.

The second segment is titled "Conformation Considerations." In order to help viewers understand the importance of conformation limitations, the author has chosen 4 geldings with four different body types. Viewers are instructed to look for underlying structures or body angles rather than appearances. Imus advises her viewers to look for a level topline, and an even division of the horse's body into three parts. She offers advice and warnings on conformation problems that can result in unsoundness. Lines drawn in white on the four geldings help beginners, venturing into the sometimes confusing world of conformation, to better appreciate the explanations provided. Imus encourages viewers to watch

the video until the information becomes ingrained, and "You'll just know that you know" whenever a good horse is presented for inspection.

"Smoothing Things Out" is the focus of the third and final segment of the video. In this section, Imus uses footage from clinics that she has given to demonstrate techniques for changing undesirable gait characteristics or behaviors without the need to invest in expensive tack or training devices. Although she does not provide a clip illustrating a true pacer, the exercises and techniques used on horses with other types of movement as recorded produce results that vary from quite acceptable to just less than extraordinary. In the case of the round-bodied. trotting palomino walker, a simple change in riding style by his owner and some hill work transforms a rough individual into one that begins to perform a part time running walk, and a full-time smooth gait. Even horses with no major flaws should benefit from use of the exercises demonstrated by various riders on the tape.

With the first clinic horse, the author states that "Generally, a horse will not perform a really full and good intermediate gait with a simple snaffle, but will require some kind of curb action." While this might discourage those who prefer snaffle only riding, the advice provided in this tape should be useful to anyone searching for ways to learn and improve the movement of their own gaited horses. Since no show horses are filmed, true novices to the world of gaited horses might find it somewhat difficult to discern some of the more subtle gait distinctions as performed by the horses used in the clinic clips. Perhaps Brenda Imus needs to film some top show competitors from all breeds to create a video companion to Heavenly Gaits? This reviewer would certainly be interested in adding it to her video collection!
