
Bird dog trials at Mortlach, SK.

In 1967, when I was 12 years old my Uncle Robert Smith took me and my Welsh Pony to the Professional Bird Dog Trials. They run in the fall, south of Gainsborough, Saskatchewan, our home town. They were riding about 30 miles per day running dogs, and I rode all day for three days, bareback, and enjoyed every minute.

At the end of every morning and evening, I would lead in as many horses as I could handle (which was up to six), and the American dog trainers would ride back to camp in the dog wagon. As soon as they had driven out of sight I would switch over to what I thought was the best Walking Horse I had, and ride it most of the way in. Then I'd switch back just before the camp was in sight. (I found out later that I never fooled them for a minute, but they didn't mind.) From my first ride on one of those long striding horses I was hooked on Tennessee Walkers.

My first Walking Horse was a red roan mare named Sugarfoot. She'd been brought up from Alabama by one of the pro trainers. She was only a half-Walker, but she had a great flat walk and a slow, easy canter. As I couldn't afford better, I used numerous part Walkers, which were common in our part of the country, for the next few years to run my dogs. I bought them as two or three year olds and broke them myself. Some didn't walk too well but over time I learned how to get the best out of them.

I bought my first registered Walker as a green broke four-year-old in 1997. He was a big grey gelding, registered as Berachan Midnight Raider 934937. His sire was Streaker Autumn Echo 862395 and his dam was Baronessa 870632. We named him Dusty. (*Photo below.*)




Our horses are ridden pretty hard for a lot of miles in every type of terrain and extreme weather conditions every year. They regularly carry canteens of water for the dogs, saddle bags, ropes, roading harnesses and dog tracking equipment. They must be calm and not kick, step on or otherwise injure any dogs or puppies that are underfoot or around them. They must learn to 'road' dogs – walk along with one or two dogs in harness out front pulling at the end of a 20 foot rope hooked to the saddle.

Our horses are loaded and unloaded a lot, must ground tie and stand still for mounting, must calmly accept whistles blowing, calling commands to dogs, gunfire, birds flushing around them, and stand still while dog-tracking receivers with pop-out antennas are beeping and being waved from side to side. They must walk along calmly in the gallery or group of other riders following the dogs in a field trial. At any time they may be required to run after, catch and turn a fast-running bird dog, then return to the gallery and immediately walk calmly along with the group.

Walking Horses are smart, quick to learn, and enjoy having a job to do. Once they figure out our training program, most take a keen interest in what the dogs are doing and watch for them all the time. If I lose a dog, I usually look first in the direction my horse is looking, and most of the time he has already spotted the dog.

I find Walkers are easily trained to do most anything, due to their intelligence and calm nature. That, combined with endurance and a smooth ride every day makes them the ideal choice for our sport.

Three great horsemen, Ken McLean of Gainsborough, and John & Ted Gardner of Mississippi, taught me a lot about Walking Horses, horses in general, and bird dogs. That knowledge, combined with forty years of trial and error, has led me to numerous conclusions.

Right: Shown with the trophies they won -Curtis with Katie: John with Bo. Walking Horses come in all shapes and sizes, and all can walk. However, each is an individual, and bits, hoof angles, shoes, saddle equipment and type and the rider's ability all make a big difference and will dictate how well the horse walks.

The horse's conformation is another limiting factor. Some of our horses just aren't put together right for walking greatness. Some of the horses I've owned or rode had the desire and gave it everything they had, but just didn't have the conformation to be more than average horses.

The best statement I ever heard concerning Walking Horses came from my friend, Kelly McLean of Gainsborough. He said,

"If he's not smooth, change something."

It's that simple – but also that complex.

"Best to you all and have a great summer."




This year the winner of the Trail Challenge was Lissa Townsend and her horse, Toddy's Apollo.



SNOW and MORE SNOW! Despite the horrendous weather, the Alberta Walking Horse Assoc. held its AGM on MAY 29 at the home of Dave and Rhonda Lemmon. The reasoning behind holding the meeting in spring was to avoid the hazards of winter driving... Enough said!

The annual meeting had an exciting new format this year. In addition to the A.G.M. and Awards program, a Gathering and B.B.Q. was held Saturday afternoon, and a Dressage Clinic was offered on Sunday.




RIDE YOUR WALKER PROGRAM 2009

This was the most fun program I ever participated in! I got to do what I love to do and it turns out, I even get a prize for it. Thank You, CRTWH!

We live in beautiful Manitoba in the RM of Rossburn, and the Ketelsen Ranch counts about 1100 acres our own. The Riding Mountain National Park is a short 15 minute trailer drive away from us with its great hilly and well groomed trails. Besides our herd of Tennessee Walkers we also have Black Angus cattle. (A still clumsy little black foal out of Lady Black Kat by Highstepping Bob got us to 22 TWH and besides that there are still a few half bloods.)

I have been riding (on draft horses) since I was a kid and lived in Germany. As my parents finally exchanged the draft horses for a tractor, that was the end of my riding, or so I thought. Years later with family of my own, we got hung up on that crazy idea (so the family said) of immigrating to Canada. Once settled in – we lived the first 12 years of our Canadian adventure in Quebec - our daughter started asking for a horse. Well, I gave in ... and was sold. It went from one to several horses; it went from our daughters to our sons, and in one of them I have found the best riding companion you can think of. He has joined us last year and with it, we created "9 Finger Ranch", which will be offering trail rides and accommodation for horses and riders (ninefingerranch@hotmail.com).


Only when we moved to Manitoba in 2002 did we buy our first TWH, but since we have owned these "rocking chairs" of the horses, we don't want anything else. Last year was a great year for riding and my time was divided between Drifter (A&B Snow Drift) and Kit (Kit'N'Kaboodle). Drifter is THE horse for long rides in the Riding Mountain National Park, with his fast soft


running walk and his energy, but also because of his trust in me to direct him through thick and thin (and water) if need be. With son Ray I did, among others, our first two-day ride through the Park, which will surely not be the last one, and maybe not the longest one either. There are other trails I ride regularly and never get tired of; I have shown many friends and visitors my favorite spots. Drifter was also the horse to participate with me for the first time in Rossburn's annual parade at Fair Day. Side by side with son Ray we led the parade as flag bearers. None of the horses had ever done such a thing, so we did practice beforehand, but again, one can only be proud of how calmly the horses handled this.

Kit just loves to do this and if he can herd the cows just a little, the event is even better. We do pretty much all the cow work by horse.

Kit is also one you can trust to carry riders in the beginner stage on his back, so he is often alongside Drifter and me, when we show our trails at home or in the National Park to our guests. (Photo above left.)

I feel very lucky to live where I live. I love the rolling hills with the lakes and all the wildlife, which I get to see, especially if I am riding alone. I do love people's company but I don't necessarily need it - as long as I can ride my horses. (Below: Thomas & Ray.)

BIRDCATCHER SPOTS?


KEITH DOLL of DOLL'S TENNESSEE WALKERS, DOUGLAS was telling me about some interesting white spots that have appeared on his sorrel mare, Rebel's Queen O' Diamonds. He says she was not born with these spots, but has been developing more every year for the past few years. They are each about the size of a loonie. (See pix right & below) They are not the result of injury or disease, just areas that have lost their pigment and turned white.



This is very intriguing. I went to the horse person's colour reference, Sponenberg's *Equine Color Genetics*, to see if he has anything to say about this phenomenon. In it I found this reference to "birdcatcher spots" which sound like Queen's.

"The birdcatcher spots pattern of white spotting is rare and consists of small, random white spots scattered over the body. Birdcatcher spots are usually not numerous and usually not progressive. The name comes from a Thoroughbred horse named Irish Birdcatcher who sported such spots. They are unrelated to the leopard complex of colors, although if they are numerous they can resemble the snowflake pattern. Birdcatcher spots occur on horses of a wide number of breeds, but only in a very few individuals. Hairs in scarred or injured areas of any base color can grow in white, but these blemishes are distinct from birdcatcher spots, which are unrelated to injuries. Some horses acquire birdcatcher spots well into middle age, and some horses that develop birdcatcher spots lose them later in life.

No studies have ever been done concerning birdcatcher spots, but they are strongly associated





BEAUTIFUL JIM KEY: Book Review by Sue Gamble



The book "Beautiful Jim Key", with subtitle "The Lost History of the World's Smartest Horse", is by Mim Eichler Rivas and published by HarperCollins. (www.beautifuljimkey.com).

This true story is set in the United States at the turn of the previous century. The tale is painted by the events just after the American Civil War. Beautiful Jim Key was foaled in Shelbyville, Tennessee in May of 1889 and owned by 'Doc' William Key. Jim Key was the offspring of a broken down ex-circus Arabian mare and the stallion, Tennessee Volunteer, who was of Hambletonian trotting horse bloodlines. Jim Key was said to be an Arabian-Hambletonian cross.

A number of foundation Tennessee Walking horses trace to Hambletonian, which makes this book interesting for TWH owners. For example, foundation horses such as F-18 Echo and F-51 Bedford Boy descend from Hambletonian, while F-54 George Wilkes was sired directly by Hambletonian.*


Mim Eichler Rivas recognizes the connection between Beautiful Jim Key and the TWH when she briefly discusses the Tennessee Walking Horse emerging from the horses of the Shelbyville area.

'Doc' William Key was a former Negro slave who was known and loved as a local veterinarian, and salesman of his own "Keystone Liniment". He was quite a lovable character who knew and loved horses. After Jim Key was foaled, his dam did very poorly, and Jim Key himself was spindle legged and appeared to be in pain to the point that euthanasia was considered. Instead of naming the colt after a heroic figure, Doc Key picked the name 'Jim' after the staggering town drunk. The prefix Beautiful was attached at a later date when Jim Key became a celebrity for his unusual intelligence and extraordinary talent.

'Doc' William Key raised and trained Jim Key. The two became inseparable for the rest of their lives. 'Doc' Key had a special touch, and trained Jim through kindness and patience to know the letters of the alphabet, to count, to use a cash register to make change, and to spell names. Jim performed many other acts of intellect including bowing to the ladies in the audience, and having opinions on the politics of the day. Jim was allowed to have and express his own opinions. This amazing horse and his owner went on the road to display Jim's incredible intellectual talents. They were soon to meet up with A.R. Rogers who became their PR manager and arranged tours for Doc and Jim for many years in pursuit of being kind to animals. Rogers, Doc Key, and Jim Key participated in the establishment of the humane movement in the United States.

This book does not provide a road map to all the ways that Doc Key may have taught Jim Key to have a superior horse IQ, although it does provide explanations and clues to that end. The book is not only a good read if you want a better understanding of the people, places, and times in which the early Tennessee Walking horse evolved, but also an unforgettable story of a very remarkable horse. The fact that the "world's smartest horse" has connections to the TWH is just the icing on the cake.
